A Call For Help!

A number of our GARB churches in the eastern section of the United States suffered greatly as a result of the recent floods. Some of these churches were filled with water and debris. Pews, carpets, pulpits, organs, pianos, hymn books, libraries were destroyed.

Concerning just one of these churches, we learned that most of the congregation had lost their homes and their businesses, as well as, their personal belongings. The church building was badly damaged. The basement was still filled with water even though the fire department had been pumping for two days. The water had reached to the second story of the parsonage. Everything was completely wrecked! There was a three-inch layer of mud covering everything. The destruction is unbelievable! The pastor's personal belongings were destroyed. He and his family lost their dining room, living room and kitchen furniture. Every appliance was totally ruined. His library was a complete loss. Even their linens and clothing were rendered worthless. They have suffered a great loss.

In order to help meet the needs of these dear folk and others like them, our Council of Fourteen at the recent GARBC conference in San Diego, California declared that a "Flood Relief Fund" be established at the Des Plaines office. Approximately 300 members and friends from both near and far were present. The service was led by Pastor John D. Teeters. Others participating in the service were Mrs. Daniel Thomas, Mr. Bruce Perry, Mr. Larry Cox, Mr. Warren Kissell, Mrs. Donald Moffat, Mr. George Perry, Mr. Thomas Fillinger, Mrs. Donald Middleton and Rev. A. Donald Moffat.

Mr. Larry Cox, Building Superintendent presented the church keys to Mr. Warren Kissell, Chairman of the Board of Trustees. Editor/Evangelist A. Donald Moffat delivered the Dedication sermon.

The building was originally built for and owned by the Parksave Food Market. Later, it was leased by the

Mohawk Motor Company. The Calvary Baptist Church purchased the building which includes a large paved parking area for the sum of \$95,000 (Total area — 3½ acres). Approximately \$12,000 was spent in remodeling. It has nine large class rooms, a carpeted auditorium that seats 360 and is air conditioned throughout. At the rear of the building is a two-story addition which will be made into more class rooms.

The people of the church gave many hours to the work of remodeling. Like those of Nehemiah's day, they were a people who had "a mind to work". It is most beautiful! Rev. Teeters formerly served as pastor of the Emmanuel Baptist Church in Xenia, Ohio. He has been at Tiffin since November of '71. The Lord is greatly blessing his ministry there. If ever you should get into the Tiffin area, be sure to drop by and see this lovely church building.

The San Diego Conference

The 41st Annual Conference of the General Association of Regular Baptist Churches is now history, but its value lives on in the memories of those who were privileged to attend. A friend, who had never attended an Annual Conference, once asked, "What is an Annual GARBC Conference?" My first and immediate response was that it is many things to many people. It is an opportunity to see Christian friends and other Christian workers from all across the country, seen only at Conference time. To some, it provides an opportunity for a vacation, visiting interesting places on the way to and from Conference. For some it proves an opportunity to get from the pressure of daily service, and a chance to look at one's own ministry from a different perspective — an opportunity to evaluate the past and to plan for the future. But, whatever the side issue might be, the heart of a GARBC Conference is the preaching of the Word of God. We felt spiritually hungry. Our souls needed to be fed. We were not disappointed!

One of our Ohio pastors, Dr. Wilbur C. Rooke, of the Euclid-Nottingham Baptist Church, spoke to us every morning on the necessity of putting the government of our lives on the shoulders of the Child who was born and the Son who was given.

Further business carried on included calling for a Council of Eighteen rather than a Council of Fourteen, a voluntary pension plan for pastors and other Christian workers was adopted, reports were received and resolutions were adopted.

Many others from Ohio participating in the program. Dr. John Balyo, Pastor of the Cedar Hill Baptist Church, Cleveland, moderated the Conference. Dr. James T. Jeremiah, President of Cedarville College, presented the need for, and ministry of, our approved schools. Rev. William Fusco and Dr. Viggo Olsen presented the challenges of the mission field. Rev. Donald J. Sewell, pastor of Emmanuel Baptist Church, Toledo, moderated the session presenting our Social Agencies. Rev. Clifton Miller presented a workshop on campus ministries. During the business sessions new churches were received. Our GARBC now numbers 1443 churches. These churches reported giving nearly nine million dollars to our missions during the fiscal year, 1971. Our five approved mission agencies have 1600 missionaries taking the gospel to the world, both at home and overseas.





Spurgeon College Purchase Land

Spurgeon Baptist College, presently located in Lakeland, Florida, has purchased 35 acres of land on route 60. This property is strategically located on a major 4-lane highway. The city of Tampa is but 20 minutes to the west and Lakeland only 10 miles to the northeast. The purchase price was \$55,000. A similar plot of land located within 1½ miles from this property was recently re-priced from \$60,000 to \$120,000. "The Lord hath done great things for us."

