President Honored For 20 Years Of Service

Dr. James T. Jeremiah, President of Cedarville College from its first year as a Baptist college in 1953, was honored Friday evening, October 19, at a banquet given by the college trustees in the college gymnasium.

Past chairman of the College Board of Trustees, now President of Western Baptist Bible College in Salem, Oregon, Dr. Thomas Younger served as Master of Ceremonies. Faculty, staff and administrators, students and personal friends of Dr. and Mrs. Jeremiah and the College attended the banquet.

Tributes and presentations were made to Dr. Jeremiah following the meal. The president of the Cedarville College Alumni Association, which presently has a membership totaling almost 3000, Mr. Ronald Grosh, presented Dr. Jeremiah a gold medallion bearing the seal of the College to be worn with his academic regalia at such events as Honors Day and Graduation. ENROLLMENT SETS ANOTHER RECORD

A record enrollment causes rejoicing at Cedarville College. While universities and smaller colleges are currently suffering declining enrollment woes, Cedarville's enrollment has swelled to a record-breaking number.

Rumors proved true when 1009 students filled registration lines during the first week of classes, September 24.

The student body, expanded by over 100 students this fall, represents a cross-section of the U. S. Over 32 states and the District of Columbia are home states to Cedarville Students. The foreign countries of Liberia, Brazil, and Portugal are also represented by their citizens in the college enrollment. Students from missionary families on such fields as Australia, Africa, Brazil, Canada, and the Philippines provide an additional international perspective to the student com-

Included in the 1009 member student body are 293 from 90 Ohio GARB churches with an additional 182 Ohio students representing 119 independent churches.

SCIENCE CENTER IN SERVICE

Happy students and science faculty converged on the new Science Center at the beginning of fall quarter. Located in the new building are three chemistry, two physics, a physical science and a geology lab, as well as a lab for independent study work. Several rooms have been furnished with emergency showers, eye baths and fume hoods for students working with poisonous gases. A 16 inch telescope will facilitate the physical science and astronomy classes. A lecture hall, which will seat 164 students, has been equipped with a closed-circuit TV and video projector to be used to transmit the morning chapel service.

The biology department anticipates moving to the lower level of the new building by winter quarter. This area will house three labs, a classroom and an individual study lab.

The Alumni Association has accepted the challenge of raising \$50,000 of the remaining \$130,000 needed to offset the financial obligation outstanding.



FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

Dr. James T. Jeremiah, President



My family and I will long remember this year's Cedarville College Homecoming. We are very grateful for the many unusual gifts presented to us and the words of encouragement that were spoken on this twentieth anniversary.

Outstanding of all the presentations on the occasion was the decision by the student body to contribute \$10 per student each quarter toward the chapel building fund. The student contribution to the fund this year will total about \$20,000. I am most grateful to each one of them for this sacrificial giving. I am hopeful that this student action will inspire others to give too.

It is impossible to state how much we need the new chapel. When you consider that the present auditorium seats 700 and we have over 1,000 students, I think you can see a larger chapel is needed. However, unless some unusual gifts designated for the chapel are forthcoming, we must postpone a chapel fund drive until the cost of the new science building is completely paid. Gifts totaling \$620,000 toward our needed goal of \$750,000 have been received. The Alumni Association has accepted the challenge of raising \$50,000 of the remaining \$130,000.

Daily we thank God for what He has been pleased to do for all of us individually and as a college during the past twenty years. How completely He has fulfilled His promise "to make all grace abound . . . that ye . . . may abound to every good work" (2 Cor. 9:8). Without His abounding grace, there could never be a Cedarville College.

These are some of the areas to be dealt with in a series of three lectures for the 1973-74 In-Forum.

Initiated this fall by the Student Senate, In-Forum has replaced the college Lecture Series. It has been designed to encourage a cultural awareness, provoke critical thinking so that the student can develop his perspective of divine revelation. Along with the evening lecture, each guest speaker will participate in classes and discussion seminars.

The 1973-74 In-Forum concerns life. Dr. John N. Moore, M.S., Ed.D., professor of Natural Science, Michigan State University, East Lansing, Michigan, spoke November 8-9 on "The Nature of Life." "The Control of Life" will be the topic of Dr. John R. Meyer, Ph.D., assistant professor of Psysiology and Biophysics, University of Louisville, Louisville, Kentucky, January 10-11. Dr. Duane T. Gish, Ph.D., Associate Director of the Institute for Creation Research, San Diego, California, will provide the final lecture April 25-26, entitled "The Purpose of Life."


















