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

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n the 1890s, men and women came to the foothills of Azusa in search of gold. A hundred years later, they still do.

One of the oldest cities in the rich heritage of California's San Cabriel Valley, the city of Azusa has long been noted as a city that serves. From the early days of providing gold to miners in search of their riches, through the first half the of the 20th century in which Azusa grew an exorbitant amount of California's citrus fruit, and into today's industrial production, Azusa has been a vital community in the Southern California landscape.

Known as "The Canyon City," Azusa is strategically located at the mouth of the San Gabriel Canyon. It became the local outlet for the early miners who panned canyon streams for gold. In time, farmers settled in the area and developed one of the most productive citrus growths ever in California. For decades, Azusa's population stood around 6,000 inhabitants. However, following World War II, the city exploded in population through the 1950s much like the rest of Southern California. Industry came to Azusa, such as Aerojet Inc. and Avery Label. American Float Builders, providers of over half the floats in the Tournament of Roses parade, settled in Azusa.

Residents found the greenery of Azusa and the backdrop of the San Gabriel Mountains to be a perfeet mix for the idealistic lifestyle. Likewise, educational leaders were attracted to the Azusa scenery and in 1946, Azusa Pacific University (then known as Pacific Bible College) moved from the urban surroundings of Los Angeles to the then rural settings of Azusa. Together, the city of Azusa and Azusa Pacific grew by leaps and bounds through the 1950s, '60s and '70s. Today, over 42,000 people call Azusa home.

while the university has grown to over 2,200 under grad students and has established itself as the largest Christian university on the west coast.

It was gold that put Azusa on the map, and today it is gold that keeps Azusa on the map. This week, approximately 1,000 student-athletes pursue

track and field gold at Azusa Pacific in the nation's largest collegiate championship meet — the NAIA Outdoor Championships. For the third time in the past seven years, Azusa Pacific's outdoor athletic complex is the home of NAIA Track and Field. Occasionally labeled "The House that Christian Okoye Built," this complex debuted its facilities on October 16, 1986, and was christened by Okove's 162 yards rushing and 3 touchdowns in the Cougars' 49-19 football victory over the University of San Diego. In 1988, the complex hosted its first national championship event when the NAIA Outdoor Track and Field Championships came back to California for the first time in 30 years. Over the course of its 7-year. existence, the complex has hosted such track & field greasts as Dave Johnson, Daley Thompson, Mike Powell, Jackie Joyner-Kersie, Jose Barbosa, Joaquim Cruz, Mike Barnett, Kevin Young and Quincy Watts. In 1992, the world's collegiate record was set in track's most thrilling event - the 100 meters. Azusa Pacific sprinter Davidson Ezinwa, then a junior. blazed an incredible 9.91 on this surface.

Indeed, the setting is just right for the 1995 NAIA Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

ecent evaluations on the state of track and field conclude the sport lacks drawing power because, among other things, on its highest level of competition natural rivalries are thwarted, discouraged and rarely showcased. To those who miss intensity, focus and rivalry, we say, welcome to Azusa.

In its 42-year history, NAIA track and field is dotted with great team clashes such as Abilene Christian vs. Occidental, Texas Southern vs. Mississippi Valley State, Prairie View A&M vs. Southern, and most recently, Azusa Pacific vs. Wavland Baptist.

In the past 24 months, new combatants have developed that are as intense as the old rivalries of yesteryear.

On the women's side, Southern-New Orleans is creeping up on Central State's long-held championship territory. Last February, SUNO yanked the NAIA indoor crown from Central State's tight

grasp, beating the Marauders at their own game sprinting. Now the Knights have their eyes set on stealing Central State's 4-year kingdom in outdoor track & field. It's a fierce battle dripping with pride.

Last year, all 5 NAIA sprint records (100, 200, 400 and both relays) were set, and 4 of them were established by either Central State or SUNO athletes. All 5 could easily come tumbling down again this weekend. SUNO and Central State bring a wealth of sprint talent to Azusa, and most likely the one who wins the most sprints will win the national championship.

In the 100 meters the battle is between Beverly Langley (SUNO) vs. Chanteau White (Central



State). The 200 meters features the clash of Altrice Taylor (SUNO) and Ronalce Davis (Central State). The 400 meters pits Vernetta Rolle (SUNO) against Beverly Grant (Central State). The relays are straight up, head-to-head competition between the 2 most talented and deepest sprint corps in NAIA women's track history.

