Location Of Cedarville College

Cedarville College is located in Cedarville, Greene County, Ohio. It is in the southwestern part of Ohio. It is in the northern part of the beautiful Miami Valley. The main line of the Pennsylvania Railroad from Pittsburgh to Cincinnati, Chicago, and St. Louis runs through Cedarville.

Cedarville is only eight miles from Xenia, twelve miles from Springfield, twenty-four miles from Dayton, twenty-six miles from Washington C. H., forty-six miles from Columbus, and sixty-two miles from Cincinnati.

CEDARVILLE

The village of Cedarville has a population of 1100. It is a typical college town. It has three good churches, Presbyterian, Methodist Episcopal and United Presbyterian. The streets and sidewalks are paved. A new system of water-works fed by artesian wells has been installed. The town is lighted by electricity. The homes are heated by natural gas or coal and lighted by electricity. The public schools are among the best in Ohio. The educational, moral, and religious tone of Cedarville is of the best type. The business houses and industrial plants are attractive and meet the needs of all classes of customers. The people are hospitable and students are welcomed and made to feel at home.

THE COMMUNITY

The community around Cedarville is one of the finest and richest agricultural districts in the United States. Its farmers are prosperous and of a high type of good citizenship. Their homes are modern and substantial.

Both Cedarville and community are good places for parents to settle who have children to educate in public school and college.

THE CAMPUS

The buildings of Cedarville College are located on three tracts of ground. These tracts constitute the campus. The campus is beautifully shaded with trees, the gift for the most part of the late Ambassador Whitelaw Reid, whose birthplace is only one mile from Cedarville. The campus also has the various fields of athletic sports located on it.

REFECTORY

A dining hall is maintained in the basement of the library building for the students. An experienced matron is in charge. The students have a steward who purchases their provisions. This is the popular dining club of the students. The prices are kept at a minimum cost. The meals are well prepared and are palatable and healthful.

ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS

Students are admitted to the Freshman Class without examination from first grade high schools or their equivalent.

They may be admitted to classes higher than the Freshman upon presentation of college credits or their equivalent from other institutions of approved standing.

A CHRISTIAN COLLEGE

Cedarville College was founded by the Covenanters, the lineal descendants of the Covenanters of Scotland and Ireland. Cedarville College remained under the control of that denomination until 1928 when the General Synod of that church gave the ownership and control of the college into the hands of the Board of Trustees. This Board consists of ministers and laymen, all of whom except one are Presbyterians. There is no other co-educational college of Presbyterian principles within one hundred and fifty miles of Cedarville College. Its doors and privileges are open to people of all churches. It is attended by young people of all denominations and is receiving the support of all Christian people devoted to the maintenance and perpetuation of the fundamental truths of the church and the practice of God's Word.

FAVORABLE ACTION

In their September meetings, two of the largest presbyteries of the Synod of the Presbyterian Church, U. S. A. in Ohio unanimously passed resolutions commending Cedarville College to the consideration of parents who have children to educate; and these presbyteries also commended Cedarville College to the liberality and generous support of their constituents.

The action of these two presbyteries, the presbytery of Columbus and of Dayton, is an encouragement to Cedarville College and cannot but be an inspiration to their friends and the friends of Cedarville College to cooperate to make Cedarville College bigger and better.

COLLEGE BAND

Cedarville College has a band of twenty young men and women. It furnishes music for many of the public functions of the college. It is open to all students who can play wind instruments.

GLEE CLUB

A glee club of twenty-five girls has been maintained by the college for several years. Besides the training and practice given in the studio, the girls of the Glee Club give entertainments in schools, churches, and at clubs. Their work is very popular.

SOCIAL ACTIVITIES

Students have a social committee cooperating with a like committee of the faculty to plan the social life of the students and the faculty. The Y. M. and Y. W. and Literary societies besides local church organizations contribute to this phase of college life. The various classes have the usual spreads, breakfasts, gym meets and banquets. Our students, like all other young people, love fun and they are full of pep and have good times.