Homecoming Week Hums With Activities

HOMECOMING

Special speakers, special events, and a special anniversary filled the activity calendar during the 1973 Homecoming week, October 15-19, at Cedarville College.

The days preceding the Homecoming weekend found the students attention turned toward alumni as five visiting alumni brought chapel messages throughout the week. Alumni chapel speakers who set the stage for Homecoming were Rev. John Lawlor, '63, Baptist Bible College, Clarks Summit, Pennsylvania; Mr. John Willetts, '58, superintendent of Brunswick City (Ohio) Schools; Rev. Dan Boyd, '68, pastor of Grace Baptist Church, Montpelier, Indiana; Dr. Dale Thomson, '56, Malone College, Canton, Ohio; and Dr. Maurice Stone, 58, Slippery Rock State College, Slippery Rock, Pennsylvania.

Among the many activities scheduled for the festive weekend, the most significant was the Twentieth Anniversary Banquet given Friday, October 19, in honor of Dr. James T. Jeremiah, College President since 1953. The banquet was attended by friends and alumni of Cedarville recognizing Dr. Jeremiah for his outstanding leadership of the college for the last twenty years.

Homecoming Day dawned clear and crisp as many alumni, friends and students assembled along Main Street for the traditional Homecoming parade. The procession included the Cedarville High School Band, class and alumni floats, Congressman Clarence Brown, and the 1973 Homecoming Queen, Miss Peggy Wagner, and her court.

Sports events attracted the Homecoming crowd to the athletic fields. The Invitational cross country meet brought the Cedarville Yellow Jackets a first place trophy over eight other teams. The Cedarville-Walsh soccer game saw the Yellow Jackets score another Homecoming Day victory as they defeated Walsh, 5-2. Prior to the beginning soccer kick-off, skydivers from Greene County Parachute Club descended upon the new soccer field to present the game ball to the game players.

During half-time, Miss Peggy Wagner received her crown as the 1973 Homecoming Queen from 1972 queen, Miss Yvonna Cope. Peggy, from San Diego, California, is a senior majoring in physical education. Her attendants were Miss Debbie Dear, a senior majoring in elementary education. Miss Becky Lamb, a junior majoring in Bible; Miss Mindy Andes, a sophomore music major; and Miss Carolyn Sapp, a freshman business administration major.

Many hours of plans, work, and lost sleep were rewarded Saturday as float competition was judged. A missionary translator and nurse serving under the Association of Baptists for World Evangelism, Miss Lockerbie was presented the 1973 Alumna of the Year Award in absentia during Homecoming activities, October 20. The Asian missionary is the author of the book *On Duty In Bangladesh*, in which she accounts the tragedies and atrocities that are a part of daily living in a war-torn country.

Miss Lockerbie is presently preparing to return to Bangladesh following furlough in the United States.

Counseling Services Offered

Applying Biblical principles to effective daily living, Christian counseling has become a full-time service provided by the college. It is designed to meet the varied needs of the college students and concentrates on a God-centered, Bible-based approach to Christian counseling. Counseling services available include personality development, self-concept evaluation, family relationships, spiritual life, pre-marital counseling and occupational and vocational information. The program also includes a strong emphasis on testing services.

Mr. Ken Nichols, Director of Counseling Services, views this service as "a total, vital ministry." A graduate of Cedarville College, Mr. Nichols received his Masters degree in Personnel Counseling from Wright State University near Dayton, Ohio.

"God has given Christians an ability to discern and minister to others' needs. Christian counseling is sharing and praying together for insights into a more effective Christian experience. A more effective person becomes a more effective Christian."

An effective Christian experience can be discovered in a practical application of the Word of God through principles and projects used on a daily basis. The counselee is given assignments and projects each week. An assignment includes memorization of Scripture pertaining to the problem, a study and report of a passage of Scripture and a reading assignment. Each project is designed for an individual problem and must, along with the assignment, be completed each week. The actual counseling session involves a time of praying and sharing the application of these principles.