Away from the SUNO-Central State spotlight, there are plenty of other lady one-on-ones to keep watch over. In the long distance runs of 5,000 and 10,000 meters, Wayland Baptist's unique Rosa Ibarra will try to offset the challenge of Puget Sound's Emily Kellman. Russian Ivana Skladana of Mobile and Valerie Niese of Wisconsin-Parkside waged a classic in February's indoor mile, They should again in the outdoor 1500 meters. Catherine Scott-Pomales of Central State has frustrated Azusa Pacific's Michelle Campbell cach time out in the past year, but Campbell is having a great outdoor season and is primed to catch Scott-Pomales this time around.

The NAJA men have their share of rivalries, as well, though they are uniquely set up. Defending national champion Azusa Pacific is braced for another attack on its crown from Central State. Yet, while the Cougars are going toc-to-toe with Central State, they have to watch their back side for Lubbock Christian, the 1995 NAIA indoor champion. Interestingly, though, Azusa Pacific, Central State and Lubbock Christian will rarely meet headto-head for the team championship. Central State is deep in the sprints. Lubbock Christian is peerless in the distances. And, Azusa Pacific reigns over the field events. The Congars should jump out to a huge lead by Friday evening and then will try to hold on as Central State sprints and Lubbock cruises in an all-day attempt to run down Azusa Pacific by sundown Saturday. The team that performs best in its respective strength should come out the winner. For Azusa Pacific, it would be its 11th national championship in 13 years. Central State is seeking its second in 3 years, while Lubbock is gunning for its first-ever outdoor crown.

Individually, numerous one-on-one battles high-light the men's competition. Chinese natives Hong Li (Azusa Pacific) and Xiaojun Zhang (Findlay) meet on the east side of the Pacific Ocean to engage in a spirited triple jump. Ali Ahmed (SUNO) and Floyd Howell (Central State) figure to go for the open 400 title then square off as anchors in the 4x400-meter relay. Oregon natives Craig Greis (Western Oregon State) and Travis Olson (Linfield) have taken their local javelin battle onto the national stage. Good friends even in competition, Carl Brown (Siena-Heights) and Rene Bustamante (Azusa Pacific) stand in each other's way of multiple NAIA championship titles as they lock horns in the shot put and discus throw.

Perhaps the most engaging rivalry of the weekend though, may be the most drawn out. And what better place to stage this clash of titans than on the home turf of what some believe to be the proving ground of America's best collegiate decathletes. Dating back to last year's NAIA championships, Western Oregon State's Alper Kasapoglu and Azusa Pacific decathletes Tage Peterson and David Pope have waged a 3-way contention for NAIA supremacy in the multi-events. Kasapoglu beat Pope last year to win the decathlon with an NAIA record, Peterson came back to barely edge Kasapoglu and win the indoor pentathlon last February with another NAIA record. Perhaps for Pope, who won the 1992 decathlon title, this is his turn to shine in this 3-man contest.

In this meet of great duels and head-to-head encounters, the NAIA also features 2 of the world's best sprinters. Nigerians Daniel Effiong from Lubbock Christian and Azusa Pacific's Fatima Yusuf are unparalleled in their talent, and they should win

their respective events in perhaps NAIA record times. Effiong is the world's No. 4-ranked male 200-meter sprinter. While, Yusuf is the world's No. 10-ranked female 400-meter sprinter.

After 4 straight years on the west coast, the NAIA Outdoor Championships return to the east next year. But before this weekend is out and the championships leave the Pacific Rim, the NAIA should enjoy one of its most thrilling track and field meets in its long and storied history.

If healthy, 4-time NAIA quarter mile champion Fatima Yusuf, will down-shift her focus to a 100- and 200-meter sweep. Yusuf, an Azusa Pacific junior from Lagos, Nigeria, has the top NAIA 100-meter time this year with a windy 11.36 recorded on this track on Δ pril 22. The challenge to her quest will be great since 5 of last year's 6 All-Americans return, including 5-time national champion, Central State senior Layphane Carnagic, the former NAIA record holder with an 11.54 set as a 1992 fresh-

man. Fellow Marauder, junior Bridgette Edwards, a 7-time sprint All-American, was the 1994 national runner-up and is hungry for her first NAIA crown. Not to be left out of the Central State sprint corps, Chanteau White is a young threat since she is the defending indoor 55-meter champion. Southern-New Orleans sprinting parade is led by Beverly Langley, who was second in the indoor 55 meters, and senior Bahamian Chantel Rolle, a 1993 All-American who has run a windy 11.60.

