Cedarville baseball & volleyball benefit from Heritage Christian athletes

In the past couple of years a special connection has been made between Cedarville University and Heritage Christian High School in Indianapolis, Indiana. This has especially proved to be of great benefit to both the Lady Jacket volleyball team and the Yellow Jacket baseball team.

Chris Ward, a 5-foot-10 outfielder from Indianapolis, just completed his sophomore year at Cedarville and he is the first of an impressive list of seven recent athletes who are or will be a part of CU athletics. Ward, a finance major, batted .273 as a freshman outfielder for the Jackets. He appeared in all 48 games with 43 starts in center field. He added eight doubles, three triples and two homers while compiling a .956 fielding percentage. Ward registered a second-best 11 stolen bases while posting 16 RBI's.

Unfortunately he suffered a season-ending injury during the 2011 spring break baseball trip to Florida after playing in just five contests for head coach Mike Manes.

Manes commented about the contributions of Ward to the CU baseball team. "Chris brings a lot to our program. He is sure of the abilities God has given him and he plays hard all of the time."

Three Heritage Christian baseball players joined the 2011 Cedarville baseball program. David Ledbetter, a 6-foot pitcher/DH from Fishers, Indiana, just completed a successful rookie campaign with the Yellow Jackets. He capped the season by being named to the NCCAA (National Christian College Athletic Association) All-America Team. Ledbetter also earned a spot on the All-American Midwest Conference Second Team as a starting pitcher after recording a 7-2 record with a 2.89 earned run average.

Ledbetter topped the CU pitching staff with 55 strikeouts in 53 innings of action. He also earned a spot on the All-NCCAA Midwest Region Team and was the region's Pitcher of the Year.

David's twin brother, Ryan, suffered a preseason injury and was unable to participate this past campaign. Coach Manes sees major contributions from both players in 2012. "David and Ryan

are very hard workers with a strong desire to be the very best they can be. They are intense competitors who love to win and that rubs off on everyone!"

Cameron McWilliams, a 5-foot-10 speedy outfielder from Carmel, Indiana, appeared in 47 games this season with 28 starts. He recorded a .263 batting mark with 29 runs scored, four doubles and 10 RBI's. McWilliams was second on the team with 13 swipes in 15 attempts.

Coach Manes is pleased with the progress of McWilliams and is looking for more of the same next year. "Cameron is quietly intense, willing to learn and improve, and is an excellent young man."

The Ledbetters along with classmate McWilliams achieved the ultimate in high school sports as they helped lead Heritage

Christian to the 2009 Indiana High School Division 2A State Championship under Eagle head coach Dan Ambrose, a former Cedarville baseball player from 1990-93.

Coach Manes likes the solid foundation that Ambrose is building into his players. "Heritage Christian is an excellent baseball program that is producing a winning attitude in student-athletes. I am grateful for the support Cedarville is receiving and look forward to that continuing in the future. All four of our Heritage Christian alumni are fine young men that make their parents proud!"

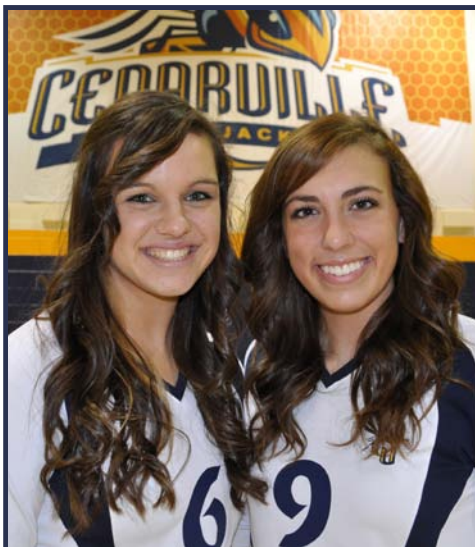
Coach Doug Walters, beginning his fourth season as the head volleyball coach at Cedarville University, is also reaping the benefits of the student-athlete pipeline to Heritage Christian as two former Eagles completed their freshmen seasons for Walters and one will soon be joining the team.

