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

The Judgment Seat of Christ

Part I

"For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ; that every one may receive the things done in his body, according to that he hast done, whether it be good or bad" (II

Corinthians 5:10).

The term "judgment seat" is the translation of the Great word *Bema*. It was used for the Roman magistrate's tribunal, a platform from which judgments were pronounced. In Romans 14:10 and II Corinthians 5:10 it is used for the tribunal before which all Christians will stand. It appears from Scripture that Paul, whom the Holy Spirit used to write about the Judgment Seat of Christ, lived daily in the expectation of that day of reckoning. Concerning that day our text teaches several important lessons.

1. It is Inevitable - "For we must..."

The Judgment Seat of Christ is certain to happen. It cannot be avoided; it is a "must". No Christian can escape that important event. We know it is inevitable because God has decreed it to be so. This final judgment for the believer is not a matter of choice. It is not optional; it is obligatory.

2. It is Inclusive - "For we must all appear..."

The "we" in verse 10 has reference to Christians only. This is not a warning to the unsaved. The "we" in this chapter, appearing not less than twenty-six times, cannot possibly refer to unbelievers. The Epistle is addressed to "the church of God which is at Corinth, with all the saints..." (1:1). The conclusion then is that all who have been born again will be present at this final court. Let not any one Christian entertain the false idea that escape is possible.



3. It is *Individual* - "that *every one* may receive..."

The Judgment Seat of Christ is not a mass judgment of the whole Body of Christ. While it is inclusive taking all the redeemed into account, it will be on an individual basis. Each Christian lives his life in his own way, therefore, each is judged singly. The husband will be judged individually apart from his wife and the wife separately from her husband. Each Christian will stand alone at the Judgment Seat of Christ.

4. It is *Indisputable* - "the things done in his body, according to that he hath done, whether it be good or bad."

No Christian will be permitted to argue or debate the final decision of the Judge. There will be no discussion of opinion pro and con. The Lord Jesus Christ will be the Judge (John 5:22), therefore, the judgment will be in "righteousness" (Acts 17:31). "We are sure that the judgment of God is according to truth" (Romans 2:2). The decree of the Judge will be final. He has the records, and He will make the final decision as to what is acceptable and unacceptable.

The house in which my children grew, Where we had lived for years-I turned to see it broken down, And brushed aside the tears.


I looked upon my soul one day, To find it too had grown With thorns and nettles everywhere, The seeds neglect had sown.

Wherefore, comfort one another with these words," (I Thess. 4:16-18).

In Philippians 1:20-25, Paul admits that he has some discord about death. He anticipates death because it would bring him into the presence of God. We have too much to do."

Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Culbertson are an encouragement to the people they meet. They live in a retirement center in Franklin, Pennsylvania. Clyde, 73, and his wife Elizabeth, 61, have been active members for many years in their church in Oil City.

The best way to get an insight into their life is to listen to what they have to say. Here are just a

few of their statements.

Clyde: "What I find with people is that they need somebody to talk to—somebody that is interested in what they think. You may hear it over and over, but I've always been patient to listen to it just as much as if I'd never heard it. It is a comfort to me to know that I can talk to these people, and it helps... These are the things I like to do. I really enjoy talking to senior citizens. They usually help me more than I help them."

Elizabeth: "We have no desire to do anything except Christian work. Sometimes it doesn't seem like we've done anything. We just serve the Lord every day the same way. It gets better every day."

"We have had a lot of sickness, but God promised to give us more grace. Each trial beings us a little closer to Him. We learn to lean on Him that way. We have to depend on Him to get closer. It's been a good life. I wouldn't have

it any other way."

Clyde: "I never questioned God, and I don't today. Sometimes things come up, and I've heard people say, 'I wonder why this happened to me?' I do believe that whatever comes upon us is what we have to go through. In every test He has given me the grace to go through it. I don't know how I'd have ever gotten through life without serving the Lord."

The Culbertsons have actively served the Lord, throughout their lives. Before their recent change of residence, they conducted weekly Sunday services for the people in the retirement center who were not able to get out to their regular church. They spend a great deal of time counseling and encouraging people who just need to know that someone cares.