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Ralph Aldredge, Bobby Morrow and Innocent Egbunike — they are the only athletes ever to hold the NAIA record in both the 100 and 200 meters at the same time, Daniel Effiong of Lubbock Christian wants to join that elite group. To do so, he'll have to run a 20.56-or-better 200 meters and a 10.04-or-better 100 meters. He has done it in the past and is rounding into shape to do it again here in Azusa. Two years ago, Effiong blazed a 9.98 100 meters and this year he has hovered around Ezinwa's record. He has the

skill, now it's just a matter of featuring it in the championship meet. He is easily the best in the 100-meter field, and the real race in this event may be for second place where Dakota State's Tard Smith, Southern-New Orleans' Christian Asiah, Hasting's Allen Haynes and Central State's Sayon Cooper and Sayan Williams should lock horns. Haynes was second here last year with a 10.47. Williams was second to Effiong in the 55 meters at the NAIA indoor championships.

The second log of Fatima Yusuf's double sprint title aspirations concludes with Saturday's sunset. Yusuf, the Azusa Pacific junior, has the best time in the field with an NAIA record-threatening 22.97. Not only is she trying to win both short sprint titles, but she also has the ability to become the first person ever to hold all 3 NAIA sprint records — 100, 200 and 400 meters. It won't come easy though, 6 of last year's 8 finalists are back. Central State's Beverly Grant (second last year), Bridgett Edwards (third last year) and Layphane Carnagie (1993 champ)

are formidable and experienced foes in championship competition. Southern-New Orleans counters with whizzes Altrice Taylor (third at indoors) and Vernetta Rolle, who may not run because she is a favorite in the 400 and 800 meters. Findlay's All-American senior duo of Katina Johnson and Araya Brantley look to emerge from rival Central State's sprint shadow. The NAIA record has fallen 2 of the past 3 years, and any one of these 8 ladies can break it again.

Effiong, a former U.S. junior college champ out of Central Arizona, has run a 20,15. Trinidad Olympian Neil DeSilva of Central State, the 1993 NAIA 200-meter champ, clocked a legal 20,66 in 1992. Dakota State's All-

American Tard Smith has also run a sub-21 200 meters. DeSilva and Smith have the talent to make this an interesting race and push Efficing, who is hoping to become the 14th person in NAIA history to sweep the 100- and 200-meter titles. Defending champ Damon Sims, an Oklahoma Christian junior, knows he had his hands full in trying to repeat. Yet, he has experience on this track—something the other 3 don't—and he knows what it takes to win.



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Southern-New Orleans has the best 400-meter talent in the NAIA. Five Knights are listed among the 9 best times coming into this weekend, led by Altrice Taylor and Vernetta Rolle, both sub-55 second sprinters. Taylor was second at indoors with a 54.93, followed by teammate Selisha Hudson, who ran a 55.96. All-American Lesakay Morgridge was fourth last year in Azusa with a 54.29. SUNO's Patrice Peart is a newcomer to NAIA national competition but she has All-American potential. Central State's multiple All-American Beverly Grant and

Arkansas-Pine Bluff's Madie Chunn appear to be SUNO's chief obstacles in gaining a 5-way sweep of the 400 meters. Grant was an amazing third last year as a mere freshman, posting an impressive 53.15, a time that would have won the event in 8 of the previous 14 NAIA outdoor meets. Chunn is a returning finalist who has a 55.30 on the resume. Oklahoma Baptist's Gilliane Quirin hopes to repeat her All-American honor she collected in February's indoor competition.



Just how talented is Lubbock Christian senior Julius Randich? To put it simply, if he concentrated on a single event, he would easily win it — whatever the event: 1500, steeplechase, 5000 or 10,000 meters. As it is, Randich is stretching his physical limits and will probably run in any 3 of the aforementioned races; and still he is a favorite to win those events and perhaps become the first person ever to win 3 NAIA individual distance titles in the same meet. It is likely he will be part of an outstanding 1500 meters field that includes Julius Achon of Southern-New

Orleans, the indoor mile king who beat Randich, and Taylor's James Njoroge, who was third last year. All 3 runners have flirted with times that would best the NAIA record of 3:43. 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Jason Mohr's 3-year old NAIA steeplechase record is on the endangered list. Lubbock Christian's Simeon Sawe, one of the plentiful distant-running Chaparrals, has a bead on Mohr's 8:43.44 set in 1992. Already this season, Sawe has run a sub-8:35 steeplechase, thus displaying his unequaled talent that could shatter the record. His nearest competitor is teammate and 3time NAIA champ Julius Randich, who may not even feature his 8:45 abilities in this event, saving his energies for the 1500, 5000 and/or 10,000 meters. Erik Gibson, a junior out of George Fox. and Preston Richert, a junior from Southwestern, are the

only returning All-Americans but so far their bests have been more than 30 seconds off Sawe's 1995 best. Gibson was fourth last year and would gladly welcome a cool Southern California Saturday afternoon to best simulate his personal training weather in Northwest Oregon. Cedarville's Pete Simons wants to make his first NAIA Championship showing a memorable one by claiming All-American recognition. Westmont junior Phillip Livingood, a 1994 qualifier who missed the finals by just 2 seconds, could post a point or 2 for the Warriors.



