### Athletics

This week Cedarville College will host several athletic events. On April 7, our softball team will oppose Marietta at 1:00 p.m. and our men's tennis team will compete against Hillsdale at 1:00 also. (This is a dual meet, and, according to the team's top man, it's going to be a real tough match.) Later this week, April 10, our baseball team will challenge Urbana at 1:00 p.m., and at 3:00, our women's tennis team will rival Central State University.

Rick Jones, chairman of Student Body Project, stated that the reason SBP chose the Walk-a-thon as the means to raise money was that, from past experience, they found that a Walk-a-thon was more lucrative than a Work-a-thon. "It's human nature to want fun," explained Ron Bigelow, a

student senate representative and a driving force behind the Walk-a-thon.

Project coordinator, Mike O'Quinn said that the actual walk will take approximately five hours, though stops along the way will lengthen the trip.

"We want the Walk-a-thon to be fun, not a race," emphasized Mike.

Ron explained that the round trip walk will begin at the chapel. The walkers will take back roads leading to John Bryan and then return to the campus for a picnic by the lake.

To add excitement and to provide variety for the walker, entertainment has been arranged. A pick-up truck filled with clowns and a string band will travel with the participants.

Ron stated that a light lunch will be served at John Bryan, the climax of the trek.

"It will be a relaxing stop for the walkers," Ron further explained. Walkers will not need to dodge traffic. Ron said that "the communities of Clifton and Cedarville have been informed and the traffic will be rerouted."

For the safety of the travelers and also proof to donors that they completed the walk, participants will be required to register for the walk before they leave and sign

in when they get back.

"Joggers will go in groups according to their speed," Mike explained, "for the benefit of those who wish to travel at a faster rate than the rest."

The administration approved Saturday attire for the Walk-a-thon. For the ladies, this is a chance to wear jeans in the middle of the week without zero degree weather.

Mike stressed that they need at least 75 percent of the student body participating in order for "Ma" Printy's challenge of steaks for the students to be valid.

When asked how much money has currently been raised, Ron excitedly informed that a 600 dollar pledge came in a few days into Spring Quarter.

"A couple hundred pledges have already come in and this is just the beginning," Ron optimistically reported.

Ron encourages everybody to get involved. "Every little bit helps."

Mike suggests that those who do not have support write letters to friends including a stamped brochure. "This will make it as easy as possible for the donor."

Above all, both Ron and Mike concluded that every walker can expect a good time.

## Banquet Cancelled

Al Morgan, president of Alpha Chi, said his organization decided not to put on the banquet at a later date to avoid having it scheduled too close to the Junior-Senior Banquet next month.

When the conflict between the banquet and the concert was first discovered, the leadership of the service club conferred with their advisor, Dr. Murry Murdoch, and Myron Youngman, Student Activities Director, about the problem. Unable to work out a compromise with Student Activities, Alpha Chi decided to drop any banquet plans for this academic year.

The club was given the option to still have the banquet tonight and then go directly to the chapel for the concert, but decided not to take this option. Morgan said, "The problem involved with this is that if we had the banquet, we end up putting a lot of work into something that we only use for a couple of hours; because, after we were through eating, we would probably end up going to chapel for the concert." ## Anne Criswell Jackson to Perform

Anne Criswell Jackson will present a sacred vocal concert in the James T. Jeremiah Chapel tonight at 7:15. She has appeared many times on national television in the Billy Graham crusades and has journeyed around the world as special soloist in various other crusades including an extensive tour of East Africa and the Orient.

Although her musical training began with voice lessons and piano at the age of thirteen, she was singing solos in churches when she was only seven. Since then she has studied voice and opera at Baylor University, Southern Methodist University School of Music, and special study with Lloyd Carroll, opera coach of the San Francisco Opera Company.

Mrs. Jackson is proclaimed to be one of the six or possibly seven dramatic-coloratura sopranos in the world. This is a very unique voice classification, combining the power and intensity needed to sing over full orchestras with the great agility and high range of the coloratura.

Anne Criswell Jackson lives in Dallas where she is not only a concert soloist, but a dedicated wife and mother. Her husband, Dr. Kenneth Jackson, is a renowned oral surgeon and also a gifted pianist. They have one son, Paul Daniel, four years old. In addition to her active musical career, which has included leading roles in operas such as *The Bartered Bride*, *La Traviata*, and *Marriage of Figaro*, she is a life-long member and participant in the First Baptist Church of Dallas.

Anne Criswell Jackson has recorded two albums with the Ralph Carmichael Orchestra. A third album, "Come On and Join," was made with Crescendo Music of Dallas.

Ralph Carmichael makes the following comment about Mrs. Jackson: "In the past twenty-five years, it has been my happy privilege to be able to record with the finest gospel singers that ever graced a platform, and now, I am indeed grateful to add to that list of experiences my association with Anne... For Anne Criswell Jackson will long be remembered for her Christian testimony and her beautiful singing."


# Editorial



# Dr. McGoldrick to lead Philadelphia tour

The Department of Social Sciences of Cedarville College will again be offering the unique opportunity learning while traveling to Philadelphia in September.

The group will leave Cedarville on September 4 and will travel to Cherry Hill, N.J. where they will stay in a Best Western Motel (with indoor and outdoor pools). They will go into Philadelphia and surrounding areas each day to see the sites. The group will see such attractions as: Independence Hall; Liberty Bell Shrine; Gettysburg Battlefield; Betsy Ross House; and Admiral Dewey's flag ship, Cruiser Olympia. Another site, especially interesting to us as Christians, is the Hebrew Tabernacle Reproduction in Lancaster.

The ten day trip, open to anyone who would like to go costs only \$295. This price includes transportation from Cedarville, four hours tuition in history, and the motel expenses for the entire trip. Students are expected to pay for their own meals, planning on 8-10 dollars per day. The dates of

the trip are September 4-14.

