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

New Christian Day School

The Emmanuel Baptist Church of Xenia, under the leadership of Rev. John Teeters its pastor, has just recently completed plans in organizing a Christian Day School. The school will meet in the 22-room Education Building of the Church which is located at 1120 S. Detroit Street in Xenia. It will begin with Nursery and Kindergarten and expand one grade at a time until at least six grades are offered.

Miss Carla Packard, who is a language professor at Cedarville College, will serve as principal of the new school. For the first year she will serve only part time, but will devote full time by September of '68.

The Education Building was erected in 1966. The rooms are large, with toilet facilities for each two rooms and well lighted. Teachers will have certificates issued by the State Department of Education and the cost for the Nursery and Kindergarten will be \$18 per month for the first child and \$15 for the second child. Although the school has just been announced, some pupils already have been enrolled.

In this day of confusion, when men would forsake the Word of God, it is good to have schools such as this where we might send our children for educational training with a Christian emphasis.

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

The Bible Baptist Church in North Madison formerly dedicated its new building on Sunday, April 30th. Guest speaker for the occasion was Rev. A. Donald Moffat, Editor of The Ohio Independent Baptist. Others participating in the program were Rev. Ben H. Garlich of Huntsburg, Rev. Marvin A. Werbeach of New Lyme, Rev. John Strong of Painesville and a former member, Rev. Daniel S. Brown. Also, comments were made by Mr. George Schaefer, the contractor, Mr. Milton W. Griffes, Mr. Delpert O. Haynes and Pastor Globig. Special music for the occasion was presented by Mrs. Daniel Brown and he Men's Chorus of the church. More han 225 persons attended the service.

Brief History

Bible Baptist Church observed its 150th anniversary three years ago, having been first organized in July 1814 as the first Congregational Church & Society of North Madison, with a charter membership of nine

members. The first meeting was held in a log home in Madison where the church met until August, 1819. The first pastor, Rev. Alvin Hyde, was called, ordained, and installed at this time and the meeting place moved to the Town Hall where the church met until its own house of worship was completed at the corner of North Ridge and Hubbard Roads in North Madison in August of 1835. The building, known as the "Bell Meeting House" because of the bell used to announce services and other events in the community, was destroyed by fire in 1889 and rebuilt on the same site and dedicated in 1891. Only the pulpit and the bell were salvaged from the fire. The bell was recast and hung in the new building and the pulpit was used until January of this year when new pulpit furniture was installed. Both the bell and original pulpit are still in the possession of the congregation. The father of Robert Ingersoll, the noted infidel, was at one time pastor of the North Madison church and it was under his ministry there that young Ingersoll rebelled against the gospel message and took up his infidelity.

Temporary Closure

The church closed its doors temporarily in 1925 due to lack of funds and small attendance but was reactivated in 1934 as the North Madison Community Church. The Cleveland

Mission supervised services there until 1938 when the Rev. Gerald Wagner became pastor. In December 1953 the church was reorganized as the Bible Baptist Church under the leadership of pastor Ben H. Garlich, now in Huntsburg, Ohio and affiliated with the General and Ohio Associations of Regular Baptist Churches. In 1960 it was instrumental in helping to organize the North East Ohio Association.

An extensive building program was conducted by the church in 1957 which more than doubled the space available for services, but when this, too, became inadequate and parking space was limited, the property was sold to the Sibarco Corporation as the site of an Atlantic gas station. It was vacated in August, 1965 and for four months the congregation met in a large one-room store building until the present building was ready for use. The first service was held in the new church on December 9, 1965.

The Church Today

The new facilities, located on 3-1/3 acres in a strictly residential area near Lake Erie, permit an enlarged program for both Sunday School and church. The Sunday School is fully departmentalized with seven departments and 20 classes and reached an all-time high in attendance of 290 on May 14th. Attendance averaged 219 during the month of April.

The Flying Evangelist



Rev. Curt J. Wetzel, known as "The Flying Evangelist," has over thirty-five years of flying experience to his credit, the last twelve of which he has used in the ministry. In 1948, he was the chief instructor of the Missionary Aviation Department at Bob Jones University in Greenville, South Carolina. During World War II he instructed flying for three and a half years for the Army at Fort Worth, Texas, and flight tested the nation's first guided missile for the Navy at Fort Dix. Before the war, and again afterwards, he was a test pilot for Piper Aircraft Corporation in his hometown of Lock Haven, Pennsylvania.