At the NAIA Indoor Championships in Lincoln, Neb., last February, Lubbock Christian scored 33 points in the 3000 meters and added 25 more in the 5000 meters on its way to the national championship. Chaparrals dominated the distance events in Lincoln, and they can again in Azusa. For Lubbock coach Darryl Price, it's a mix and match as to where he'll run all his talented athletes. In fact, some of their running assignments weren't determined until Wednesday. Nonetheless, any one of the following Chaparrals can win the 5000 meters or score very

high. The Chaparral list begins with Peter Tanui, the indoor champ, and continues with the All-American parade of Mike Mamo, Tim Kemei, Levis Anyega, James Bungei, the 1991 and 1992 champion and Julius Randich, the 1993 winner. 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Last year Wayland Baptist senior Rosa Ibarra and Puget Sound senior Emily Kellman staged a thrilling 10,000 meters with Ibarra pulling away over the final lap to collect a 7-second victory. The pair return this year, expecting to lock horns in the 5000 and the 10,000 meters (though Kellman could figure into the 1500 and 3000, thus taking her out of the 5000 and/or 10,000). 

Last year he sidestepped this event, allowing a teammate one last NAIA championship. But there is no mistaking that this is Lubbock Christian senior Julius Randich's event. After all, no one in NAIA history has run 10,000 meters like Randich. As a 1993 sophomore, he set the NAIA standard with a blistering (to both his feet and the clock) 28:16.65, shattering his own 1992 NAIA record by 46 seconds. No one in NAIA history has won the team triple crown championships — cross country, indoor and outdoor track. Lubbock, which is two-thirds of way there, is gunning to be the first, and the Chaparrals' pursuit of the final

jewel appropriately hegins on Randich's shoulders Thursday night in the 10,000 meters. Fellow Chaparrals Jaimes Bungei, second to Randich in the indoor 3000, and Peter Tanui, the indoor 5000 titlist, will pace Randich and battle Life's Wilheim Gidabaday and Malcom Campbell for an additional and all-important 14 points. Members of Azusa Pacific, Central State, Western Oregon and Southern-New Orleans, all who share Lubbock's team title dreams, will watch this event with vested interest — it's a key to Lubbock's success.

bring life to it. Football has Buddy Ryan, and basketball embraces Charles Barkley. Some say tennis lost its luster when Jimmy Connors and John McEnroe faded away. Yet, the shot put and discus throw have never had an advocate to the people. They are nearly lost arts in the American sports culture. So enter Carl Brown, a burly senior out of Siena Heights College in Adrian, Mich., who is out to raise the shot and discus from the ashes. Brown is a character, who admits that often times his antices are misinterpreted for showboating and arrogance rather than a honest burst of youthful enthusiasm. No athlete this weekend will hoot and holler like Brown in the discus ring. He may even get a bad case of dance fever during the competition. And you'd think he was using a hasketball they way he weaves the shot ground his legs during warm-ups.

"I always jump around," explained Brown. "A lot of people may think I'm cocky, but that's not it. I do it to relax me and stay relaxed. I'm so nervous all the time."

Perhaps it was nervous energy that eventually put Brown at Siena Heights and on this threshold of track & field fame. In 1988, his life became sidetracked once he graduated from Albion (Mich.) High. The Navy didn't want him, his junior college didn't want him and his 2 daughters couldn't stay with him. For this 25-year old general studies major, life was miserable as recently as 3 years ago.

However, Brown had his personal advocates — like Ron Gunn, legendary track coach at Southwestern Michigan Junior College, and Siena Heights' track coach Tim Bauer, and Brown's grandmother, Johnnie Craig.


"Coach Gunn stood by me when I got in trouble," said Brown. "Coach Bauer screwed my head back on when I lost it emotionally. And my grand-



mother? Well, she and God are the backbone of my life. I owe everything to her. If I can afford it, I'm bringing her to Azusa to watch me."

In his own unique way, Carl Brown understands how the shot and discus can use a good advocate. When he's done with track, he'll turn his attention to the troubled youth in Southeast Michigan. He knows that for some, all they need is encouragement and someone in their corner.

"Last summer I worked with guys who didn't have the best backgrounds. I really saw myself in those guys. What saved me from the streets was my coach. I want to show these guys that there is light at the end of the tunnel. The hurdles I've jumped over have brought me here, but it wasn't easy. Sometimes, all these kids need is encouragement." An advocate in other words.



