A Recognition Council convened at the Northfield Baptist Church for the purpose of examining the constitution of the First Baptist Church of Hudson.

Mrs. Montgomery, clerk of the new church, gave a brief historical sketch of the work. It was started with several families from the Northfield Church under the direction of Pastor Lynn Rogers. After several weeks the group was meeting under the leadership of the state missionary, Rev. Earl Umbaugh, until Pastor Karl Gettman was called to the field last November.

After a thorough examination of the constitution and articles of faith it was moved "That the Council recognize the First Baptist Church of Hudson as a duly constituted Baptist Church." The motion was supported and unanimously carried.

At the present time the congregation is meeting in the Hudson High School. Pastor Gettman and the church would appreciate the prayer support of all the Regular Baptist churches in Ohio.

The attendance was by far the most we have ever had, as over 200 men attended most of the sessions and enjoyed the fellowship and the beautiful surroundings of Sky View Ranch.

Dr. Hugh Hall of Cascades Baptist Church in Jackson, Michigan, brought Spirit-filled messages that were both challenging and comforting as he preached four messages emphasizing the greatness of God. His messages were entitled: "God's Great Call;" "The Great Coming of Christ;" "God's Great Nation;" and "God's Great People." Many men were challenged to go back to their local churches and become involved in GOD'S GREAT WORK.

Mr. Pat Baker, deacon at the Emmanuel Baptist Church in Toledo, had a very interesting and practical workshop on the necessity and procedure for discipline in the local church. He also led a discussion on the advantages and disadvantages of a one-board church and a two board (deacons and trustees) church.

Rev. Clarence Townsend, Pastor at Grace Church in Minford, did another splendid job in preparing and overseeing the work of feeding these hungry men.

Pastor Tom Wright and his men from Sharon, Pennsylvania, had the most men in attendance followed closely by Graham Rd. Baptist Church of Cuyahoga Falls where Ben Jennings is Pastor.

Again, we thank the Lord for the blessing of providing for us the tremendous facilities of Sky View Ranch and the great blessings that we received there.

- CAMP PATMOS -

Patmos campers are treated to a most refreshing sight upon arrival at camp this year. The newly constructed 40' x 82' swimming pool generates a great deal of excitement to hot travelers. Three diving boards are an imposing sight and are in constant use during swim time. The boards feature double, tubular, steel guardrails on each side of each board. These extend over the edge of the pool, thus minimizing risk of injury. The boards also have an abrasive surface to prevent slippage.

Another new feature this year is the new Starcraft, offshore boat—18 feet long with a hundred horsepower motor. When water-skiing is going on, there is room for seven or eight passengers. Boat rides have been cleared with the Coast Guard and juniors are given rides in place of water-skiing.

Sailboating continues to be a smash hit with campers. The fleet of ten boats is directed by two sailing instructors and all campers are given instruction. Weather permitting, sailboat races wil be run off giving the "skippers" a chance to show their skills.

Swimming instruction also has an added feature of diving instruction. Beginners are taught swimming and less capable swimmers are given added instructions. Water olympics are now a reality with swimming races, relays and diving competition each week.

Archery and air rifle instruction still receive a goodly number of campers as do the bike and miniature golf areas. Table tennis, softball, basketball and volleyball complete the roster of often used facilities.

Our kitchen staff numbers six. Top

grade beef is now being flown in weekly from Ashland and ham has become an added weekly attraction on the menu. These and other adjustments are being made to have plenty of good food for our "hungry ones."

Mr. George Barnes is the camp manager. Under his supervision is the kitchen staff plus the full time camp staff of eight (compared to five last year). A good report is that the new girl's rest-room should be ready for use early in July, as plumbers and other workers are frequently flown in by Mr. Shel Fisher, cosuperintendent of grounds.

There is still room for some boys during each of the senior weeks. A good number of decisions have been reported already. Please continue to pray for the spiritual impact upon our young people. — Lynn Rogers

- SCIOTO HILLS

At this writing of News and Views on Scioto Hill Baptist Camp, located in southern Ohio at Scioto Furnace, one week (High School Young People) is history with one of the best youth weeks yet. As dean for the week, I can surely say that it has been one of the most blessed and fruitful weeks in my camping experience.