Since 1949, Rev. Wetzel has preached in almost every state, traveling and broadcasting by plane. During the past six years, however, being without an airplane, he continued in evangelism, traveling by car. He served as interim pastor at First Baptist Church of Lock Haven, Pa. (his home church) and for the past three years he has been with the church as Director of Visitation and Evangelism. During this period, he has taken a limited number of evangelistic meetings.

With the purchase of a new airplane, he intends to enter more extensively the field of evangelism. Besides providing transportation, the plane is used to promote attendance at meetings by offering free rides to all who qualify by memorizing specified verses and bringing a visitor.

As the Lord opens the doors, Rev. Wetzel welcomes the opportunity of working with pastors in the strengthening of the local churches and reaching the lost for Christ.

Pastor Ordained

An Ordination Council was called by the Portage Lakes Baptist Church. Akron, Ohio, to consider the advisability of ordaining their pastor. Raymond Doan, into the Gospel Ministry. The meeting was held at the First Baptist Church of Green Township, Ohio, Rev. Albert Johnson. pastor.

The council heard and questioned the testimony of conversion, call to the ministry, and doctrinal statement of the candidate, and recommended to his church, by unanimous vote. that they proceed with his ordination.

Rev. Earl Umbaugh, State Missionary of the Ohio Association of Regular Baptist Churches, was elected moderator of the council, and David Morris as clerk.

Revival Fires At Blanchester

Evangelist D. M. Fruits of Kansas City held a most successful meeting in the First Baptist Church of Blanchester. Pastor Russell states that these meetings (originally scheduled for one week, but because of the blessing of the Lord, extended to two) were truly wonderful! There were thirty conversions, a great number who dedicated their lives to the Lord and many who confessed sin. There were some who sought the forgiveness of others because of ill will or grudges. It was a most precious time of revival.

Pastor Russell highly recommends our Brother Fruits to any who desire to see revival in their churches.

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




Scenic Surroundings

Why Christian Camping?

Miss Joy Mackay is Dean of Women at Cedarville College. She also serves as one of its teachers. She is well qualified to write on the subject of Christian Camping. Each summer, her time is spent serving the Lord with Word of Life Camps (Jack Wyrtzen) in Schroon Lake, New York. She is the author of a book entitled . . . "Creative Counseling for Christian Camps," The following article shows the value there is in having Christian Camps for our young people.

"Is summer camp worth all the work and problems involved?" asked a pastor recently. A week of camp may be the most productive ministry of the church today. More decisions are made in camp than in any other agency of the church.

Why is this so? The free and relaxed atmosphere of camp is more conducive to life changes. The climax of camp provides an atmosphere where the Holy Spirit can work. The barriers of formality are gone and a camper can be himself.

In camp, a camper not only hears the Word, but he has opportunity to see it demonstrated in the every day life of his counselor. Often he learns more from watching the lives of the staff than from listening in a meeting. Of course, this necessitates a mature, dedicated, well-trained staff to provide an example worth following.

Then too, a camp provides a controlled atmosphere for the camper to grow. After Sunday School, you hope Johnnie remembers the lesson, but he may stop at the corner drug store, watch TV for several hours Sunday afternoon and forget everything about your lesson by evening. But at camp he is free from environmental distractions.

168 Hours Continuously!

Camp provides a concentrated impact on campers, and this has a cumulative effect. Out of 168 hours in the week, Jim may be at church 4 or 5 if he attends Sunday morning and evening service, Sunday School, youth meetings and prayer meeting. He spends 30 or more hours in public school. But in one week at camp, he is under the Christian in-

fluence 168 hours continuously. He is constantly learning. He does not have to be sitting in a Bible class to be learning. At camp he is learning by living . . . by doing . . . in the cabin, on the ball field, in the dining hall.

Camp provides a person to person contact. It is this one to one, counselor to camper relationship which makes camp so effective. A camper may be influenced by the

large crowd, and decisions are made in the big campfire service, but some of the most effective ministry takes place out under a tree, along a path in a personal counseling situation. It is Barnabas helping John Mark. It is Paul working with Timothy.