No lady in NAIA history has ever won the marathon and the 10,000 meters. Last year, however, Deb Chavis, a senior out of Siena Heights, finished fifth in the 10,000 and came back 2 days later to post a third in the marathon. That is about as close as anyone has ever come. So this year, can she become the first ever to pull off that rare double? It is a daunting task for any competitor, but Chavis is a rare athlete. She already has a 3:06

marathon to her credit and with that becomes the favorite to win Saturday morning. Doane junior Heather Thompson, who was fourth in 1994 with a 3:10, and Andrea Nye, a senior at Western Washington who recorded a 3:30 last year, have run this particular course and have an advantage on many others in the field. Southwestern's Raquel Rios has run a 1:22:12 half marathon, the best among all those who qualified by that venue.

PREVIEW

An event run by itself or in an Olympic setting, the marathon is a collegiate championship event unique to the NAIA. Life senior John Bartlett, last year's winner in 2 hours, 27 minutes and 30 seconds, is trying to become only the fourth repeat champion, but the conditions need to be right. Lasat year, midmorning heat got the best of several runners during the final 5 miles. NAIA officials hope to enhance Bartlett's chances and the championship hopes of every other runner by moving the marathon to 5:15 a.m. to take advantage of cooler morning tem-

peratures. If the weather cooperates and Bartlett's body is willing, the NAIA record could fall in the streets of Azusa and Glendora. The 100-meter hurdles race is simply a 2-lady sprint. Former Californian Catherine Scott-Pomales, a junior out of Central State who competed at nearby Mt. San Jacinto Junior College during her 1992 freshman season, and Azusa Pacific junior Michelle Campbell are in the midst of what appears to be a 3-year battle for queen of the NAIA hurdles. So far, the Olympian Scott-Pomales has held the upper hand, beating Campbell in last year's 100-meter hurdles and this year's indoor 55-meter hurdles. However, for Campbell, the 1994 indoor champion,

this may be her year. Already she has blazed a sizzling, though windy, 13.17 to finish fourth at the Mt. SAC Relays. Scott-Pomales has a 13.79 to her credit. Both are foreign athletes, Scott-Pomales from Jamaica and Campbell from England. In addition, both are married with Campbell's spouse being former L.S. Olympic hurdler Tonie Campbell. Three-time NAIA high hurdle champ James Rollins, a senior at Central State who won this event as a 1992 freshman, seeks a second outdoor hurdle jewel to add to his NAIA crowns (he won the 1994 and 1995 indoor titles as well). Rollins, who was disappointed after finishing second last year, has clocked a 13.98 and is trying to become only the uinth NAIA champ ever to post a sub-14-second 110-meter hurdle race. Rollins has no major threat to his title pursuit. In the finals he may be pushed by Azusa Pacific senior decathlete David Pope, who finished sec-

ond to Rollins at the indoor meet, and Missouri Valley sophomore Detrick Davis, who has had a strong outdoor season after placing eighth in the indoor finals. NAIA indoor finalists Justin Lydon of Willamette and Scott Huston of Oklahoma Christian should be finalists again and perhaps collect All-American honors as well. Marian sophomore Spencer McKenney is making his second appearance in Azusa and can draw upon championship experience to give him All-America potential this time.

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Central State junior Catherine Scott-Pomales was the 1994 NAIA Female Outstanding Performer for one simple reason. She became the first-female ever to pull off the difficult task of winning both the 100-meter hurdle and 400-meter hurdle races. This year, she is out to prove that though the feat is unique, it can be done with regularity. She is among the favorites in the highs, but she is the clear cut, casy-pickin' favorite in the intermediates. She comes in with the best time in the field, a full 3

seconds ahead of her nearest competitor. Among last year's finalists who return, senior Amy Carlson of Willamette and senior Tanya Wilde of Moorbead State appear to be among Scott-Pomales' chief rivals. George Fox junior Liz Stephens, who did not get out of the first round last year, could be a finalist this year and perhaps an All-American. Central Washington senior Karla Dodd, a 1994 semi-finalist, is among those who could push for national runner-up honors.

PREVIEW

Experts say it's the most grueling event in all of track & field. The 400-meter hurdler must sprint for 55 seconds while hurdling objects every 7 to 9 steps. He can not lose his intensity nor his focus. And his reward when he crosses the finish line is shear pain. Monte Raymond of Southern-New Orleans thrives on that kind of pain; so too does Central State Anthony Dean-Neil. Both men are sub-52-second hurdlers and the leaders of a brigade of pain-seekers racing for an NAIA title that is open for

the taking this year. There is no clear cut favorite. Western Oregon senior Rio Okmura was here last year but did not get out of the first round. This year, not only should he advance out of the preliminaries but he could garner some All-American recognition to boost Western Oregon's national championship aspirations. Doane's Dan Marousek is an All-American candidate as well.

