Cedarville College

Cedarville College is a Baptist college of arts and sciences of 2,650 students. The school is located on a 300-acre campus at the north edge of the village of Cedarville, Ohio, a quiet town with a populaof approximately 3,000. The village and its surrounding area have



long maintained a reputation for providing a wholesome envi-

ronment for learning.

Though located in a rural community, Cedarville is conveniently situated in the center of a triangle formed by Columbus, Dayton, and Cincinnati, which allows easy access to three of the fastest-growing metropolitan areas in the nation.

Founded in 1887 by the Reformed Presbyterian Church, the college was established by individuals who had a vital interest in the spiritual welfare of young people. In 1953, the operation of the college was transferred to the trustees of Baptist Bible Institute of Cleveland with the goal of enlarging the Institute's ministry. The name, Cedarville College, was retained and the school continues to perpetuate the original purpose of its founders. The school motto, "...for the Word of God and testimony of Jesus Christ," reflects this commitment.

Since its founding, Cedarville has coupled a balanced liberal arts program with a fundamentalist, theological position in regard to doctrine and patterns of conduct. All classes are taught by dedicated Christian professors who integrate the knowledge of their respective fields with Biblical perspectives.

In keeping with the liberal arts concept, the curriculum centers on a basic program of general studies, including biblical education, communications, humanities, physical education, science and mathematics, and social science. Students choose a major field of concentrated study related to their abilities, interests, and career goals. The college offers over 90 programs of study leading to a baccalaureate degree.

The College recognizes that students must live and work in a society where computers and computer networks are an essential part of everyday life. To equip students to function effectively in this environment, Cedarville has launched CedarNet, the award-winning campus-wide computer information network. CedarNet, which allows access to Internet, WWW and OhioLINK, links computers in every dorm room and office on campus.

Cedarville views individual ministry involvement to be a vital and necessary part of each student's education and personal growth. The Christian Ministries Division provides training and assistance to the hundreds of students who volunteer for any of the more than 100 different ministries each quarter.

Cedarville attracts students from 47 states and nearly 65 percent of the student body comes from out of state which includes more than 30 international students.

Residence hall living is considered an integral part of the educational process with approximately 80 percent of the student body residing on campus in college housing.

Dr. Paul Dixon, President

Dr. Paul Dixon is a graduate of Tennessee Temple University and Temple Baptist Theological Seminary. In 1986 he received his doctorate in higher education from the University of Cincinnati. He is the recipient of two honorary degrees: the Doctor of Divinity from his alma mater and Doctor of Laws from Liberty University.

After 14 years in an evangelistic ministry, Dr. Dixon became the president of Cedarville College in 1978. Under his administration, the College's enrollment has grown over 90 percent, with 2,650 students in fall 1998.



For more than 20 years, Dr. Dixon has been a popular speaker for professional sports chapel programs including the Cincinnati Reds and Bengals and many of the National League baseball and NFL teams.

Mrs. Dixon, the former Pat Landers of Chattanooga, Tennessee, serves as the Assistant to the President for Institutional Enhancement. She is Professor Emerita in the Department of Language and Literature Department where she taught for 25 years before retiring in 1996.

The Dixons have one son, Scott, who is an assistant professor of Bible at the College. He and his wife, Sara, have five children and reside in Springfield.

Psalm 37:23 has been a challenge for Dr. and Mrs. Dixon since their marriage in 1960: "The steps of a good man are ordered by the Lord, and he delighteth in his way."

Dr. Don Callan, Dean School of Health and Human Performance

Dr. Don Callan begins his 39th year at Cedarville College where he has served in various capacities in athletics. His most recent promotion was being named the first Dean of the School of Health and Human Performance. He is responsible for the Department of Exercise and Sport Science, Athletic Department, and Athletic Training.

At one time, Callan jointly held the positions of athletic director, head men's basketball coach, end department chair. He was the school's athletic director



from 1961 through 1997 in which Cedarville went from offering just a couple sports to 14 varsity programs.

Callan served as head men's basketball coach from 1960 through 1995. Upon completing his legendary career, he was the NAIA's third winningest active coach and ranked 19th all-time with 579 victories.

Callan is a member of the Halls of Fame at the NAIA, NCCAA, Cedarville College, and Taylor University, his alma mater. He received the prestigious Lifetime Achievement Award presented by the Agonis Club of Dayton, Ohio in 1996 for his longtime commitment and contribution to athletics in the state of Ohio.