Walters praised the Eagle program and their head coach Michelle York. "Coach York has established an outstanding program that has consistently been one of the top-ranked volleyball teams in the state of Indiana. She has coached at the collegiate level and knows what it takes to prepare athletes to compete at the next level."

Stephanie Rogers, a 5-foot-11 middle hitter from Carmel, Indiana, earned All-American Midwest Conference Second Team honors while leading the Lady Jackets in kills (437), kills per set (3.24), solo blocks (57), block assists (49) and total blocks (106). Rogers was also a member of the All-AMC Freshmen Team and received the league's Freshman of the Year honor.

Rogers was voted to the All-NCCAA Midwest Region Team and appeared in all 38 matches and all 135 sets during the 2010 season. Coach Walters credited a lot of his team's offensive success to the play of Rogers in the middle of his front line. "Stephanie led our offense at the net and was a big weapon for opponents to deal with. This took a lot of pressure off our other hitters and helped give us a more powerful attack."

Classmate Kelsey Christiansen, a 6-foot middle hitter from Fishers, Indiana, played a big role in the latter part of the Lady Jacket season as the team made line-up adjustments in preparing for post-

season action. Christiansen ended up playing in 17 matches and 38 sets while recording 32 kills and tallying 16 blocks.

Coach Walters saw improvement from his rookie from Heritage Christian. "Kelsey earned valuable minutes in the latter part of our season as a middle hitter where she will be a major contributor this fall."

Maddie Anderson is a 2011 graduate of Heritage Christian and will join the Lady Jacket volleyball program in the fall. Anderson, 5-foot-9 left-handed setter from Carmel, Indiana, is a two-time All-State First Team honoree and the all-time assist leader for the Eagles.

Walters is anxious for Anderson to begin her collegiate career. "Maddie is incredibly athletic and has a powerful left-handed arm swing. She is a great leader on the court with a high intelligence for the game of volleyball and will be a major part of our team in 2011."

"All three of these young ladies have a great work ethic and are willing to do what it takes to make our program successful in the NCAA," Walters added. "That is all due to the excellent program at Heritage Christian and the quality of student-athletes the school is producing."

As the ties between Cedarville and Heritage Christian continue to strengthen, other student-athletes are becoming interested in attending CU. And not only are the athletes making a major contribution to the Cedarville campus but more and more of their non-athlete classmates are seeing the value of the Christ-centered education that is available.

Cedarville University Director of Admissions, Mark Weinstein, sees many positive aspects to the CU-Heritage Christian connection.

"The relationship between Heritage Christian and Cedarville University continues to foster great results for each student and both institutions. As Heritage Christian alumni excel in the classroom and athletic environments, they are building a legacy for future Heritage students - and they're strengthening Cedarville's already strong athletic reputation. This will only increase as more students like those from Heritage Christian enroll at Cedarville and compete at the NCAA II level."

Summing it all up in athletic terms, it is a win-win situation!

Top 10 Yellow Jacket Individual

The CU sports information staff selected what it believes to be the Top 10 feats turned in by a Yellow Jacket in 2010-11.

1 All-America race walk specialist Joshua Wiseman is recognized as having the No. 1 individual performance by a Yellow Jacket during the 2010-11 season with his record-setting effort at the NAIA Indoor Championship.

Wiseman covered the 3K walk in a school-record time of 12:23.54 to place third at the GaREAT Sports Complex in Geneva, Ohio on March 3. His effort was nearly 10 seconds faster than the mark he established in February at the Cedarville Invitational.

The race walk is arguably the least appreciated and most misunderstood event on the track. There is a correct form to adhere to and judges are present to make sure competitors abide by the rules. They also have the authority to disqualify them if deemed they are "running."

There aren't many opportunities at typical intercollegiate meets, either, especially since the NCAA doesn't sanction the event. If it is included, the starting time can leave the participants walking in relative obscurity.