Anyone who is interested in going to Philadelphia next fall should see Dr. Murdoch or Dr. McGoldrick for reservations. A \$60 deposit, payable by May 31, will reserve a spot for you. The balance of \$235 is payable by Sept 1.

As many of you already know, actually seeing the sites while learning about them is much more beneficial than just reading about them in a book. You can stand in Independence Hall and imagine that you are one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence or imagine yourself to be one of the first people to hear the ringing of Liberty Bell. You can actually see and feel the artifacts so important in making America what it is today.

To receive the four history credits, the students will be required to read four books specified by Dr. Murdoch and write short critiques on them. This work is supposed to be done and turned in before the commencement of the trip.

### Rehearsals take form

On May 10, 11, and 12, the Cedarville College Speech Department will present William Shakespeare's comedy "As You Like It," directed by Mrs. Rebecca Baker. Principal characters include: Renee Globig, as Rosalind; Jim Leightenheimer, as Orlando; Lori LaHaye, as Celia; and John Duff, as Jaques.

Set construction is under the able supervision of John Duff and Mr. Wesley Baker. Mr. Baker is also responsible for the original set design.

Currently, the cast rehearsals are concerned with general objectives of the play, blocking, and stage business, which involves such things as movement and gestures. In the future, Mrs. Baker plans to shift the

emphasis to characterization, pacing, and music. While it is not a musical as we know the term, "As You Like It" does call for a few ballad-type songs.

When asked about the reasons behind the presentation of a Shakespearean play, as opposed to some of the past theatrical offerings at Cedarville, Mrs. Baker responded that "any drama program should include some work from the classics." Famous actors and actresses such as Laurence Olivier, Charlton Heston and Vivian Leigh recommend to young actors and actresses an exposure to Shakespeare's works because of their potential for developing strong characterizations and training in language usage.



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# Cedarville's Veteran Baseball Team is Ready!

The 1979 edition of the C.C. baseball team is a combination of both youth and experience. The Yellow Jackets, under the direction of Coach Tom Hopewell, find 15 returning lettermen from last year's team. Last year's team finished 15-11; 2nd in the M.O.C.; & qualified for the NAIA District #22, and NCAA District #3 playoffs.

The Jackets are led by senior captain Fred Greetham who comes into his fourth season with a career average of .401, including a .446 and .432 clip in each of the past two seasons. In each of these two seasons, Greetham has led the MOC in batting, along with being in the top 20 in the nation both years. He has been selected to the MOC, NCCAA, and NAIA teams both years.

Flanking Greetham, who is in centerfield, is senior rightfielder Marty Devine who is playing his this season in the C.C. outfield. Sophomore transfer Al Stewart is holding the job in leftfield. Two

year letterman Dave Stewart is fighting for a job in the outfield along with sophomore Scott Carr, and freshman Steve Sadowitz.

The pitching staff which combined for a team era of 2.83 last year finds four returners with a combined seven years experience between them. Senior ace Randy Cagwin is coming off an outstanding year of five wins and two losses with a 1.98 era.

Junior Dave Creman is back after a 2-1 season, which was hampered by injury. Sophomores Greg Greve and Dave Lawhead who each won two games also return. Three freshmen add to the already fine pitching staff and make it one of the finest assembled in the league. Mark Mathews, Ron Hobar, and Chris Johnson all have fared well thus far, and all are fighting to crack

the rotation.

The catching department has produced a dogfight between senior Dwain Hill and sophomores Dave Merkh and Jim Carroll. Hill hit .317 in '78, but has been slowed by injury. Strong armed Merkh is a converted outfielder who has made the adjustment and has looked good thus far.

The infield is spearheaded by Junior Dan Fullmer at second

base who is coming off a .322 season in 1978. Sophomore Jamie Darling has played some at second and will be used in the utility role, and as the designated runner. Freshman Ed Stewart has handled the role at shortstop and has been very impressive on the left side of the infield. Sophomore Don Rickard is the incumbent at third base, and has been steady defensively thus far for the Jackets.

## Off and Running

The cinders are flying as the C.C. trackmen are off and running into the 1979 season. Coach Elvin King has five NCAA All-Americans returning to this year's team. Senior distance runner Brian Hull, and senior Shot put, discus man Dave Rogers. Junior Pole Vaulters Mark Peters along with junior Cross-Country, NCCAA All-Americans Dale Shaw and Tom Yater make for a fine nucleus of

this year's team. Coach King feels that the strength of this year's team is the distance running, which is comprised of several of the cross-country men who captured the NCCAA National title earlier this year. Dale Shaw won the event and Tom Yater finished third. To further bolster this area is the return of Brian Hull who missed the cross-country season due to injury. Hull was an NAIA All-American in 1976.

The twelve players are closely matched, adding a "pressure in practice which prepares for pressure in other schools." The team is young, with only five returning players, but strong. "They have a desire to play, to play well, I've never had in a team before," commented Dr. Diehl.

The only two returning singles players are Jannell Decker and Patty Harding. Brenda Nealy (the lone senior), Shawn Taylor, Landa Penquite, and Cathy Boyd comprise the remainder of the top six players for the opening matches. The other players include Becky Blackburn, Connie Clemons, Colene Fox, Colette Sirca, Karen Steinhoefer, and Cheryl McMillan. Mrs. Becky Trittipoe is the assistant coach, and Rachel Scott is the manager.

"You could win all eighteen of the matches, but if you aren't doing it to the glory of God, it just won't count," commented Colene. Another team member has personally resolved to share what Christ means to her with each of her opponents.

opportunity for personal spiritual growth.




PATTY HARDING concentrates as she returns the ball in tennis action.