A Christian friend, who is a contractor, has offered to build our first building for about one/half of the regular cost. We plan to construct the first unit of a dormitory quadrangle. The dimensions will be 40' x 160'. It will be carpeted and centrally air-conditioned.

Our immediate need is \$12,000. Of this amount, we have already received a gift of \$1,000. We ask prayer for wisdom concerning the financing of this program. We recently met with representatives of a bond company and feel the Lord may lead us in that direction. Will This Be Our Epitaph?

Here lies the greatest civilization ever developed upon this earth—the finest and best hope that all men could be free, self-governing and prosperous, and that the burden of excessive toil, disease and poverty could be lifted from the backs of men.

This great civilization died not as the result of external aggression, but from internal crumbling of the character of its people. The phenomenon was more in the nature of suicide than murder. The people had become so luxury-loving and soft that they would not exert themselves in their own defense. Possessing great power, they refused to use it against the criminals who developed in their own country or those from abroad. A malignant disease that might be described as a maudlin sympathy for one's enemies seemed to paralyze their will.



Mr. Domokos has also accepted a position on the faculty of Faith Baptist Bible College, Ankeny, Iowa, and will begin teaching in August, 1972.

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
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God's Burning Bush

THE WORD OF RESTORATION

Editor's Note: This article originally appeared in our APRIL issue. However, due to a printer's error, the closing part had inadvertently been left out. We are running it again . . . COMPLETE!

Galatians 6:1 begins a new paragraph, but does not introduce a new subject or change of theme from the previous context in chapter 5:22-26. The fruit of the Holy Spirit does not include pride, envy, and vainglory, and surely does not lead us to challenge each other belligerently. Christian liberty is devoid of all selfishness, and doesn't lead any of us to want more credit and praise than others. True, spiritual "brethren" — who are genuinely what the word denotes will not act in any such manner. Such things as envy, selfishness, desire for more credit, challenging each other as to "rights", vainglory, and station, are beneath real brothers in the Lord. Those who are motivated by envy and unholy desire would not be sorry to see a brother in Christ overtaken by some sin and blemished by it. But those whose character is genuinely spiritual, with hearts not motivated by pride and envy will be deeply concerned over a brother who has become the victim of some transgression, and are the proper ones to help the sinning brother by the exercise of Christian love and wise counsel. This leads to the admonition in 6:1.

The case Paul visualizes and sets before us is that of a man who is overtaken (proleimphthei) in a "fault", lit. "surprised, or detected in the act of committing a sin" - so that his guilt is unquestionable, placed beyond all doubt. The "fault" or sin, is rendered by the word paraptomati, and contrary to the views of many, is not a mild word and chosen for that reason, but denotes something solemn and serious, and plainly wrong. In fact, the verb form of this word occurs in Hebrews 6:6, where the aorist

participle parapesontas describes the act of having fallen away from the true Christian faith. The sin here, in Gal. 6:1, is not some slight, "lesser" sin, one not so "bad" as others --but a transgression which cuts across what is right and goes contrary to it. When a man is detected in such an action as this, those who are spiritual (hoi pneumatikoi), in the congregation are responsible for restoring the guilty one. "Those who are spiritual" are those who are mature in the faith, possessing solid Christian character, conscious of the Holy Spirit's leadership and guidance, able to counsel, and ready to forgive. To stress the fact that it is such as these who are expected to undertake the restoring, the emphatic pronoun (humeis) has been placed by the Holy Spirit before the particular plural noun (hoi pneumatikoi) so that the expression is to be rendered: "you, on your part, the spiritual ones - you restore!" It is not for those who are unable to master their carnality and fleshly inclinations. God has placed men in every local church who are able to exercise themselves in this vital and crucially important work.

They are to "restore" the sinning brother in a spirit of meekness, and watching themselves lest they also get to be tempted. Evidently, in view of the last verb in the verse, peirastheis, "tempt", the sin is of a nature which deals with the kind of wrongdoing into which one may be "tempted" (enticed, lured). The "restoring" is important. It is described by the verb katartidzete, which is a most interesting word. Its original meaning of "prepare, make ready, perfect" something for its full use and destination is found among the Papyri,

in rather common use. For example, in Papyrus Oxy viii, 1153:16, the recipient of a letter is informed that he will receive certain garments which have been especially made and prepared (kateirtismena) for him. The word is used in the New Testament, Hebrews 10:5, of the special divine preparation of the body of the Lord in the virgin's womb for the virgin birth. In Hebrews 11:3, it designates the planning and framing of the ages in expert manner ("The ages were framed by the word of God"). Again, in Hebrews 13:21, the writer prays in his benediction that God will "make you perfect in every good work. . ." Paul appeals to the Corinthians that they "be perfectly joined together in the same mind. . ." (I Cor. 1:10). To the Thessalonians Paul expressed the desire that whatever was lacking in their faith might be made complete (I Thess. 3:10). But the word occurs also in Matthew 4:21, where it describes the action of the Apostles in mending their fishing nets. And it has an old, common surgical usage — that of setting a broken limb, and repairing a dislocated joint.