Success is difficult to measure but easy to recognize in the lives of those students availing themselves of the services of a total Bible ministry through counseling.

by Mr. Lloyd Ostendorf of Dayton, was unveiled by Mrs. Miriam Maddox on behalf of the college faculty and staff.

The Doctor of Letters degree was conferred upon Dr. Jeremiah by the Board of Trustees of Cedarville College. Dr. Clifford Johnson, Academic Dean, presented the citation. Mr. Dan Estes, president of Student Senate, presented Dr. Jeremiah with a student body pledge of \$10 per student per quarter for the next two quarters to be placed into a fund for a new chapel. This type of gift is a student tradition and has greatly aided in the building of the Gymnasium Student Center and new Library. A fourteen-place setting of sterling silver was

given to Mrs. Ruby Jeremiah by Mrs. Sandy Entner on behalf of the Cedarville College Women's Fellowship. Mr. George Engelmann, chairman of the board of trustees, presented Dr. & Mrs. Jeremiah with a Champion motor home, privately donated through gifts from trustees, churches and friends.

In 1953, upon the suggestion of the pastor of the Emmanuel Baptist Church in Dayton, Ohio, the Baptist Bible Institute of Cleveland, Ohio, assumed the debts of the Presbyterians at Cedarville College totaling \$60,000. That fall, Cedarville became a Baptist College. In November of that year, the trustees asked this pastor to become the president of the college, and Dr. Jeremiah has assumed this responsibility for twenty years.

The "new" college included a faculty of ten and a student body of 105. Under Dr. Jeremiah's administration, the school has grown to a faculty of sixty and a student body of over one thousand in just twenty years. Nine buildings and fifteen acres have expanded to ninteen buildings and 105 acres.

A graduate of Baptist Bible Seminary in Johnson City, New York, and Central State University in Wilberforce, Ohio, Dr. Jeremiah pastored churches in Panama, New York, and Toledo and Dayton, Ohio, before assuming the responsibility of President of Cedarville College. In 1961 the Doctor of Divinity degree was conferred upon him by Dr. Wesley, president of Central State University. Today Dr. Jeremiah continues to preach in many churches on behalf of the college. His primary concern is that Cedarville remain a college "For the Word of God and testimony of Jesus Christ." He also presents a daily radio broadcast, "Campus Challenge," and has published a book entitled *The Importance of Inspiration*. Having been active in the Ohio Independent Baptist Council and the Baptist Mid-Missions Council, Dr. Jeremiah presently serves on the G.A.R.B.C. Council of Eighteen.

Scores Impressive Record

An impressive record of 6-1 was compiled by the cross country team this fall in dual meets. Running the home course in 27.26, Paul Budnik broke the previous year's record set by Paul Beck at 28.19.

The runners captured two invitations in two weeks. Taking first place in the Cedarville College Homecoming Invitational, they scored 33 points, ten under Earlham, coming in second. The following Friday they racked up a perfect score of 15 at the Concordia Invitational held at Ann Arbor, Michigan. The Jackets set a wide margin between themselves and second place Grace College, which compiled a score of 53.

Although having worked this year with an inexperienced team of six freshmen and two upperclassmen, Coach King felt that the team was very successful.

Soccer Team Successful

Cedarville College's soccer team has just completed its most successful regular season in the 10-year history of the sport, climaxed by a 4-1 win over the University of Dayton. The Jackets are now entering into NAIA district and area playoffs with a hopeful eye on a trip to the national tournament in St. Louis.

Cedarville posted a 10 and 1 won-loss record as the Jackets rolled over the University of Cincinnati, Wittenberg, Miami, Malone, Urbana, Walsh, Bluffton, Ohio Northern, Wilmington and Dayton. The lone defeat came at the hands of Denison 3-1.

Cedarville was again led by All-American Larry Bollback, who scored 20 goals and assisted on 5 goals. Bollback, a junior, again is a top candidate for All-American.

Cedarville's future in soccer is still bright as six starters this season are freshmen and sophomores.

"PASSING THE TORCH"

Participation in the "Passing the Torch" Program has grown to 665 units, providing \$85,226 in pledges, and gifts.

The college has set a goal of 800 pledges from individuals and families interested in subsidizing the cost of a student's education. A "Passing the Torch" gift of \$10 monthly will help train future Christian leaders.
