Dear Graduates and Former Students:



Mrs. Livia Check, Homecoming Queen of 1947, will again this year take part in the ceremony.

Other candidates for 1948 homecoming queen included Miss Helen Rife, New Concord, Ohio, Mrs. Ronalda Riley, Cedarville, Ohio, Miss Nellie Emshviller, New Boston, Ohio, and Miss Viola Thurman, Clayton, Ohio.

Upon graduating from Springfield High School in 1947, Miss Cullum attended Heidelberg College at Tiffin, Ohio, for a year where she was a drum majorette.

VICTORIES AHEAD

Cedarville College opened its third year of intercollegiate football after a fifteen-year layoff, meeting Ohio Northern University at Cox Field in Xenia, Tuesday night, Sept. 14. With sixteen lettermen returning from last year, a good season was in prospect. However, Ohio Northern's Polar Bears dimmed the outlook by defeating the Yellow Jackets, 26 to 0.

Scoring three times in the first seven minutes, the boys from Ada showed a well-balanced attack. Cedarville showed a superior brand of football from then until an intercepted pass gave the Northerners their fourth touchdown midway in the last quarter. Cedarville was outgained but not outplayed in this starting setback.

Georgetown College, from Georgetown, Kentucky came to Osborn, Ohio September 22 with revenge in their eye. Hoping to repay the Jackets for the 1947 season's 13 to 13 tie, they put on an attack that proved devastating once it started to click.

In the first half the Yellow Jackets showed great improvement over the brand of ball played against Ohio Northern and left the field after two quarters trailing by only 6 to 0. Georgetown came on the field the second half with a show of determination and it paid off as they scored again midway in the third quarter, making the score read Georgetown 13 Cedarville 0, going into the final quarter. A brilliant passing attack, aided by haphazard Cedarville playing, enabled the Tigers to score four more times and left the final score 38 to 0, Georgetown.

A strong Ashland eleven was the third opponent and the Jackets, showing little improvement and failing to capitalize on breaks, were handed a 21 to 0 lacing.

Ashland's Purple Raiders, using a strong "T" formation, scored once in the second quarter and made good the extra point to lead, 7 to 0, at the half. An attempted reverse, resulting in a fumble, gave the Raiders possession of the ball on the Cedarville 9. From there the Jackets made a valiant stand but Ashland scored on the fourth try, again kicking the point, to lead, 14-0, in the 4th period.

Cedarville was able to penetrate Ashland territory as far as the four-yard line, but inferior play enabled the boys from up north to halt their only threat. Ashland scored its last touchdown on an intercepted pass and the placement was good. The final score: 21 to 0.

Saturday, October 9, the Yellow Jackets of Cedarville journey to Bluffton to meet a favored Bluffton College squad. The Jackets are still looking for their initial win, and this is the time. The remaining schedule shows no weak sisters or breathers, but this reporter sees victories on the way. The team as yet has not come up to pre-season expectations, but it will--and soon.

The students, faculty, and alumni must get behind the team, showing that, even in defeat, those who continue to try are honored.
