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

Only recently the college gained State approval for the training of High School teachers. We have asked Dr. Clifford Johnson, Dean of Cedarville College to inform us more fully concerning this vital step.

Another Step Forward!

Last June 10, 1968, the Board of Education of the State of Ohio granted Cedarville College full approval for both the elementary and secondary teacher education programs. Beginning next Fall it will be possible to complete all the requirements for state certification on the Cedarville campus.

It has long been one of Cedarville's purposes to include teacher training. Born-again instructors, both at the elementary and secondary levels, can and do have tremendous effects upon children and young people. Since secondary education has been approved, the teaching ministries of Cedarville graduates can now be more effective. It had been possible in previous years for Cedarville students to gain secondary certification by participating in a cooperative program with nearby Central State University, but the program had a number of disadvantages which limited enrollment.

In 1967 and 1968 Cedarville graduated two classes which included over one hundred young people certified to teach at the elementary level. These young people are now making an important impact in Public and Christian Day Schools. Although these graduates have found employment from coast to coast, most seem to be located in schools in mid-western states. It is quite interesting that several of the young people who came to college from some distance now have decided to stay in Ohio and teach.

State approval has been granted in such a way that next year's seniors may begin the secondary program if they have had appropriate preparation. It is anticipated that twenty will complete the program.

The secondary program probably will grow in enrollment until perhaps fifty to sixty young people will complete the program each year. They can seek certification to teach in fields chosen from among fifteen different subject matter areas.

Dr. Merlin Ager will head the enlarged Education Department. Dr. Ager is a Cedarville graduate of the class of 1960 and has since received his Ph.D. from The Ohio State University in the field of secondary education. Professors Brad Moore, Irma Dodson and Dwayne Frank will complete the personnel of the department.

Dr. Clifford Johnson, Academic Dean at Cedarville, noted that much prayer, effort, and preparation had gone into the application for secondary certification. He also indicated that thanks were clearly due to those who upheld the college in prayer, and those who worked so diligently getting the faculty, staff, facilities, and equipment ready for the state evaluation team.

Dr. Johnson also noted that the approval was probably another important step toward regional accreditation. College personnel have been working with a consultant from the North Central Association on the matter and it seems that there is now interest in perhaps directing some effort toward preparation for an examination in the next year or two by North Central.

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
Know Your Council of Ten

Training for Christian service was gained at Ohio State University and Bob Jones University. He has served as pastor of his present church since 1961. The Lord is blessing the work. Present Sunday School attendance is near the 500 mark. In March of this year, the church moved into its new building. They called Mr. Michael Hooks as full time Director of Youth in August of '66.

A Beautiful Building

The new building features a central auditorium flanked on one side by offices and on the other side by a two story educational unit. In the auditorium, laminated arches support a contrasting spruce deck ceiling. A sloping floor presents full view of the pulpit area. The elevated baptistry

and choir loft are at the rear of the pulpit area. There is an abundance of diffused light. The overflow and balcony areas make it possible for 675 to be seated. The fully carpeted floor and public address system make for excellent acoustics, and the auditorium is fully air-conditioned.

The rooms in the educational unit are well lighted and decorated in warm colors. This building is also air-conditioned. It has a well equipped nursery and toddlers rooms which are carpeted.

The office wing consists of the pastor's study, conference room, youth director's office and church office — all air-conditioned.

New Building Completed

The First Baptist Church of Wauseon, Ohio have completed their new building which is located on State Route 108 (Shoop Avenue) about three-fourths of a mile south of Wauseon.

It is a lovely brick building, equipped with new church furniture, a fully carpeted sanctuary, gothic style chandeliers, a modern nursery and a seating capacity of about 260 people. Next to the sanctuary there is a Sunday School Annex which will accommodate 200, as well as, a kitchen and beautiful fellowship hall.

First services were held in the church on June 30th at which Rev. Leon Williams, missionary among the negroes of Cleveland, spoke. A special dedication service will be held Sunday afternoon, September 15th. Dr. Arthur F. Williams of Xenia, Ohio will deliver the dedication address. Former pastors, Rev. Martin Holmes of Sunbury, Ohio and Rev. Wagnitz of Kouts, Indiana will also take part in the dedication.

Present pastor of the church is Rev. J. E. Wheeling. We rejoice with Brother Wheeling in the Lord's blessing on the work there in Wauseon.

Blessing in Meetings

In Cedarville, Ohio, Evangelist Chelsea Stockwell conducted a series of meetings — June 16-23.

For promotion, Rev. Wm. Broughton, pastor of the Grace Baptist Church, did a number of things which smaller communities are able to do. First, he had the membership extract all local telephone numbers from the directory. Second, using the mailing permit he issued the church's monthly news sheet printed on the back of a promotional flyer. Third, he divided these telephone listings into 67 lists of 10 each, distributing them to the church membership, who were to call and personally invite these to the meetings. Fourth, the pastor and others of the church went from house to house and personally invited the community to the services. The results of all this publicity were not sensationally successful but it did bring a good number of first-time visitors to the services.

