The Harmonizers (Men's Quartet) filled several engagements before Christmas, and as this is the boys' second year in singing together, they put on a really harmonious musical program, and entertainment as well.

The Girls' Quartet who call themselves the Orange and Blue Warblers have begun to make a reputation for themselves on the campus, and a few outside engagements. Likewise the Melody Trio has entertained in chapel and has held regular rehearsals.

The climax of the Christmas music however, reached new heights on Sabbath night, December 12th when the Mixed Chorus of forty-five members sang "The Holy City" by Gaul, in a regular convocation service.
