WANTED - A SONG LEADER

(Just A Song Leader)

Is there any law in Bible-believing churches against a music director or song leader per se? A music director who leads the choir without belaboring us beforehand on how hard the choir has worked on this number. (No one, I hope, gives a blurb on how hard the preacher has worked on his sermon.) I like to think that both the music and the sermon are services rendered to our wonderful Lord as we gather to worship Him.

Occasionally the origin of a hymn or some genuinely pertinent remark by the song leader I appreciate. In its place, I enjoy wit and humor. Even in church, used sparingly. But I've had it up to my bangs (n.b. — that's beyond my eardrums) with frothy talk and light jokes prefacing every song that's sung.

Maybe it's because we've fallen into a certain pattern (or rut) in fundamental circles. We shun liturgy and ritual because they can become meaningless. We claim the guidance of the Holy Spirit Himself. But I wonder about some of the practices that seem to spread from church to church. How much meaning do they hold for us?

The same noisy chatter before and even during services. Before the Sunday morning message the same whirling around to shake hands with everybody while we sing the same song. (Ever stop to think how that strikes a visitor who expects some semblance of reverence in the place of worship?)

The same prelude by the visiting quartet, "Y'all pray for us while we sing." (And, often as not, we need prayer for the ordeal!) When it is over the preacher stabs a finger into the audience, straight at me, and shouts, "Everybody who enjoyed that, say Amen." I hate to lie.

The same manner of introducing the invitation. The same closing hymn, time after time after time. Have we drifted into an unwritten, informal pattern?

The habits of music men seem to me part of the pattern. But from my pewpoint, our fundamental churches could stand some music men who direct the choir and congregation in worshipful music and leave the talking to the preacher. "And now while every head is bowed, is there one"?

is a picture of the Home Office of our General Association of Regular Baptist Churches. It is located at 1800 Oakton Blvd. Des Plaines, Illinois. The building also houses our Regular Baptist Press.

If ever you get to the Chicago area, be sure to see it for yourself. It is a beehive of activity . . . a building well suited to meet the needs of our Fellowship.

There are now 1400 churches in our GARBC. Our Association approves five mission agencies numbering 1399 active missionaries, 76 inactive and retired, and 148 newly accepted candidates. These labor in 52 foreign countries and the United

States. Total receipts for missions last year were \$7,505,844.57.

The GARBC also approves six colleges which have a total student enrollment of 3,156 students. Full time faculty members number 162 and there are 37 who serve part-time.

Four social agencies are approved, as is also The Baptist Builders Club.

Our national magazine is the Baptist Bulletin, Dr. Merle Hull, Editor. Every church in our Ohio Association of Regular Baptist Churches should be placing it in the hands of their people. They should be given their people THE OHIO INDEPENDENT BAPTIST as well.

The rally proved a financial success. There was a splendid spirit of cooperation on the part of all.

"I Am A Missionary Child"

This is a letter sent to Dr. Allen Lewis, President of Baptist Mid-Missions. It was written by a "M.K." (Missionary Kid). It contains an urgent plea. Perhaps the Lord would use you to help meet this need!

Dear Mr. Lewis:

I am a missionary child. I am fourteen years old. I have lived in Africa eleven years of my life. Three other years were spent in the U.S.A. when my folks were on furlough. I am very aware of the problems in the Central African Republic. One problem I am burdened about is a high school for missionary kids.

This year I am taking 9th grade by correspondence. It is very difficult. My folks live in Bakouma. We are the only missionaries there now. Two of my older brothers are in the States. Charles is at Karawa, Congo along with Rick Golike and Rene Einfeldt. Becky Fisher is also taking correspondence. Priscilla and Peter Dreisback in the Tchad are taking correspondence and also Peter Kendrick.

In August I was able to visit with some missionary families for about a month. I heard many people's opinions on the subject of a high school. I feel the need more now that I am facing the decision of what I will do next year for school.

On August 18th. I went to the airport in Bangui. Pauline and Eunice Dark, Karen and Ken Wimer left on the airplane. Before the plane came in while we were waiting for it, we all stood around joking. No one

felt bad or cried. As the minutes flew by and the jet came in I pretty well knew what was on the minds of my friends who were leaving. None of them cried as they left, but I knew what was on the minds and hearts of the kids as they kissed their folks and went through the door into the airplane. When they saw their folks for the last time and said, "Good--bye Mom, Good-bye Dad", I knew they were wondering whether they would see each other again. As the engines roared and the jet taxied down the runway, the tires off the ground and minutes ticking by leaving the ones you love so dear, miles and miles apart from you. The days of your childhood are over. You are facing a new year. The only friend you can count on is the Lord.