One of the great assests at Camp Scioto are the surrounding hills, which make it a place of beauty, rest, relaxation and rich blessing from the Lord. Within these hills are attractive buildings and much improvement during the past two years. One can feel the very presence of God as they enter the camp grounds.

The young people had a great time on the mini-bikes (now in the second year) as well as the paddle boats. Also, the meals are the best with plenty of food.

The swimming area is in good condition, but is badly in need of a new concrete dock. Lord willing and as the funds are available, the trustees endeavor to have this built in the Fall. A new chapel is also needed with the present one to be used for indoor recreation.

Some of the activities enjoyed by everyone are organized sports, such as softball, volleyball, archery, rifle range, basketball, indoor hockey, pingpong, swimming and water sports. Competition contests are held throughout the weeks, both on land and in the water. Other events are midnight swims, polar bear dips, banquets and picnics.

The most important emphasis given throughout the weeks is the spiritual. We hear of reports concerning Bible discussions around the bunk beds, as well as various subjects relative to the lives of young people. Personal

interviews are held with each camper, which has been a help to the staff and counselors, as well as pastors.

The Bible Study sessions, missionary challenge and evening services are tremendous. Spirit filled men open up God's word endeavoring to reach the hearts and lives of all campers. Testimonies around the campfire are of such nature that only God can be given the credit for working and moving in the hearts of precious lives.

Much emphasis is given to campers that when they go back in the valley that their stand and esteem for Jesus Christ might be in great abundance and that they will not forget what they have been taught while at camp. It is our prayer that each one will daily seek the Lord's will for his life and be consistently firm on the biblical faith once delivered onto the Saints. — Joe Chapman

The Heavenly City — — The New Jerusalem

The author of this article is Dr. Jack R. Riggs. He is presently serving as Associate Professor of Bible at Cedarville College. Brother Riggs received his Th.D. at Dallas Theological Seminary in 1968. He also pastored in northwest Ohio before going into the field of education. We do appreciate his giving us this article for the O.I.B.

In the eleventh chapter of Hebrews, it is said of Abraham that he "looked for a city which hath foundations, whose builder and maker is God." (Heb. 11:10). By faith he saw what no mortal eyes could see; he saw far into the future and there beheld the eternal city which surpasses the glory of any earthly city. The anticipation of such a city is also the experience of the saint of the New Testament for the writer of Hebrews explains that "here have we no continuing city, but we seek one to come." (Heb. 13:14). This is the reason Paul points out that our citizenship is in heaven (Phil. 3:21).

The Apostle John identifies this city of God as the "new Jerusalem, which cometh down out of heaven from my God:" (Rev. 3:12). In due course John sees the city descending from heaven and is invited to a closer view of it. He records his vision in Revelation twenty-one and two. The Apostle gives a preview of the new heaven and the new earth in Revelation 21:9 — 22:7. The city is not pictured as alighting on the earth and consequently is regarded as hovering over the earth during the millennium and then descending closer to the earth after the renovation of heaven and earth.

The question has arisen as to the literalness of the city. The conclusion one reaches has definite bearing on one's conclusion as to the significance of the city being called "the bride, the Lamb's wife" (Rev. 21:9) and its relation to the church, the bride of Christ.

Several things would argue for a literal city as opposed to a figurative view. The very description of the city itself as having foundations, walls, gates and streets indicate a real construction. It has guards outside and inhabitants within. It is called the new Jerusalem as over against an old Jerusalem which was a material city.

A further argument is the tremendous size of the city. A non-literal city would have no dimensional demands placed upon it. However, this city, which is 1500 miles long, and broad, and high, allows ample room and space for each individual, family, tribe, nation and tongue of the redeemed.

The construction materials of the city are also indicative of a literal city.

This city must be the Father's house containing many mansions referred to by Christ. (John 14:2, 3) To raise a question to its literalness in Revelation would create a serious problem with respect to the promise of Christ.

The identity of the inhabitants of the city is also of interest. Both the

are alluded to in the description. (Rev. 21:12, 14) The inscription of the names from these two groups is apparently intended to indicate that the citizenry will be comprised of Israelites and the church, or saints of the present age. In line with this is the explanation of the author of Hebrews as to the inhabitants of this expected city. He has written in Hebrews 12:22-24:

But ye are come into mount Sion, and unto the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem, and to an innumerable company of angels. To the general assembly and church of the firstborn, which are written in heaven, and to God the Judge of all, and to the spirits of just men made perfect, and to Jesus the mediator of the new covenant, and to the blood of sprinkling, that speaketh better things than that of Abel.