Callan is founder of the Missions Involvement Service at Cedarville College. He has been especially committed to worldwide sports evangalism for four decades.

Dr. Callan is a 1955 graduate of Taylor University. He received his master's degree from Ball State University in 1960, and his Ph.D. in physical education from The Ohio State University in 1968.

Dr. Callan and his wife, Nedra, reside in Cedarville and have two married children. A daughter, Jan Leach, and her husband, Mark, reside in Fairfield, Ohio with their two children. The Callan's also have a son, Jon David, who lives in Wilmington, Ohio with his wife, Karen, and their two children.

Pete Reese, Athletic Director



Pete Reese begins his 11th year at Cedarville College and on July 1, 1998 was promoted to the office of athletic director where he oversees 14 varsity Yellow Jacket sports. He brings over 30 years of athletic administration to the program.

Reese previously held the positions of assistant men's basketball coach and Director of Athletic Facilities at Cedarville. Among his many

responsibilities, he guided the construction of new complexes for soccer, baseball, and softball.

Reese was Cedarville's head baseball coach from 1989 to 1991. He was named the 1990 NAIA District 22 and Mid-Ohio Conference Coach of the Year after leading the Yellow Jackets to their first MOC title in 20 years and the top seed in the district tournament.

From 1965 to 1988, Reese was associated with The Master's College in California, formerly known as Los Angeles Baptist College. At one time or another he held positions as athletic director, chairman of the physical education department, professor, and coach.

Reese is a 1960 graduate of Cedarville College and has a master's degree in education from Eastern Michigan University. He established himself as one of the most dominant basketball players to ever play for the Yellow Jackets and he was inducted as a charter member of the Cedarville College Athletic Hall of Fame in 1984.

Pete and his wife, Joyce, live in Xenia and have two married children. A daughter, Kim Ray, and her husband, Ken, reside in San Jose, California. Their son Chris, a 1989 Cedarville graduate, is presently athletic director and head basketball coach at Multnomah Bible College in Oregon. He and his wife, Cheryl, have two children.





Paul Orchard, Head Coach



Paul Orchard begins his sixth year at Cedarville College as head track and field coach. He oversees the sprinters, hurdlers, horizontal jumps, and weight events.

The Yellow Jackets have enjoyed notable success during Orchard's five years at the helm. He has led the Lady Jackets to an unprecedented five straight National Christian College Athletic Association ban-



ners and one Mid-Ohio Conference title, and he has guided the men to one MOC championship in 1994 as well as four NCCAA runner-up showings.

Orchard is a five-time NCCAA Women's Coach of the Year. He was named Mid-Ohio Conference men's Coach of the Year in 1994 and was women's Coach of the Year in 1996 and 1998.

Orchard came to Cedarville in 1993 after spending six years at the University of Akron. He served as an assistant coach for the Zips' track and cross country programs plus coordinated all of their recruiting.

Orchard, who is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Exercise and Sport Science, is a 1983 graduate of Taylor University where he competed in track and cross country. He was a graduate assistant at Miami University (Ohio) and earned his master's degree from the school in 1986. Paul and his wife, Wendy, reside in Xenia with their sons, Brendan Taylor, 2; and Ryan Eric, born August 9, 1998.

Elvin King, Assistant Coach



Elvin King is in his 30th year as the head cross country and distance coach at Cedarville College. He has been a part of the men's track and cross country programs since coming to the school in 1969, and he started the women's track and cross country programs in 1980.

King served as the Yellow Jackets head coach in both cross country and track until 1990 when he relinquished his duties as

head track coach to devote full attention to the distance program. Cedarville is recognized for having one of the top NAIA distance running programs in the country and his runners have earned 20 NAIA All-America honors.

King has been a forerunner in the National Christian College Athletic Association. He is responsible for developing the NCCAA Track & Field Championships he has served as meet director of the NCCAA Cross Country Championships for 18 of

the past 20 years.

King's teams have won a combined 12 NCCAA track and cross country titles and 48 of his distance runners have been recognized with NCCAA All-America honors. Equally as impressive is that on 13 occasions one of his runners has been presented the Wheeler Award which is symbolic of the NCCAA's Athlete of the Year in either track or cross country.

