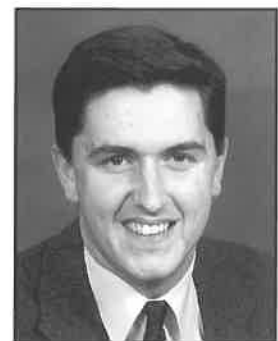

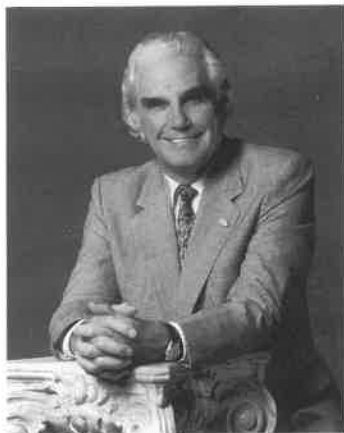

Life College



Life College today is the manifestation of the continued unfolding dream of Dr. Sid E. Williams, who originally envisioned the establishment of a chiropractic college which would serve humanity through the professional work of its graduates. Life College includes a School of Chiropractic, a School of Undergraduate Studies, and a Graduate Studies Program. The School of Chiropractic offers a Doctor of Chiropractic degree, and is the largest Chiropractic school in the world. The majority of the students at Life College are in the D.C. program. The School of Undergraduate Studies offers Bachelor of Science in Nutrition for Chiropractic Sciences and Bachelor of Business Administration degrees, and also offers pre-professional curricula for health care professions, including chiropractic, dentistry, podiatry, medicine and others. The School of Graduate Studies offers a Master of Science degree in Sports Health Science, and has additional Master programs under development.

The Life College campus is situated on approximately 100 acres which form a wooded oasis amidst the bustling metropolitan community of Marietta, Georgia. Life's beautiful campus has recently undergone a multi-million dollar building and expansion program. New and highly sophisticated facilities have made it possible for the college to add new programs and majors, all part of the institution's long-range plan to obtain university status during the 1990's.

In just a short period of time, Life College has developed a tremendous tradition of intercollegiate athletics. It all began in 1990 with the hiring of Roger Kaiser to become the school's first Director of Athletics and Head Basketball Coach. In the spring of 1991, Life College joined the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics, and in the fall Life fielded its first intercollegiate team. Since the inaugural game in November, 1991, the Running Eagles' basketball team has compiled a record of 150 victories and only 30 losses, and have made four straight trips to the NAIA National Tournament. Life College has one of the nation's best winning percentages in the 1990's.

Life has also enjoyed much success with its cross country and track programs. In 1993, Coach Mike Spino's cross country team finished fourth in the nation, and in just four seasons of competition, the cross country and track teams have had 11 NAIA All Americans. The Life College Soccer team has just completed its second season of competition with a trip to the NAIA Southeast Region Playoffs, and the golf team showed improvement under new Head Coach Jim Hudson. Life College has fielded a championship quality Rugby Club team since the early 1980's. In 1994, the Rugby team finished the season as national runners-up with a 35-1 record. Life also hosts additional club sports,



including ice hockey, and cycling.

Under the leadership of Dr. Williams, Life College most recently opened its Olympic quality track and field stadium. The stadium features a Mondo Track surface. Thirty one indoor and twenty five outdoor world records were broken on Mondo

Tracks in the past 20 years. Life College's track is currently the only track in the area that conforms to the International Amateur Athletic Federation guidelines. It is the same track surface that will be used in the 1996 Olympic Games.

This past Labor Day Life College hosted some of the world's best athletes in the Coca Cola/Life College International Challenge Track and Field Event. Over one hundred athletes from over 20 countries came to Life to compete in this grand event. After visiting Life College for this event, several national teams, including the French, Italian, and Swiss teams, chose Life as their pre-Olympic training facility.

Life College, with the guidance of Dr. Sid E. Williams, has



truly been a leader in amateur athletics. Life College's facilities will be very active with international visitors during the 1996 Olympic Games, and after the games, the track will continue to serve the city of Marietta and the greater community by hosting many other events.

