What Must I Do to Be Saved?

jailer once asked the question, "What must I do to be saved? A person can ask no more important question than this. That's because the question deals with ultimates — not peripherals. The question carries us beyond the temporary to the eternal, beyond the earthly to the heavenly. It reminds us that we have a real need, that we have a role to play in meeting that need, and that we can know a real hope. Wouldn't it be great if everyone reading these words had already wrestled with this question and had answered it in a biblically informed way?! But just in case some haven't, let's explore this key question in the next few lines.

Tune in to this desperate jailer's story in chapter 16 of Acts:

But at midnight Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God, and the prisoners were listening to them. Suddenly there was a great earthquake, so that the foundations of the prison were shaken; and immediately all the doors were opened and everyone's chains were loosed. And the keeper of the prison, awaking from sleep and seeing the prison doors open, supposing the prisoners had fled, drew his sword and was about to kill himself. But Paul called with a loud voice. saying, "Doyourself no harm, for we are all here." Then he called for a light, run in, and fell down trembling before Paul and Silas And he brought them out and said. "Sirs, what must I do to be saved?" Yes, he really was quite desperate, wasn't he? As far as he was concerned he was history. Suicide seemed to be his best way of escape. You see, if the prisoners under his charge had escaped, his own life would be taken. Eternity loomed large in his thinking, and he wasn't ready for that.

One of those prisoners under his charge prevented him from jumping to the wrong conclusion and thus committing suicide. "Do yourself no harm, for we are all here!" Remarkable! The earthquake that

released all the prisoners from their cells was impressive enough. Even more impressive the fact that no one moved! It obviously had something to do with these two prisoners who were singing at midnight. And so he comes to Paul and Silas with this most basic question. "Sirs, what must I do to be saved?"

Who Needs to be Saved?

In his time of desperation the Philippian jailer acknowledges his personal need for salvation. Each one of us must come to the same sense of need. We need to be saved (rescued) from our sin. That singing prisoner, Paul, put it this way.

"For all have sinned and come short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23). He emphasizes the consequences of our sinning when he writes, "The wages of sin is death" (Romans 6:23).

Since *all* of us sin, we *all* need to be saved from sin. And since death is the inevitable consequence of our sin, we need to be saved *now* — before death overtakes us.

All sinners are candidates for salvation.

Because of the work of the Lord

Jesus Christ all sinners are
savable.

What Must I do to be Saved?

Notice the answer Paul and Silas gave to the desperate man, "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and you will be saved, and your house" (Acts 16:31). To believe means to transfer your trust from yourself and your efforts and to place your trust in Christ.

Another way of saying the same thing is to cast yourself without reserve on Christ. Believing does

involve more than simply acknowledging some facts about Christ; it means committing yourself to Him alone as Saviour from sin.

Visit a moment more with that same singing apostle. In Romans 4 he makes it erystal clear that salvation does not come by our own good deeds (4.1.8), not does salvation come by fulfilling religious ceremonies (4.9.12), nor does it come by keeping religious rules (4.13.22). Salvation comes by faith alone in Christ alone (4.23.25).



Please notice that Paul and Silas did rivet the jailer's attention on Christ. They did not give him a "cafeteria list" of possible "saviours." Christ alone was his sole hope — ours too!

That's because of Who He is. He is God in a body. He is perfect humanity and undiminished deity united in one person forever. And so He is a unique, one-of-a-kind person. No one before or since equals Him!

It is also because of What He did. At the cross "He bore our sins in His own body" (I Peter 2:24). He paid the price of our sin, He died our death — and then rose victoriously over sin and death. The crucified, buried, and resurrected God-man is our real hope for salvation!

Have you done it?

Like the Philippian jailer of old have you admitted your need? Have you sensed your inadequacy? Have you cast yourself on Christ? There is no time like the present to do so. He is only a prayer away.

Lord Jesus, I admit that I need to be rescued from my sin and that you are the only One Who can do that for me. Thank you for dying for my sin at the cross and for rising from the dead. Right now I cast myself on you and trust you from this point on for my salvation. Thank you for hearing my prayer. Amen.


What must I do to be saved? Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and you will be saved! And you will be singing, too!

From a reader in Hancock County:



"Growth projections both in jobs available and employers' future needs are still high throughout the engineering specialties," said Dr. Larry Zavodney, chairman of Cedarville's Elmer W. Engstrom Department of Engineering. "but they are the greatest in computer

engineering.

He added. "We will bring two new engineering laboratories on line this fall and another when this fall's entering freshmen begin their senior design classes in 2005. Although two of our electrical engineering faculty have Ph.D. degrees in computer engineering, we will also hire a third computer engineering professor this fall. More will be added later."

Cedarville also offers a computer science degree. "Although computer engineers take some computer science classes, and computer science students take some computer engineering classes, there is a difference," Zavodney said. "The difference between computer science and the new computer engineering program is in their emphases. The computer science curriculum focuses on software programming and development. The computer engineering curriculum is more hardware and computer systems designrelated and has the engineering core."

Cedarville's engineering programs have developed rapidly and impressively. "We began our program in 1990 and graduated 24 students in 1994," Zavodney said. "Today, we have 300 students. Engineering and computer science are the fastest growing programs on the campus. Adding computer engineering will cause another

significant growth spurt."

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