King's efforts earned him induction into the Cedarville College Athletic Hall of Fame in 1988 and the NCCAA Hall of Fame in 1993. He has won numerous Coach of the Year Awards in the NCCAA, NAIA District 22, and the Mid-Ohio Conference. He is also past president

of the Ohio Intercollegiate Cross Country Association.

King, who is an Associate Professor in the Department of Exercise and Sport Science, is a 1964 graduate of Kent State University. He earned his master's degree from Bowling Green State University in 1967.

Elvin and his wife, Joyce, who has long been recognized for her work in track and cross country meet administration as well, reside in Cedarville. They have two children and four grandchildren.



John McGillivray, Assistant Coach



John McGillivray continues his role as an assistant coach in charge of the vertical jumps. He was a Mid-Ohio Conference pole vault champion during his Yellow Jacket track and field career.

McGillivray is one of the most well-respected soccer coaches in the state of Ohio and the NAIA. He won 215 matches in 24 years at the helm of the men's program at Cedarville College and he took on a new role

in 1998 as the head women's soccer coach. He was inducted into the school's Athletic Hall of Fame in 1991 and into the NAIA Hall of Fame in 1993.

An Associate Professor in the Department of Exercise and Sport Science, McGillivray was promoted to Chair of the Department. He is a 1970 graduate of Cedarville College and earned his master's degree from the University of Dayton in 1976. John and his wife Bonnie reside in Cedarville and have five children and three grandchildren.

1999 Women's Season Outlook

The Cedarville College women's track and field team may be pressed to keep their string of National Christian College Athletic Association championships going, but that doesn't mean they don't expect to be quite competitive. The Lady Jackels own an unprecedented five straight NCCAA banners and they're the reigning conference champions thanks to a wealth of depth in the past. That quality will have to be rebuilt beginning this spring.

"We have a fairly balanced team if we can stay healthy," remarked head coach Paul Orchard. "We don't have the depth like we've had in recent years, but a good freshmen class is joining us. We hope to challenge in the NCCAA Nationals and in the conference meet."

One thing that has made the Lady Jackets successful is their depth in the distance events. While they may not have the numbers there this season, they still have one of the best runners the school has ever had in senior Becky Jordan. She was an NAIA All-American last year in the indoor and outdoor 5,000 meters and she won the same event at the NCCAA.

Orchard is counting on Jordan's classmate, Jill Breckenfeld, to provide support in the distance events. She placed eighth in the NAIA marathon as a junior.

Christy Taylor, another senior, should provide some leadership in the middle distances and relays. Another athlete to watch for in the 800 and 1,500 is sophornore Sarah Pollock while classmate Jenifer Heidenreich is the defending conference 400 meter hurdle champion.

Heading up the group in the field events is junior Sandy Swales. She has NAIA national meet experience and will compete in all of the throwing events. Others to watch are Jodi Quint, a two-time conference champion in the javelin, as well as newcomers Kate Beatty in the high jump, Julie Hardin in the pole vauit, and Rebekah Millet in the long jump.

Four other seniors will see significant action in 1999. That quartet includes Kelly Ford (sprints), Jori Forward (distance), Alison Huizinga (throws), and Lindsey Mitchell, won the conference high jump and long jump events last year.

The Yellow Jackets host their own invitational on March 27. Cedarville will also be the site of the first-ever American Mideast Conference championship meet on April 17.

1999 Men's Season Outlook

The Yellow Jacket men's track and field squad faces the same primary dilemma as the women and that's a lack of depth. However, the athletes that head coach Paul Orchard does have in place could put several school records in jeopardy.

"We have some excellent people competing for us," declared the sixth year mentor. "We just don't have overwhelming numbers in many areas. Potentially, a number of our school marks could go down, but we'll just have to wait and see. As a team, the men are going to face some powerful programs in the NCCAA and AMC alone. That will provide some excellant competition."

Cedarville's best chances for NAIA All-America honors will come from fellow seniors Nate Freeman and Jon McGinnis. Freeman, who owns the outdoor school record in the high jump at 6'10 3/4", has already earned All-America recognition once each indoors and outdoors. McGinnis has accomplished the same in the pole vault.

Senior thrower Dan Hudson has been an NCCAA All-American in the javelin and discus and could do the same at the NAIA level where he has national meet experience. Sophornore Eddie Nehus, who won the NCCAA 800 last spring, leads the middle distance contingent along with newcomer Matt Hadler.

