SUMMER SCHOOL

Cedarville College offers two sessions of Summer School. Each session runs five weeks, six days each week. The first session open June 11 and closes July 14. The

second session opens July 16 and closes August 18. Six credits may be earned in collegiate subjects in each of these sessions, or a total of twelve collegiate credits for both sessions. The school is open to high school students, high school graduates, college students, college graduates, teachers of elementary and high school subjects, any who wish to train for teaching in elementary or high school, any who desire to prepare for the ministry of the Gospel, and any who wish to prepare for standing in technical or special schools.

SUBJECTS OFFERED

Cedarville College Summer School offers the following subjects: Bible, Botany, Chemistry, Economics Education, English, French, Greek, History, Latin, Mathematics, Philosophy, Physics, Political Science, Psychology, Sociology, Speech, Theology, Zoology. See the curricula. All credits earned in education and college subjects will be received towards the Bachelor's degree.

All high school subjects for high school students who are either graduates or in high school at the present time and who wish to make up either back work or prepare more fully for college entrance. Also any other subjects outside of college and high school subjects that may be requested.

WHO MAY ATTEND

High School students, high school graduates, college students and all other persons who wish to take up college subjects or Theological Seminary subjects will be admitted to the Summer School.

This estimate is high. In most cases the total cost will be about \$50 for the above items for five weeks.

PRACTICE TEACHING

Opportunity will be given for practice teaching in the elementary field during the Summer Session. Since the facilities are limited, it is desirable that anyone interested in earning credits in practice teaching make early application, so that a place may be provided. The fee for Practice Teaching is two dollars and fifty cents per credit hour.

COURSES IN EDUCATION

Theory courses in education in both the elementary and high school fields, meeting the requirements for the education major, will be offered in the summer school. This affords an excellent opportunity to earn additional credits toward the provisional state certificate.

CEDARVILLE COLLEGE

Next September marks the opening of the forty-first year of Cedarville College. Thousands of students have received a complete or partial education in Cedarville College. Over six-hundred have become alumni of Cedarville College. Our alumni are located in practically every state of the United States and also in several other countries.

Our alumni have entered all vocations. Many of them are holding positions of influence and responsibility. They are farmers, mechanics, merchants, bankers, teachers, attorneys, legislators, congressmen, physicians, missionaries, ministers of the gospel, and in various other pursuits.

OUR STUDENTS

Cedarville College is a co-educational college. During these forty years more than twenty states and several foreign countries have been represented in Cedarville College.

These students have been all this time identified, for the most part, with some church. This year they are one-hundred per cent members of the various churches. Among our churches the following have been and are represented: Presbyterian, U. S. A., Presbyterian, U. S., United Presbyterian, Reformed Presbyterian, Associate Presbyterian, Methodist Episcopal, Methodist Protestant, Baptist, Episcopalian, Christian, Disciples of Christ, Lutheran, Reformed, Adventist, Christian Science, Friends, Catholic, and Jews.

Nationalities among the students are and have been American, English, Scotch, Irish, Canadian, French, German, Italian, Korean, and Chinese.

Our students come from village, city and rural dis-

tricts. Twenty-four counties in Ohio alone and over thirty villages and cities of Ohio are represented in the student body this year.

LOCATION

Cedarville College is located in the village of Cedarville, Greene County, Ohio. Cedarville is a beautiful and typical college town of about 1100 inhabitants. It was founded over one hundred years ago by Scotch, Irish, German, and Dutch peoples. It is made up of conservative loyal, American families. It is noted for its good homes, splendid schools, and excellent churches. Cedarville has paved streets, is well-lighted, has a modern system of water-works, is supplied with natural gas, and has enterprising business houses and one of the largest paper mills in the United States.

Near Cedarville is one of Ohio's famous mounds, and an old fort. The cliffs of Massies Creek noted for beauty, are about one-half mile from Cedarville, while the famous gorge of Clifton is only four miles away.

Cedarville is located in a rich agricultural community. Routes 42 and 72 and the main line of the Pennsylvania Railroad pass through Cedarville. These routes give easy access in all directions over the best of roads to all parts of our country.

Cedarville is only 8 miles from Xenia, 13 from Springfield, 24 from Dayton, 26 from Washington C. H., 22 from London, 44 from Troy, 53 from Piqua, 46 from Columbus, and 62 from Cincinnati.