Camp provides a laboratory for testing Christian living. After a stirring message, you hope your people leave determined to put into life the truth you have presented. But do they? In camp, the many activities; the ball field, the craft shop, the waterfront, the nature trail, the rifle range become laboratories where Sally may experiment with spiritual truth. Because she has memorized her verse for the day doesn't mean she has learned its truth. She has only learned when truth gets into life, for truth learned must be truth practiced or it isn't learned at all. At

living in her cabin, at the beach and in the craft shop. She finds courage to walk alone in the woods at night as she remembers, "What time I am afraid, I will trust in Thee." Or, Psalm 97 brings peace instead of panic to your cabin on an overnight when a thunder storm blows down your tent and lightening flashes across the sky. In other words, a camper see the relevancy of the Word of Goo to his life, and life changes take place

Work - Hard Work!!

A good camp doesn't just happen It is work, hard work. Much prayer much preparation, much planning goes into good camping. Recruit your staff early. Make training a pre-re quisite. Include in your training pro gram: an understanding of the cam per, counseling techniques, how to study the Bible, how to have cabir devotions, how to lead a camper to Christ, follow up, how to have quiet time, campcraft skills, activit skills, health and safety, rainy day special programs, group work skills regulations and procedures. Develop your daily schedules and special pro grams with your staff. Involve then in the planning.

The next important ingredient of a good camp is program. Keep variety in your program. Add new activities each week. These do not have to be expensive. You can specialize in the nature skills by offering hiking, stated study, bird study, trees, rocks tripping, overnight cook-outs. Include advanced and graded skills to challenge the returning camper or one who stays longer. Be flexible and be able to change to meet campers needs.

The camp site is the third factor in a good camp. Be watchful of health and safety hazards. Don't overcrowd your facilities. You may take more campers, but fewer campers will wan to return, and you will have less effective ministry to all. Provide for small group activities. It is better to have several small group activities going on where all campers may participate than one all camp activity where most of the campers are spectators.

Yes, camp means a lot of work
But to the question, Is it worth it, we
say an emphatic "Yes." It means
sacrifice of time and effort. It means
being with boys and girls for long
periods of time. It means enjoying
their company. Was this not the
Lord's method? We read in Mark
3:14 that He chose the twelve "that
they might be with Him."

Dr. Millheim is stated as saying, The effect of our trip we trust will a to offset the National Council of hurches' opposition to the war and neir call to stop the bombing, short of victory. The American Council of hristian Churches, representing 17 rotestant Bible-believing denominations, is opposed to the no-win policy." This team also preached to ur fighting men, distributing gostel tracts and Bibles, visiting hostitals and chaplains, encouraging them piritually as well as morally in this ponflict.

A CALL FOR REVIVAL

"I delight to do Thy will, O my lod: yea, Thy law is within my eart." (Psalm 40:8). "These are the hings that ye shall do; Speak ye very man the truth to his neighbor; xecute the judgment of truth and eace in your gates." (Zachariah:16).

Do we speak the truth to our eighbors (those about us), do we emember His Word as we make our lans, do our purchasing, go about ur "business" in our homes, as we merge on the streets and in public laces? Do we pray, hope and make very effort, as Christian women and een-agers, to be such, "that in all hings He shall have the preeminnce?" (Col. 1:18-b). We have only me life to live - for Him. What do ve see on the streets these days? Vomen, (all shapes and sizes, colors ind creeds), the one who wants to e known as a Christian as well as he non-professing woman and teeniger, with rollers in their hair, in horts or slacks, or a sleeveless shirt.

When they attend church or some ocial event, they appear in dresses which look like a chemise or maternty sack, with the hemline above the tnee (each one trying to dare to wear it shorter and shorter), so, where do we go from here? Is God infair when He asks us to "adorn the Gospel," when the Apostle Paul reminded the Philippians (4:5) to "let your moderation be known unto all nen. THE LORD IS AT HAND?"

As we go shopping do we pray for His guidance to assure us of His olessing upon our purchases? Do we remember that the people who set our styles are NOT Christians, that is not their aim to make us presentable as modest, sweet and gractous "daughters of the King?"

Since we have these "latest" styles, is it a SACRIFICE to avoid them and insist on clothes becoming women in God's household, and to be true to the Word of God? We have been shocked more than once at the world-y appearance of women in Christian service, imitators of the world instead of the Word, instead of being trans-

formed, they now conform to customs of this world. If the Lord will ever favor us with a REVIVAL again, what a change would take place.

We need a revival — but what if He chooses to return in the air only, to catch away the Church which is His bride — are we ready for His coming? Do we remember daily, He can come at any time?