Rounding out the senior class are Jason Alexander, who wen the conference pele vault title last year, Greg Havens (throws), Todd Hintz (middle distance), Joel Peterson (distance), Lee Reinhard (sprints, long jump), and Ben Thompson (distance). Sophomore Cliff Reynolds, who ran in the NAIA Nationals as a rockie, will compete in the hurldes and sprints, along with classmate Bamidele Ajayi. Other notable freshmen include former Ohio state champion 400 meter performer David Dingeman and Andy Paugh, who put together a solid indoor season in the high jump.

The Yellow Jackets have been the NCCAA runner-up in six of the past seven years. They will host the first-ever championship meet in the American Mideast Conference, formerly known as the Mid-Ohio Conference, where they placed second last spring.

1998 Review




WOMEN – The Cedarville Coilege women's track & field team won the NCCAA banner for an unprecedented fifth straight tirne and regained the Mid-Ohio Conference championship in 1998. Paul Orchard was voted the NCCAA and MOC Coach of the Year.

Junior distance runner Becky Jordan paced the team during the outdoor season with the most points scored in competition. She finished the campaign as an NAIA All-American by placing sixth in the 5,000 meter run in 17:59.85.

Jordan, who was also an NAIA All-American indoors in the 5,000, set outdoor school records in the 3,000 and 5,000 meter runs as well as the 3,000 meter steeplechase. She won the NCCAA 5,000 meter run and was an NAIA and NCCAA All-America Scholar-Athlete.

At the NCCAA Nationals, the women piled up 113 points to edge fellow MOC member Malone Cellege, who finished with 105.5. The Lady Jackets used their depth to grab the team title as they won just two events total and placed second in only two others. Besides Jordan's win, Sandy Swales took first in the hammer throw with a heave of 139-feet 4-inches.

Distance runner Rachelle Elder and Jill Breckenfeld, who placed eighth in the NAIA marathen, were both recognized as NAIA and NCCAA All-America Scholar-Athletes. Other NCCAA scholars were Meredith Allgrim, Alison Huizings Chrish Tados and Rabberg Longs who



Huizinga, Christy Taylor, and Rebecca Jenks, who finished ninth in the NAIA marathon.

Cedarville totaled 96 points to win their second MOC women's track and field title. The Jackets outdistanced Malone (87), Walsh (74), Rio Grande (51), and Tiffin (0). Sandy Swales and Lindsey Mitchell each wen two field events to lead the way for the lady Jackets. Swales, who earlier set a school record in the harmer throw, won that event as well as the discus while Mitchell was a winner in the high jump and triple jump. Jodi Quint broke her own school record in winning the javelin for the second straight year, Bedky Jordan was first in the 1500 meters, and Jen Heidenreich won the 400 meter hurdles.

MEN – The Yellow Jacket men's track and field program challenged for the NCCAA and Mid-Ohio Conference titles once again and came away with runner-up finishes. It marked the sixth time in the past seven years that Cedarville ended up second in the National Christian College Athletic Association.

Highlighting the season was the performance of junior high jumper Nate Freeman. The oldest men's record entering the outdoor season was the high jump mark of All-American Bud Davis at 6-feet 9-inches set in 1965. Freeman quickly erased that and twice cleared 6-10 3/4.

The occasion that Freeman tied his own school record came in the NAIA Nationals where he earned All-America honors by finishing tourth. He also claimed the NCCAA and MOC high jump titles.

Senior Ihrower Dan Hudson scored the most points for the Cedarville men in the 1998 outdoor season. He was the NCCAA discus champion and won the same event in the MOC along with grabbing the javelin title. Hudson and distance runner Eric Crawford, who wen the MOC 10,000 meter run, were NAIA and NCCAA All-America Scholar-Athletes.

The other NCCAA All-America performance came from Eddie Nehus in the 800 meter run. He won the MOC 800 meters and was part of the winning 4×400 meter relay team along with Chris Leverette, David Rea, and Cliff Reynolds, who also won the 400 meter hurdles.

Other highlights included Leverette being named an NCCAA All-America Scholar- Athlete and Jon McGinnis taking sixth place in the pole vault at the NAIA Indoor Nationals for All-America recognition. Also winning events at the MOC Championships were Linton Ellis in the 100 and 200 meter dashes, and Jason Alexander in the pole vault.

Serving higher education in this manner is a responsibility the NAIA does not take lightly. It is a relationship built on confidence and trust — a relationship strengthened year after year.
