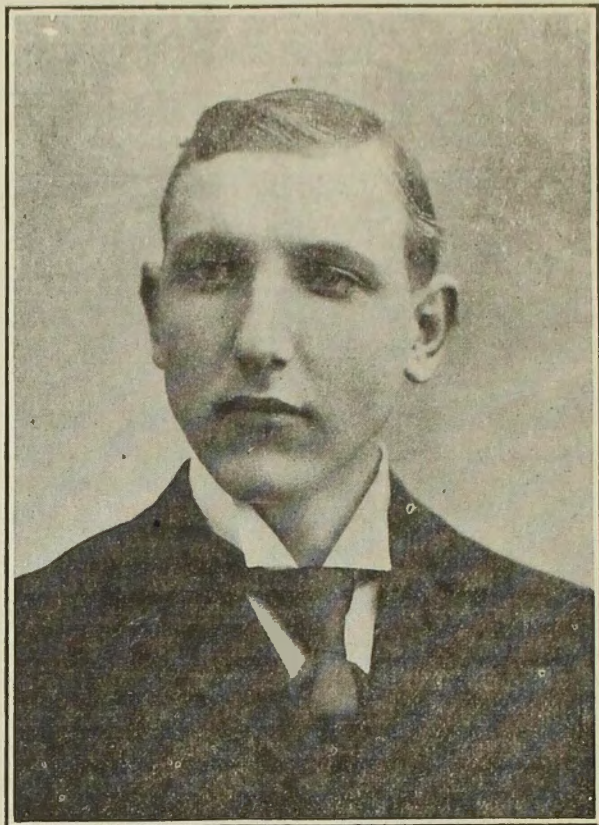

*PROFESSOR F. A. JURKAT, A. M.*

Professor Frank Albert Jurkat was born in New Galilee, Beaver county, Pa., September 19, 1876. He received his education in the public schools of his native village 1882-'89, Greensburg Academy 1889-'91, and Franklin College, New Athens, Ohio, 1891-'95. He entered the latter institution as a Freshman and graduated with first honors, receiving the degree of Bachelor of Arts; also receiving the degree of Master of Arts three years later. In college he was an indefatigable worker in the renowned Philosophic literary society. During his senior year he was an instructor in the College, and before his graduation in 1895, he was elected by the Board of Trustees of Cedarville College to the professorship he holds at present, that of German and History. Professor Jurkat is a close observer and a wide reader of books. By twelve years of age he had read the large history of the world by John Clark Ridpath consisting of several volumes and had its facts at his tongue's end. He is conversant with English, German, French, Latin, Greek, and Hebrew. His special knowledge in history

and German together with his general knowledge in other subjects makes of him a scholar of high rank and should justly entitle him to a position in any of our higher institutions of learning.

For several years Professor Jurkat has been the efficient registrar of the faculty and the capable treasurer of "The Corporation of Cedarville College." Upon the removal of the R. P. Seminary to Cedarville, he was made professor of Hebrew and Church History and secretary of the seminary faculty.

The local R. P. congregation honored him as superintendent of its Sabbath school for two years; and he has been secretary of the congregation for the last seventeen years.

The General Synod elected him some years ago editor-in-chief of *The Advocate*, whose editorials on current events would do credit to any religious paper in our country.

Professor Jurkat was married August 26, 1903, to Miss Alice Marguerite Bromagem. Elmer, their only child, has a splendid record in the public schools and promises to repeat the talents of his parents.

The nineteen years of Professor Jurkat's service in the College and community have been most successful and have enriched the community by a consistent upright life as well.

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## *Philadelphian Literary Society.*

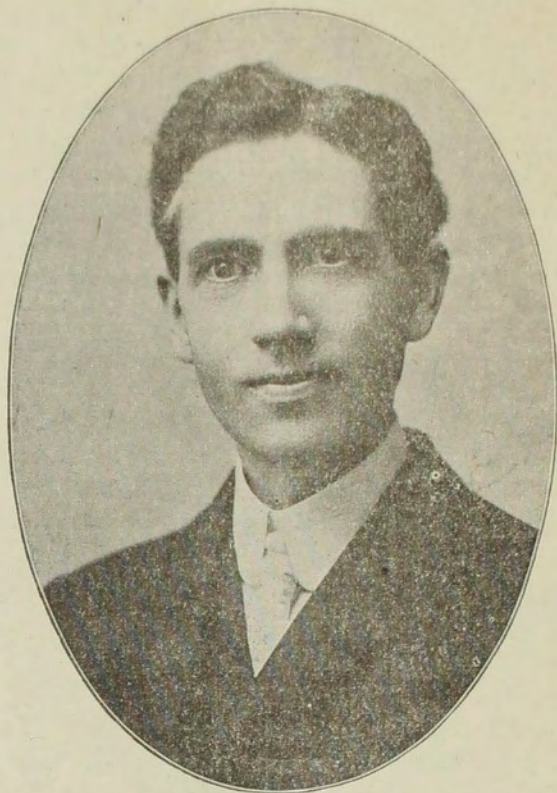

## EDITORIAL.

What a strong word! A word of five letters only, but what a vast field it opens up. It is not our desire to discuss the psychological view of habit, but merely to bring our attention to the greatness of the habit of forming habits. Think of the great men who have achieved their greatness in the intellectual world, in the business world, and in the commercial world, by incorporating great ideas and purposes until they become the habits of the mind.