The phrase "church of the firstborn" would clearly point to the church of Christ as He is the Firstborn among many brethren (Rom. 8:29), the Firstborn of all creation (Col. 1:15), and the Firstborn from the dead (Col. 1:18). The "spirits of just men made perfect" would refer to Old Testament saints and martyrs of the tribulation period.

It could then be concluded that the city will be inhabited by God, Jesus Christ, unfallen angels, the church, the redeemed of the Old Testament and resurrected saints of the tribulation period.

The church will seemingly have the prominent place among the redeemed in the city as the name of the city is the same as that of the church, the bride of the Lamb. (Rev. 21:9) The chief characterization of the new Jerusalem will be her adornment as the "bride, the Lamb's wife."

Another Beautiful Building



Calvary Baptist Church, Byesville, Ohio, dedicated its new building at special all-day services on Sunday, May 18. In the afternoon, Dr. Harold Henniger, Pastor of the Canton Baptist Temple was the guest speaker. At the evening service, two men who went into the ministry while members of the Calvary Baptist Church, were the speakers. They are Pastor David Shimp of Litchfield, Ohio and Brother Kenneth Nichols from Springfield, Ohio.

Ground was broken for the new building on Oct. 9, 1968. The edifice, with a white brick exterior, included a 392-seat auditorium with a full basement, a spacious foyer, a 75-seat chapel on the main floor, a mother's room, wall to wall red carpeting, padded, open-end pews, air conditioning, all electric heating and indirect lighting. The Sunday School Annex, completed in 1957, also is still in use.

The church was founded in a prayer meeting and Bible study in a local home, was organized in 1947 and the late Rev. S. R. Parrett of Mansfield, Ohio was called as the pastor. The first unit of the church building was completed in 1949 and Rev. Don Winters, now an Evangelist, became the Pastor. He was succeeded by Rev. Willard Duncan. For quite a number of years Rev. H. P. House, a former newspaperman, has served as Pastor. The Lord is blessing the ministry of this church — both Pastor and people!

Recently Recognized

A recognition council was held at the First Baptist Church, Hartville, Ohio on June 17. Brother Earl Umbaugh was elected to serve as Moderator for the meeting. Mrs. Nancy Bennett served as Secretary.

Rev. Don Bennett, Pastor of the church, read a copy of the letter of invitation sent to the local GARBC pastors. A second letter was read containing the minutes of a special business meeting held at the church on June 4, where the church voted that a council come to examine this church as a properly organized Baptist church. Rev. Bennett also read a statement of the history of the church.

After determining the church constitution was baptistic and after reviewing the by-laws, it was voted that the council recognize the First Baptist Church of Hartville, Ohio as a duly organized Baptist Church.

Five Great Days At Fort Wayne!

The national GARBC conference is now a part of history but to those who were privileged to attend, a glorious history, indeed! There was a spirit of unity throughout. The messages were rich and powerful.

Some very important decisions were made. It was voted unanimously that we withdraw from the International Council of Christian Churches. A unanimous call was extended to Dr. Joseph M. Stowell, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Hackensack, New Jersey, to become National Representative of the Association. Dr. William Kuhnle, pastor of the Garfield Baptist Church, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, was extended a call to become Assistant to the National Representative. (Both men have accepted!) Brother Kuhnle will play a very active part in a new worldwide radio ministry which is being launched by the Association.

Rev. W. Thomas Younger, Ft. Wayne, Indiana Five approved agencies reported 1,449 active mission-

aries, 143 inactive and retired missionaries and 115 accepted candidates. Total receipts for the last year were \$6,707,500.27. Fifty-one foreign fields, and the United States are being served. Special ministries in the United States include suburban, inner-city, Spanish, Negro, mountain, Indian and college campus works.

Six approved colleges reported a total student enrollment of 3,011 with a full-time faculty of 136 and a part-time faculty of 42. The total budget of the schools was \$4,922,334.00 and the total assets were \$15,252,887.00.

Four approved social agencies including two children's homes which serve as foster homes, adoption agencies and provide unwed mother care, one senior citizens' home, and one home and school for mentally retarded children and adults reported receipts of \$748,823.44 during the year.

