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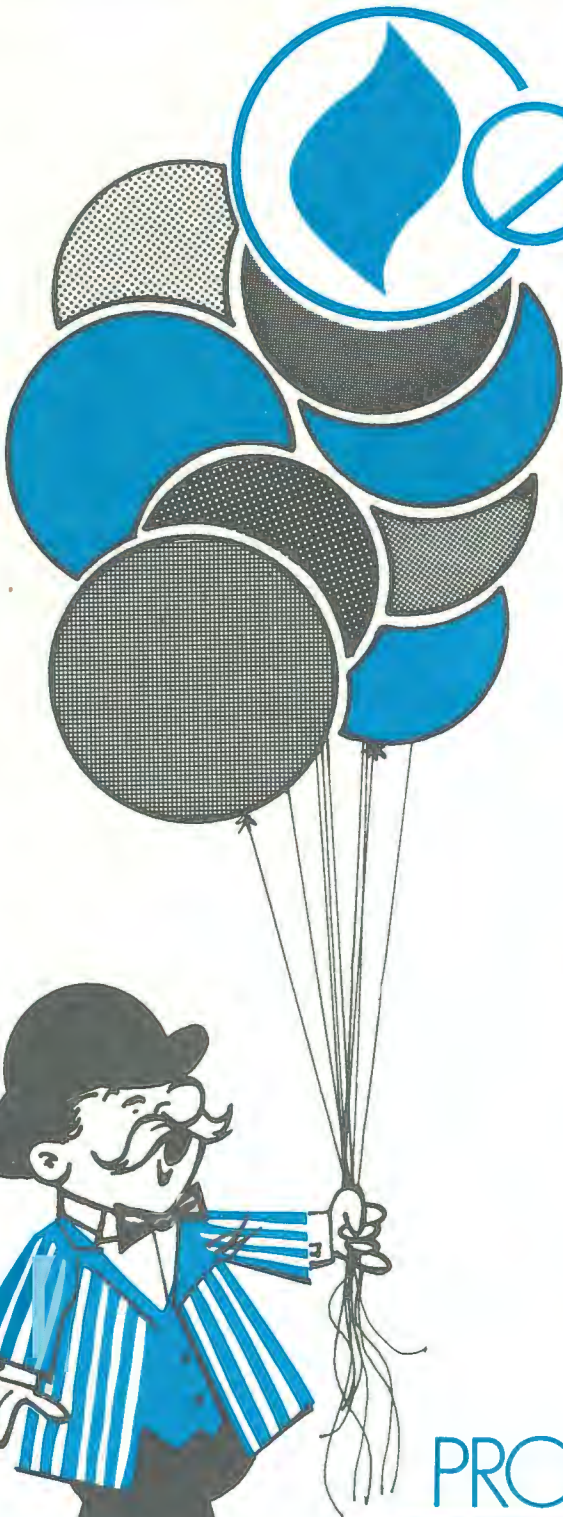

The summer of 1970 was the beginning of the Missionary Internship Service (MIS) program at Cedarville College with seven students involved in missionary efforts that summer. Since that time, participation has increased to over 50 students. Partially responsible for the rising interest in the program is the greater number of locations open to MIS candidates.

This summer, students will be able to serve in the Philippines, Australia, Brazil, Israel, Liberia, Africa, Mexico, France, Canada, Alaska, Hawaii, and various home mission fields.

The purpose of the MIS program is three-fold. Many participants go, seeking the will of God in their lives regarding missions. This field experience provides practical training in authentic situations. Through observation and participation, students are exposed to the reality of missions, what makes them work, and the dedication and sacrifice required of a missionary. Rev. Harold Green, campus pastor, feels that this experience saves many "first-term casualties" as missionary appointees enter their field aware of aspects of life which will be divergent from the normal pattern of living.

This summer, various ministries will be available in which students may participate. A team of approximately fifteen individuals will be involved in high school and church evangelism in Australia. Those going to Alaska will be working in camp ministries. Evandro Batista, who came to Cedarville from Brazil as a result of the first MIS team to that country, is going to lead the third Brazil team, which will be a musical team. Another team to Brazil will be led by John Mitchell, son of missionaries Kenneth and Jean Mitchell. This group's ministry will include construction and conducting tent meetings. This summer will be the second opportunity for a team to work on a Kibbutz in Israel.