Cedarville is the birthplace of the late Whitelaw Reid, former owner and publisher of the New York Tribune, and ambassador to King James' Court.

EXPENSES

One of the advantages in attending College at Cedarville is the low cost to the student. The total expense to non-resident students runs from \$250 to \$350 for the collegiate year of nine months. This includes tuition, furnished room in a private home, electric light, gas, hot water or furnace heat, text-books, and good table board.

Quite a number of students reduce even the above expenses by working to make at least part of their way.

A limited number of jobs and scholarships are open to students.

FACULTY

Cedarville College has always maintained an able staff of professors. Its faculty have gotten their higher education in such colleges and universities as Franklin, Monmouth, Wooster, Ohio Wesleyan, Wittenberg College, Denison University, Maryville College, Indiana University, Ohio State University, Northwestern University, Bowling Green State College, Ohio Northern University, and Purdue University.

The faculty are men and women of experience in their fields. They always are sympathetic with the students and bend every effort to encourage the students to do their best in preparation for their life's work.

In the above curriculum, the electives must include college requirements, majors and minors as specified for the Arts Curriculum.

A Major Study (a study selected by the student and including eighteen semester-hours of collegiate work in some subject of study ordinarily taught in secondary schools, for instance, English, Latin, Biology, or History). In order to major in any subject, the student must have the prerequisite high school units required by the Department of Education of the State of Ohio. The following are the number of units prerequisite to each study: English (public speaking, civics, literature, rhetoric) 3; history (political science, civics) 2; social science (economics, sociology, ethics, philosophy, logic) 1; biological science (biology, zoology, botany, physiology, agriculture) 1; physical science (physics, chemistry) 2; earth science (geology, geography, physiography) 1; mathematics (algebra, geometry, trigonometry, astronomy, statistics, etc.) 2; French 2; German 2; Spanish 2; Greek 2; Latin 4. Five semester hours of collegiate credit in any subject may be offered in lieu of each unit of the high school prerequisite in that subject.

Two Minor Studies (including twelve semester-hours of collegiate work in subjects of study ordinarily taught in secondary schools). The same requirements as to prerequisite high school units apply to the minor studies as to the major study, as stated above. Required work, as well as elective may be counted toward the major and minor studies.

Elective studies in addition to those specified above to an amount sufficient to make a total of one hundred and twenty semester hours.

The completion of the above curriculum secures the A.B. degree from Cedarville College, and the Four-Year State Provisional Certificate.

PRE-PROFESSIONAL CURRICULA

By care in choosing electives the Arts and Arts-Science curricula can easily be adapted to the needs for all pre-professional preparation. Students should confer with the professors of the departments wherein their interests lie.

THE ARTS CURRICULUM

Requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts

Upon the completion of the following requirements, which comprise the arts curriculum, the degree of Bachelor of Arts is conferred:

1. Bible (six semester-hours selected from this department);
2. Rhetoric (six semester-hours);
3. English (six semester-hours);
4. Foreign Language (from twelve to sixteen semester-hours, including two years' work in one language or one year's work in each of two languages, selected from the following: French, German, Latin, Greek, Hebrew, Spanish);
5. Science (eight semester-hours, in any one of the following sciences: Zoology, Botany, Chemistry, or Physics, each science being pursued throughout an entire collegiate year);
6. History (three semester-hours, a required course in American history);
7. Oratory (four semester-hours);
8. Argumentation and Debating (four semester-hours);
9. General Psychology (three semester-hours);
10. Logic (three semester-hours);
11. Social Science (three semester-hours, selected from the departments of economics, sociology, and political science);
12. Ethics (three semester-hours);
13. Apologetics (three semester-hours);
14. A Major Study (a study selected by the student and including eighteen semester-hours' work in any one department of study). Work required in any department may be counted as a part of the major study in that department, except that work in the first year of a foreign language in college cannot be counted;
15. A Minor Study (including twelve semester-hours' work to be selected by the student from a department closely related to the major study, with the advice and

consent of the professor at the head of the department in which the major study is taken). Work required in any department may be counted as a part of the minor study in that department;

16. Elective Studies (in addition to those specified above, to an amount sufficient to make a total of one hundred and twenty semester hours, which is the number required in the arts curriculum for the degree of Bachelor of Arts). These electives may be chosen by the student from any department of instruction.

17. Physical Education: In addition to those specified above, four hours of physical education are required, but they do not count towards a degree.
