42ND ANNUAL OPENING

Wednesday, September 11, is the opening day of the first semester of 1935-36, Convocation exercises will be held in the college chape, at 11 a.m.

Registration days are Monday and Tuesday, September 9 and 10, beginning each day at 8 a. m. All students entering for the first time should register September 9. Upper classmen should register either day. All registration must be completed by Tuesday evening, September 10. There is a charge of one dollar for registering late. Class work begins Wednesday, September 11, at 8 A. M.

Students should bring for expenses on registration day cash or cheeks approximating the amount of one hundred dollars to pay for tuition and incidentals.

CURRICULA

The curricula of Cedarville College are Arts, Science, Arts-Education, Arts-Agriculture, and Theology. These all give, upon completion, the degree either of Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science. They prepare the students for various vocations or for graduate work in Universities.

In addition to these courses, pre-professional courses preparatory to law, medicine, dentistry, engineering, etc., are offered. These courses are calculated to prepare the student to enter technical schools offering complete work in the above named subjects.

In addition to the Arts-Education course, which prepares students to teach in high schools and gives the degree of Bachelor of Arts as well as the State Provisional Certificate, Cedarville College offers for the training of Elementary teachers, a two years' Normal course giving a diploma and the State Provisional Certificate and a four years' Normal Course giving the degree of Bachelor of Science in Education and the State Provisional Certificate.

A four years' course in Music is offered. This gives a diploma. The course in music offers work in piano, pipe-organ, history, harmony, chorus, glee club, orchestra, quartette, voice, public school music, etc.

At the conclusion of the fourth year of the course, the degree of Bachelor of Science is conferred by Cedar-ville College, and at the conclusion of the fifth year, the degree of Bachelor of Science in Agriculture is conferred by the Ohio State University.