Although it is still too early to acquire an accurate response, many who have been involved in the MIS program are now preparing for the missionfield.

The MIS program has two divisions. The sponsorship program is conducted entirely by the college. The MIS Committee makes all arrangements such as itineraries, housing, flights, and programs. This program is open to all Cedarville students. A student under the assistantship program works with an approved mission board and must have completed his sophomore year.

Those participating in the MIS program are responsible for raising their own support. Many do this through letters to friends and through presenting their ministry in churches. Students going on MIS as organized teams often present programs. Each class at the college supports those going on MIS from their class. In addition, at the end of the year, the campus fellowship gives the balance of its monies to the MIS fund.

The MIS Committee consists of Dr. Don Callan, Chairman, Professor of Physical Education; Rev. Harold Green, Campus Pastor; Mr. David Gidley, Director of Financial Aid; Mr. Richard McIntosh, Associate Professor of Bible; and Mr. Harmon Bergen, Associate Professor of English.

Institute On Scientific Creationism

Cedarville College will be hosting a Summer Institute on Scientific Creationism, conducted by the Institute for Creation Research of San Diego, California, August 18-22, 1975. This is an intensive 30-hour study of scientific evidence supporting special creation and a catastrophic view of earth history. Those who desire to receive undergraduate credit must meet the Cedarville College admissions requirement of having made a profession of faith in Christ as Savior.

Student Missionary Projects

Meeting financial needs at home and abroad is part of the purpose of the Student Missionary Project (SMP) Committee at Cedarville College. Students recently decided by vote upon SMP funds for the 1974-75 year.

Through student donations during registration, \$1200.00 has been designated for needs at home. Shawnee Hills Baptist Church in Jamestown, Ohio was newly formed this year and has ten acres of land on which to build a church building. Students voted to give \$350.00 toward the church's building program. An additional \$350.00 will be given to Skyview Ranch to share in their attempt to pay the balance of a \$70,000.00 land contract. At the beginning of spring quarter, SMP will provide \$500.00 to help defray expenses at the annual spring Missionary Conference on the college campus. The conference is arranged and sponsored by the Fellowship for World Missions student organization.

During a chapel service in December, a love offering was taken. This offering will be divided and sent to the Bangladesh and the Honduras relief funds sponsored by the Association of Baptists for World Evangelism (ABWE).

Through the SMP Committee, students are able to participate in missionary giving and share in needs around the world.

Jay Adams Visits Campus

In seeking to enrich the quality of Christian service and to sharpen the effectiveness of Christian witness at the college level, the Thomas F. Staley Lectureship Foundation, which is a private, non-profit organization, sponsored its third annual week-long program at Cedarville January 14-17.

Dr. Jay Adams of Westminster Theological Seminary in Philadelphia, was the featured Christian scholar and spoke on the inter-relationships between psychology, counseling, and the Christian's life.

To be a competent counselor, Dr. Adams stressed that one be in a right personal relationship with God before attempting to help others with problems. The Word of God should not only be used in daily living, but one should use it as a text sufficient for counseling and become a diligent student of it.

A thorough knowledge of the Bible is also essential because everyone is a potential counselor for friends in need.

To those who wish to become full-time counselors, Dr. Adams suggests that the place to prepare is a seminary's Greek and theology classes, and the pastorate is the place to have a counseling ministry.

Having authored eight books since 1970 based on an extensive counseling ministry, Dr. Adams describes himself as a "knowledgeable pioneer" in the field of Scriptural Counseling and strives to introduce others to this discipline and to stimulate thinking through his lectures.

The sixteenth annual Missionary Conference will be held on April 6-11, 1975. The conference is sponsored by Fellowship for World Missions (FWM), a missionary prayer organization on campus. The officers of FWM decide upon missionary speakers through recommendations made by students, faculty and approved mission boards.