I feel a real love for my folks. Some families that were once missionaries aren't here any more because they didn't want to leave their children in the U.S.A. or some other country. After all, what are moms and dads for? They are to love, care, show their children the answers, and help them figure out their problems. Parents are someone that a kid can go to and talk over problems and blessings with them. Love is what keeps a family together. I feel I have a right

to love my parents and want them to be with me. I don't feel selfish about this.

I am afraid to even think of going back to the U.S.A. All the immorality I have read and heard about, and seen in the high schools in the States. It makes me feel like a fish in the Pacific Ocean. I want to be with Mom and Dad for a few more years before I plan to go to college. Maybe the only way I can do this is if we have a High School.

I believe a missionary kid can have a ministry in Africa as well as the moms and dads. I personally, have had a chance to talk with teen age girls and help them and show them the way to heaven. My parents would never have this opportunity. If one soul was saved because of a high school, wouldn't it be worth it?

We can never build a high school or get enough money and teachers for one. It must be all of the Lord's doing. He has to supply all the materials that are needed. I hope that there will be some instruments who are willing to be used of God and be sent to teach us kids in the Central African Republic. I hope there will be generous people who will be willing to give what money is needed. I am praying desperately that the Lord will provide the needs. I believe that He will too. The Lord said, "If ye ask anything in my name with faith believing", He will answer as He sees best. We have that promise.

Moms, Dads, brothers and sisters, I am sure, are crying, are asking the Lord for a High School. We want one badly. We have a very promising director too. Gene Townes is very encouraging. He is a good man with a lot of faith in God.

You have heard my plea for a High School. You know that there are kids and parents who feel the same way as I do.

We must have faith and put our trust in the Lord for providing all the needs. This is a big burden on my heart.

We are praying for the Lord's direction and I know you are too in the Home Office. Please don't quit.

A Mountain Top Experience

A Report on our National GARBC Conference by Mrs. Earl Umbaugh

Many who read this have never been in the Rocky Mountains. The Rockies are at their best in Colorado. There are 54 peaks over 14,000 feet. These mountains display wild flowers, forests, lakes, rivers, creeks, beaver dams, rocks, tundra, crags, glaciers, wildlife and trout fishing deluxe.

The grandure of the mountains was only exceeded by the blending of the hundreds of GARBC delegates voices raised in praise to our God. Our Saviour was truly exalted as Creator, Ruler and Coming King.

The daily messages by Dr. Ernest Pickering, President of Baptist Bible Seminary, were exalting to our God "Who Is"; "Who Rules"; "Who Creates"; and "Who Speaks" to man through His creation and through His precious Word.

The theme of the Conference "YE SHALL BE WITNESSES" was best set forth by our (Ohio's) own Richard Snavely, Pastor of Calvary Baptist Church, Findlay, Ohio in his message on Tuesday afternoon, "The Reality Of A Lost Community". The message can be summed up in this quotation, "When I say I have the only answer to man's need then I make myself responsible for the souls of men."

There were 50 churches received bringing our membership to 1400. Ninety-nine Teens were entered in the finals of the Talents for Christ Contest. There were over 1500 delegates registered and over 350 Teens attended the Thursday and Friday sessions for the youth.

There were decisions for Christ made at the meetings on the Capitol steps and many and varied decisions were registered at the closing session on Friday evening when the Evangelist Tom Williams spoke.

Conference next year will be June 28 through July 2 at Winona Lake, Indiana. Plan now to go by arranging for your vacation for these dates. There are many house-keeping and camping facilities available at these Conference grounds.

An Examination . . . of Holy Spirit Power and Speaking In Tongues

by Dr. Arthur Williams

That there is a rising tide of interest in what is reported to be "the baptism in the Holy Spirit" followed by the gift of speaking in tongues cannot be denied. It is reported that this movement is gaining adherents from among Baptists, Methodists, Presbyterians, Episcopalians, and even among Roman Catholics. We are told that these recruits have become dissatisfied with what their churches have to offer them, and that in their acceptance of the teaching of Pentecostalism they have been led into a more intimate fellowship with the Saviour through a more perfect understanding of the ministry of the Holy Spirit.

