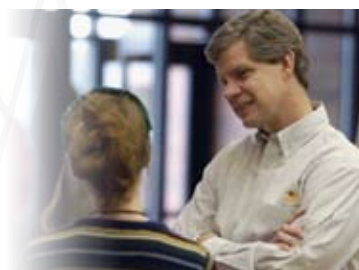

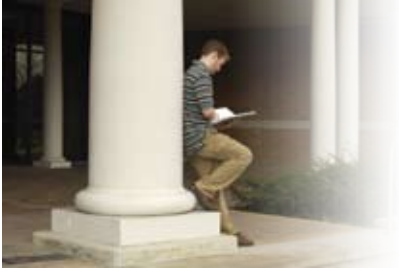
Leadership

Leaders make a difference. They shape opinions, make discoveries, and influence direction. They change the world.

Leaders engage the difficult legal, moral, and political issues of our day. As Christians whose faith must inform and guide us, we have no choice but to take a stand in troubled times. In 2004, Cedarville initiated the **Center for Political Studies** to articulate a biblical view of government through the study of politics, law, history, and public policy and to engage and influence American political culture. Students have opportunities to participate in innovative programs sponsored by the Center including the Cedarville Roundtable, student research, and a summer scholars program. The first Roundtable presentation, held April 12, focused on “The Ethics of Faith-Based Policy.”

Leaders have real-life experience. With small businesses and new business ventures driving economic growth and job creation around the world, Cedarville has made entrepreneurship more than a concept in a business course. In 2005, the department of business administration launched the **Center for Business Innovation**. Faculty and regional entrepreneurs work closely with students to launch new businesses — like Kindred Partners, LLC (www.ikindred.com) — right on campus in classroom space designated as a business incubator.

Leaders have global influence. While we watch the economic unfolding of China on the evening news, Cedarville students are experiencing it firsthand. Accompanied by their professor, Dr. Franco Gandolfi, a group of students spent **three weeks last spring in China** seeing global economic principles in action. They had the

unique opportunity to meet with high-profile speakers like Reginald Chua, editor of *The Wall Street Journal Asia*; Randy Wilcox '81, president of Otis Elevator Company (South Asia Pacific Area); and Jaime FlorCruz, the Beijing bureau chief for Cable News Network (CNN). Students were immersed in the culture and were exposed to corporate, political, and social leaders during one of China's most crucial moments in history — now.

Also last spring, Cedarville entered into a partnership agreement with **Handong global University** (HGU) of Pohang, South Korea. The agreement creates an academic and mission-oriented exchange between Cedarville and HGU, a Christian university equipping godly leaders in Southeast Asia for global service and ministry. The global benefits for Cedarville students include field studies, summer programs, and joint research and publishing activities.



Excellence

There is nothing second-rate about the Cedarville educational experience. The standard is excellence. Few universities ... Christian or not ... offer the modern facilities, cutting-edge technology, faculty credentials, and research resources that characterize Cedarville. Our students use their world-class education and achieve impressive academic results.

Cedarville's forensics and debate programs are among the nation's finest. The debate team finished in the top 10 percent of all debate programs in the country; forensics finished the 2005 year ranked 12th in the nation. The forensics team has been state champion in Ohio for the past four years, defeating teams such as The Ohio State University, Miami University, and Bowling Green State University.

A Cedarville University team of engineers was named **World Champions of Solar Splash®**, the world championship of intercollegiate solar boating, for the second straight year! The CU entry outpaced boats from 15 other schools, including Washington State University, the University of Arkansas, and the U.S. Naval Academy.

Cedarville's Model U.N. team brought home top honors at the 2005 Dayton Model United Nations Conference. The 13-member Cedarville team competed against 150 other delegates from 14 regional colleges and universities, earning four of the top six awards and three of the six second-place awards. Cedarville swept the Economic and Social (ECOSOC) Committee top honors. Nine of Cedarville's team members earned special recognition for superior preparation and negotiating skills.



Cedarville offers significant opportunities for students to work with a **faculty mentor in joint research**, including publishing in leading academic journals and presenting papers at major national conferences. Amanda Berger and faculty mentor Dr. Michael Firmin presented a paper at the Association for the Advancement of Educational Research (AAER), a national conference for scholars presenting research papers. The advantages to joint research are significant: excellent preparation for post-graduate work, resume-building experiences, networking opportunities, and the satisfaction of being stretched to think, learn, and explore at a completely new level. Amanda is now a Ph.D. student at Wayne State University. Her success is just one of many examples of joint faculty/student research at Cedarville.

The University was once again recognized in “U.S. News & World Report” and included in “Peterson’s Competitive Colleges” and “The Princeton Review.”