Women's 100 Meters



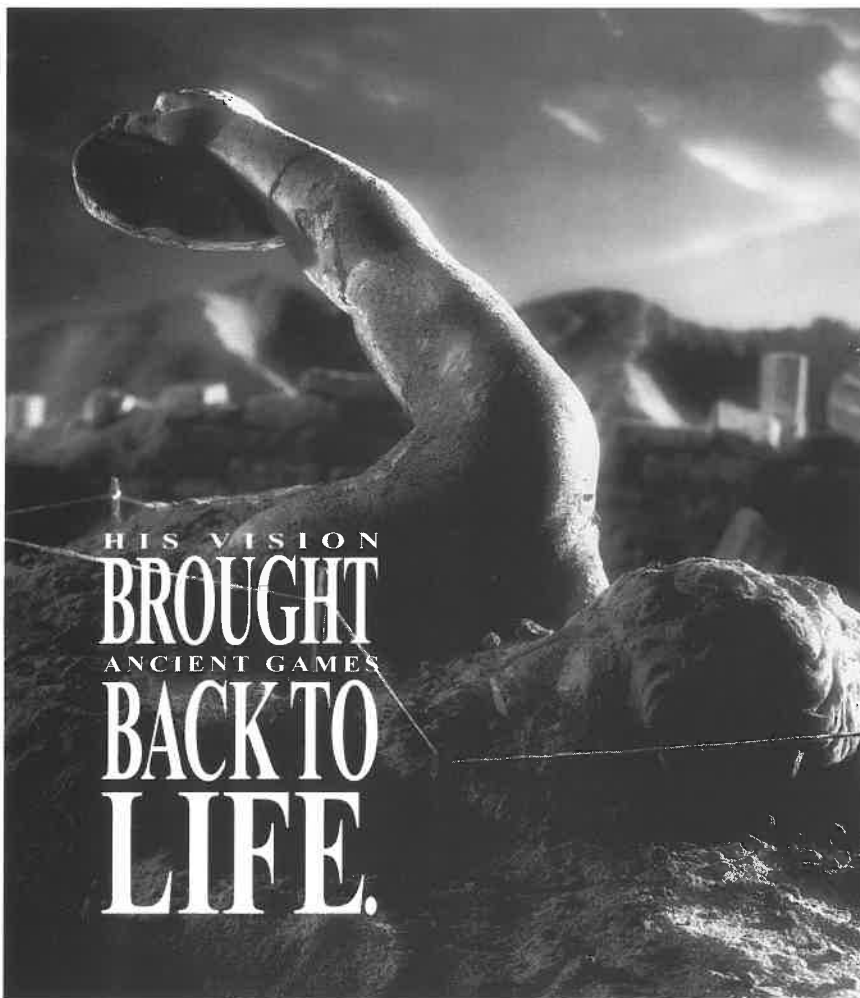
The advantage in the Women's 100 meter dash belongs to Southern New Orleans, who will enter three runners all of whom have a good chance to win the event. Tracyan Baker will be the favorite having run a season best time of 11.66, while teammates Michelle O'Horro, and Paula Douglas are also expected to make a good showing. Competition will come from Jasmine Sampson of Park MO and Ronalee Davis of Central State. Others to keep an eye on include; Wayland Baptist's LaTosha Wall, and several runners from a strong Arkansas Pine Bluff team. The NAIA record in the women's 100 meter is held by former Southern-New Orleans runner Sevethedn Fynes with a time of 11.42, set in 1994.

Men's 100 Meters



The men's 100 meter dash should be a very exciting and close race. The favorites coming into the national championships are Sheldon Edwards from Oklahoma Baptist and Joseph Mares from Wayland Baptist TX. Sheldon won the 55 meter dash in the indoor championships earlier this year and has posted a time of 10.48 earlier this season in the 100 meters. Joseph Mares has recorded the fastest 100 meter time this season running a 10.38. Other runners to watch and their best recorded time this season include: Maurice Johnson, Claflin College SC 10.50; David Smith, Southern New Orleans, 10.50; and Isaac Vanburen, Voorhees College SC, 10.51. Southwestern Oklahoma has three strong sprinters in Jake Jensen, Willie Brown and Damon Wills. The NAIA record in the 100 meters is 10.05 set in 1992 by former Azusa Pacific runner Davidson Ezinwa.