The Baptist Builders' Club gives grants of up to \$2,000 to needy churches from gifts of members. Seventeen churches were given \$34,000 last year, and 286 churches have been given \$506,950 since the establishment of the Club.

Nine resolutions were presented and acted upon. They all passed unanimously. These covered the subjects of The Mission of the Church, Personal Holiness of Life, Sensitivity Training, Divine and Human Authority, Patriotism, Social Responsibility, Sex Education, Formation of International Fellowship of Regular Baptist Churches and Verbal Inspiration.

A proposed change in the constitution will allow churches in Canada and U. S. possessions to fellowship with the Association. The change would become effective next year if approved by the Association.

Should the Lord Jesus tarry, our national conference in 1970 will be held in Denver, Colorado. Start saving your pennies now!

Ours is a blessed fellowship now totaling 1361 churches! The theme of the conference was . . . "Faithful Stewards of the Mysteries of God" . . . and so may we ever be!

Journey To Ecuador

Back in early June your editor learned concerning a trip taken by Rev. and Mrs. R. Kenneth Smelser, Medina, Ohio. Along with "The Smelsers" were Mr. and Mrs. Shrum. Brother Shrum is a deacon in the First Baptist Church where Brother Smelser serves as pastor. We asked for a report of their trip. It seemed to us that the best way to give this report to our readers was to share Brother Smelser's letter telling of this joyful experience.

Dear Don:

I am so glad for your kind letter and the desire to help us tell our story. We are presently in the midst of DVBS. We have 285 enrolled! We are getting ready for the "Church in the Park" services. These will be held Sunday evenings . . . July and August. Also, we have the tent at the Fair to reach 100,000 in concentrated effort. We covet your prayers.

The last three weeks of April, Theona and I along with Mr. and Mrs. Ray Shrum from our church went to Miami and flew to Quito, Ecuador. We visited the work of HCJB. We saw millions of dollars worth of buildings and equipment God has planted in that spot for His glory. There are 150 missionaries and 200 nationals working with that station and fellowship. The Bible Institute of the Air has 18,000 enrolled from over 40 different countries. The station broadcasts 18 hours a day in 14 languages. Thus, we praise the Lord for His great work. I got to make 5 tapes to be used in broadcasts and will also be sending other sermons. I had my first experience of speaking with an interpreter! Once I did this at an Indian base and another time at a little Spanish church.

We were taken to Shellmara to see the hospital work and then the missionary at the base which the five young men (those slain by the Aucas) left to reach and die for the Aucas. From there we were flown to Macuma, the Land of the Headhunters

— the Jivroh Indians. We met Frank Drown the famous missionary author and worker. Then we were taken to Limoncocha where we stayed 3½ days. This is the base for the Wycliffe Translators. What a work is this! We were here with the Quitchua Indians. Our own Bruce Linton, who is the pilot now for the Auca Indians flew us over Auca land to see "Palm Beach" and wave at Rachael Saint and Aucas and see that field. What a tremendous blessing!

I can testify that any Pastor will never be the same who goes to the mission field. We have pictures and a story and are ready to "do what He says for us to do." The work of God is great. Just to see the transmitters at Pifo and the generators at Pappallacta and realize God's missionaries are the finest, deeply dedicated, most wonderful people on earth is such a blessing!

American Baptist Convention Elects New President

The following are excerpts from an article given by Religious News Service, Seattle. The complete article appeared in Western Voice, Fort Worth, Texas 6-19-69.

Dr. Thomas Kilgore, Jr. pastor of the Second Baptist Church, Los Angeles has been elected the first black president of the American Baptist Convention and the second black man to lead a predominantly white denomination.

The choice of the convention's nominating committee, he was elected by a vote of 1200 to 46 after one lone shout of dissent prevented a unamious ballot. There were no other nominations.

Dr. Kilgore called himself a "militant with love" and said he saw his role as unifying the forces of blacks and whites, rich and poor, young and old.

Dr. Kilgore, who received his theological education at Union Theological Seminary, N.Y., has been pastor of the Los Angeles church since 1963. Previously he served pastorates in New York, North Carolina and South Carolina.

Dr. Kilgore said after his election that he would like to see the black American Baptists "work in the community toward coalition with black militants."

Dr. Kilgore said he was in favor of churches paying \$500 million in reparation as demanded recently by black militant James Forman.

