## Siemon, Hoffman are 2010-11 Athletes of the Year

### Phipps honored for FAR service

**A**ubrey Siemon and Justin Hoffman were recognized as the 2010-11 Cedarville University Athletes of the Year while Dr. James Phipps was honored for his years of service as the Faculty Athletics Representative during the Athletic Department Honors and Appreciation Dinner on April 18, 2011 in the Stevens Student Center.

Yellow Jacket coaches and senior student-athletes along with a notable list of guests including University officials were in attendance at the annual event.

Siemon, a Lady Jacket basketball standout, and Hoffman, a record-setting hurdler on the track & field team, earned the highest awards in voting by the Yellow Jacket head coaches.

Siemon, a senior post player from Springfield, Ohio, averaged 13.1 points and 12.2 rebounds for Cedarville's nationally-ranked women's basketball team. She was named to the NAIA All-America Third Team and the NCCAA All-America First Team.

Siemon paced the Lady Jackets to a 24-10 record and a spot in the quarterfinals of the NAIA Division II National Tournament. She ended her career as CU's all-time leading rebounder (1,362) and is 12th on the school's scoring list (1,541).

Hoffman, a junior from Chillicothe, Ohio, has already established himself as the finest hurdler in school history. He has earned NAIA All-America honors in the indoor 60 meter hurdles as well as the outdoor 110 and 400 meter distances.

Hoffman is a multiple NCCAA champion and owns four school records. He was the 2010 and 2011 AMC Outstanding Track Performer of the Meet.

Dr. James Phipps will be stepping aside from his role as Faculty Athletics Representative after serving faithfully for 41 years in the post. His contributions to the conference and national levels were ultimately recognized when he received the NAIA's Wally Schwartz Award in 2004.

## Morris Selected for NCCAA Hall of Fame Induction

The National Christian College Athletic Association is pleased to announce the Class of 2011 inductees for the NCCAA Hall of Fame and the list includes Lady Jacket women's tennis coach, Dr. Dee Morris.

Morris, Marsha Jackson of Maranatha Baptist Bible College and Keith Champion of Clearwater Christian College are the three individuals who will join the current membership of 43 other outstanding servants.

Morris served as the Assistant Women's Tennis Coach at Cedarville University from 1977-2006 before becoming the Head Coach in 2007. She was a pioneer in getting Men's and Women's Tennis developed and approved as a National Championship sport within the NCCAA in 2000.

Dee has served as the NCCAA National Sports Chair since 2007 although she was the "unofficial" chair since the 2000 approval of the sport. Her leadership talents also spread to other associations as she also serves on the NAIA National Tournament Committee and the NAIA Rating Committee.

Under her leadership, the Cedarville Lady Jackets earned the 2010 American Mideast Conference title and that same team was honored as a scholar-athlete team and as an NAIA Champion of Character program. The Lady Jackets have appeared in the NCCAA National Championship from 2007 through 2010 and earned a runner-up finish in 2007.

Most importantly, Dee has been a humble servant of Jesus Christ within the NCCAA for three decades. She has given of her time, talents and treasure to insure the young ladies within her care grew spiritually, academically and athletically. Morris has also displayed excellence in her service as an NCCAA leader within her Region, Sport and the National Administration Committee. Dee was inducted into the Cedarville University Hall of Fame in 2006.

**T**his is a question I am often asked by those who have been challenged to be a witness and have been exposed to sport ministries. I usually reply, "Good question. I have the same problem you do in finding where God would like to use me."

First I think we need to talk with God about our desire and that we are willing to do whatever He asks regarding being a witness for Him in the world we live in. Sometimes it becomes quite obvious and at other times it just seems to happen. I have spent most of my life asking God the "what" and "where" questions about ministry. I am pleased that God has chosen to use me many times when I had not even asked.

Recently this happened to me as I talked with our Assistant Pastor at Grace Baptist Church in Cedarville. Pastor Brian, knowing I have been involved in the past, asked me to work with him in an outreach I originally helped start with the Central State University football team under a former pastor Mickey Farlow. I thought that would work, so I said sure - knowing it would involve time, effort and commitment. Being retired, the timing was good for me, but Brian was just adding on to his job.

In the past I had been involved with CSU athletics and the administrators, but not the ones they now have. Brian and I began to be visible and active in the process of talking with coaches and players regarding the spiritual issues of life. We found a willing and eager team who gave us an audience for the Gospel. As we talked and shared, we have seen some decisions to begin to follow Christ and for others to return to a relationship with the Lord.