Academic excellence requires the continuous pursuit of **professional accreditation**. This year three departments completed their accreditation process:

- **Business Administration**, accredited by the Association of Collegiate Business Schools and Programs (ACBSP) — June 2005
- **Athletic Training**, accredited by the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs (CAAHEP) — April 2005
- **Music and Art**, accredited by the National Association of Schools of Music (NASM) — December 2004





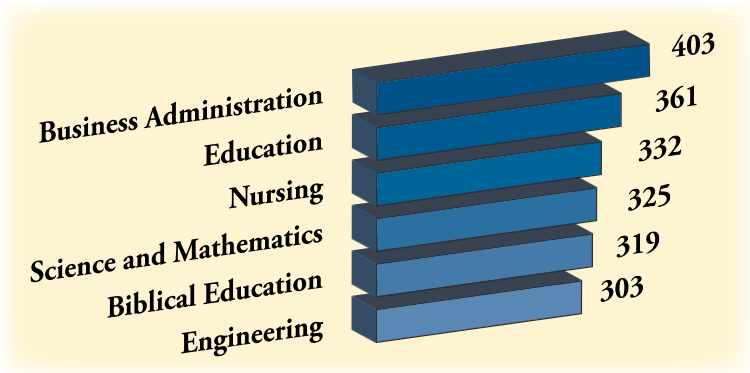
Truth

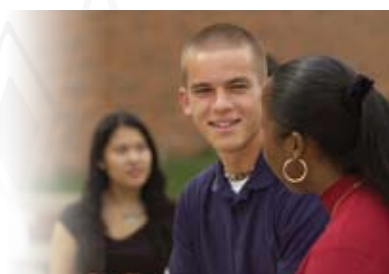

In 2004, the Student Life Division introduced a Community Covenant which expresses the foundation of a student's personal Cedarville experience. The Cedarville Experience is overflowing with activities both on and off campus. Three major theatre productions (*Broadway Bound*, *Spoon River Anthology*, and *Camelot*) made an exciting, challenging, and energetic contribution to the University’s academic and social community. A diverse selection of musical artists also came to the University stage, ranging from a classical guitarist and the Air Force Band of Flight to contemporary Christian artists Bebo Norman, Audio Adrenaline, and Casting Crowns.





The 2004 National Survey of Student Engagement placed Cedarville at the top of Council for Christian Colleges and Universities (CCCU) institutions for providing a supportive campus environment for freshmen.

Contributing to the excitement of campus life, Cedarville's athletic programs continued their winning tradition last year. Outstanding accomplishments included:

- The Women's All-Sports Award for the American Midwest Conference (AMC), recognizing league championships in basketball and volleyball and runner-up finishes in cross country and softball
- Second place standing in the NCCAA Presidents' Cup, which recognizes a school's overall performance in men's and women's athletics
- Best-ever 35-2 record for the women's basketball squad, who repeated as the NAIA Division II national runner-up
- NAIA Division II Final Four finish for men's basketball
- NAIA Region IX and AMC South Division titles for women's volleyball and the team's first appearance at the NAIA National Tournament
- NAIA rankings for both Yellow Jacket cross country teams as well as placements in the Top 15 at the national meet



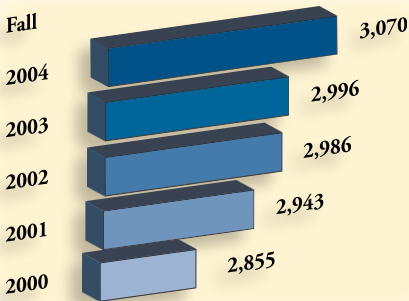

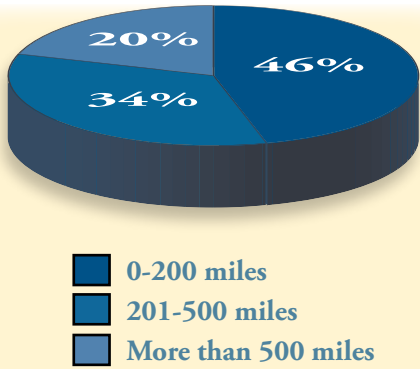

That’s why Cedarville remains one of the few universities in the nation with an entire division and a vice president dedicated to Christian ministries. The opportunities are intentionally diverse. Our desire is that every student will participate in ministry — not because they have to, but because they love God and want to serve Him. We are encouraged to see God working in and through our students!

In 2004-2005, 799 students were involved in more than 70 University-organized community ministries each semester. Volunteers spent approximately 250 hours of service per week in activities such as tutoring,



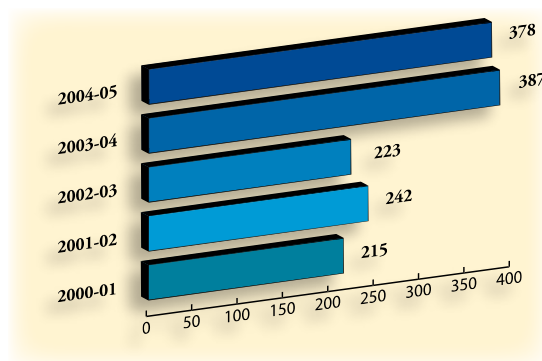

Doden Field House Dedicated

On January 20, 2005, Cedarville University dedicated the Doden Field House in a ceremony paying honor to the late Rev. Chester A. Doden, father of Cedarville University trustee Daryle Doden.

