# Cedarville Wins Trip

## To NAIA Tourney

Students sang "We're Going to Kansas City", pandemonium reigned on the basketball court and Cedarville College basketball mentor Don Callan was thrown into the showers after his Yellow Jackets upset Steubenville's Barons last night at the Cedarville Gym 83-71 to annex the District 22 NAIA championship.

Cedarville will leave Saturday for Kansas City, Mo., and the 32-team NAIA national championships. Drawings will be held Sunday in Kansas City and Cedarville will play either Monday or Tuesday.

It was the greatest single athletic event in the Baptist school's brief history last night as the heavily favored and much taller Barons were beaten, in every phase of basketball by the aggressive Cedarville quintet which won for the 19th time this year against only five setbacks. Steubenville finished the year with a 16-9 record.

Both teams connected on 31 field goals but Cedarville was 21 for 31 at the free throw line while Steubenville was nine for 13. The Barons became quite rough during the second half and 21 personal fouls were called against them compared to nine on Cedarville. The referees were not from the local area either.

Steubenville used a 2-3 zone the entire way and Coach John Boyer refused to change until late in the contest when the Barons were forced to press Cedarville. Cedarville liked the zone and hit 15 goals in 25 shots the second half for a 60 percent average. The Yellow Jackets were 47.6 percent for the game with 31 field goals in 65 shots.

Steubenville took 79 shots but hit only 31 for 39.2 percent. Steubenville was 15 for 43 in the first half and 16 for 36 in the second half. Cedarville was in a 2-1-2 matching zone the entire game.

One of the turning points in the contest was the combination outside shooting of 6-0 junior guard Mark Combs and 5-8 sophomore guard Jerry Olsen. Combs made 19 points while Olsen had 21. The pair hit

outside, drove inside for lay-ups and fed Dozier Carter, 6-5 junior center, who made 25 points. The trio combined for 65 points and nearly matched Steubenville's 71.

CEDARVILLE played 35 minutes of basketball without calling a time out and the five starters were not relieved until the last two minutes of play. First starter to leave was Rod Lane, 6-3 senior forward, who sustained a nose bleed in the last two minutes. Larry Richardson replaced him.

Cedarville College student body went berserk at the end of the game and rushed out onto the floor where Callan and Olsen were carried around the floor on the happy partisan's shoulders. Team members cut down the nets as souvenirs. The crowd was estimated at over 1,000 by Callan.

Fred Raizk, coach of Wilmington College and chairman of the District 22 NAIA committee, presented Callan with a winning plaque in ceremonies after the game.

