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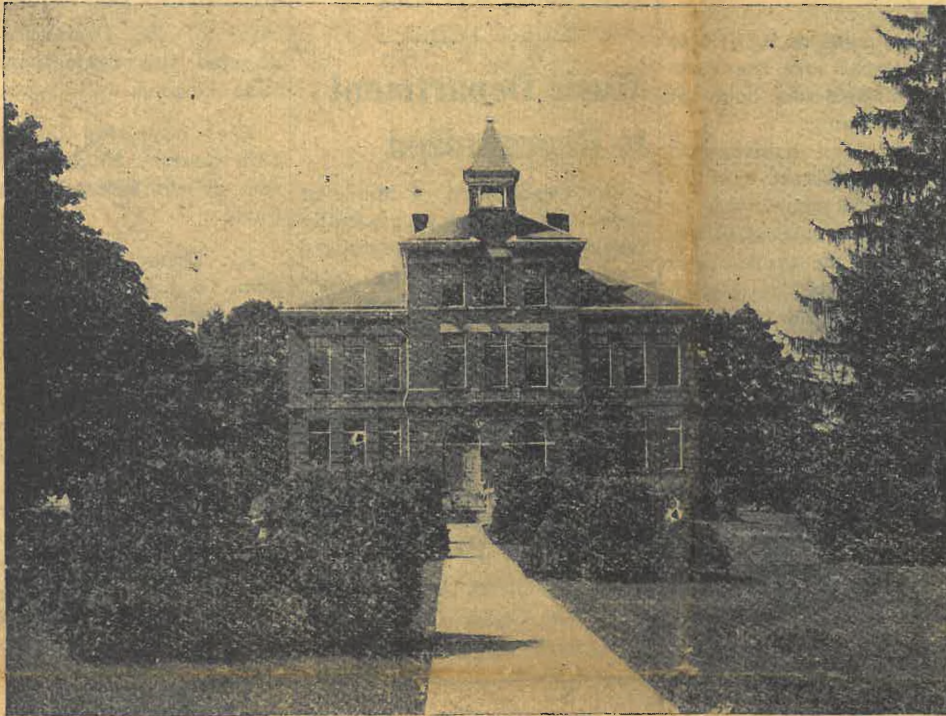

### College Adjusts To GI Influx

Cedarville College is adjusting itself to the large influx of students. With the return of the G. I's and the new interest being manifested in higher education, Cedarville faces the future with great assurance. We find the G. I's a fine and wholesome group of men eager to study and get the most out of their education in the shortest possible time.

Present enrollment for the summer sessions indicates that we will have the largest mid-year school in the history of the college. Some fifty G. I's will be enrolled besides a large number of prospective "Cadet" teachers. Summer School will be under the capable leadership of Professor A. J. Hostetler who has made such an enviable record in the past. He will be assisted by a capable faculty. Prospective teachers should make application at once for the Summer School so that

housing reservations may be made for them. It now seems likely that Harriman Hall will be used as a girls' dormitory for the Summer School.

The Religious Emphasis Week was very successful. Dr. Homer B. Henderson, '02, brought five strong addresses to the student body, and an equal number to nearby local churches. We plan to make this an annual event.

We are keeping the repair program before you. We were compelled to spend more money than had been pledged in our campaign. In order not to make these repairs a drain on our current budget we are asking you to join the many friends who have already made their contributions.

### Religious Emphasis Week March 17-21

During the week of March 17 to 21, Religious Emphasis Week was observed here at the college. Chapel services were held each day at eleven to twelve o'clock. Dr. Homer Henderson, '02, pastor of Grove City, Pa., United Presbyterian Church was the speaker.

Rr. Henderson brought different messages for each day. Monday, "Who Is God?"; Tuesday, "Christ, The Son of God"; Wednesday, "Man"; Thursday, "Getting Acquainted with God"; Friday, "What shall it profit a man if he gain the whole world, and lose his own soul?"

Cedarville College offers two sessions of Summer School. Each session runs five weeks, six days each week. Six credits may be earned in collegiate subjects in each of these sessions, or a total of twelve collegiate credits for both sessions.

