These two students, Miss Naomi Conner, Cedarville, and William Osman, Manchester, were elected to this place of honor on the basis of scholarship, leadership, and character

Miss Conner, twenty years of age, was born April 12, 1929 and graduated from Cedarville High School in 1947. Entering Cedarville College in the summer of 1947, she has worked in the college office as a typist during her three years in college.

Most of the students know her as the young lady who presides at the piano during convocation period. Her hobbies are music and all sports.

Naomi has been an active member of the Caravaners for three years, a member of the Dramatics Club in 1947-48, the Y. W. C. A. three years, Chi Sigma Phi Sorority two years, Future Teachers of America two years, and a member of the women's basketball team in 1948. She was secretary of her class during her sophomore year, and is treasurer of the senior class this year.