Now, from these uses, it is clear that the prominent idea in the word is not that of punishment, but of reparation, amendment, correction, restoration, making right again where there has been injury, wrong, or loss. Believers who are tempted into doing what is wrong must be corrected and restored to their proper place. This is all a part of the preparation and maturing of such brethren for their full use and service, and for their destination. All of this goes into the fitting out of the whole man for a more effective witness. When an errant brother gets off the right path, and is detected in some act that is wrong, and therefore harmful and injurious, and detrimental to the

Cedarville College held its 76th annual Commencement exercises on June 3rd. A total of one hundred and sixty-five graduates were led by four marshals from the Alford Memorial auditorium to the College gymnasium to receive their degrees. These marshals were four Juniors with the highest grade-point average in their class. They were Donna Bingham, Daniel Esters, Arlene Knight and Bruce Olsen.

Dr. James T. Jeremiah, president of Cedarville College spoke at the Commencement ceremonies.

An honorary Doctor of Divinity degree was conferred upon Rev. Meade T. Armstrong. At the present time, he is serving as Associate Professor of Bible at Cedarville College. Brother Armstrong received his Litt. B. degree from Grove City College, Grove City, Pennsylvania; graduated from Baptist Bible Seminary, Johnson City, New York: received his Litt. M. degree from the University of Pennsylvania, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania; and did graduate work at Syracuse University, Syracuse, New York. His professional experience includes secondary teaching at Eldred and Tidioute, Pennsylvania and Baptist Bible Seminary, Johnson City, New York. He was pastor of the First Baptist Church of Hallstead, Pennsylvania for five years just prior to joining the faculty at Cedarville College.

Mrs. Miriam Maddox, Head of the Drama Division at Cedarville and Associate Professor of Speech, did the planning and coordinating of the events for the Graduation Day.

During these summer months, approximately twenty Cedarville young people are engaging in missionary work in foreign countries. Coming to the music department as college orchestra director will be Dr. Robert Monroe. The organization of the first Cedarville orchestra is to be the central focus of his first duties on campus.

Mr. Burt Frye, nationally known in the field of astronomy and also a member of the Cedarville science faculty is involved in Space Science projects this summer at the Lunar and Planetary Laboratory at the University of Arizona and at Sedalia, Missouri. His responsibilities will cover a period of 2½ months.

For the fourth time in a six year span, the Cedarville Yellow Jackets traveled as district champions to the NAIA Tennis Nationals held in Kansas City during the first week in June.

The tournament in which they were involved attracted 32 top small college teams from all over the country. This is their sixth year of competition.

A new approach to pre-season workout, the Cedarville varsity soccer team will begin practices in a pre-season soccer camp, tentatively scheduled for September 17-23 at Schroon Lake, New York.

EMMANUEL BAPTIST CHURCH, XENIA —



whole body - mature, brotherly concern must come to the rescue, and get the sinning person back on the right road again. The present imperative "restore" is iterative, for every case of this kind, and shows the critical urgency of making the restoration. This is a ministry which must be carried out by those who are truly spiritual — and they even minding themselves, so that they too are not tempted into a fall. The task requires a spirit of meekness on our part, the very opposite of harshness, arrogance, and excess severity. Some sins do require stern rebuke and plain-spoken censure, and we must not hesitate to carry them out when it is necessary. The transgression of Gal. 6:1 however, while far from being a mild offense, needs the pouring in of oil and wine upon the wound, and gentle fingers to bind it up. A mending process needs to be initiated, the broken limb must be set — and such treatment requires expert skill. The proper, sympathetic administration of this restoring of a sinning brother will make a better Christian of him, while causing us to remember that temptation might catch us also, as it caught this or that brother.

It is wrong to let a fellow-believer go on doing something he should not do; to allow him to continue in a path of error into which he has been drawn; to ignore his sin, and by so-

doing confirm him in his act. He must be arrested in his deviation from the truth, and the nature of his misdeed revealed and explained to him. Particularly is this essential where some aspect of the true Christian faith is concerned, and when the sin involves the matter of doctrine with its related practical effects. This is a particularly sensitive duty, and can only be carried out by those who are genuinely spiritual, and thus know how to exercise tact, skill, and gentleness. Criticism and censoriousness will be laid aside in such cases, but the Word of God must be applied, for it is living and powerful, and penetrates the inmost recesses of the heart. Warnings will need to be given later, when the restoration has been effectively accomplished. In this present day, it is particularly crucial for sinning saints to be restored to fellowship and harmony, by correction to be brought back into the right way, whatever has been broken or rent made sound and fit again, and the life with its practices and pursuits put in order and adjusted so that the Lord is honored and pleased. The whole body of saints will be blessed and benefited by this, and the corporate testimony enlarged and strengthened. Let those who are spiritual seek out sinning saints, and restore them to fellowship and faithfulness, for the glory of God and for the good of all.