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Sophomore Danielle Kirk is back on home turf. The Southern California native who grew up in the San Fernando Valley has walked her way east to Wisconsin-Parkside, by way of Cal State Northridge and Azusa Pacific. Last year, Kirk won All-American honors at Azusa Pacific (the only athlete outside Wisconsin-Parkside to do so) after finishing fifth in the walk with a 14:58. She comes back this year with the top time in the nation and the favorite to win with her 14:24 stride, Fellow Ranger junior Sue Kisting was the national runner-up last year

with a 14:27.56 and figures to battle Kirk for the victory this year. Kirk's teammate, senior Ali DeWitt plans to wants amends for last year's disqualification. An All-American award is likely for DeWitt, who won such an honor with a fifth place showing in 1993. Simon Fraser's Anne-Marie Oswald, who was eighth last year as a freshman, and Joanne Fox (11th as a sophomore last year) appear to be the top walkers outside Parkside.

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For years they have endured the chuckles of bystanders, but the walkers of Wisconsin-Parkside don't mind. They just waddle on by those who don't understand their event, the only one of its kind held on any collegiate championship level. The most diverse distance program in the nation, Wisconsin-Parkside runs and walks to unparalleled successes. A Parksider has won the walk (a 10,000 meter event from 1974 to 1992) the past 12 years in a row and 18 of the past 21. Five of last year's six walking All-Americans hailed from Parkside. Indeed, this is

Wisconsin-Parkside's very own event. Senior Tim Seamon, a 3-time national champ (won the 1991 10,000 walk) is back to defend his crown, as is teammate and national runner-up junior Al Heppner. Sophomore Will Van Axen returns to improve upon a fourth place finish. Will Leggett and Dave Mitchell are hoping to get their first-ever All-American walking papers. Can anyone break up Parkside? Western Washington's Don Wesley and Simon Fraser's Ian Hetherington are the best bets, but expect a Parksider to waltz . . . er walk to the title.



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Central State's Catherine Scott-Pomales

Big-time meets can rattle the most seasoned athlete. But for Central State junior Catherine Scott-Pomales, they simply propel her to big-time marks.

Most legends are born over time, but it took Scott-Pomales just one championship meet to etch her name among the all-time

NAIA greats. In Azusa last year, she became the first female ever to win both the NAIA's 100- and 400-meter hurdles, blazing a personal best 13.79 in the highs and a stadium record 56.57 in the intermediates. By the time Scott-Pomales anchored Central State's 4x100m relay teamto an NAIA record 44.32, she had sewn up the meet's Female Outstanding Performer honor.

Even she was surprised by her amazing hurdles accomplishment — one that track experts call the most difficult double in the sport. The 21-year old Jamaican expected to win the intermediates but she thought Azusa Pacific's Michelle Campbell had the edge in the 100-meter hurdles.

As a result, a rivalry developed. Campbell was an odds-on favorite to walk away with the high hurdles title. However, Scott-Pomales, a veteran of 7 Penn Relays and the 1992

Olympics, overcame her nerves and pulled off the upset.


"I didn't think I'd win the highs," recalled Scott-Pomales. "Going into the finals I was so nervous. Wichelle is a determined athlete and a good hurdler. To be honest, I was kind of scared. I was so relieved when I won the race."


This past February, the two met again at the NAIA Indoor Championships in Lincoln, Neb. And again, Scott-Pomales won, posting a 7.74 in the 55-meter hurdles to nip Campbell's 7.79. Despite their intense competitiveness, the 2 hurdlers enjoy a healthy friendship.

"I consider her a good friend," Scott-Pomales said of Campbell. "She is always very nice to me. Some people in your own event won't talk to you. They treat you as the enemy. But Michelle always speaks to me and tries to help me develop my technique, and I try to do the same for her. Plus, I respect her talent, so she motivates me to practice."

A product of track powerhouse Vere Technical in Clarendon, Jamaica, Scott-Pomales came to the United States in 1993 to run at nearby Mt. San Jacinto Junior College in Hemet, Calif. Though she enjoyed I season there, she followed the Vere-Central State pipeline (also traveled by current Marauders Beverly Grant, Bridgette Edwards and Ronalee Davis) and took up the hurdles for the first time ever. She recently clocked a personal best 56.42 to finish second in the intermediates at the prestigious Penn Relays.

Undefeated in 3 NAJA championship events, Scott-Pomales knows the pressure is on her to repeat her double victory. Nerves, however, will not get the best of her. She thrives under the pressure of big-time meets.