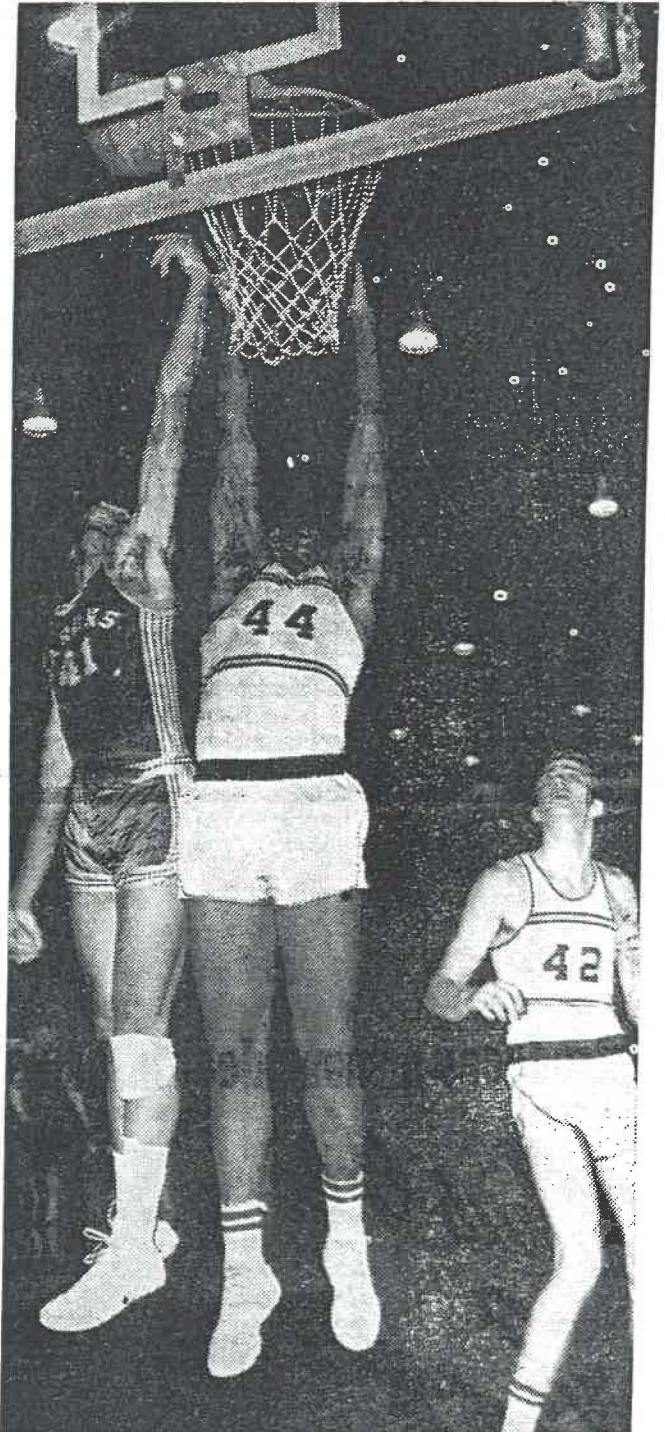
Cedarville downed Findlay College Monday night in Mansfield, 86-73, and the finals were switched to Cedarville for financial reasons. Steubenville edged Wilmington College Monday night at Mansfield to reach the finals and were rated a shoo-in for NAIA honors.

There were only three seniors on either team last night and only Rod Lane, 6-3 forward, was a starter for Cedarville. Both teams should be rugged next year for the two squads.

THE SCORE was tied nine times in the first half and the lead changed hands 11 times. Biggest Cedarville lead of the first half was 14-10 after Carter hit a free throw at 13:43. Steubenville held a 34-31 lead with 1:30 left on a basket by Vogelberger. Olsen hit a 22-foot set shot with 1:09 left and Jerry Osborn put the Yellow Jackets

ahead on a last second rebound shot at the half 35-34.

Cedarville never trailed in the second half but Steubenville appeared ready to close the margin if given a chance. An Olsen steal for a full court layup gave Cedarville a 45-39 lead with 15:20 left.

Probably the turning point in the game came when Mark Combs passed to Carter for a layup at 13:47. Carter connected and was fouled. His three-point play gave Cedarville a 47-39 lead.

The Yellow Jackets' largest margin was 13 points on several occasions in the second half. A long fielder by Combs gave Cedarville a 64-51 edge with 7:21 left. Steubenville called time and went into a full court press that nearly upset the Yellow Jackets' composure. Randy Green's basket closed the margin to 66-63 with 3:46 left but a layup by Combs followed by an over and back violation by Hummell gave Cedarville a 68-63 lead and the ball with 3:14 left.

Cedarville stalled most of the last three minutes and displayed excellent ball control and passwork. Many of the final points were at the free throw line on the one and one bonus.

Top three scorers for Cedarville after 24 games are Carter with 551 points (22.9), Olsen 393 (16.3) and Osborn with 343 (15.6).

# Cedarville Ends Regular Season

Cedarville College hosts Spring Arbor College of Michigan tonight in the Cedarville Gym and will be gunning for its 17th victory against five defeats. It will be the last regular season game prior to Monday's four-team National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics District 22 playoffs in Mansfield.

Coach Don Callan is completing his fourth year as the coach of the Yellow Jackets and this is his best ever season. His first year at the helm Cedarville won nine games followed by 11 and 13 victories.

Cedarville began the year trying to replace 6-7 Gary Walthall, former Xenia High cage star and three graduating starters. Dozier Carter, 6-5, 240-pound junior, was the only returning starter.
