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# MEMBERS OF FACULTY AND STUDENT BODY AT CEDARVILLE COLLEGE

CEDARVILLE, O., Nov. 13. — Forty-three years ago last September 19, Cedarville College was opened for the training of young men and women. This fine little college is located in the town of Cedarville, Greene County, on Routes 72 and 42, and is just 12 miles south of Springfield.

The town of Cedarville is an historic place. Alford Memorial Gymnasium, given to Cedarville College by a millionaire of the east, was formerly the church building in which Dr. Hugh McMillan preached for more than 30 years. Dr. McMillan brought his congregation here in the early part of the 19th century from Chester District, South Carolina. He and his congregation left South Carolina in protest to human slavery. Dr. McMillan built his home near the church. In this home he conducted an academy out of which went many young men trained for colleges and universities. Among them was the late Whitelaw Reid, former ambassador to Great Britain and owner and publisher of The New York Tribune. Mr. Reid's boyhood home, kept in fine condition, is about a mile out of Cedarville.

Cedarville College occupies a campus of 17 acres in the north end of the village. Its buildings consist of the main administration building and science hall, gifts of friends, located on the main campus; the library building, a gift of the late Andrew Carnegie, and the gymnasium, previously mentioned. During the past summer our

college buildings, science hall and Carnegie library, were treated to much needed coats of paint on their inner walls. They were brightened up and are cheery and inviting. Many visitors have remarked about the improvement that has been made.

Moreover, the new electric lamps placed in the main hall have added much to the appearance and have made our lighting system up-to-date.

One fine move was putting all the offices on the first floor. Convenience and beauty unite to make our offices attractive and practical.

This work was done by a number of students who are working their way through college, and was under the direction of our business manager, John L. Dorst. The alumni of Cedarville College number over 1,000 and are found in all parts of the United States and in other parts of the world. Many of them hold eminent and responsible positions in business, church and state.

Cedarville College offers the four-year liberal arts curricula, and both four-year and two-year educational courses, as well as preparatory studies for other professional courses. In addition to the regular college courses, the students engage in the following extra-curricular activities: Music, dramatics, debate, basketball and baseball. Expense to the students is kept at the lowest possible cost. The purpose of the college is to so train young men and women that they will give efficient and

faithful service and be loyal and true citizens of our country.

The Board of Trustees has taken action to increase both the current expense and endowment funds, looking forward to the growth of the college and to take care of increased enrollment.

Dr. David McKinney, father of Dr. Davis Earl McKinney of Springfield, was the first president of the college and served in that capacity for 21 years. He was succeeded by Dr. W. R. McChesney.
