Your Marriage: Duel Or Duet?

No one plans on his or her marriage turning into a duel. We tend to labor under the notion that the really big struggle is to get to the altar—to get the knot tied—to get the tourniquet around the finger and thus stop the circulation. Then we will live “happily ever after.” Then the struggle will cease. We tend to focus more on the wedding than the marriage.

Such a naïve approach to marriage can lead to disastrous results. The reality is that we all have the potential to turn our marriages into marriage-threatening duels. That’s what Isaac and Rebecca did (see Genesis 27:1-13). They certainly enjoyed an exotic and romantic start (Genesis 24:1-26) but something went awry. They ended up pulling in two different directions and dividing their family right down the middle.

What are some of the forces, both internal and external, that can turn a marriage into a duel? For starters, think about the “big three”—the world, the flesh, and the devil. That’s right, all three work against our marriages. The world attacks our emotions (I John 2:15-17). It appeals to us to love the wrong things. We tend to love things more than people and self more than others. In the midst of a permissive atmosphere sexual standards seem antiquated, since nothing is absolutely right or wrong. The world allures us to selfishness, greed, and pride. And it all seems so innocuous since everyone else seems to be on the same bandwagon.

The flesh attacks our will (Romans 7:15-23). It appeals to us to make wrong choices. Under its sway we become self-centered and our own worst enemy. We look out just for “No. 1” and shove everyone else to a remote corner of life. The “I’ve got to be happy” or “I’ve got to

be me” syndrome becomes a watchword. This innate selfishness will readily destroy any marriage.

And Satan attacks our minds (I Peter 5:8-9). He appeals to us to think wrong thoughts. He woos us to develop wrong perspectives of reality, to question others’ real motives, to doubt our own value and God’s intentions for our lives. He delights to pit partner against partner through communication breakdowns and misunderstandings. He plays on our weaknesses and uses them to hurt one the other. His deceptions can readily destroy our marriage.

But think a moment beyond the “big three.” Other forces can turn our marriage in a duel as well. We all bring into marriage differences in background and training. Every family is different in its value structure—money, savings, food, clothing, friends, vacations, use of leisure time, etc. It takes communication and time to understand such differences and then to carve out a new pattern of values in each family unit.

We also bring into marriage differences in perspective and temperament. Personality types are real and the differences can become aggravating. Introverts and extroverts can “bug” each other. Those who are “drivers” can drive the more “laid back” crazy.

Further, men and women do come at life differently. There is such a thing as a feminine and masculine approach. For example, what a car is to a man a house is to a woman. Differences can naturally arise as to whether to spend the money on a car or the house. These masculine feminine differences are not sinful or carnal; they are naturally inherent in being a man or a woman. In other words, our own normalcy can threaten our happy marriages. We have found the enemy, and it is us!

Enough about dueling! We must be realistic about these negative forces but we do not have to be pessimistic or defeatists. There is another whole possibility—dueting. The reality is that we all have the potential to turn our marriages into harmonious duets! I know many couples across Ohio who make beautiful music together. The wives live in submission to their husbands; that is, they voluntarily follow his leadership and they graciously support his endeavors. The husbands love their wives as Christ loved the Church and as they love their own bodies.

Such couples have learned to complete one another rather than to compete with one another. They live out a beautiful sexual humility in which each admits his or her need for the other spouse. They are right with their Lord and with each other. They each “know their part” in the musical score and happily live it out.

Such a novel idea comes right out of Ephesians 5:18-33. Paul there teaches us that Holy Spirit-empowered persons discover a real harmony in their hearts psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs hum along in their inner being. Taking that to the next level, Paul goes on to teach that Holy Spirit-empowered partners discover a real harmony in their homes. When we are filled with the Spirit He fills our hearts and homes with harmony rather than cacophony.

As in any musical production, the key is the Conductor! All players must keep their eye on Him and move according to His direction. He establishes our part in the “score” and He sets the pace for the rhythm. Being filled with the Spirit implies being sensitive to His direction in our marriages. As we are in tune with Him, we find that we are also in tune with each other. Our marriages sound more like a duet than a duel!

Dear Ladies of OWMU

Recently I once again read the seventh chapter of Numbers. I read each and every word in all 89 verses. I did not "cheat." I read every hard-to-pronounce name and every repeated list.