Athlete Profile

Azusa Pacific University's Fatimat Yusuf, senior, Nigeria



Ranked number 7 in the world in the 400 meters, Fatimat Yusuf figures this-the NAIA Championships-to be the first of 2 trips to Atlanta this summer. She fully expects to be back here in 8 weeks, representing her home country Nigeria in the 1996 Olympic Games. A 6-time NAIA indoor/outdoor champion, Yusuf is back at the NAIA's to reclaim her 400 meter title and perhaps improve upon her NAIA record time of 51.57. Last year she clocked a season best 49.43 which in turn gives her good reason to believe she can medal in the 400 meters, a monumental accomplishment in Nigerian track & field history. Fatimat won the 1993 NAIA Indoor 440 yard title in a record 54.60, and as a sophomore in 1994, she successfully defended her indoor title with another NAIA record 54.00, and went on to win the outdoor crown with a current record of 51.57. This made her only the fourth lady in NAIA history to sweep the indoor and outdoor 400 crowns in the same season. Last year, she captured the indoor 200 meter and 400 meter titles, and after missing the outdoor championships with a strained hamstring, she returned in February 1996 to post two more NAIA records, winning the 200 and 400 meters in record times of 23.50 and 53.05.

Women's 800 Meters



The favorites to win the women's 800 meters are Steph Miller from Southern Nazarene, who is the 1996 NAIA Indoor Champion, and Christine Smith from Southern-New Orleans. Steph won the indoor event with a time of 2:17.00. Christine Smith finished a close second with a time of 2:17.09. Christine has posted the best time this spring with a 2:13.15 mark. At the 1996 NAIA Indoor National Championships Sheldon won three events and set two NAIA records. 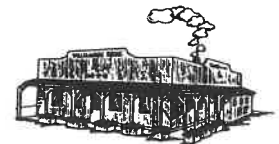

He has won six national titles in his three seasons at OBU, including four national titles at this year's NAIA Indoor Track National Championships. In the 1996 indoor meet, Dawkins set NAIA records in the 600 meters (1:18.30), 1,000 meters (2:29.88), and two-mile relay (2:28.98). Dudley has won All American honors in 15 events in his career at OBU. The most recent honors came in the 1996 indoor track season, where he was selected as an All

American in the 600 meters, 1,000 meters, two-mile relay, and distance medley relay. Dudley will compete in the mile and 800 meters at this year's NAIA Outdoor National Track Meet, but his biggest contribution will come as a key component of OBU's nationally-competitive relay teams. He was on the two-mile relay team that set the national indoor meet record this year with the second best time in the nation, trailing only NCAA Division I Penn State University.

Women's 3,000 Meters



Wayland Baptist took the first two spots in the 3,000 meters at the 1996 NAIA Indoor Champions. Rosa Ibarra won the event with a time of 9:49.23. She was followed by Tamara Dingley who finished with a time of 9:49.90. Melissa Hayward of Lindfield MO finished tenth at the indoor meet, however, she has run the fastest time this spring with a time of 9:43.34. Other runners to watch who have posted fast times this spring include, Whitman's Jessica Bissonnette, Mobile's Petra Staskova and George Fox's Dawn Hartwig. The NAIA record in the women's 3000 meter is held by Sarah Howell of Simon Fraser. Her record time is 9:13.20 which was set in 1992.