As we were ministering with CSU we were encouraged to meet Dr. Paul Nitz, who is an Orthopaedic surgeon and overseer of the physical well-being of the football team. While talking with him, he asked if we would consider the same type of ministry with the new professional hockey team, the Dayton Gems. Dr. Nitz is one of the owners and interested in having a spiritual impact on these young men. We thought and prayed about it and God opened doors for us to be part of that new effort in hockey in the Dayton area. Hockey is one tough sport, and neither Brian nor I had had any involvement with hockey. We jumped in with both feet and found another willing audience. We talked with the whole team about what we wanted to do regarding our being there. We told them we didn't know hockey, but wanted to talk with them about the rest of their life outside of hockey.

We have had a steady group of 5 to 10 players who have become quite active in trying to understand issues about God and life that most said they had never heard before. It has been great to see some come to faith in Christ. We have made great friends this season, but may never see them again in this life. Their goal is to reach that upper level of competition - the National Hockey League. We are fortunate to catch these players on the way up. The Gems coach Brian Gratz has invited us to be a part of the program again next year. We are excited for what a new year will bring. Even now in my 78th year God is still willing to use me. Wow, what a God we have! Do you have a desire to serve God? Let Him know and see where it will lead you. Don't be afraid to step out on faith. I wouldn't have done what I have in my life if I hadn't told God, "I am willing to be used."

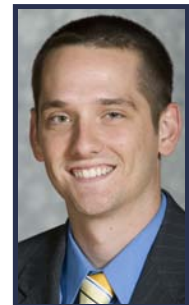

# 2010-11 CU Athletic Awards



Joy Kellogg and Matt Niemiec were presented the Donald E. Callan Award which recognizes four-year Yellow Jacket athletes who have shown a commitment to Christian ministry, academic excellence, leadership, and athletic accomplishment.

Kellogg, a senior from Arlington, Ohio, is a four-year standout, three-time NCCAA All-American, and scholar-athlete on the women's tennis team.

Niemiec, a senior from Holland, Michigan, was a two-time NCCAA All-American on the soccer field and the national tournament's Most Outstanding Offensive Player for the runner-up Yellow Jackets in 2010.

The Don and Nedra Callan Sports Ministry Awards were presented to women's soccer player Kelly Wise and men's basketball player Adam Riehle. They honor student-athletes for their evangelism in and through sports activities at Cedarville University.

Wise, a senior from Mohnton, Pennsylvania, was a team captain, a two-time Team MVP, and ranks third on CU's all-time goals scored list with 25. She has been on soccer missions trips to Chile, the Dominican Republic, and South Africa as well as possessing extensive soccer camp experience.

Riehle, a senior from Edgerton, Ohio, was a four-year varsity basketball player and an NAIA and NCCAA Scholar-Athlete. His sports ministries include a trip to Scotland and he was the 2010-11 recipient of the coveted Ron Holmes Memorial Award as presented by the American Midwest Conference's men's basketball coaches.

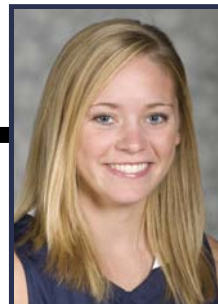






# STING SPOTLIGHT

**Rachel  
Hurley**



*Rachel Hurley and Andrew York are 2011 graduates of Cedarville University. Rachel was a four-year member of the Lady Jacket basketball team and graduated as a premed major. She ranks 16th all-time with 1,274 points and is third all-time in three-point field goals made with 221. Andrew is a three-year member of the Yellow Jacket baseball team and graduated with a degree in business finance. He is one of the top Yellow Jacket players on this year's squad with a .347 batting average headed into the post-season. They share thoughts, memories and lessons learned from their respective athletic careers....and plans for a future together as husband & wife:*

## **Tell us about your family.**

Rachel - My dad is a pastor and my mom is a physical therapist. I am the second of five girls...my dad's a little outnumbered:) My oldest sister, Rebecca, is married and has a sweet little one year old girl (of course). Emily is a junior at Grove City College. She is studying Mechanical Engineering and plays soccer. Elise is a senior in high school and will be coming to Cedarville in the fall. Jessica is a sophomore in high school.

Andrew - My family is from Northern Maine. I have a younger brother (Cameron York) attending CU. He is a junior exercise science major. My other brother is a junior in high school back in Maine. He plays basketball and baseball. All three of us went to the same high school that my Dad went to and all three of the brothers have been high school basketball state champs.

