

New President-Elect of Cedarville College

The Cedarville College Board of Trustees announce the election of the Rev. Walter Smith Kilpatrick, '34, as president of the institution to succeed Dr. W. R. Mc-Chesney, whose resignation was announced last June, and who asked to be relieved of the administrative duties at an early date. Rev. Kilpatrick will become president-elect January next and will serve in that capacity until his inauguration in September. At that time Dr. McChesney will become President-emeritus by the action of the Board of Trustees and will continue as a member of the teaching faculty.

The new president is a native of West Hartford, Conn., and located with his parents in Delaware County, Ohio, graduating from the Orange Centralized Schools. He graduated from Cedarville College in 1934 with the degree of B.A., magna cum laude, majoring in English and Social Sciences.

He is also a graduate of Western Theological Seminary, Pittsburgh, Pa., having been honored with the Keith Memorial Fellowship for highest standing. He was ordained in the Presbyterian ministry by the Dayton Presbytery in April, 1937, and received his M. A. degree from the University of Pittsburgh. He has completed his residence requirements for his Ph.D. degree.

While a student in the seminary and university in Pittburgh he served as minister of Valley View Presbyterian Church, and as a director of young peoples' activities of the large East Liberty Presbyterian Church in Pittsburgh.

He won a fellowship and in 1938 left for Europe for travel and study. He had two terms at Westminster College, Cambridge, England and a semester at the University of Basel, Switzerland. While there he was granted a research fellowship at the Faculte Libre de Theologie Protestante de Paris, but the outbreak of war prevented him from taking up the fellowship.

He spent the first month of the war in Scotland and England, doing social service work among evacuated children, returning to this country on a cargo boat last October. In connection with his studies he took an active interest invarious athletics in the different schools. While in Europe he traveled extensively in Germany, Switzerland, France, Italy, Belgium, Holland, Denmark, Sweden and Norway.

While at Cedarville College 1930-1934, he was a member of the debate squad for three years, played on the tennis team for four years, was editor of the college magazine, "Cedrus" in 1934; served as president of the college Y. M. C. A., and vice-president of the Presbyterian Young Peoples' League of the Dayton Presbytery.

Rev. Kilpatrick's father spent 20 years as instructor of the deaf, and superintendent of the state schools for the deaf of New Jersey and Washington. At present he owns and operates a poultry farm in Delaware County, O. He was graduated from Parsons College, Ia., and took