Glimpses of Truth

from the

Greek New Testament

PTOCHOS

The word of
True Poverty

This interesting Greek word (ptochos) is rendered "poor" in the A.V., which is a correct translation, but there is a depth of meaning behind it. Actually there are two words in Greek for "poor." One is the word peneis, which means "wretched, suffering want, hungry." This word describes the man for whom living is a struggle, the man who is the very reverse of the man who lives in affluence. This term appears in II Cor. 9.9. Then there is this word ptochos. It is derived from the verb ptosso, "to be thoroughly frightened, to cower down and hide oneself for fear," so the noun form ptochos describes a man who slinks and crouches and cringes. It denotes no simply honest poverty and the struggle of the common laboring man to make ends meet, but it describes abject poverty; it indicates one who is reduced to beggary, who has nothing, and is in imminent danger of starvation. It designates not genteel poverty, but rea! acute destitution. Moulton says this word ptochos "was always used in a bad sense until it was ennobled in the Gospels."

Ptochos is used in Luke 14:13, "But when thou makest a feast, call the poor (ptochous). . ." It appears in John 12:8, where our Lord's words are: "For the poor (ptochous) always ye have with you. . . "Paul uses it in Romans 15:26, "the poor (tous ptochous) saints at Jerusalem." James uses the word several times, as in 2:2, 3, 5, 6, — "a poor man (ptochos) in vile raiment. . ." and "the poor (tous ptochous) of this. world. . ." etc. John has it in Rev. 3:17, when he describes the worldlyrich apostate church as "poor" (ptochos), i.e. destitute of the Christian virtues and eternal riches. The word occurs twice in II Cor. 8:9, to describe our Lord's descent out of glory into the realm of human life in the incarnation and His subsequent death on the cross: "For ye know the grace

of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though He was rich, yet for your sakes He became poor (eptocheusen), that ye through His poverty (ptocheia) might be rich."


When the Lord Jesus Christ read the Scripture in the synagogue at Nazareth, He chose the passage which says that the Spirit of the Lord was upon the Servant of the Lord to preach the gospel to "the poor" (ptochois), Luke 4:18. When the Lord identified Himself and gave His credentials to John's disciples who had been sent to Him to ask if He really was the Anointed One, His answering statement ends with the words "the poor (ptochol) have the gospel preached to them" (Matt. 11:5). Moreover it is of great interest to note that the Beatitudes in Matthew 5 began with the statement "Blessed are the poor (ptochoi) in spirit . . ." (Matt. 5:13).

Two Hebrew Terms

At this point it should be said that behind this Greek word ptochos in its background, as William Barclay has pointed out, there are two Hebrew terms: ebion and ani. These words have an interesting and significant development of meaning in three stages: (1) Poor, in the sense of lacking in this world's goods (Deut. 15:4, 11); (2) Then, poor, as down-trodden and oppressed (Amos 2:6; 8:4); (3) Finally, the greatest advance in meaning: when a man is lacking in sufficient goods, and is down-trodden and oppressed, he has no influence in the world, no power, no prestige, no position, and cannot expect help from other men. With all help and resources of earth closed to him, he has nothing left but to look to God. So these words come to describe people who, having nothing on earth, have thus come to put their complete trust and hope in God (Amos 5:11-12; Psalm 10:2, 12, 17; 12:5; 14:6).

We come back now to Matt. 5:3, "Blessed are the poor (ptochoi) in spirit . . ." with a better understanding of its real meaning. It means, for one thing, that blessed is the man who is brought to a sense of his own abject destitution in the sight of God, and who can only cry out "God, be merciful to me, a sinner!" But since this teaching of our Lord Jesus Christ is addressed to those who are the Lord's own people, it means: blessed is the man who does feel this sense of destitution and who has placed his utter and complete trust in the eternal God. Such is the "poor one" (ptochos) for he is conscious of his need, and is certain that in the Lord

of glory alone that need can be supplied. The "poor ones" (hoi ptochoi) of the New Testament are those who, belonging to the Lord, realize their own abject helplessness in themselves and the great wealth of the riches of the grace of God.