It should be the earnest desire of every born-again believer in the Lord Jesus Christ to experience all that God has for them. It cannot be denied that there is much carnality among the redeemed, and this fact is attended with tragic spiritual apathy. Before we sit in judgment upon those who seek for what is called "the baptism in the Holy Spirit" with its attendant gift of speaking in tongues we should be willing to acknowledge our own spiritual deficiencies. Before we condemn the emotionalism of Pentecostalism we need to examine our own hearts which may at best be only "lukewarm", a condition deplored by the Saviour.

Consider Two Propositions

In our approach to the subject before us we would like to present two propositions which we believe to be axiomatic in our study of the Scriptures.

- 1. The will of God for the believer in Christ is CLEARLY RE-VEALED within the pages of the Holy Scriptures.
- 2. Any "experience" which is not clearly revealed within the pages of the Holy Scriptures must of necessity be of the world, the flesh, or of the Devil.

The question which we must face

is this: Is it the will of God for the believer in Christ to seek "the baptism in the Holy Spirit and to speak in tongues (languages not previously known)? If it is God's will we shall find it to be very clearly revealed within the pages of the Holy Scriptures. We should expect to find exhortations in several books of the New Testament in support of this teaching. We need to ask God to give us an open heart and mind as we approach the Scriptures for His divine guidance as to His blessed will with reference to this matter.

- 1. Our Lord very definitely promised the gift of the Holy Spirit, and this is recorded in John 14:26 and 16:7. Further, He bade His disciples to "tarry in Jerusalem" until they were to be endued with power from on high. Luke 24:49. But we have searched the four Gospels in vain for a single exhortation from the lips of the Saviour for any one to seek the baptism in the Holy Spirit.
- 2. Let us now look at the Book of Acts. Is it possible to find a single exhortation from the lips of the Saviour or from the Apostles for believers in Christ to seek a baptism in the Holy Spirit? In Acts 1:5 our Lord Jesus declared that His disciples were to be baptised in the Holy Spirit "not many days hence." We learn from Matt. 3:11, Mark 1:8, Luke 3:16 and John 1:33 that the Lord Jesus Himself was to be the Baptizer. This baptism occurred on the Day of Pentecost, in fulfillment of its prototype as recorded in Lev. 23:9-17. On the Day of Pentecost (fifty days after His resurrection from the dead) our Lord fulfilled His promise, and the Church had its birth. The gift of languages was also given to the disciples on this occasion which enabled them to address the multitudes gathered together at Jerusalem in their own dialect, and that without an interpreter! Acts 2:1-11 We fail to find

a single exhortation within the Book of Acts for anyone to seek that which occurred on the Day of Pentecost. This was the *one baptism* to which the Apostle Paul referred in Eph. 4:5, and was as unrepeatable as Calvary.

- 3. It is generally conceded by all who believe the Bible to be the Word of God that the Apostle Paul was the human agent whom God selected to reveal His will for the Church and its several members (Eph. 3:1-12) The Apostle Paul wrote a long letter to the Church at Rome. Can anyone cite a single exhortation in this letter for believers in Christ to seek "the baptism in the Holy Spirit and the gift of tongues"? If so, we have failed to find it.
- 4. The Apostle Paul wrote two letters to the Church in Corinth. Can anyone cite a single passage in either of these two letters in which believers in Christ are exhorted to seek "the baptism in the Holy Spirit and the gift of tongues"? Is it not a fact that the Apostle Paul addressed them ALL as having previously been baptised in the Holy Spirit, and thus made to be members of the body of Christ? I Cor. 12:12-13. Is it not true that we become members of the family of God by the new birth, but we become members of the body of Christ by baptism in the Holy Spirit? But this baptism did not constitute the recipients "spiritual". The Apostle Paul reproved these very believers with gross carnality, and cited evidences of it to prove his contention.
- 5. The Apostle Paul wrote an encyclical to the Churches of Galatia. Can anyone cite a single passage in this letter exhorting believers to seek such a baptism and gift?
- 6. The Apostle Paul wrote letters to the churches of Ephesus, Philippi, Colosse, and Thessalonica. Can anyone find a single passage in any one of these Epistles in which believers are exhorted to seek a baptism in

the Holy Spirit and the gift of speaking in another language?