## **How and why did you decide to attend Cedarville?**

Rachel - We first discovered Cedarville when my oldest sister was looking at colleges. When my mom visited the campus she immediately thought it would be a perfect fit for me. I was looking for a Christian college with solid academics and a competitive basketball program...Cedarville was it! After a visit to the campus, I was convinced that this is where I wanted to be and God was gracious enough to allow me to be here. I went to summer basketball camp and committed to playing basketball under Coach Martin.

Andrew - I originally attended Liberty University to play basketball but after my freshman year I decided to switch to baseball. I transferred to a junior college after Liberty where I played one season of baseball. I was looking for a school to transfer to after junior college and I decided to talk to Cedarville. Both of my parents attended CU so I had always known about it. I visited the school, Coach Manes offered me a scholarship, and the rest is history.

## **How would you summarize your CU athletic career?**

Rachel - My CU athletic career was filled with great memories on and off the court. I enjoyed being part of a competitive basketball program that strived for excellence in all aspects of the game and in life as well. My athletic career will be marked not so much by what I did on the court but the relationships that I built with my teammates and coaches. Playing basketball was a major growing time in my life. Through the ups and downs, I was challenged to mature not only as a basketball player but also in my relationship with God.

Andrew - Unforgettable. The friendships and memories you create with your teammates throughout the school year is unlike any other college experience. Practicing, working out and going on the road with the guys on the team creates a strong bond of friendship that will last beyond CU.

## **What have been some of your special athletic memories?**

Rachel - Team mission trips to the Dominican Republic and Costa Rica were special times of serving along side my teammates. It was such a unique opportunity to use basketball as an opportunity to share Christ. The NAIA National tournament in Sioux City was full of fun memories both on and off the court. It was a great atmosphere of competitive basketball. There were lots of laughs and fun memories with my teammates on those trips as well. Our last trip to the NAIA tournament was a special memory as we made it to the Elite Eight after pulling off two major upsets.

Andrew - Some of the special memories I've had include going to the Dominican Republic with the baseball team in the fall of my first year at CU. We played several Major League Academy teams and were able to share the gospel with them. I also had the privilege of going to the Phillipines with the basketball team from Cedarville. That was an amazing experience and it was certainly very special.

## **What are some lessons God has taught you as a CU student-athlete?**

Rachel - Through all the ups and downs, struggles, and frustrations that come with playing basketball, I have learned the importance of being grounded in Christ rather than life's circumstances. I have learned the importance of having an eternal perspective in all aspects of my life.

Andrew - God has definitely humbled me through athletics in various ways, and He is continually teaching me how to worship him through my play on the field. Worshiping God through my play is applicable to other areas of my life and He is teaching me how worship can occur every moment of the day rather than for thirty minutes before a church service.

## **How have you been able to successfully balance academics, athletics as well as your social life together?**

Rachel - Time management! I had to be disciplined and prioritize to put myself in a position that would allow me to excel and not feel overwhelmed. God always provided me with daily strength to get through a crazy schedule.

Andrew - Well, I had a pretty light load this past year academically so that helped, but on top of that I spent a majority of my time with one of the most hard working and organized girls I have ever met. She helped keep me organized and if I wanted to spend time with her I usually had to bring something to read or study because she studied a lot.

## **Who or what has made the most impact on your spiritual life?**

Rachel - My parents have provided me with solid spiritual guidance and encouragement. I am so grateful for their godly influence in my life and how they have challenged, encouraged, and disciplined me in all aspects of my life, but especially in my spiritual journey.

Andrew - My parents and grandparents have made the most impact on my life spiritually. My parents have always encouraged me in my faith. My dad gives me wise advice and my mom is always praying for me. I grew up living two houses away from my grandparents on my dad's side so they had a lot of influence in my life. My grandfather is always up for a spiritual discussion and he is always recommending books that would be good for me to read.



## **What are your plans after graduation?**

Rachel - Andrew and I are getting married in August and then moving out to Manchester, New Hampshire. I will be going to grad school for my masters of Physician Assistant. We are excited to see what God has in store for us!

Andrew - Immediately following graduation I will have baseball for potentially another two weeks depending on our post-season performance. If, after that, I don't have a job lined up I will drive 21 hours back home to Maine where I will continue to search for jobs in the Manchester, New Hampshire area. I will move to New Hampshire as soon as I have a job and begin working. On August 7th Rachel and I will be married, and then in January she will start grad school in Manchester.

## **What were the circumstances of your deciding to begin a serious relationship?**