The last 4 NAIA sprint relay championships — whether the 400 meters or 1600 meters — have been nose-to-nose battles between Central State and Southern-New Orleans. The Marauders won this event last year, screaming to an NAIA and stadium record 44.32 while beating SUNO by more than a full second. That record is in trouble once again. All season long, the Marauders have been flirting with another mid-44-second spin around the track. Chateau White, Bridgette Edwards, Catherine Scott-Pomales, Layphane Carnagic and Crystal

Finlayson are hoping to sprint Central State to its fifth straight 4x100-meter relay title. Southern-New Orleans, which is churning out 45-second 1-lappers, counters with the likes of speedsters Beverly Langley, Chantell Rolle and Lesakay Morgridge. It's a fierce rivalry that may learn toward Central State because of its depth. Arkansas-Pine Bluff and Findlay, perennial finalists in this event, are talented in their own right and should show well for themselves.







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Possibly the women's team championship will come down to this event—and the 2 likely challengers will square off for the event title and perhaps the meet championship. Reigning NAIA indoor team champion Southern-New Orleans, which last year set the NAIA and stadium record in this event, has another set of deep and talented quarter milers, led by Altrice Taylor and Vernetta Rolle. They've already posted an early season 3:37.42, just 4 seconds off last year's record pace. Four-time defending NAIA outdoor champion Central State should be nipping at

SUNO's heels the entire 4 laps. SUNO posted a 3:41.18 in Lincoln, Neb., at the indoor championships to beat Central State by 2 seconds. Since Azusa Pacific has Fatima Yusuf, the world's No. 10-ranked quarter miler, the Cougars are a factor. Not to be left out, Findlay was fourth last year and third at indoors. This anchor leg may be a thrilling sprint between SUNO's Taylor, Central State's Catherine Scott-Pomales, Azusa Pacific's Yusuf and Findlay's Katina Johnson.



It's been 21 years since a Vanguard has won an NAIA individual title, and now 2 brothers — Kevin and Brian Carlson — are hoping to put SCC back in the NAIA national track picture by winning Saturday's high jump. Both Carlsons, who double their athletic pleasure as Vanguard basketballers, are 7-foot jumpers. But then so too is Doane's Quinten Esser, who has something on the Carlsons —

NAIA championship experience. Esser, looking to become Doane's first ever NAIA high jump champ, was fifth at the 1995 indoors. However, it was fellow Nebraskan Chad Drehle of Hastings who won that particular competition with an even 7-foot jump. Linfield's Scott Radetich, the lone returning outdoor All-American (third last year), is a 7-foot high jumper like everyone else it seems. 

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Five All-Americans from a year ago are back, including the charismatic and defending national champion, Siena Heights' Carl. 

Azusa Pacific's David Pope

A zusa Pacific's David Pope is perched on a pedestal that views his promising future. When he ponders how he got here, he realizes 3 turning points brought him to a threshold of track & field glory.

The first came in 1991, when as an 18-year old freshman standing in the middle of Notre Dame Stadium, he concluded that track was more enjoyable than Irish football. Without another thought, he turned in his helmet, packed his bags and stunned everybody—the Pope left Notre Dame.

"I wanted to go to UCLA or Florida," he remembered, "but I visited Aznsa Pacific and loved the place."

Working out in a warm climate with world class decathlete Dave Johnson also made Azusa Pacific appealing. However, Pope's dad, Isaac, wouldn't allow David to accept a scholarship his first year, citing he had to earn it—and did he ever. As a mere 1992 redshirt freshman, Pope won the NATA decathlon with 7,040 points.

Now with a scholarship and national title in hand, greater success seemed a given. But it wasn't. Frustration ruled for the next 18 months. Three shoulder separations, a surgery and a broken leg nearly brought Pope's decathlon career to a halt. He missed the 1993 NAIAs, and though he rebounded to finish second last year, he remained frustrated by unmet potential.

Enter the next significant moment.

"I beat myself up for a long time because I knew I had the

tools, but I was no Dave Johnson," said Pope. "Coach Franson kept saying I was just a pup, that it would take time. I then realized that the decathlon is a long haul. To succeed, it must become your lifestyle."

Relaxed and patient with himself, Pope began to blossom. He made noticeable improvements week by week. Then came the defining moment.

This past April 15, Pope tallied 7,753 points, the third best mark in Azusa Pacific history and a personal record by more than 400 points. But more importantly, that qualified him for the U.S. Track & Field Championships in Sacramento, Calif., in mid-June.

"Ever since I got here all I ever wanted was to qualify for the U.S. Championships," said Pope. "I was lost in a daze afterwards, stunned and thinking 'what do I do now, die in peace?""

Instead of dying, Pope has reset his goals. He once dreamed of competing in the 1996 Atlanta Olympics. Now he trains for them. "Dave Johnson said to me that the decathlon constantly changes your mindset," said Pope. "I understand now what he meant then."