Even at that, Wiseman was an NAIA All-American in the indoor 3K walk all four years of his career and never placed worse than third. The senior from nearby Springfield, Ohio was third as a freshman, won the national title as a sophomore, and was the runner-up in 2010. Wiseman was a three-time NAIA All-American in the outdoor 5K walk.



2 The #2 individual performance on CU's Top 10 in '10-11 belongs to T.J. Badertscher with his victorious run in the NCCAA Men's Cross Country Championship.

The Yellow Jackets, especially Badertscher, could not have envisioned the day they were about to enjoy at the Elvin R. King Cross Country Course on Nov. 13, 2010.

Cedarville had not won the banner in 25 years and was resting six of its top seven runners in preparation for the NAIA Championship the following week.

The senior from Marion, Ohio entered the event as a two-time NCCAA All-American and as one of the Jackets' most consistent performers during his career. However, he had not run up to par in his previous two races.

Badertscher was Cedarville's #7 runner the previous week at the American Midwest Conference Championship and his 18th-place showing overall was good enough for honorable mention honors. The meet before that, he was #9 for CU and 75th overall at the NAIA Great Lakes Invitational hosted by Aquinas (Mich.).

On this day, Badertscher topped the field of 186 runners crossing the finish line first and becoming just the fifth Yellow Jacket ever to win the race. He covered the 8,000 meters in 26:08 to win by 13 seconds.

Other teams rested some of their top runners, too, but Cedarville used its depth to capture its first NCCAA title since 1985. Badertscher was joined on the All-America Team (top 20 finishers) by Ryan Gustafson (8th place), Joshua Wiseman (13th), and Neil Klinger (17th).



3 Matt Niemiec scored two goals in a 4-0 wipeout of top-seeded Covenant at the NCCAA Men's Soccer Championship which ranks #3 on CU's Top 10 in '10-11.

Honestly, any number of Niemiec's performances could be chosen as worthy for the Top 10 especially since he deposited goals in each of the first eight contests of the season.

Among the senior forward's many highlights, he had the first tally in a 2-1 decision at Bryan (Tenn.) which was eventually the nationally-ranked Lions' only regular season



loss; he struck the 3-2 overtime winner against Indiana Wesleyan in the Dave Jones Memorial Classic; and he also found the net in a 2-1 setback to NAIA #3 and eventual national runner-up Notre Dame (Ohio).

The Yellow Jackets headed to the NCCAA Nationals in Kissimmee, Fla. on Dec. 1-4, 2010 as the No. 5 seed in the eight-team tournament. They overwhelmed No. 4 Campbellsville, 4-0, in the first round which brought up No. 1 Covenant in the semifinals.

Niemiec gave Cedarville a 2-0 lead with his first score early in the second half. He headed home his team-leading 17th goal of the campaign to complete the 4-0 rout.

Even though the Yellow Jackets were blanked, 2-0, by NCAA Division II Palm Beach Atlantic in the championship match, Niemiec was honored as the Most Outstanding Offensive Player of the Tournament. The NCCAA All-America First Team performer finished the year with 17 goals and 8 assists for 42 points.

4 NAIA All-America sprinter Alexa Winik is #4 on CU's Top 10 in '10-11 by dashing to Outstanding Track Performer of the Meet honors at the American Midwest Conference Championship.

Winik, a junior from Windsor, Ontario, was on the home track as Cedarville University served as host of the two-day event on April 15-16. Her record-setting performance helped to lead the Lady Jackets to a runner-up finish.

Winik set AMC and school records with her victory in the 200 meter dash when she crossed the finish line in 24.21 seconds. She went on to win the 400 meters in 58.47 and then anchored the runner-up 4 x 400 meter relay team along with Neola Putnam, Katie Lanphier, and Joy Santos (4:03.33).

Winik finished the 2011 season in strong fashion. She won two events and was an All-American in four total at the NCCAA Outdoor Championship.

Winik tied the school record in the 400 meters (55.31) for NAIA All-America recognition for the second consecutive year.