Four missionaries and one missionary appointee will be speaking during the 10:00 a.m. chapel hours and at the 6:15 and 7:30 p.m. evening sessions. Coming from Bangladesh is Dr. Don Ketcham who works with Dr. Viggo Olsen at the Memorial Christian Hospital in Malumghat under Association of Baptists for World Evangelism (ABWE).

Rev. William J. Reid is a missionary to Hong Kong serving with ABWE. Rev. Larry Abbott works with Campus Bible Fellowship in Iowa under Baptist Mid-Missions. An appointee of Baptist Mid-Missions, Mike Horn is planning to minister in Holland. Rev. Sami Kanani, under Evangelical Baptist Missions, works with Arabs in the Detroit area. In addition to speaking, these men will also give color slide presentations concerning their ministries during the 7:30 p.m. sessions.

Book Review

Converging Signs, by James T. Jeremiah
(Christian Educational Publications, 1974,
31pp., pb.)

This paperback booklet consists of twelve radio messages given on "Campus Challenge", a radio ministry of Cedarville College, by President James T. Jeremiah. The messages are biblically oriented and well illustrated with excerpts from books, magazines and newspapers.

Dr. Jeremiah makes it very clear that certain events that are signs of Christ's approaching second coming can be discerned today as indicated by the Scriptures. He carefully warns, however, that identifying these events and trends should never culminate in setting a date for Christ's return. This would result in a serious contradiction of Matthew 24:36. A further important note of interpretation is that the prophetic signs converging today do not point to the Rapture of the Church (I Thess. 5:13-18) for that event can and might occur at any time. Rather the "signs of the times" indicate that Christ's personal, visible, bodily return to the earth to reign as King of Kings and Lord of Lords (Rev. 19:11-15) is nearing.

The converging signs cited in the booklet are: international unrest and turmoil, catastrophic famines, spiritual indifference, apostasy in the professing Christian church, a one-world church, an increase in demonic activity, materialism, the deterioration of the home, the proliferation of knowledge, and the twentieth century movement of Jews to Palestine. The recognition of these things should create an attitude of expectancy and an impetus to live for God now.

This concise treatment of such a relevant subject will be of real help to all Christians of any spiritual age.

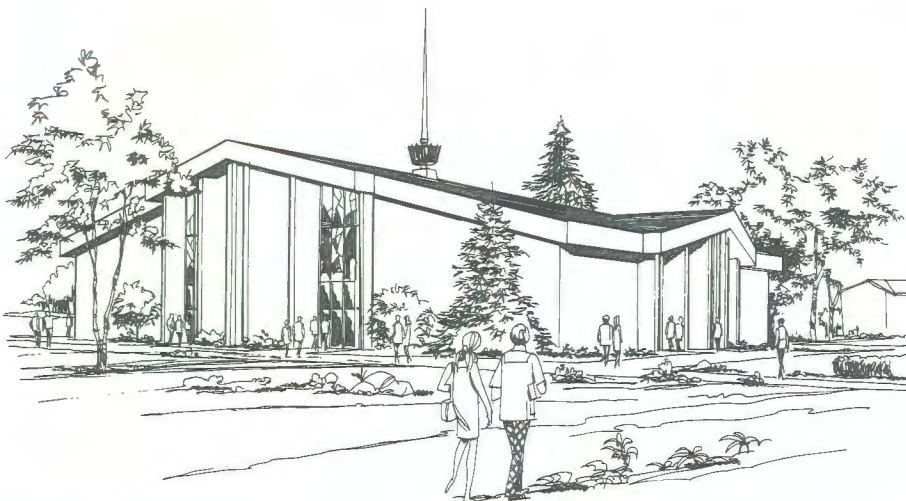

PROGRESS: REVIEW AND PREVIEW

The progress and plans of Cedarville College are being presented in different regions of the country by a series of banquets which will feature President James T. Jeremiah as guest speaker.

In January, local pastors of Flint, Michigan met for breakfast with Dr. Jeremiah. Two banquets for the review and preview of Cedarville College have been planned for the state of Iowa. The Grandview Park Baptist Church of Des Moines and the Walnut Ridge Baptist Church of Waterloo will host the formal banquets on Friday, February 28 and Saturday, March 1, respectively. A Cedarville

College musical team will provide special music.