Perhaps this weekend will be another milestone in David Pope's life — the moment when papel supremacy took over the decathlon.



The Pacific Northwest has always been a storehouse of great javelin throwers, and a quintet from the great northwest takes its regional battle for supremacy onto the national stage. Linfield's Travis Olson, the national runner-up last year with a toss of 198-4, and Western Oregon State's Craig Gries, who finished third, a foot behind Olson, figure to battle for the title. Pacific Lutheran's duo of Brian Van Valey, who was ninth last year, and Dan Carlson should be among the elite eight by sundown Thursday. Western Washington's Tim Johnson has eclipsed the 200-foot barrier this

year, a mark that would make him national runner-up each of the past 2 years. Southwestern's Eric Mauldin has thrown nearly 200 feet and could snatch the crown from the Pacific Northwest gang. Though they don't come from the land of giant trees and cool summers, Howard Payne's Casey Pearce and Jamestown's Chase Cooper are sophomores — and in this particular event, in this particular year, that seems to be the only necessary requirement to be an All-American candidate (Olson, Grics, Van Valey and Carlson are also sophomores).

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Azusa Pacific is known for its multi-event athletes and junior Carmen Gage does not intend to be left out of that clite group of Cougars. Last year, she won 3 of the 7 events, which included a heptathlon record 2:12.65 in the 800 meters, to score a school-record 5,039 points and win the heptathlon. She is back to defend her title, which has been a frequent accomplishment since, in the past 14 years, 4 previous NAIA champs success-

fully defended their titles. This past February Gage won the NAIA pentathlon, the indoor version of this multi-event. She figures to be challenged by Mary freshman Cindy Leingang, an outstanding high jumper, who pushed Gage for the pentathlon title (she finished third). Western New Mexico's Reda Riddle was ninth last year but she could win All-American honors this year with her 4,400-point potential.

Men's Decathlon

PREVIEW

If this talented trio isn't at Atlanta in 1996, they likely will be in Sydney, Australia, for the 2000 Olympic games. Western Oregon State's Alper Kasapoglu, the defending NAIA champion and record holder (7,596), already has Olympic experience, representing Turkey in the 1992 Barcelona Games. Azusa Pacific's Tage Peterson and David Pope, the 1992 NAIA champ, are two of the United States' most promising young decathletes. They come into the meet with the top NAIA marks this year, and both have qualified for this summer's U.S. Championships. The 20-year old Peterson has a season best

7,788 points. Pope, a former Notre Dame footballer, has a personal record 7,753 points. This trio was the top three a year ago, then staged a classic for the indoor pentathlon crown in February (won by Peterson), and should do the same this weekend in the decathlon. It is an intense rivalry and whoever wins should claim another NAIA record. All-American Rodney Wallace of Wayland Baptist and John Heckenlively of Doane are back as well to make this perhaps the best decathlon competition in NAIA history.

The NAIA - Providing Balanced Athletics Programs for 60,000 Student-Athletes



hroughout its history, the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) has provided strong leadership for all aspects of intercollegiate sports. Since its introduction of intercollegiate championship basketball in 1937, the NAIA has maintained the highest standards while administering first-rate athletics programs.

Time and time again, the NAIA has stepped forward to address the important issues of the day — be it racial integration in the '40s and '50s or establishing the first women's championship program in 1980. The NAIA has not been afraid to enact changes while others have watched and waited.

In the past decade, presidents of the NAIA colleges and universities have assumed a position of responsible leadership. The NAIA's Council of Presidents, the organization's primary governing body, is comprised of 32 college and university presidents from all regions of the United States.

With its major emphasis on educational development, it was natural for the NAIA to further strengthen academic eligibility requirements in the mid-'80s. All NAIA participating student-athletes must maintain a certain grade-point-average (GPA) while accumulating credit hours for a declared academic degree. Unlike other associations, NAIA student-athlete academic eligibility is monitored on a term-by-term basis.

The All-America Scholar-Athlete program, a long-standing NAIA tradition, recognizes junior and senior student-athletes with a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.5 (on a 4.0 scale). This past year, more than 700 NAIA student-athletes were so honored, representing 225 member institutions.

During the '90s, the waves of change once again washed over the NAIA. The membership voted to institute affiliated conference and regional groupings and discontinue the use of district play as a means of qualification for national championships, marking the first time since the NAIA's creation that district competition would not be used.

Since 1937, the NAIA has administered athletics programs and championships in proper balance with the overall collegiate educational experience. Serving higher education in this manner is a responsibility the NAIA does not take lightly. It is a relationship built on confidence and trust — a relationship strengthened year after year. The future of 60,000 young people is too important to handle any other way.

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
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