### HABIT.

A definition, not found in James' psychology, but nevertheless true, which may easily be remembered by everyone is: "Habit is a cable, a thread of which we weave each day, until it becomes so strong that we cannot break it."

Without habits our lives would be irksome, our minds always in a state of chaos, and we would have to feel our way through the simplest acts. The majority of the acts of life are habits in whole or part.

Man is nothing more than a bundle of habits. One must not think that habits are restricted to actions only, for the face of each one is an unerring map formed by habit. Every movement of the

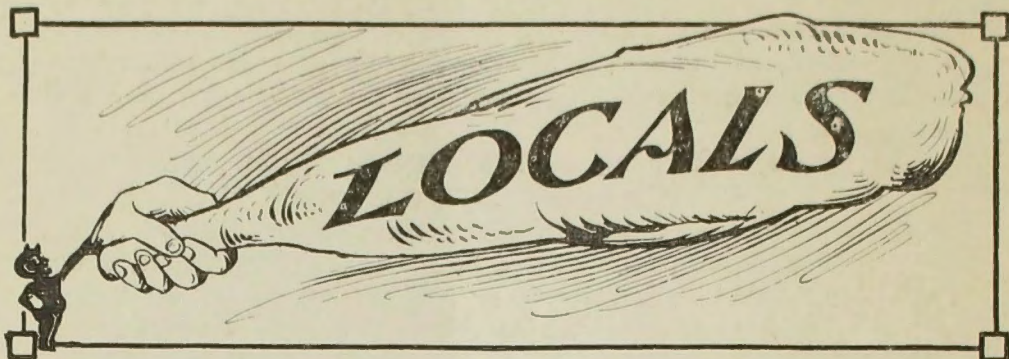
muscles, sooner or later, will leave its imprint on the face, and one can easily read the face of a weak man, or the face of a strong man, and, more pronouncedly, the face of a jovial or a crabbed man, even if it be in repose.

The process of forming habit is relatively simple. It is similar to the folding of a piece of paper. After once being folded it tends to fall into the same folds, with little effort exerted by the folder. Or, like a garment, which, after having been worn a certain time, clings to the shape of the body better than when it was new. But though the formation is simple the results of habits formed have the most far-reaching consequence.

It is our duty while in college to form habits that will be beneficial to us in later life. If the period between twenty and thirty is the critical one in the formation of intellectual and professional habits, the period below twenty is more important still for the fixing of personal habits. The great thing in all education is to make our habits our ally instead of our enemy. If we have formed habits that will broaden us we have achieved something. "Habit, like fire, is a cruel master as well as an invaluable servant."

The coming Christmas should be one especially dear to this nation of ours and to every individual within its boundaries who is a true patriot or lover of peace. Not alone because it commemorates the birth of the Saviour, although that is reason for great rejoicing, but because it is the commemoration of the hundredth anniversary of peace between England and the United States. On December 24, 1814, the treaty concluding the war of 1812 was signed at Ghent. So far as England and the United States are concerned the gates of Janus have been closed since that time. This vigil of peace has not been easily maintained. There has been a number of disputes arisen between the nations, but they have all been peaceably settled. As a result of the friendly relations maintained, greater advancement has been made than in any previous one hundred years of the whole world's history. Industry has been revolutionized by the introduction of modern inventions; commerce has increased by leaps and bounds and educational facilities have been made better. Under such circumstances, how befitting that these nations should lead the world in the establishment of a "League of Peace." True, England is now engaged in a terrible conflict, but she was drawn into it in defense of justice and for the cause of humanity. However, the United States still remains a beacon light to the nations now in the dark days of war. Out yonder, on the Judean hills, the shepherds heard the joyful message, "Peace on earth, good will toward men." It is this peace that has brought us so many blessings as a nation and we should rejoice this Christmas and always that we have the privilege of helping to bring about the time predicted by Tennyson, when

"The war drums throb no longer,  
And the battle flags are furled  
In the Parliament of man,  
The Federation of the world."

## The Alumni Endowment.

Some of the Alumni of Cedarville College have stated that they did not feel disposed to contribute to the Alumni Chair Fund unless a majority of the Alumni subscribed to the fund. This attitude is right or wrong—just as one views the matter. Of course, all contributors would feel better if they knew that seventy-five per cent of the Alumni were interested in the proposition sufficiently to have a few dollars invested in the fund. On the other hand the duty of an individual is not fixed or measured by what another may or may not do. Today, as never before, Christian people are giving careful thought to their yearly appropriation to benevolences and to the objects for which they contribute. I believe that it is a matter that should be settled by the individual. Is the object a worthy one? Is it practicable? How much can I invest in it? Settle these questions and any others that may suggest themselves and then act on your own judgment.

It is now on deposit with the Cedarville Building and Loan Association, where it draws a three per cent dividend every six months. It will be turned over to the board of trustees of the college only on the order of the Alumni Association. When it is placed under control of the college it will be catalogued each year as the Alumni Endowment Fund. The money that is now being pledged on the five year plan will go to swell this fund. At this date we have received seventeen pledges on the five year plan that amount to \$757.50.