The ptochoi kind of poverty consists in being destitute of all confidence in the flesh, in cringing at the very thought of total self-reliance, in holding back from self-assertion, in esteeming others better than ourselves, in the realization of utter helplessness and beggary so far as is concerned. It is to be gratefully dependent upon the power, provision, and preservation of the eternal God. It is to be thoroughly conscious that we are what we are by the grace of God, and that without the Lord we

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
Berean W.M.F. To Meet In September

Visiting Missionaries In The Land Of Old Mexico

Through the prayers and generosity of the Bible Mission Baptist Church in Reynoldsburg, Ohio, Pastor and Mrs. Thompson traveled to Poza Rica, Veracruz, Mexico to a conference of the Baptist Mid-Missions missionaries. They were met in Mexico City by the Sam Hornbrooks, Harry Babcock, and Lois Jackson. After a little sight-seeing in Mexico City they traveled to Pachuca. Next day a trip to the pyramids at Teotihuacan but the start was delayed so that the missionary could take a woman and her husband to the hospital. She was going for maternity care but had to stop on the way to buy necessary items for the baby. Good news! After five boys the new arrival was a girl. They named her Luz Divina, Divine Light, since she was born after the parents were saved.

The trip to the pyramids—as large at the base as the ones in Egypt, but not so high — was a lesson to show the height, breadth, and weight of paganism. All this to show for the worship of long since dead priests and rulers and a lifeless and powerless god. The weather was HOT! We traveled from 8,000 ft. to about 40 ft. above sea level. This is a great change for the body and a missionary told that it takes about a year to become acclimatized. Longer sometimes for the disposition.

In Poza Rica we visited an established Baptist Church — with their own national pastor, Pablo de la Garza. A Bible School is held in connection with the church. The building for the school is partially finished but classes have been held for two years. Five students finished the classes for last year on May 10 Five to ten new students are expected next spring, D.V. after a three year term. One student holds services in a neighboring town. Another takes

care of a book store in Poza Rica, the only one within 150 miles. It also is the backing for a radio program that goes out to the surrounding neighborhood. \$30 to \$40 will pay a student's bills for one month. They are already used to the climate and know the language — a good investment.

In the Sunday School time at the church one interesting incident was partly understood (the service was in Spanish), one person gave a Bible verse and then called on another person in the class. They gave a verse and called in turn on another. The men sat on one side of the church and the women on the other during the regular service but combined for the Sunday School time. Two girls, about 13 or 14, who helped with the housework in the missionaries' homes each had a children's class. On Saturday they did their work together to get done earlier and go calling on their students for the next day.

Four days were spent at a hotel in Tecolutla, near the Gulf of Mexico, where Mr. Thompson spoke to the assembled missionaries in morning and evening sessions. Classes were held by two Bible Club women for the children. In the afternoon, siesta time, swimming and meeting together to talk over plans and problems and enjoy fellowship with English speaking friends. Rooms with private baths (showers) and three meals a day (two of them were four-courses) and

no dishes to wash, were fully enjoyed. Cost — a little over \$4 per person per day.

The part of Poza Rica the Horn-brooks live in has a good water supply, (available just the last few months) but they have to buy drinking water by the 5 gal. jug. Most homes are built right on the street and the dust sifts in. It is surprising to see how clean the clothes are when the people come to church considering how dusty it is. Some wash near the river — others have washers at their homes. Some cook in an open room — guess it is cooler that way since you get more breeze.

Part of the missionaries have their residence papers. We had written reports from each missionary and they reported no trouble in passing through customs with tourist visas but with residence papers they are able to take in more and larger items such as refrigerators, stoves, washers, etc. and do not have to go to the border every 6 months to get tourist papers renewed. One missionary was told at the border that she should get the residence papers - it wouldn't take longer than 6 months — but there is difficulty getting them quickly. It seems time goes slower under the hot sun and tomorrow does just as well as today when it comes to signing papers.

Prayer is needed for these dear missionaries as they faithfully serve the Lord in Mexico.

Five pastors and two laymen (messengers from Central Baptist, Columbus) met and after careful examination of the Constitution, they voted to make the following declaration. . .

The recognition council wishes to recognize the Bible Baptist Church of Newark, Ohio, as a duly and properly organized Baptist Church with the stipulation to be included in the Articles of Faith and added declaration concerning personal and ecclesiastical separation as well as a statement concerning civil government (separation of church and state).

The Council asked the Newark Church to indicate its willingness to insert the above named stipulation by a church vote before the close of the business session at the annual meeting of the GARBC, and immediately notify the Council of Fourteen of this action.

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


Dr. Jeremiah asd Rev. Carter