5 Caitlyn Brooks enjoyed a career-best game at Huntington during what was a most bizarre day to lead the Lady Jacket basketball team to victory and rank #5 on CU's Top 10 individual performances of '10-11.

Brooks exploded for career highs of 24 points and 18 rebounds as NAIA Division II #13 Cedarville posted its sixth consecutive victory with a 75-64 result.

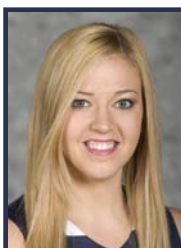
That, in and of itself, is great news. How the Lady Jackets got to that point is what makes it a great story.

The date was Dec. 10, 2010 and the "weirdness" of it all is based upon the extenuating circumstances that unfolded. Consider the following:

- Lady Jacket leading scorer and rebounder Aubrey Siemon made the trip but did not play because of illness.
- Freshman standout Deborah Chandler was not allowed to make the trip because of sickness.
- Upon arrival in Huntington, Ind., Cedarville discovered that the Foresters disciplined five of their players for violating team rules and would have only five players available for the game.
- No one could foresee the numbers that Brooks would put on the score-sheet either. She did not score a point two days earlier in a 79-58 win at Taylor and was averaging 2.9 points and 3.9 rebounds for the season.

The six-foot senior forward stepped up big time. She tallied 14 points and 10 rebounds in the second half alone when the Jackets broke away from a 39-36 halftime lead.

Brooks made 11-of-18 shots from the field and converted 2-of-5 free throws for her 24 points. Eight of her 18 rebounds came off the offensive glass and she added two steals in 32 minutes of playing time.

It's worth noting that of the five players to play for the host Foresters, they had three of their top four scorers on the court including the top two.

6 Matt Harner rates #6 on CU's Top 10 in '10-11 after firing in 25 points as the Yellow Jackets nipped Roberts Wesleyan, 71-69, in the AMC Men's Basketball Tournament semifinal to secure another trip to the NAIA Division II Championship.

The date was Feb. 26 - just three weeks after Roberts Wesleyan strolled into the Callan Athletic Center on Li'l Sibs Weekend and walked away with a 77-68 victory. After that setback, the #2 seed Yellow Jackets ran off six victories in a row. The #3 Raiders returned to town riding a 10-game winning streak.

The stakes were a bit higher now. The winner would earn the league's second automatic berth to the upcoming NAIA Division II National Tournament in Point Lookout, Mo. AMC champion and top seed Walsh already owned the other.

Harner came up big in the second half against Roberts Wesleyan when he scored 21 of his points. More impressively, he tallied 17 of the Yellow Jackets' last 23 markers covering the final 11 minutes of the contest.

Cedarville scored the last 10 points of the first period for a 34-29 lead. The hosts completed a 14-point run early in the second half for a 38-29 margin - the largest advantage either team had.

The Raiders bounced back to regain the upper hand with a pair of three-point spreads. Their last lead was 63-62 with 4:22 to go.

Brian Grant broke the game's 12th and final tie with 3:11 to play to give CU the lead for good, 67-65. Harner added a jumper for a four-point advantage and Daniel Kohavi converted both ends of a one-and-one with 18 seconds on the clock to make it 71-67.

Roberts Wesleyan, 19-12, cut it to two with five ticks left and the visitors had one last chance with 1.3 seconds remaining after the Jackets missed the front end of the bonus. However, a length-of-the-court pass was deflected away as time expired pushing CU's record to 20-11.

7 Justin Hoffman is #7 on CU's Top 10 individual performances of '10-11 after repeating as the Outstanding Track Performer of the Meet at the American Midwest Conference Championship.

Cedarville University served as host of the AMC Championship on April 15-16 in what would be its final appearance in the event with the school's upcoming transition to NCAA Division II. Hoffman's performance in the hurdles guided the Yellow Jackets to their second league title in the last three years.

The junior from Chillicothe, Ohio set an AMC record in the 110 meter hurdles prelims when he turned in a time of 14.24 seconds. He won the final in 14.53 seconds and later took first in the 400 meter hurdles in 55.01.