Monday, June 9 ---- First Summer School Session Begins.

Saturday, July 12 ---- First Summer School Session Ends.

Monday, July 14 ---- Second Summer School Session Begins.

Saturday, August 16 Second Summer School Session Ends.

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## Great Demand For Teachers

Cedarville College is cooperating fully with the Ohio Department of Education to meet the demand for elementary teachers. Courses to train teachers required for all grades will be offered at the two Summer Sessions from June 9 to August 16.

The following regulations are now in force in Ohio: For Elementary Teaching.

A temporary elementary certificate will be issued upon the request of a city, county or exempted village superintendent, upon evidence of a scarcity of suitable teachers otherwise certified, to those who have completed two years of training in an elementary curriculum of an approved institution providing courses satisfactorily completed include methods, children's literature, management, educational psychology, principles of teaching and student teaching.

## Cadet Certificate

Because of the need for more elementary teachers, the Ohio Department of Education will issue a four-year "Cadet" certificate upon the recommendation of Cedarville College to any student who satisfactorily completes the following courses: Educational Psychology, Student Teaching, Art, English, Children's Literature, Health Activities, Music, Science, and Social Studies. A total of sixty-four hours is necessary for completion. Such certificate is stamped "Cadet" and is renewable only upon evidence of satisfactory teaching and the completion of 12 hours of additional credit.

## Practice Teaching

Since facilities for practice teaching are limited in the Summer Session, applications for this work must be made not later than Thursday, May 29th. Fee, \$5.00 per credit hour.

## Training for Perm. Certificates

Any four-year provisional certificate issued since January 1, 1939, may be converted into an eight-year professional certificate of like type and validity upon evidence of 24 months of successful teaching experience under the provisional certificate to be converted and the completion of 18 semester hours of additional training.

The eight-year professional high school certificate may be made permanent upon evidence of five years of successful experience under the professional certificate and the completion of an appropriate Master's degree or the equivalent.

The eight-year professional elementary certificate may be made permanent upon evidence of forty months of successful experience under the professional certificate and the completion of a Bachelor's degree in elementary education.

## Cedarville Wins Tournament

Cedarville College participated in the first Ohio Intercollegiate Basketball Tournament and emerged the champion by winning over Interstate College in the finals by a score 73-60.

The tournament was held March 6, 7, 8, 1947 in Alford Memorial Gym in Cedarville.

The first game at 7:30 March 6, was played between Bliss Business College of Columbus, Ohio and Interstate Business College of Portsmouth, Ohio. Interstate had no trouble putting Bliss out of the picture. When the final gun was sounded Interstate had scored 97 points to only 38 for Bliss.

The second game at 9:30 March 6, was played between

Ohio University Chillicothe Branch of Chillicothe, Ohio and Cedarville College, Cedarville, Ohio. At the close of the game Cedarville had scored 74 points to 57 points for Ohio University.

The first game March 7 at 7:30 teamed Tiffin University of Tiffin Ohio and Interstate Business College. Again Interstate of Portsmouth Ohio was the winner. Interstate 75 Tiffin 66.

### Alumni News

Two of our graduates, the Rife brothers, have joined the ranks of authors. John Merle Rife, A. B. 1916, has just published a Beginning Greek Book, which he tried out on his students at Muskingum College before submitting it to the General public. The text has been adopted at the University of Chicago, from which he holds his Ph. D., 1932.

His brother, David Cecil Rife, BS., 1922, is a professor at O. S. U. from which he obtained his Ph. D. in 1933. He is quite an authority on Eugenics and Heredity, and has published a book on the subject, The Dice of Destiny, which is favorably mentioned in the bibliography of Meredith's Hygiene. The Rife brothers are cousins of our Professor Carrie Rife.

Wilbur Gerald Shaw, a student of Cedarville College forty years ago, died at Xenia, Ohio, February 23, 1947. He was one of a family of ten children, eight of whom attended Cedarville College and six of whom graduated here.