The banquet, which is free of charge, will provide fellowship for alumni, friends, prospective students, and their parents and be informative of Cedarville College's progress and plans for the new chapel.

The urgently needed chapel, as presently envisioned, will seat approximately 1,500, more than double the seating capacity of Alford Auditorium which is inadequate for a record student body of 1,050.

Another banquet is being planned for Toledo, Ohio this spring. The cost of these meals provided by the churches is defrayed by a free-will offering.

TEACHER EDUCATION EXAMINATION

On October 22-24, 1974, the Division of Teacher Education and Certification of the State Department of Education evaluated the teacher education programs at Cedarville. The areas they evaluated were: (1) objectives, organization and financial support; (2) preparation of faculty and student personnel services; (3) curriculum; and (4) student teaching, lab experience, and educational media center. The examination included planned and spontaneous interviews. In their evalua-

tion, the team suggested some areas which need improvement such as additional buildings, a student center, classrooms, and a chapel.

The team unanimously recommended approval of the teacher education programs. They stated that the most noticed characteristic of Cedarville's teacher education institution was the complete agreement of its stated philosophy and its implementation through Christian commitment by the staff, students, and curriculum.

The outstanding individual on the 2-4 squad is the matman at 177, 1974 All-Ameri-

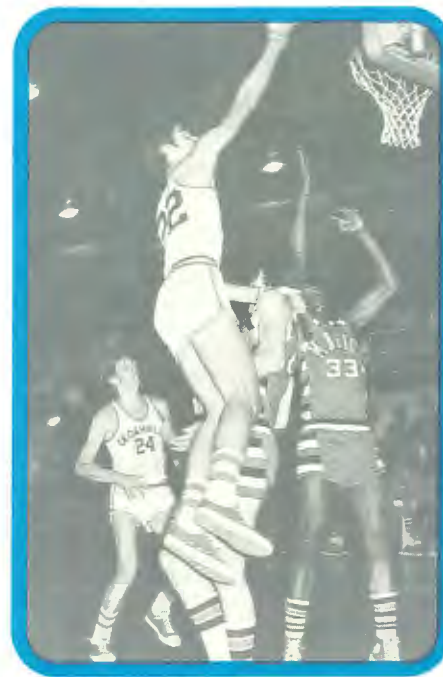

"Campus Challenge" is a radio vehicle to reach and tell people about both the gospel message and Cedarville College. This radio program, presented by Dr. James T. Jeremiah, President, originated about seven years ago and has a present outreach through 18 stations including such diverse locations as Puerto Rico, WIVV; Florida, WTLN; and Connecticut, WIHS. Dr. Jeremiah explains that the program is effectively reaching people. Cedarville receives between fifty and one hundred replies to the broadcast monthly, with most responses coming from Cleveland's WCRF listeners.

The five minute "Campus Challenge" program finances tapes, duplications, and mailing, but its air time is completely donated along with other contributions made towards program support.

A future goal of this ministry is the inclusion of an additional fifteen stations in the "Campus Challenge" broadcast network, with a concentration in Indiana, Michigan, and other areas where there is strong student representation.

Spring Tours

Five groups of students will be representing the Lord Jesus Christ and Cedarville College through various ministries during spring break, March 21-31, 1975. Two Swordbearer teams will be braving the elements of the snow in Michigan while the Beach Evangelism team enjoys the warmth and sunshine of Florida.

The two Michigan teams will be ministering in eastern and western Michigan, one in the Battlecreek-Lansing area and the other in the Detroit-Flint area. These teams will be involved in the total church ministry. Responsibilities will include door-to-door visitation as well as services in which special music, seminars, childrens' programs, and challenges from the Word of God will be presented. The Beach Evangelism team will be engaged in personal evangelism on the beach during the day and in church ministries in the evenings.

The 48-member Concert Choir under the direction of David L. Matson, will give sacred concerts in the southeastern United States including Kentucky, Tennessee, North Carolina, West Virginia, Ohio and Indiana. Lyle Anderson's Choralaires, touring with 46 members, will present thirteen concerts as they visit churches in Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Connecticut, Massachusetts, New York, West Virginia and Ohio.

Plan now to hear the Cedarville group which will visit your area.