Clyde and Elizabeth Culbertson would like to give this challenge: "There's thousands of things a senior citizen can do. They have the time. You don't have to have a car; you don't have to be educated. Just care. This is how people are won. You win them by caring. The Culbertsons have found this out all through life."

The great hymn "The Old Rugged Cross" has become the most popular gospel song of the twentieth century. The inspiration of Rev. George Bennard to write this great hymn in 1913, was that he could almost see John 3:16 leave the page of his Bible and act out the meaning of redemption through Christ on the cross. When he first began to see this visualization, he wanted to do something with the idea right then, but an inner voice seemed to say "Wait." Later, through some personal tribulations and revival successes, he was able to concentrate on writing the hymn. Perfection of the song came in a Methodist parsonage, where he was engaged in revival services in Pokagon, Michigan. There he got out his favorite guitar, and asked the congregation to listen while he played and sang the hymn. After hearing the hymn the Rev. L.O. Bostwick said to Rev. Bennard, "God has given you a song that will never die." On June 7, 1913, Rev. Bennard introduced the hymn in a nearby church, and then from pencilled notes a five-voiced choir sang it. "The Old Rugged Cross" is the heart of gospel songs, like John 3:16 is the heart of gospel doctrine.

So I'll cherish the old rugged cross, Till my trophies at last I lay down; I will cling to the Old Rugged Cross, And exchange it someday for a crown.

Each year, just before hunting season begins, a farmer protects his herd by painting in hugh white letters on both sides of each animal: COW. Asked whether he put a different sign on the bulls, he replied, "Nope. No use confusing

The famous naturalist, John Burroughs, walking one day with a friend in New York City suddenly stopped. "Hear that?" he asked. His friend hadn't—and neither had the other passers by. When Burroughs searched about and found a cricket, the friend said, "Here is something people CAN hear." And he dropped a penny on the sidewalk. Twenty people near at hand stopped, turned, looked to see the fallen coin. Those people saw, thought and heard money everywhere while Burroughs saw, heard and thought nature. We generally hear only what our ears are tuned to hear.

Through the years, men and women have not listened to God no matter how loudly and clearly He has spoken. Sin and unbelief or the sin of unbelief has stopped their ears. Atheists of today and yesterday have boastfully said God has not been speaking, but He still speaks and

they are silent.

Ingersoll held up a copy of the Bible and said, "In fifteen years I'll have this Book in the morgue." Fifteen years rolled by. Ingersoll was in the morgue, and the Bible lives on. Voltaire said that in one hundred years the Bible would be an out-moded and forgotten Book to be found only in museums. Recently, ninety-two volumes of Voltaire's works—a part of the Earl of Derby's library—were sold for two dollars. God is still speaking and pleads with men to hear.



Looking At God's Creation

Have you ever walked in a meadow and seen in the early morning mist the sparkle of the dew upon the web of a spider? Did

you ever stop to marvel at the web and intricacies of the design that the spider has spun into it? God has created the majority of the spiders with the innate ability of web-building as a primary means of survival. This web acts as a snare to capture the food, which the spider then wraps.

How does the spider build its web? Spiders are created with special organs for spinning. At the posterior end two fingers extend that contain tubes that are attached to a special sack in the spider where the silk is produced. This fluid passes out through the tubes of the fingers. When it comes in contact with the air it hardens into the silk we see in the web.

Two kinds of silk thread are produced by the spider. The inelastic thread is used to hold the

shape and structure of the web. These extend from the center and are around the edge. The elastic threads are the form that is seen extending from the center in a circular motion. How marvelous is the creation of God! The thread of the spider is stronger than steel thread of the same diameter.

Each kind of spider spins a different kind of web. Some merely place a single strand; others develop a web of beautiful

geometric patterns.

In Matthew 6:25-34 God tells us that we are not to be concerned for our needs, but that He will provide them for us. God shows us that He has provided for the fowls of the air and the lilies of the field. He also has provided for the spider. God sees our needs and meets them. Matthew 6:33 shows us the pattern for our lives: "Seek ye first the kingdom of God, and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added unto you." Give God first recognition in your life, depend totally on Him, and all things you need He shall provide!

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But whosoever drinketh of the water that I shall give him shall never thirst; but the water that I shall give him shall be in him a well of water springing up into everlasting life.
