LIBRARY NEWS Staff and Service Highlights

OHIOLINK FUNDING AFFECTED BY OHIO BUDGET DIFFICULTIES

OhioLINK is an integral part of the ability of the Centennial Library to provide information resources to our faculty and students. Because of the current State of Ohio budget difficulties, OhioLINK has been and is under significant financial pressure. State support of Ohio higher education will decline in the upcoming state capital budget and is unlikely to increase in the next operating budget. Consequently, OhioLINK is facing an anticipated annual shortfall from more than \$500,000 to more than \$1 million. The result is that some of the OhioLINK and library resources currently available are being eliminated and others may no longer be available in the future. OhioLINK funds are spent in combination with member library funds in order to provide a wide array of resources. Academic libraries across the state, including the Centennial Library, have picked up additional costs transferred from the OhioLINK budget in order to maintain current services and resources, placing increasing pressure on library budgets.

LIBRARY PARTICIPATES IN GRADUATE SCHOOL CAREER ACTIVITIES

As part of an effort to promote library science as a career option for Cedarville University students, the Centennial Library faculty recently participated in two graduate school programs sponsored by Career Services.

Graduate School: Getting In and Getting Out, on January 19, gave current students the opportunity to hear from a recent Cedarville alumnus about the process of choosing and applying to graduate

school and the experience of being a graduate student. The program concluded with an opportunity for over 40 students to meet with a faculty member in their area of interest. A Library faculty member represented library career options.

On January 20, *Graduate School Career Link* showcased more than 20 graduate schools. Students were able to visit representatives from schools offering a variety of graduate programs. The Centennial Library faculty hosted a library science career table, with information about the various accredited graduate schools and the specializations within the profession. Although the student turnout was lower than anticipated, Career Services intends to make it an annual event and has a number of ideas which will increase student participation. In addition to meeting with interested students, the librarians were able to encourage faculty to remember library science as a career option when advising students in all majors. This project was led by **Julie Deardorff**, *Assistant Library Director for Collection Services*.

Library Resource and Service Updates

RESOURCEFINDER DEVELOPED BY LIBRARY FACULTY

Are your students struggling to find the right resources to begin their research? Is **Google™** their first and maybe only place for research? Are your students procrastinating because they can't find "anything" in the library? In response to these questions the Centennial Library reference librarians have created a new database to help students start their research called



Resource Finder is a tool for locating selected Centennial Library research materials, databases, and web sites by subject.

Students choose the types of material needed (i.e. Book Reviews, Articles, or Statistics), then choose their subject (i.e. Current Issues, Health and Medicine, Law). Additional options include limiting by format (electronic, print, or web sites only).

To locate **Resource Finder** from the Library Web site, click on **Resource Finder** under the heading **Research**

The Resource Finder lists reference books we recommend to start your research. You can create a customized list of resources by subject. Select source(s), a subject, and limits, then click the "Find Matching Resources" button to create your custom research guide. **Hint:** Try searching with "All Sources" selected first. If you get too many books, try specific sources.

ADDITIONAL VIDEOS NOW AVAILABLE ON-LINE FROM THE OHIOLINK DIGITAL VIDEO COLLECTION

In early 2003, an extensive collection of videos from the Films for the Humanities was made available on-line through *OhioLINK's Digital Video Collection*. Recently, with funding provided from all the OhioLINK member libraries, over 800 additional videos were added to that collection. The new additions include programs from **PBS** and from **Annenberg**. The PBS videos will include series such as American Experience, Frontline, Ken Burns productions, NOVA, and Scientific American Frontiers. The Annenberg videos will include such titles as American Cinema, Brain and Mind Teaching Modules, Discovering Psychology, Economics USA, Failing Forward, Lost in Translation, Rural Communities, and Seasons of Life.

The videos area accessed from servers in Columbus and will play on campus computers using *RealONE Player*. OhioLINK has licensed the content of the videos to allow for unlimited simultaneous users, and to maintain an infrastructure to support unlimited simultaneous use. Access points to the videotapes will include the Central OhioLINK Library Catalog and the OhioLINK Digital Media Center. Both real-time streaming of the video to user and classroom computers as well as downloading for later classroom use are available.

RARE BIBLE ADDED TO THE BIBLE HERITAGE COLLECTION

A recent opportunity to purchase another rare English Bible has provided additional breadth to the early English Bibles well represented in the *Centennial Library Bible Heritage Collection*. A quarto version of the **Kings James Bible published in 1613** has been added to the collection. The first edition of the King James Bible was published in 1611 in large folio format, followed the next year, 1612, by the first Roman letter quarto printing, or "personal-sized" version. The Centennial Library copy is the first black letter quarto version published a year later in London in 1613. This Centennial Library copy is called a "He" Bible because of the "he" reading in Ruth 3:15. The Centennial Library's 1617 folio edition of the King James Bible is a "She" Bible because of the "she" reading in the same verse. Bound into the 1613 Bible are a Common Book of Prayer and a 1614 Psalter. Also included in this Bible is a rare map, the "Description of Canaan and bordering Countries," often missing in similar volumes.



This new volume joins an already excellent collection of rare Bible leaves and complete Bibles.

Bible Leaves:

Tyndale New Testament, 1536. The leaf includes the text from Romans 10:12 to 11:13.

Matthew's Bible, 1537 [First edition]. The leaf includes the text from John 11:22 to 13:5

Coverdale Bible, 1551. The leaf includes the text from II Chronicles 12:1 to 14:12

Great Bible, 1540 [First edition]. The leaf includes the text from Job 22:1 to 24:20

Complete Bibles:

Geneva Bible, 1608 (First edition published in 1560)

Bishop's Bible, 1584 (First edition published in 1568)

King James Bible (quarto printing), 1613 (First edition published in 1611)

King James Bible (folio printing), 1617 (First edition published in 1611)

With these eight rare items, the Centennial Library Special Collections has representative original examples of Bibles or pages from the major early English printed translations, starting with the first printed New Testament in 1525 and concluding with the King James version, first printed in 1611.

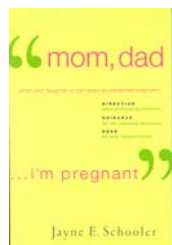

From the Abstract: “In 1978 Italy was the first country to pass laws that would eliminate mental hospitals and replace them with community-based services. Italian ideas about community care provided inspiration for care in the community legislation when this was introduced in the UK... In the course of the investigation, the author sought to discover if the implementation of what were regarded by some as radical community attitudes in the care of people with mental health problems had led to innovative approaches when dealing with patients/clients requiring long-term care and treatment.”

As a mother and grandmother, the author offers a comprehensive guide to the challenges and conflicting emotions faced by parents of children who experience unplanned pregnancies. Jayne also chronicles her own family's experience, from the initial heartbreak and shock upon hearing her daughter's news to the new level of love, maturity, and spiritual commitment. The author suggests that what families need during this time now more than ever is compassion, understanding, and direction. As well as being the author of four other books, primarily on adoption, Jayne also regularly conducts workshops that bring insights and empathy to audiences of both families and professionals.