If you are contemplating evangelistic services, Pastor Broughton recommends very highly to our OARBC constituency, Evangelist Chelsea Stockwell.

Mr. Jack R. Riggs, associate professor of Bible at Cedarville College has been granted his Th.D. degree from Dallas Theological Seminary. This conference seemed to top all others. There was continuity throughout as each speaker, endued with power, gave sound biblical presentations of eschatological truth — all of which was made to apply to the believer in his daily walk before the Lord.

A Youth Choir of 250 voices, under the direction of Mr. John Peterson, completed the conference with the singing of a hymn which he had composed entitled, "How Long Will It Be?"

The largest group gathered on the closing night — approximately 5000 in attendance. Truly the Lord gave us one of the best annual conferences in the 37 years our fellowship has been in existence.

To many, the "high spot" of the conference was the presentation made by Shepherd's Incorporated. Three fine little boys . . . retarded children . . . stood before a large evening audience and in their sweet way left




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Missionary Athlete

A Statement of Position

It is popular not to "positionalize" one's self in this day and age. The key words today are "togetherness" — "compromise" — "conform" . . . a sort of "peace at any price" idea! We appreciate receiving this "Statement of Position." These folk are to be respected for taking this stand

- "positionalizing" themselves in this

way. May their number increase!

This statement, by majority vote, on the part of the members of Calvary Baptist Church, Bellefontaine, Ohio, Rev. John Wood, pastor, was adopted and placed in the July 2nd issue of their local newspaper. We run the statement here as it appeared in the newspaper.

In view of recent trends in the religious world, and in view of recent happenings in our country, both social and political, the membership of the Calvary Baptist Church of Bellefontaine wishes to positionalize itself publicly on matters of public interest. Since liberal forces in both the religious and political areas have stolen the thunder from the more conservative groups, many people think that these people speak for all of us. It is our desire, therefore, to let the public know that the National Council of Churches, for example, does not represent the feelings or thinking of our Church in the areas of certain political, social, and religious action.

- 1. We do not believe in a soft position towards communism. We believe communism should be resisted wherever, and whenever, it raises its ugly head. Our Church is not a haven for draft dodgers or draft card burners. If our sons are called to serve their country, we shall pray for their safety and for the ultimate victory of our military forces. Above all, we shall pray they serve their country with honor and dignity, and not end up as deserters in some foreign land.
- 2. We reject the official policy statement made on February 21, 1968 by the leadership of the National Council of Churches entitled, "Imperatives of Peace and Responsibilities of Power," a statement which encouraged a policy of appeasement towards communism, trade with Red China and her admission to the United Nations. In 1966 The Clergymen's Committee on China was organized by the late Dr. Daniel Poling. This committee challenged the leadership of the National Council of Churches, charging they did not truly speak for the more than eighty million Protestants they represented, nor the thousands of Protestant pastors. A nationwide poll was taken by Dr. Poling to which thousands of Pro-

testant clergymen responded. Of more than thirty thousand clergymen who completed the poll, an amazing 71.4% were opposed to the admission of Red China to the United Nations or U. S. recognition of Peking; and 93.7% were opposed to satisfying Communist China's conditions for joining the United Nations by expelling the Republic of China from the U. N. The General Board of the National Council of Churches does not reflect the views of their constituency, and they do not reflect the views of our Church.

3. The racial question is perhaps the most controversial and misunderstood problem facing the Christian church today. We deplore the slums and ghettos which some of our citizens are forced to live in. We denounce as "unchristian" any attitude of inferiority which one might hold towards a member of another race. Our gospel is universal in scope and includes all men. "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life." John 3:16. That "world" includes the black man, the white man, the red man, and the yellow man. Our Church currently gives in excess of \$15,000 a year through its missionary program to preach the gospel of Christ from Africa to the Orient, from Canada to South America. We believe, however, that the black man's greatest need is spiritual. This happens to be the white man's greatest need too! We believe our greatest area of failure as white Christians is in neglecting to take the Gospel of Christ to our black neighbors. While we spent millions of missionary dollars to evangelize Africa we failed to see the spiritual needs of those negroes who lived in American cities. We believe American private enterprise can do more to help the economic problems of the Negro than can American

government. We commend the Ford Motor Company and other industrial giants like them, who are endeavoring to recruit, train, and employ negroes from our slums. This kind of program not only saves tax dollars, but gives the Negro a sense of accomplishment and of "belonging." Like any other citizen, he prefers the dignity of earning his own living instead of being supported by the state. We denounce racial prejudice as an untenable position for any Christian to hold.