LITERARY SOCIETIES

The old fashioned literary societies prevail in Cedarville College. By rehearsals in declamation, essay, extempo, oration, and debate, the spirit and power of public expression are developed. These societies are popular and one of the best means to teach a young person confidence and ability in public speech.

OPENING

Cedarville College began its thirty-seventh year September 10. The opening address was given by Mr. Frank B. McMillin, president of the Ohio Chamber of Commerce. His subject was "A Call to the Colors". His address was timely, impressive, and well received.

Nearly all of last year's students returned and there was a good enrollment of Freshmen.

VISITING CLASSES

From time to time the professors of Cedarville College take their classes on trips to inspect schools, factories, aviation fields; also to hear noted speakers, and to visit institutions of various kinds.

LIBRARY

In 1905 the late Hon. Andrew Carnegie gave Cedarville College a library. It has a capacity of 30,000 volumes. It contains upwards of 10,000 volumes. The leading periodicals and magazines are on its reading tables.

Arrangements have just been completed for all students taking the Librarians' course to do practical work in the library preparatory to their life-work.

MAINTENANCE AND EXPANSION FUND

In July of this year the president of the college started a movement to raise an Expansion and Maintenance Fund of \$15,000 for the year 1930-1931. The purpose of this fund is to provide against a deficit in the current expenses and to keep workers in various fields to raise an additional Building and Endowment Fund of \$750,000. This fund is to be raised as soon as possible, but it is desired to secure at least \$300,000 additional endowment within the next four years, or by June 1934, which will make the fortieth year of the college.

About \$5,000 of this Maintenance and Expansion Fund has been secured. This leaves \$10,000 more to be secured by May 1, 1931. We appeal to our alumni, former students, friends of the college and to all others, who are disposed to help foster and maintain Christian education to send Cedarville College your checks or subscriptions. We must receive your help as soon and as liberally as you can give in order to succeed in our project.

COURSES OF STUDY

Cedarville College offers courses of study in practically every line of training. You can find your choice and what you need from the following courses:

1. Liberal Arts—Four years, giving the degree of A. B.

2. Science—Four years, giving the degree of B. S.

3. Agriculture—Affiliated with Ohio State University, giving the degree of B. S. from Cedarville and B. S. in Agriculture from Ohio State University.

4. Theological—Three years, giving a diploma of graduation.

5. Music, offering—Courses in voice, theory, history, piano, pipe organ, etc. Also combining with the Liberal Arts course and giving a degree.

6. Pre-Engineering, Pre-Journalism, Pre-Law, Pre-Library, Pre-Medical, each two years and leading to a degree and giving advanced standing in technical schools. Students upon completing any of these courses receive a certificate.

7. Commercial Course — Offering typing, shorthand, bookkeeping, and other subjects of such a course, and also leading to a degree.

PURPOSE OF CEDARVILLE COLLEGE

Cedarville College was founded and opened in 1894 to train young men and young women for Christ and humanity. Cedarville College is a conservative Christian College. It is owned and controlled by a Board of Trustees, all of whom are active and true Christians. Its professors are earnest and faithful Christians.

It welcomes students of all churches. It keeps ever before the student the value of God's Word and cardinal principles of Christianity. It insists that its students shall prepare to render to God and man a service of efficiency and of the highest moral and spiritual value also.

EXPENSES

Cedarville College gives the opportunity to secure a good collegiate training at a low cost. Practically every young person of ambition can afford to come to Cedarville.

The tuition, books, furnished lighted and heated rooms, and boarding, will run for non-resident students from \$400 to \$450 a year, while students whose home is in Cedarville or nearby do not need to spend over \$175 a year.

They, moreover, are fitted to do greater work and in a much easier and more effective way than the non-college person. Then, too, they get more real enjoyment out of life and put better and larger service into life for others.

The total expenses run from \$4.50 to \$13.00 a week.

MUSIC
