Edward H. Miller, acting president of Cedarville College since September 15, 1950, first came to Cedarvile to raise funds for the improvement and re-pair of the college plant. He was soon appointed to the Cedarville College Board of Trustees. When he was appointed vice president and business manager of the College, he resigned from the board to assume those positions.

Miller is a native of Buffalo, New York, received his education at Cortland, New York, Deerfield Academy, Massachusetts, and received his degree from Amherst College in 1930. Until he organized his own fund raising organization in 1945, he was engaged in manufactur-

The Millers have two children, Edward H. III, a freshman at Denison University, and Mary Sharon, in junior High School. They recently moved from Springfield to the former Conley residence in Cedarville. Mr. Miller is a member of the Christ Episcopal Church in Springfield, and was a deputy to the 1946 and 1949 general conventions of the Episcopal Church.

A major change in the administration of Cedarville College was effected by the board of trustees last August when they accepted the resignation of President Ira D. Vayhinger, effective September 15, 1950, and appointed E. H. Miller to the position of vice president and busines manager, and acting president.

Dr. Vayhinger, who had been president since 1943, resigned to accept the pastorate of the Presbyterian Church in Fletcher, Ohio. He had originally come to Cedarville as business man-

inspection report some two years ago in which the college was advised to replace dangerously aged wiring. At that time the college was not in a position to go ahead with the work, but took up the problem and its solution at the beginning of the school term.

As a part of the overall program of improvement, the college has contracted with C. C. Brewer of Cedarville to install a new furnace and heating equipment in the science building. The furnace has arrived and is in the process of being installed.

"Face lifting" of the buildings will be undertaken by the Hamel Construction Co. of Dayton. This will include pointing up of all brick work and refinishing weathered and damaged portions of the structures.

In addition to these many improvements in its existing facilities, the college is tentatively laying plans for the erection of a new girls' dormitory. The college board was said to have high hopes that this work can be undertaken by the beginning of the summer vacation.

23 Alumnus Accepts In Memoriam College Presidency at Missouri Valley

Dr. M. Earle Collins '23 has resigned as president of Tarkio College, Tarkio, Missouri, where he has served the past eighteen years, to accept the presidency of Missouri Valley College at Marshall, Missouri. He will begin his new duties January 29. Missouri Valley College is a Presbyterian institution.

During his administration of Tarkio College, the endowment has been doubled, the college has become free of debt, and five new large buildings have been built.

Dr. Collins graduated from Cedarville College with an A. B. degree in 1923. He received his M. A. at Ohio State University in 1930 and his PhD in 1933.

Dr. Collins is now president of the Missouri State Council of Churches, is a former president of the West Central area of Church Related Colleges Association, was district governor of Rotary in 46, and is a member of the General Association of the National Council of Churches in the United States.
