Cedarville College

EDARVILLE College is situated in the beautiful and historic village of Cedarville, Greene County, Ohio, in the fertile Miami Valley. It is on the Little Miami Division of the P. C. C. & St. Railway, 47 miles southwest of Columbus and 73 miles northeast of Cincinnati. It is 25 miles east of Dayton, 12 miles south of Springfield and 8 miles northeast of Xenia. Situated in the very center of one of the most prosperous, progressive regions of Ohio, Cedarville and its vicinity constitute a most desirable location for an educational institution and for the residence of those who wish to live here while their children are in college. Those whose desire to remove to Cedarville for this purpose will have the assistance of the college officials in renting or purchasing homes or farms.

CONTROL

Cedarville College is under the control of its own self-perpetuating board of trustees. The college is under the general direction of the General Synod of the Reformed Presbyterian Church. It is decidedly a Christian college, but in no sense sectarian. Students of all religious faiths are welcomed and made at home. The moral and religious surroundings and influences both in the college and in the community are of the best and most wholesome sort.

INCOME AND ENDOWMENT

The total endowment of the college on July 1st, 1922, was \$163,-345.46. A successful financial campaign conducted during the summer of 1921 will result in \$100,000.00 more being added to the endowment in the near future. Other sources of income are the tuition fees of the students, contributions of churches and gifts and bequests of friends.

BUILDINGS




College Hall

Cedarville College has now three buildings: College Hall, the main administration and recitation building; the Alford Memorial Gymnasium; and the Carnegie Library. In addition to these the successful financial campaign of 1921 made provision for starting three new buildings: a science hall, a new gymnasium, and a women's dormitory. The first of these is now in the course of construction and will probably be completed in 1922. This is the new science hall, which is to be located north of College Hall. The basement will contain offices, quarters for elementary science, waiting rooms, toilets and a heating plant. The first floor will contain the chemical laboratories and lecture room. The second floor will contain the physical and biological laboratories and lecture rooms.




Alford Memorial Gymnasium

Proposed New Gymnasium








Scenes Around Cedarville



REV. W. R. McCHESNEY, PH. D., D. D. President of Cedarville College

Dr. McChesney is practically the founder of the college. As its first professor in 1894, he gathered 37 students around him and with two assistant teachers started instruction in the old McMillan mansion, where a famous academy had been conducted in the early days of the State. The next year College Hall was built, and from that day to this the institution has prospered under his hand. In 1915, the Rev. David McKinney, D. D., LL. D., the first president of the college, resigned, and Dr. McChesney was elected president. He also teaches philosophy and oratory.



DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



ATHLETICS

All students are required to secure a certain minimum of credit in physical education unless excused for physical disability or labor necessary for self-support. This credit may be secured either by participation in athletic sports or in gymnasium classes. Foot ball, basket ball, base ball and tennis are the favorite forms of athletic activity. All are under the direct supervision of the faculty and are warmly encouraged, but not to such an extent as to interfere with studies and other college duties.



Cedarville College Minstrels


A minstrel show, under faculty censorship, is given by the students once in every two or three years. The proceeds go to some worthy college purpose.

Several plays are presented each year, giving many of the students valuable dramatic training.








Whitelaw Reid's Old Home

Courses of Instruction

- 1. The Arts Curriculum, providing a regular college course leading to the degree of Bachelor of Arts.
- 2. The Arts-Education Curriculum, giving a regular college course with professional studies preparatory to teaching, and leading to the degree of Bachelor of Arts and to the State High School Provisional Certificate. This certificate permits the holder for four years to teach in any high school or to superintend school in any school district in the State of Ohio. After the holder has taught upon it successfully for three years he is granted a life certificate without any examination.
- 3. The Arts-Theology Curriculum, leading to the degree of Bachelor of Arts and to the diploma of the Theological Seminary.
- 4. The Arts-Science Curriculum, providing a regular college course with special emphasis upon natural science, and leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science.
- 5. The Arts-Agriculture Curriculum, providing a regular college course and also professional work in agriculture, and leading to the two degrees of Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Science in Agriculture. This is a five-year curriculum. The student spends three years in Cedarville College and two years in Ohio State University. He gets his first degree from Cedarville College at the end of his fourth year, and his second degree from the University at the end of his fifth year.
- 6. The Agricultural Curriculum, providing two years of college work preparatory to agriculture in Cedarville College and two years of work in agriculture at Ohio State Universty, and leading to the degree of Bachelor of Science in Agriculture, conferred by the University.
- 7. The Normal Curriculum for Elementary Teachers, providing a year of professional training and leading to a certificate stating the amount and quality of work done.
- 8. A Preparatory Department for those who lack college entrance requirements and leading to a diploma of graduation.
- 9. A course in Typewriting, designed to fit students for taking dictation directly on the typewriter.
- 10. A Department of Music, giving instruction in piano, voice, harmony and history of music and leading to a diploma of graduation.
- 11. Special Courses. Student not wishing to complete any one of the above, may take special courses chosen from any department to meet their special needs and desires. They are, of course, limited to the choice of studies for which they are prepared.
- 12. A Regular Theological Curriculum, given in the Reformed Presbyterian Theological Seminary, affiliated with Cedarville College, and leading to a diploma of graduation.
- 13. A Graduate Theological Curriculum, open only to college and seminary graduates, and leading to the degree of Bachelor of Divinity.

Tuition and Other Fees

THE FEES are about half what they are in the average college. The fee for tuition is fifteen dollars per semester. There is a contingent fee of five dollars and an athletic fee of five dollars per semester. The athletic fee not only provides for physical education, but also secures the right to a ticket of admission to all athletic contests conducted by the college. The laboratory fee is five dollars per semester for elementary science and ten dollars per semester for advanced courses. There is also a breakage deposit of five dollars a semester for courses in chemistry. After breakage is deducted the balance is returned to the student. Only one year of science is required in the regular A. B. Course.

EXPENSES

Living expenses are much lower in Cedarville than in many college towns. This enables many to get an education who could not elsewhere do so. Tuition, contingent and athletic fees come to \$50 a year. Text-books cost \$15. Room rent, including light, heat and care, costs from \$2 to \$2.50 per week, or from \$72 to \$90 a year. Boarding costs about \$4.00 per week, or \$144 a year. The strictly college expenses can thus be kept down to less than \$300 a year. Of course, this estimate does not include such items as laundry, clothing, travel, expenses in vacations or luxuries. Such expenses will, of course, vary with the tastes and habits of different students.

ROOMS AND BOARDING

Students at Cedarville room in the best homes in the village, approved by college officials. A women's dormitory is to be erected in the near future. The students conduct their own co-operative College Boarding Club, which is established in the basement of the College Library, where it has a living room, dining hall and kitchen. Excellent board is furnished at actual cost amounting to about four dollars per week. Students away over the week-end get it for less.

EMPLOYMENT BUREAU

After a student has taken a complete or even a partial course at Cedarville he has the right to the gratuitous assistance of the college employment bureau. Many students get good positions through its activities.