The son of German immigrants, the Rev. Doden grew up on an Iowa farm, receiving just an eighth-grade education. He later went on to graduate from Chicago's Moody Bible Institute and serve more than 40 years as a pastor, sharing God's Word with churches in rural America.

Opened in 2003, the Doden Field House has already proven itself a versatile and popular addition to Cedarville University campus life. The 60,000 square-foot building boasts four courts usable for indoor tennis, basketball, and volleyball. Its 200-meter track allows for indoor track meets, casual walking and jogging, and a multitude of other recreational activities. The structure has also been used to successfully host Cedarville University's commencements, class meetings, basketball and volleyball camps, Homecoming activities, and many youth events.

- Cedarville completed fiscal 2005 with a balanced budget for the 28th consecutive year.
- Tuition, fees, and room and board covered 92% of the fiscal 2005 budget; gifts and other revenues covered the remainder.
- Cedarville’s costs continued to be 25% below the national average for private higher education.
- \$.84 of every budget dollar is directly invested in students
 - \$.50 in classroom and teaching instruction
 - \$.10 in direct student aid
 - \$.24 in extracurricular, chapel, and Christian ministry opportunities

- Gift income increased 15.4% in fiscal 2005, primarily in funds for student scholarships.
- Bridging the Gap-Scholarships included \$803,000 from the Scholarship Matching Fund initiative, reflecting the University’s desire to help more students with financial need.
- Support for the CDR Radio Network increased nearly 10% in fiscal 2005.
- Endowment gifts increased 50% in fiscal 2005, with a strong portion provided by increased bequests to the University.

Gifts and Donors

- The average gift to Cedarville was \$489.55; excluding gifts of \$5,000 or more, the average gift was \$240.38.
- More than 8,000 individuals, churches, foundations, and other organizations gave to Cedarville in fiscal 2005.
- An average of 1,172 gifts were received each month. Approximately 25% were given in June and December.

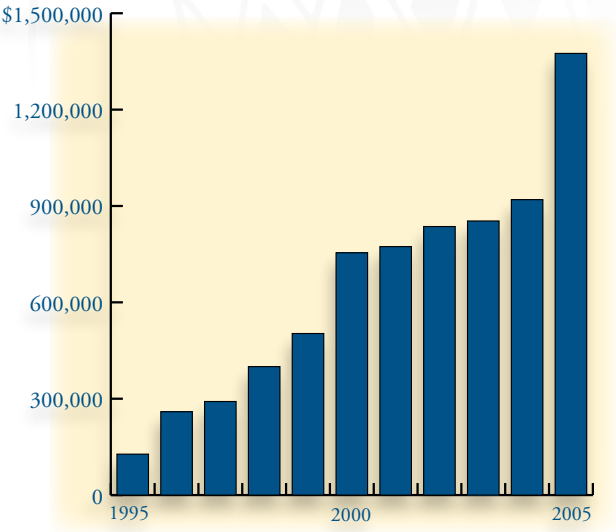
- In fiscal 2005, 13.5% of alumni (1,785) gave gifts.

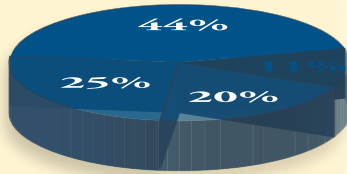


- The University scholarship program includes 140 named, endowed scholarships and 54 named, annually funded scholarships.
- Named scholarships benefitted 413 students.
- The number of named scholarships awarded has increased 721% since 1995.
- 69% of awards were made from endowment earnings; 31% were funded by annual gifts.

The book value of scholarship endowment assets increased in 2004-05 by \$1,672,000 (net of new gifts and distribution for student awards).



Scholarship Matching Fund

Compelled by Cedarville's interest to increase scholarships so that costs do not keep students from attending, friends of the University offered two matching grants totaling \$400,000 to fund additional scholarships. They encouraged Cedarville to challenge others to join them. Their initiative resulted in 525 friends and alumni giving \$403,000.

The \$803,000 toward the Scholarship Matching Fund nearly doubled the donor-funded scholarships available to students in fiscal 2006. The scholarships ranged from \$1,500-3,000 and enabled 427 students to attend or remain at Cedarville. The University intends to continue this donor-funded initiative for fiscal 2007.

The 2004-2005 academic year brought transitions in key administrative and academic leadership positions.

David Ormsbee was named vice president for advancement effective November 1, 2004. No stranger to the University family, Mr. Ormsbee has served at the University for 25 years as director of admissions and more recently as vice president for enrollment management.

Two other new administrators were appointed effective July 1, 2005 — John Gredy, vice president for enrollment management, and Robert Milliman, academic vice president.
