THREE LIBRARY FACULTY SUCCESSFULLY COMPLETE UNIVERSITY FACULTY REVIEWS



Lynne Funtik, *Senior Reference Librarian*, **Susan Winn**, *Reference Librarian*, and **Greg Martin**, *Curriculum Materials Center Librarian*, have successfully completed their faculty reviews as part of the new University non-tenure faculty review program. During the 2004/2005 academic year, they were involved in preparing detailed

professional portfolios, participating in evaluative interviews, and were the subjects of review reports. The portfolio and recommendations were submitted to the Academic Vice President, who reviewed the materials and rendered a decision. As a result Greg, Lynne, and Susan were extended a multi-year employment commitment by the University.

ANOTHER RARE BIBLE ADDED TO THE BIBLE HERITAGE COLLECTION



A recent opportunity to purchase another rare English Bible has provided additional breadth to the early English Bibles well represented in the *Centennial Library Bible Heritage Collection*. A quarto version of the **Rheims New Testament**, a first edition published in 1582, has been added to the collection. By the 1580's, the Roman Catholic Church had lost the battle to suppress English language translations of the Bible.

Thus, the Church of Rome determined that they would at least have their own official Roman Catholic English translation. Using the Latin Vulgate as a source text, the Rheims New Testament was published in 1582. Because it was translated at the Roman Catholic College in the city of Rheims, France, it was known by that name. The Roman Catholic English Old Testament, called the Duoai, because it was translated at the Roman Catholic College in the city of Douai, France, was completed in 1609. The combined project is now commonly referred to as the Rheims-Douai Version.

LIBRARY FACILITY UPGRADES CONTINUE WITH THE ADDITION OF NEW CASUAL FURNITURE



The fiberglass casual furniture, a fixture in the Centennial Library since its construction in 1987, is now a thing of the past. Those units have been replaced throughout the Library with comfortable individual seating, some with tablet arm inserts to accommodate laptop computers. In addition, several round group study tables have been placed in the casual reading area at the entrance to the Library. We hope to soon add a plasma screen


television to this area to accommodate news and special events on a regular basis, similar to what is available in the Student Center.

The addition of this new casual furniture completes the current project of upgrading the Library facility begun in 2002. This project has involved upgrading restrooms, replacing most of the carpeting, replacing selected furniture, re-configuring the reference area, re-painting a number of public and office areas, expanding network and electrical service, adding public access computers, and providing e-mail “e-check” stations.

Recognizing Faculty Scholarship




Cheryl Irish, *Associate Professor of Education*

Carrying the Torch to Their World

The Messianic Jewish Epistles: Exposition from a Messianic Jewish Perspective.
Tustin, CA: Ariel Ministries, 2005. 478 pages

This first in the *Ariel's Bible Commentary* series seeks to provide a commentary on the five epistles in the New Testament written to Jewish believers dealing with issues specific to their experiences. This commentary on Hebrews, James, I and II Peter, and Jude focuses on two major problems facing the first century Messianic Jewish community, persecution and false doctrine. Fruchtenbaum, a Messianic Jewish believer and the writer of eight previous books and commentaries on Hebrew Christianity, is the founder and director of Ariel Ministries, which is dedicated to the evangelism of Jewish people and the discipleship of Jewish and Gentile believers from a Messianic Jewish frame of reference.

LIBRARY HOURS EXPANDED

In response to student input about Library service hours and the availability of resources to respond, the Centennial Library hours on Monday through Thursday have been extended to 11:30 p.m. for the 2005/2006 academic year. As long as the Library is able to respond to changes in student regulations, the current policy for Library hours during the Fall and Spring semesters is for the **Library to close one-half hour before student curfew on Monday through Thursday**. With these additional hours, the Library is now open 87.25 hours per week.
