

It Just So Happened...


ave you ever used those words, "It just so happened"? Most of us have, at one time or another. When we do we almost instinctively realize that there is more to life than random events. We realize that things do not "just happen." The more biblical way of saying it sounds like this: God has a way of getting the right people to the right place, at the right time.


Oftentimes the reality of that statement is only clearly seen from the vantage point of hindsight as we look back on people, places, and events in our lives. But it is a universally true maxim. From behind the scenes of our lives and without violating our real human according to His grand plan and design. And it all happens so naturally and smoothly that we often do not even realize what is going on until later.


Certainly Ruth and Boaz must have thought of this many times over as they reflected on God's direction of their lives together. Ruth had gone out that morning to find work; she was simply being routinely faithful in caring for Naomi, her mother-in-law. She was seeking employment virtually anywhere they were "hiring." And it just so "happened" that she stopped at the field owned by Boaz. It also "just so happened" that he showed up that day and, more importantly, that he was a rich relative. He would become her husband, name. Both of them would play a role in the coming of the Jewish Messiah through King David.

Accident? Luck? Chance? Happenstance? Not hardly! In a way that boggles the mind, God had brought these two people to the right place at the right time.

Even the well-known Christmas story illustrates this universal truism. Mary and Joseph were the right people (a virgin, related to King David, from whose family the Messiah would come); they arrived at the right place (Bethlehem as predicted by Micah); and they hit town at the right time (the delivery of her firstborn son, our Savior). "Let's Do It"

e cannot think of a better title for our new church planting endeavors than to "Stretch and Sow." This will require our seeking through prayer God's blessing on the seed that is sown. God will not do apart from prayer what He has promised to do in and through prayer. When the disciples saw Jesus praying in Luke 11, they came to Him and said, "Lord teach us to pray also." At the heart of the Lord's answer to their request was the word "importuning," which simply means, "persistent and consistent praying." We must make certain that we are not importuning the Lord's reluctance, but His will. We do not just want to pursue good ideas, but to make sure they are God's ideas. The life of Christ was a life of prayer. If this is the same Christ that is in us, and it is, and, prayer was number one in His life, then it must be number one in our life. This means that we will not only pray but also make ourselves available to be the answer to our own prayers. Translated, this simply means to each of us that we must prayerfully "Stretch and Sow." In 1 Corinthians 3: 21-23, there are three beautiful statements: "Christ is God's;" "ye are Christ's;" and, "all things are

yours." We have taken them in reverse order. "Christ is God's" in His deity and in His humanity. "Ye are Christ's" by creation, redemption, regeneration and His providential care. When we look at the little phrase, "all things are yours," it begins with an inventory of spiritual leaders, reminding us that as we "Stretch and Sow" we have to work together though there be differing personalities, differing backgrounds, and coming from different cultures. In that spiritual inventory in verse 22, we are also reminded that we have "things present and things to come." "Things present" will be both pleasant and unpleasant, and even those things that are unpleasant can be of great spiritual benefit to us. "Things that are to come" is more than the sweet bye-and-bye, but can, if we pull together, pray together and work together, be the sweet now-and -now. "For the Lord God is a sun and shield: the Lord will give grace and glory: no good thing will he withhold from them that walk uprightly" (Psalm 84:11).







obey the governmental decree and register in their hometown. Even today people who are nine months pregnant do not venture very far from home. Yet God worked it all together so that the right people arrived at the right time in the right place. And the rest is history!


A similar scenario is currently taking within our OARBC family (not on such a grandiose scale, of course). It has to do with Max and Phyllis Tucker. It all began when the Council of 12 formulated the Stretch and Sow initiative and made it public knowledge. We decided to look for a Church Planting Coordinator if the messengers at the Portsmouth conference would approve the position. The position was unanimously approved and we began fund raising efforts to support the salary for that position. Approximately 25 churches responded to the appeal and promised a total of \$14,800 per year in support.

During that same time "it just so happened" Max Tucker came to my attention. He expressed interest in the position and, although he did not know the amount the churches had promised to that point, he stated that he would need \$15,000 in salary to make it happen. He had other funds coming in which would supplement that amount. It just so happened that the amount was right.

