4-H CLUB

4-H Clubs were originated in nearby Springfield, Ohio by a man named A.B. Grahm. The original meeting place of the 4-H group was at the high school in Springfield now known as Springfield South.

4-H Clubs in the Cedarville area are primarily agriculture and Home Economics oriented. But, in fact in other towns the per cent of members from the agricultural community may be as low as fo per cent. This week at Camp Clifton many 4-H Cub members are attendin the camp and there are about as many rural members as city members.


The 4-H Clubs provide programs of training in many areas of interest. Members may work on projects in agriculture, sewing, cooking, livestock, auto maintanance, fishing sports, swimming, handcrafts and nature.

At nearby Camp Clifton seven counties support and attend the camp. Each week over 200 4-H members attend and enjoy such activities as swimming, tether ball, basketball, hand crafts, nature study, canoeing, and contests of various kinds.Swimming lessons are provided and fishing is permitted The campers go on hikes, enjoy drama and song fests and learn citizenship.

The camp is staffed by college students or recent graduates.

Each week a new group of campers attends the facilities and they bring along their own staff of counselers and program directors. There is a full time resident director that stays at the camp for the summer and other staff members are employed full time for the sum-

Choose Right Plants For Shady Areas

Gardening in the shade always presents some extra problems but none that are inseperable. You can have just as attractive a garden, and sometimes just as colorful a one as in the sun, garden experts say.

The main thing is to choose the right plants. Of course, everyone knows about ferns-reliable, effective, easy to grow, but not very colorful. Along with these go such old reliables as English ivies in a variety of forms, vinca, pachysandra and any of several wild gingers.

Grown from "bulbs," they need little care besides adequate food and moisture and protection from the ture, and protection from the burning sun. They must be stored indoors over winter.