7. The Apostle Paul wrote two letters to Timothy and one to Titus. Can anyone find a single passage in these letters in which these brethren were exhorted to seek a baptism in the Holy Spirit, or to encourage those to whom they ministered to do so?

8. We do not know with certainty who wrote the Epistle to the Hebrews, but we fail to find a single exhortation here for anyone to seek a baptism in the Holy Spirit or the gift of speaking in another language?

9. Can anyone cite such an exhortation in the Epistles of Peter, James, John, or Jude? And one will look in vain for such an exhortation to the Book of Revelation.

What then must we conclude? If it is impossible to find a single exhortation to seek such a baptism or gift in the entire New Testament, can it be possible that it is the will of God? That which is the will of God is CLEARLY REVEALED in the Holy Scriptures. We are not left to inference. There is no ambiguity. God's will for the believer in Christ does not rest upon some isolated text; it is stated with clarity.

1. It is the will of God that men repent and believe the Gospel, 2 Pet. 3:9.

2. It is the will of God that lost sinners be saved, and come to a knowledge of the truth, I Tim. 2:1-4.

3. It is the will of God that believers in the Lord Jesus Christ be "sanctified" not only positionally (Cor. 1:2), but practically, I Thess. 4:3.

4. It is the will of God that believers in the Lord Jesus Christ present their bodies a living sacrifice, that they be not conformed to the world, but transformed by the renewing of their minds, that they prove experimentally what is the good and acceptable and perfect will of God. Rom. 12:1-2.

5. It is the will of God that believers in the Lord Jesus Christ be filled with the Holy Spirit, Eph. 5:18; even unto all the fulness of God, Eph. 3:19.

6. It is the will of God that the redeemed hold in high esteem those who have the spiritual oversight of the Church; that they live in peace among themselves; that they warn the unruly, encourage the faint-hearted, support the weak, exercise patience toward all men; that they rejoice evermore, pray without ceasing, be thankful for everything (I Thess. 5:12-18).

These and other similar instructions are clearly revealed in Holy Scripture as the will of God for every born-again believer. But we fail to find a single exhortation within the pages of divine revelation for anyone to seek a baptism in the Holy Spirit or to obtain the gift of tongues!

Any "experience" which is not CLEARLY REVEALED as the will of God within the pages of Holy Scripture must of necessity be of the world, the flesh, or of the Devil.

We do not for one moment question the sincerity of those who claim to have had an "experience" of baptism in the Holy Spirit, and with it the gift of speaking in tongues. But sincerity is no criterion of truth. We are concerned with one thing only, and that is, were such "experiences" according to the revealed will of God in the Holy Scriptures. If not, then they must of necessity be from some other source. It is clearly revealed as the will of God for every believer to be filled with the Holy

Spirit, for only thus are they enabled to exhibit the fruit of the Spirit (Gal. 5:22-23), or to witness to the lost with power (Acts 1:8).

We would not conclude this brief study without a word of encouragement and of warning. It is the will of God that we be filled unto all the fulness of God, Eph. 3:19. Let us confess our lack of that love which the Holy Spirit awaits to impart (Rom. 5:5) (I Cor. 13). We lack so many of the virtues which were so gloriously exhibited by the Apostles and the early Church. Let us confess our impotence and fruitlessness and earnestly seek all that God has revealed as His will for our lives.

But we would also warn the members of the Church which is Christ's body against seeking any "experience" for which there is no support in Scripture. The Word of God presents the norm for the child of God, and there is no other authority. The validity of our "experience" must be tested in the laboratory of divine revelation (Isa. 8:20). We have been impressed with the lack of consistency on the part of those who cite Mark 16:17 in support of speaking in tongues, but who seem to be unwilling to demonstrate their confidence in the validity of the text by "taking up serpents" or drinking "deadly things" without physical harm. Our study has led us to the conclusion that certain gifts of the Spirit were temporary in nature, and that they served a useful purpose in the days before the volume of Divine Revelation was completed. (I Cor. 13:8). We are determined to make the Word of God our sole authority in both doctrine and practice. It provides us with an adequate revelation of the will of God for our lives.






Tom Finch Ordained