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



Glimpses of Truth

from the

Greek New Testament By Dr. Geo. Lawlor "PATIENCE"

Romans 5:3 states: "tribulation worketh patience." The term "patience" is one of the grandest of New Testament words. It is hupomonei (hupo, "under," and meno, "remain"), normally rendered "patience, endurance" in the New Testament. However it is not totally possible to transmit in the English all of the fullness and significance of its meaning. It is a word which summons all the attributes of manly virtue and the faculties of true courage and dedicated perseverance, and puts them into one.

To Endure Hardness

In classical Greek it is used to express endurance in hard labor, holding up oneself under the stress of grief and bereavement, standing firm in the shock and agony of battle and the nearness of death. It is also used significantly to describe a plant or flower living and blossoming under unfavorable circumstances. In later Greek and Jewish literature, it appears quite frequently as particularly

descriptive of that quality shown by martyrs, the spiritual staying-power that enabled men and women to die bravely for their God without giving up to torture and pain.

This is the New Testament word used in the noun and verb forms approximately 50 times, rendered "endure, patience, steadfast." In Luke 2:43, the verb is used to set forth the fact that Jesus "tarried behind" in Jerusalem. Paul says in II Tim. 2:10 he "endures" all things on account of the elect. James uses both the verb and noun in 5:11, stating "we count them happy who endure," and then, "ye have heard of the patience of Job." Peter has the verb twice in I Peter 2:20, in the second instance as describing one who bears up bravely and calmly under ill treatment, when he has done nothing to warrant such abuse. The writer of Hebrews reminds his readers of former times when they "endured," i.e. stood up courageously under many afflictions (Heb. 10:32).

Paul commends the Thessalonians for their "patience" under many persecutions and tribulations (II Thess. 1:4). The Apostle connects this manly endurance with "hope" in I Thess. 1:3, and again in Romans 5:3-4; 8:25; and 15:4-5. In Hebrews 12:1, we are admonished to run the race of the Christian life before us with "patience," i.e. with steadfast consistency and perseverance, and determination to keep on at all costs.

Pastors are instructed to follow afte this virtue of manly courage, pursuing, driving in the direction of such an essential trait of true constance (I Tim. 6:11).

It Is Not Passive

This is the word hupomonei, "pa tience," in the New Testament, and we can thus see the essence and sig nificance of the great virtue set forth by this word. We may understand, tha it is perhaps a different kind of pa tience and endurance than we have considered in the past. It is not en tirely a patience that can sit down bow its head, and passively endur the storm until it is past. It is no just "taking one's medicine" withou complaint. Nor is it merely a kind o dumb resignation with no murmur o protest or revolt. But it is the spiri that bears up under difficulty and distress without succumbing to the pressure and pain. It is the tempe that bears things that are nearly un bearable because there is hope in i all and a goal ahead. As William Bar clay said, "It is not the patience which grimly waits for the end, but the pa tience which radiantly hopes for the dawn." It is that manly courage and indomitable spirit which will not give up to the trial, will not yield to the agony and strain, will not sink down under the burdens, but which keep us on our feet with our face to the wind, because we belong to Christ This is "patience" — hupomonei.

Grace Baptist Church, London, Ohio.

Sunday Services were begun on May 14th, 1967 in two rooms of a new office building at 258 West High Street — route No. 42. Five families have committed themselves to the starting of this work and attendance has been running 21 to 31 with two additional families showing an interest.

A good building site has been made available to them. One family, not a part of the nucleus, has offered to pay the full purchase price of the land. If financing can be secured to put up their first unit, the rent that they are paying for their present meeting place would come close to making a building loan payment. This seems to be the direction that the church should take since they could lose their present meeting place on thirty days notice.

Some assistance is needed from area churches in these early months if they are to have their best chance of success. At the present time, they are using borrowed song books and chairs. They will need about \$200 a month financial support if the pastor is to give his full time to the work. Local offerings from the five families is expected to be from \$232 to \$268 per month. It is hoped that an additional \$100 per month will come from Sunday School offerings, visitors and new families. The treasurer of the church is Mr. Elvin King, 140 Hawthorne, London, Ohio.

The church extended a unanimous call to a young man to be their pastor. He has not felt led of the Lord to accept so the group is continuing to hear potential candidates. The help of Cedarville College has been greatly appreciated in the supplying of speakers as needed.