Cedarville ended up winning the seven-team meet handily with 299.50 points. Malone was the runner-up with 207.50 points, Notre Dame was third at 152, and Walsh was fourth with 119.50. The two days featured all sorts of weather including sunshine, rain, cool temperatures, and high winds.

8 Cedarville's Top 10 individual performances of the year include Nate Davenport at #8 as he belted two homers and drove in five runs to pace the Jackets to an 8-4 win at Bethel (Ind.) in the NCCAA Midwest Region baseball championship game.

Cedarville headed to Mishawaka, Ind. on May 11 to face the Pilots in a best 2-out-of-3 series for an automatic berth to the NCCAA Nationals. It was already a big day for Davenport, who was named the American



Midwest Conference Player of the Year earlier in the morning and was later tabbed the NCCAA Midwest Region Player of the Year.

The Yellow Jackets cruised to a 7-1 win in the opener before Davenport took center stage in the nightcap. He cracked a two-run home run in the third inning to stake CU to a 3-0 margin and added a three-run bomb an inning later to inflate the bulge to 7-0. Davenport finished the contest 3-for-5 with five RBI's.

The region title was the fourth overall for Cedarville, 33-16. The Jackets made their fifth appearance at the NCCAA Nationals which was played May 18-21 in Mason, Ohio.

Davenport completed the campaign batting a team-high .361 with 11 home runs to go along with school records of 25 doubles and 61 RBI's. He was named to the NCCAA All-America First Team.

9 Jenn Spann tossed a complete-game shutout to lead the Lady Jackets to just their second NCCAA Midwest Region softball championship which ranks #9 on Cedarville's Top 10 individual performances of the year.

The Lady Jackets traveled to Marion, Ind. as the #1 seed in the three-team tournament on April 29-30 to meet up with host and #2 Indiana Wesleyan and #3 Spring Arbor (Mich.). Ironically, CU's only other region banner was earned at IWU in 2000.

Spann stepped into the circle and the freshman lefthander spun a four-hitter to blank Spring Arbor, 1-0, in the final.

Cedarville plated the game's only run in the bottom of the first inning. Kelsey Wilson singled with two outs, stole second, and scored on a single by Sydney Miller.

That's all the Lady Jackets would need behind the pitching performance of Spann. She allowed just four hits and struck out three batters while improving her record to 10-3. Spann joined six teammates on the all-tournament team.

Cedarville pulled off one of the key defensive plays of the season in the sixth inning. The Cougars had a runner on first when a ball was scorched to right center. Rightfielder Christina Zorn tracked it down, relayed the ball to second baseman Kenleigh Ludlow, and she fired a strike to catcher Meghan Creech to cut down the would be tying run.

The Jackets advanced to the NCCAA Nationals in Troutville, Va. on May 12-14. Spann was credited with CU's lone victory - a 6-2 complete-game decision over Judson (Ill.) as she finished the season with an 11-4 mark.

10 Rachel Brownfield's goal in the second overtime at Mount Vernon Nazarene is #10 on Cedarville's Top 10 individual performances of the year.

The Lady Jackets traveled to MVNU on Oct. 26, 2010 for an American Midwest Conference match-up with the intention of locking up an AMC playoff berth with a win. However, it would have to come against a Cougar program it had only beaten once in 11 previous meetings (1-9-1).

Cedarville came away with a 1-0 victory as Brownfield found the net 29 seconds into the second overtime.

The contest featured extreme windy conditions and an hour weather delay with 12 minutes left in regulation. As the two teams entered the second OT, Amanda Bunton delivered a pass to the left wing where Brownfield lofted a perfectly placed shot over the keeper and into the net for her fourth goal of the season.

The Lady Jackets, 7-9-1, dropped the regular season finale at Walsh, 1-0, forcing them to return to MVNU 10 days later for the AMC playoffs. The two teams played to a scoreless draw in the rematch with the Cougars advancing on penalty kicks, 3-2.
