Rev. David H. Markle, A. B., B. D., A. M., Ph. D., pastor of the Cedarville Methodist Church, is assisting in the department of education, teaching the course in History of Education.

Dr. Markle took his A. B. at Ohio Wesleyan University and his B. D. degree at Yale Divinity School and his A. M. and Ph. D. degrees at Yale University.

Opening Addresses at College

Rev. R. Lincoln Long, D.D., Minister to the Collingwood Avenue Presbyterian Church of Toledo, Ohio, was the speaker on the opening day of the 46th year of Cedarville College. Dr. Long used as his theme, "Ridiculous Excess." He delivered a thought provoking and inspiring message and held his audience from start to close. Dr. Long was accompanied by his daughter Caroline.

Rev. Ernest E. Schroeder, Minister to the Memorial Presbyterian Church of Dayton, Ohio, was the guest preacher at the annual convocation service on Sabbath evening, September 10, at the Presbyterian Church. Rev. Schroeder used as his topic "War Bulletins" from which he drew illustrations to challenge faithfulness and loyalty in these days of stress and trial.

WILL YOU HELP?

Our treasurer's report to the Board of Trustees at the annual meeting showed that the college received from contributions for current expenses from 227 subscribers in pledges in amounts from \$1.00 to \$500 the sum of \$2,-260.30. There were six pledges to the Frances McChesney Fund which totalled \$102.00. \$500 was received in one subscription toward the scholarship fund, and one subscription of \$500 for the girls' dormitory fund. From six churches we received pledges amounting to \$286.32, and from the Reformed Presbyterian Church Board of Education \$216.00.

Last year we had to close our books with a deficit of about two thousand dollars. This was the first deficit incurred for a number of years. This year it will be necessary for us to take up the deficit of last year and with the addition of about \$4000 for the budget of this year on our maintenance account.

A number of our friends have already sent in their pledges for contributions.

You will likely be bestowing gifts during the year with the purpose of helping a worthy cause.

Cedarville College is helping very generously worthy young people without means to secure a college training.

Cedarville College gives in scholarships and other ways about \$2000 a year to help students.

A gift towards the scholarship fund will be gratefully received and will produce good results for all the years to come.

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION

It is customary for all men and women at Cedarville to engage in some form of physical activity whether it be recreative or athletic. The Department of Health and Physical Education endeavors to maintain a "club" atmosphere in and about the gymnasium. Every man and every woman is a member of the "club" once he or she enrolls in the college, and is eligible to make use of its many facilities during class or leisure hours.

The Department of Health and Physical Education was established this year for a two-fold purpose: first, to serve the physical education needs of the individual students, and second, to organize and promote a curriculum for the teaching of future directors of health and physical education.

There are now enrolled in the School of Health and Physical Education fourteen students who desire to earn a "minor" in physical education. This number does not include members of the entering class, but the latter will have the opportunity to matriculate in several of the health and physical education courses at the beginning of the second semester.

The department has also under its jurisdiction the promotion of an intra-mural program. An Intra-Mural Athletic Board has been organized composed of ten members; two from each of the four undergraduate classes, the Director of the Department of Health and Physical Education, and the Director of Women's Physical Education. The Board controls the organization and administration of the athletic program as far as interclass contests are concerned.

Another new feature is the founding of the charter group of the Varsity "C" Club. This unique organization takes its members from the ranks of the winners of varsity awards, the aim being to promote a more fraternal group of men to handle the athletic destiny of Cedarville College.

It is the sincere hope of the director and his associates

that many members of the alumni group will return to their Alma Mater in the near future to inspect the plan that is now being used.