When I was done, I knew that when the tabernacle was completed, on twelve consecutive days a leader from each tribe of Israel brought the very same gifts and offerings for the dedication of the altar. Each brought one silver dish that weighed 130 shekels, a silver bowl that weighed 70 shekels, both filled with fine flour mixed with oil for a burnt grain offering; one gold pan that weighed 10 shekels, filled with incense; one bull, one ram, one male lamb one year old, for a burnt offering; one male goat, for a sin offering; two oxen, five rams, five male goats, five male lambs one year old, for a peace offering.

In heaven, if I bump into Nahshon, Nethanel, Eliab, Elizur, Shelumiel, Eliasaph, Elishama, Gamaliel, Abidan, Ahiezer, Pagiel or Ahira, I'll be able to say honestly, "I read about you and your offering." I'll also be able to ask them how to pronounce their names, and how they made sure their silver dish weighed 130 shekels!!

Why do you think God had Numbers 7 written this way? Why didn't He condense it by listing the gifts and offerings only once? The chapter could contain only 34 verses. I believe the almost monotonous repetition shows the value God placed on each gift and offering. The size of the tribe did not matter. The Lord was pleased with the gift. Perhaps that was what He told

Moses when He met with him in verse 89.

As I read that chapter, I thought of our Ohio Women's Missionary Union. We come together from all over Ohio. We represent individual churches, some large, some small. We bring the gifts and offerings of our time, talents, and monies. We don't bring the same amounts as those in Numbers 7 did, nor do we meet twelve consecutive days (wouldn't that be fun?) but the Lord values each individual gift and notes each one. Then, in our "tent of meeting," He speaks to our hearts. When we leave and go our separate ways He continues to use our gifts and our lives to bring honor and glory to His Name.

If you've met with us, you've experienced the truth and blessing of what I've shared. If you haven't, you can in Marysville on April 17. I'd love to have every church in our OARBC represented. Will you help make that and our project goal a reality? I'm praying you will.

Now take time to read Numbers 7!

"For a number of years the people of Immanuel have been concerned that those in wheelchairs or who otherwise have difficulty with steps were limited in the activities and ministries in which they could participate," commented Bill Abernathy, Immanuel's senior pastor. Immanuel had been saving for the elevator for several years. But in January of 2000 the church board challenged the congregation to give above their usual offerings toward the final \$12,000 needed for the project. The needed gifts and pledges came in quickly.

Pastor Abernathy expects the need for the elevator to grow as the church positions itself to reach out to those who will live in a senior housing project being built near the church.

Cedarville University's engineering honor society was installed as the Ohio Nu chapter of Tau Beta Pi on March 3. To have a chapter installed with Tau Beta Pi, an institution must have all of its engineering degrees accredited and must graduate at least 40 engineers per year. Cedarville currently offers ABET-accredited bachelor of science degrees in both mechanical and electrical engineering, and the University awarded 58 engineering degrees in 2000.

On February 27, women's ministry students and community guests learned about women's ministry from guest speaker Lynn Reece, women's ministry director for Southeast Christian Church, Louisville, Kentucky. Reece addressed three topics: how to develop a successful women's ministry, the three essential phases of ministry, and how the church can identify and meet women's needs.

During Hunger and Homelessness Awareness Week (Feb. 4-10), numerous Cedarville student organizations put their compassion into action. The Society of Women Engineers held a canned food

drive for the Salvation Army of Springfield, Ohio. Mu Kappa, an organization for international students and children of missionaries, urged the University family to spend a designated day fasting and praying, and gave out prayer booklets so that participants could intercede intelligently for groups like street children in Brazil and earthquake victims in India. Epsilon Alpha Pi (Social Work Club) collected \$100 in coins for Good Works, Inc., a Christian-run homeless shelter in Athens, Ohio.

Alpha Delta Omega and Delta Omega Epsilon, social service organizations, canvassed the residence halls and came out with more than 30 bags of clothing for Dayton area needy. Alpha Chi, a men's service organization, spent a day working at the Dayton Gospel Mission. The campus organization for Christian health professionals, Chi Theta Pi, sponsored the American Red Cross in Xenia by collecting toiletries like soap and toothpaste. The week was filled with efforts of mercy, and students indicated that they hope to maintain service to the needy all year long.

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