4. We believe the primary purpose of the Church in the world is spiritual, not political — or even social. We do not believe God's ministers are called to picket, parade, or conduct themselves in any manner contrary to the established laws of our land. The greatest Christian who ever lived, the Apostle Paul, told a younger preacher named Timothy to, "Preach the Word; be instant in season, out of season; reprove, rebuke, exhort with all longsuffering and doctrine." II Timothy 4:2 The history of the Christian church and of modern missions has proven that the plain, forceful preaching of the Gospel of Jesus Christ does more to correct social and political ills than anything one can name. In the days of the early church, historians tell us, fifty per cent of the population of the Roman Empire were slaves. It is impossible to imagine a worse social condition than slavery. But those early preachers and evangelists did not picket the Roman Forum; they held no parades down the broad avenues of Ephesus or Antioch. They preached "the unsearchable riches of Christ," pointing out to men their sin and their alienation from a holy God, and of God's love for them, and how they could become "new creatures in Christ Jesus" through simple faith in God's Son. By winning multitudes of such men to Christ they broke the back

REPORT from YOUR STATE MISSIONARY . . .

LIMA, OHIO - A new church, the Meadowbrook Baptist Church, Lima, Ohio, started Sunday services on June 23. Good attendances were registered on this first Sunday with 62 in the Morning Worship Service and 33 back for the Evening Service. The nucleus for this new church is composed of six families who had been transferred to Lima, over a period of several months, by the companies for whom they worked. Gradually, a burden for south Lima, specifically the Shawnee-Cridersville area, developed and these families felt compelled to start a sound testimony for Christ in that new suburban community. Since these families were from GARB Churches, they contacted the State Missionary and plans were set in motion for the formation of this church. Bible Study, Prayer Meetings and Planning Sessions were held, one night a week, for eight weeks, in the conference room of the People's National Bank, Wapakoneta, Ohio. During this time, a temporary organization was set up, the Sunday School was organized, and a not-forprofit corporation was formed. Also, the church covenant and articles of faith were adopted and work has been begun on the church constitution. As soon as the organizational work is completed, the group has voted to seek affiliation with the North Bethel Association, The Ohio Association of Regular Baptist Churches and the General Association of Regular Baptist Churches. The Shawnee Grange Hall, on Fort Amanda Road, is the meeting place for Sunday Services and for the Prayer Meeting and Bible Study on Wednesday nights.

DAYTON, OHIO — The Blessed Hope Baptist Church has been meeting in the downtown YMCA for Sunday Services since March 10 with attendance running from 50 to 70. This group has a special interest in reaching Jewish people with the gospel of Christ. This interest is expressed by witnessing to Jewish friends, by hearing missionaries who are working among the Jews and by setting aside a portion of their offerings on the first Sunday of each month for Jewish evangelism. Mid-week services are held in the homes of interested families, a calling program has been instituted and other interests in evangelism, across the city, are being maintained. The group has voted to seek affiliation with the Ohio Association of Regular Baptist Churches, the General Association of Regular Baptist Churches, The American Council of Christian Churches and the Int'l. Council of Christian Churches. Professor Gale, Cedarville College is serving as interim pastor.

The Grace Baptist Church of London is a recently organized church instigated in large measure through the activities of the Christian Service Department of Cedarville College.


David Elmore - Ordained

These unds were designated for new quarters, in order that the Seminary and Bible School, which serves ABWE and Baptist Mid-Mission churches in bouth Brazil, might be released from high rents and the changing whims of landlords.

From its inception the "Club" was ARGELY SUPPORTED By O.A. R.B. Church folk, individuals, Sunay School Classes and Churches. In ess than a year and a half, over 10,000 were given. This amount nade possible the down payment for pace in a condominium operated uilding, in the heart of this populous ity, second only to New York, in he Americas.

Lord's specialties. (Jeremiah 32:37). Thus, apart from supplying the down payment through His people and causing the owner of our new quarters to accept the conditions of payment offered. He sent someone along who would assume the unfulfilled rent contract on the former rented location. We were thereby released from heavy penalties.

As a result, on March 30th of this year, the new headquarters of the BBSI were formally dedicated. Al-

though it cannot be said that the O.A.R.B.C. was officially represented, yet several Buckeyes were present. They were Mr. Wilbur Kirtland of Firestone who is a member of the Graham Road Baptist Church, Cuyahoga Falls, as well as, missionaries Ron Meznar and Don Hare.

The leadership of BBSI specifically requests that our many friends pray with us for the fund needed to liquidate the \$17,000 indebtedness which remains on this property.



of slavery and thus accomplished, through the preaching of the Gospel, a social revolution hitherto unheard of. The best way to correct social ills is to correct men's hearts. Once this is done, and men are given new hearts through the supernatural regeneration of God's Spirit, social injustices are soon corrected. The problem is in man's heart. People do not riot because they are poor. They riot because they are sinners. There have always been poor people among us, and there always will be. Jesus said, "The poor ye have always with you." But being poor is no excuse to break another man's store window and steal his goods. Responsible people, both black and white, deplore this kind of conduct. In summation, we believe that preachers should get back to the business of preaching the Gospel of Jesus Christ. That churches should be spiritual lighthouses, not social or political enclaves. Let the Word of God ring loud and clear up and down the length and breadth of our land, and let our pulpits once again reverberate with the fire and thunder of God's truth.


The Romigs have two fine sons. he older is James who is a graduate Baptist Bible Seminary. For

Our SOCCER team won the Mid-Ohio League championship and were undefeated in League play.