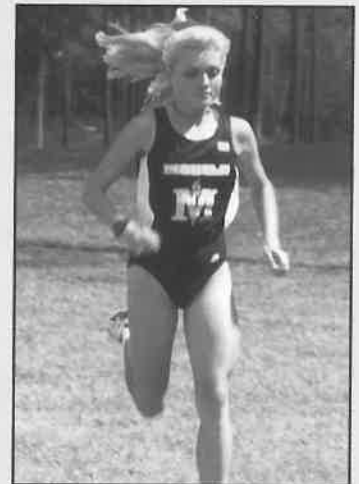

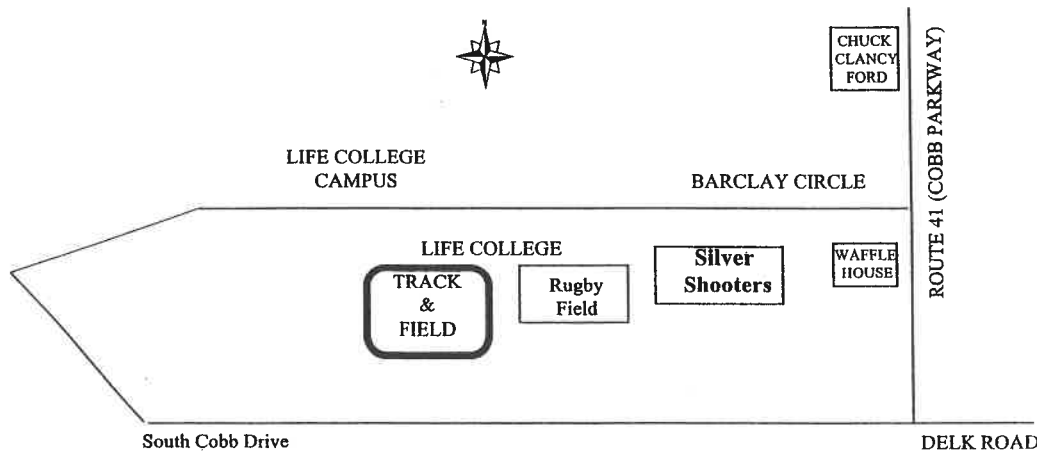
Wayland Baptist University's Rowena Welfor-Morton, Senior, Timaru, New Zealand

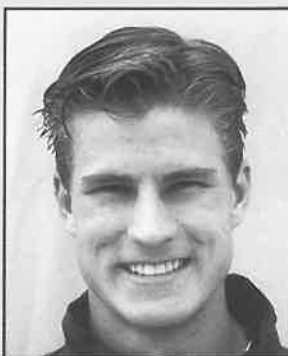
Men's Decathlon

1995 Men's NAIA Championship Results

In 1995 host school Azusa Pacific University, Azusa, California, edged runner-up Lubbock Christian University, Lubbock, Texas, to win the closest-ever NAIA Outdoor Track and Field National Championships. A mere one and one-third points, 105.33-104.0, separated the two teams while the rest of the competition trailed by more than 30 points. The closest to the top two was Central State University, Wilberforce, Ohio, which claimed 71 points in the meet. The title was the Cougars' 11th in 13 years. Southern University-New Orleans, New Orleans, Louisiana, runner Julius Achon was

honored with the H.B. Marett Outstanding Performer Award after breaking both the 800-meter and the 1,500-meter records set by Evans White, Prairie View A&M University, Prairie View, Texas, 1979, and Dan Maas, Adams State College, Alamosa, Colorado, respectively. Artis Davenport, who guided Southern-New Orleans to a fourth-place finish, was named NAIA Men's National Coach of the Year. He also coached one of the most prominent names in NAIA history, Christian Okoye, who set NAIA Track and Field records and rumbled down NAIA football fields before becoming the "Nigerian Nightmare" for the NFL's Kansas City Chiefs. Franson also has another tie with Nigeria; as he served as the Nigerian Olympic team's sprint consultant during the 1984 and 1988 Olympic games.

In the summer of 1993, Franson was named as the Athletics Director at Azusa Pacific. The following school year, the Cougars won their first-ever NAIA All-Sports Championship and were recognized as the Association's top men's program in terms of success on the local, regional, and national levels.

There is more to Terry Franson than just coaching great athletes and winning honors and national championships. He has worked tirelessly behind the scenes to help athletes in his area and around the country. He has served as the President of the NAIA Track and Field Coaches Association and founded the Fellowship of Christian Athletes Night of Champions, a celebration that draws more than 2,000 high school students for an evening of challenge and inspiration.

pelled them to greatness in the NAIA's athletic arena. Another such man is Azusa Pacific University's Dr. Terry Franson.

In 1983, only Franson's second year as the track and field coach at Azusa Pacific, the Cougars won their first-ever NAIA Championship. That was the prelude to a dynasty as Azusa Pacific won a record 10 National Championships in a 12-year span, including seven consecutive titles from 1983 through 1989. With his success came recognition from his peers as he was named NAIA Coach of the Year an unprecedented 10 times.

While coaching at Azusa Pacific, Franson served as the mentor for more than 40 individual NAIA Champions and 75 NAIA All-Americans. He has coached seven Olympians, including United