Given his love for our Fellowship, his broad background in church planting experiences, his pastoral and entrepreneurial spirit, and our instant sense of comradely one with the other, I decided to present him to the Council of 12 for their approval. After two interviews the Council in mid-June voted to extend to Max an invitation to become the Church Planting Coordinator. Our constitution gives the Council the authority to hire personnel as needed, but we also felt it the part of wisdom to ask the messengers to ratify this decision in October in Toledo. We want the broadest possible sense of ownership in this endeavor.

God does have a way of getting the right people to the right place at the right time. When He does, everything falls together naturally and neatly into place without a sense of forcing something at all. That has been our experience in this situation. We have made a start; we have taken the first step. We now come into an opportunity to build the Stretch and Sow effort together, with Max leading the way. We anticipate God's blessing on our combined efforts.







Tt's the afternoon of July 13, 2000. I've had a morning of wonderful fellowship with Rachel Chambers, BMM missionary to Zambia. We met at DerDutchman restaurant in Plain City and enjoyed the breakfast buffet and our time together so much that some who came for lunch left before we did!

We finally said our good-byes, not because we'd run out of things to talk about (I can't imagine that ever happening), but because we both had some writing to do. She had a prayer letter to prepare, and I, this correspondence to you.

As I sit here at my desk, I'm recalling that Rachel told me she was going to use "ketchup" as the theme for this latest family prayer letter. I'm wondering if I can surprise her and work "mustard" into this. I'm going to try REALLY hard to do that so be forewarned and/or prepared.

I told Rachel this morning about a great book I've read this summer. It's entitled, Created to Be God's Friend, by Henry Blackaby. The book reveals the powerful ways God shaped Abraham to be His friend. In the process, Abraham realized the importance of intercessory prayer. We need to realize it, too. After all, is it not true that Christ is now seated at God's right hand and "ever lives to make intercession for us?" If God Himself places such a high value on this ministry, should not we? Abraham thought so. I do, too. The Phillips translation of James 5:16 says, "Tremendous power is made available through a good man's earnest prayer." Our missionaries believe this. That's why Rachel and our other missionaries assure us over and over again that the greatest thing we can do for them is to pray. Right now, yes, this moment, pause and intercede for at least one missionary. "Avail" them with some of God's "tremendous power" to do the work He's called them to do.

This has been a wonderful summer of ministry at Skyview Ranch. We are rejoicing in the results of the new Zip Line, a 500-foot long. 33-foot high new Adventure Course activity. Campers put on a harness, climb a tree with a belay safety rope, and hook onto a pulley with a carabineer. It is a safe and fun activity that is also a very effective tool in challenging campers to grow in Christ and apply specific biblical life skills.

For some campers, it is a struggle even to put on a harness. Reaching the top of the 12foot ladder challenges others, and many find the challenge in climbing the whole way up and riding across the Zip Line. The new experience often causes campers anxiety and tear. This anxiety is the groundwork for great learning and a meaningful experience.

Campers begin the Zip Line by choosing an area of their life that they struggle with and

counselor then helps them choose a verse that applies to their situation, as well as to their Zip Line experience.

God is using the Zip Line to challenge campers in many ways and teach them that He is actively involved in their lives and that they are capable of success in their relationship with Him. On the Zip Line, campers experience fear in spite of the truth of all the safety assurances. Spiritually, they experience fear of failure in spite of the truth of God's promised equipping.

We, too, have areas that we need to work on and change. How often we allow fear to disable us in our ability to obey and succeed! Yet, we have the promise from God's Word that "His divine power hath given unto us all things that pertain to life and godliness. through the knowledge of Him that hath called us to glory and virtue."







Discipleship can have many benefits. Not only does it allow a new believer to "Grow In Grace," it allows the leader to be continually challenged in one's spiritual life. In a discipleship setting, I had the blessing of both these benefits plus an added one. In a course of study with a believer, we spent much time dealing with salvation and assurance of salvation. 


