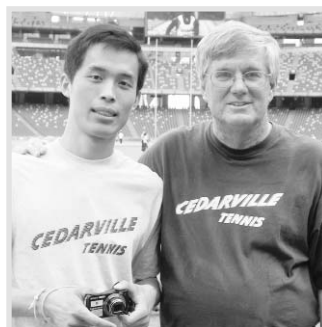

## Why Sport Ministry?

**W**ho will tell them if we don't? In Romans 10 it states, "How, then, can they call on the one they have not believed in? And how can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard? And how can they hear without someone preaching to them? And how can they preach unless they are sent? As it is written, "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!"



In Acts 1:8 we are told "we are to be witnesses," not just some of us but all of us. Sport ministry can fill a great void and be a vehicle through which athletes can fulfill the God-given command to "be His witness." What a marvelous way to serve God, by bringing together our two loves - the love of sport and the love for God. They can be blended as we use the talent, interest and opportunity sport can give, to share the love of Christ.

Sport and the performing arts, according to research, are the two platforms of human performance that have been proven to be most effective in pulling down cultural barriers, and as a result provide a quick avenue to mutual understanding and friendship. Sports can get you into places and connect you with people you otherwise couldn't connect with. Sports is a universal language. Sports provide a common ground for both athletes and spectators, where they can find understanding and acceptance in and through the sport. We ought to take advantage of such available platforms. The apostle Paul in his first letter to the Corinthians stated it this way: "When I am with those who are oppressed, I share their oppression so that I might bring them to Christ. I do all this to spread the Good News and in doing so I enjoy its blessing." (I. Cor. 9:22-23)

How do we do sport ministry? I have friends all over the world who have used sports to build a platform from which they can share interest, friendship and the message of Jesus and his redeeming power. They have used sports like soccer, basketball,

American football, volleyball, road races of various distances, jogging clubs, horses - both riding and training, table tennis, tennis, and the list goes on. The question is, what are you good at, have experience in, or sense is an interest grabber? Then find a way to implement your ideas. Draw others into the ministry. Not all of the church will be into running or walking a 5K, but you can use all of them to time, furnish water, be at the finish line and most of all encourage to make friends and share the message.

Remember, sports creates common ground between athletes, spectators, and those related to the activity. Sports allows instant relationships to begin regardless of country, culture, language or sport. Sport seems to be an open door to reach those who may never otherwise hear about the love of Jesus Christ. This may prove to be a platform from which you can share your faith.

We have been using sport at Cedarville to witness for Christ for many years. Our athletes have profited from the experiences they have had both here in the U.S., and around the world. Through these experiences they have "looked on the fields that are ready for harvest."

# Reep Brothers Built for Hoops

## 2008-09 CU Athletic Partners

**A**aron Reep never thought the neighbor would let him and his brothers play. The Erlangers kept their yard perfect, and four young boys — soon to number five — could spell disaster for a lawn, a flower bed...even a basketball court.

Still, the Brothers Reep had to try. They had a hoop at home, but not a full court, nothing to compare to the Erlangers' court. It would soon become their Madison Square Garden, hosting imaginary Final Fours and NBA Finals for years to come.

First, not long after moving to Springfield in 1995, they had to get permission to play there. The brothers approached Fred Erlanger as he washed his car one day.

"Mr. Erlanger, do you think we could play basketball?" one boy asked.

"Sure," he said.

The Reeps would call their neighbor Mr. Sure for a while. His court became a haven for Ryan, Nathan, Aaron, Jason and later Kevin.

"We'd hoop it up from dawn to dusk," Nathan says.

They may have developed into talented basketball players without that court. After all, their dad, Jeff, ranks as the 24th-leading scorer in Cedarville University men's basketball history. As a long-time assistant coach at New Mexico State University and as the head coach at Cedarville from 1995 to 2000, Jeff exposed his boys to the game long before their feet could fill high-tops.

With a full court a few dribbles away, however, the Reeps' talents could develop and mature in thousands of backyard games.

These days, there are few chances for all the boys to play together — in part because of what that court, combined with the efforts of their parents and Emmanuel Christian Academy coach Dan Moore, did for the boys.

The oldest three played college basketball this season. The fourth, Jason, started for Emmanuel Christian. Kevin, a fifth-grader, waits for the day he can compete with his brothers in the backyard.

This is a family built for basketball. What are the odds that a basketball coach, whose job revolves around finding the five best men to put on the court at one time, would end up with a quintet of boys and a court on which to turn them loose?

"Even when the last one was born, when the other four found out, they all were so excited," Jeff says. "They said, 'Yes, we're still the Reep boys.'"

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# Reep Brothers Have Blazed A Worthy

**D**an Moore hears the question all the time. "You've got another Reep?" an opposing coach will ask. "How many more are there?"

Criss Reep, the mother of the five Reep boys, hears the same thing in the stands at Emmanuel Christian Academy. On the court, sophomore Jason Reep says it's always fun to listen to the comments.

"They just keep coming," they say. "I hate those Reeps."

Let's get this straight right away, then. The Reep tradition won't fade anytime soon.

Every year since Emmanuel Christian fielded its first basketball team in 2000-01, the program has featured one of the Reep brothers — and usually two. When Jason graduates in 2011, there will be a two-year gap, but then Kevin Reep, now an 11-year-old fifth grader, will join the Lions.

His brothers have blazed quite the path. Ryan, now 23, Nathan, 21, and Aaron, 19, rank as the top three scorers in Emmanuel history with 3,480 points between them. Jason, 16, started for the Lions this season.

Ryan just completed his career as a member of the Cedarville University men's basketball squad. Nathan suits up for Geneva College in Beaver Falls, Pa. Aaron was one of the top freshman contributors for Northwestern College in St. Paul, Minn.

Moore has coached them all, and when he finally runs out of Reeps, he'll be the one asking, "One more please?"

"You talk about parents who have done a wonderful job raising their boys with character and respect for others," Moore says. "That's what every one of the boys stands for. From day one, each one of them has set an example of what it means to come to practice every day and to work hard. To have that kind of leadership and experience throughout my coaching here is irreplaceable."

## Moving

Ryan Reep would do anything to be around his dad and around the team. Ball boy, floor scrubber, whatever it took. Eventually, he discovered the perfect job: videography.

"That was my ticket on the bus," Ryan says.

During Jeff Reep's years as the head coach at Cedarville University (1995 to 2000), Ryan missed just three games. He traveled with the team to road games, packing a video camera to film them.

That wasn't a job Ryan could do earlier in Jeff's career. Prior to returning to Cedarville, where he played from 1974 to 1978, Jeff spent four years as an assis-

tant coach at Delta State in Mississippi and 11 at New Mexico State, where his teams made five NCAA tournaments.

The four oldest Reep boys were born in Las Cruces, N.M., but Jeff jumped at the chance return to his Cedarville roots.

"You don't leave New Mexico State to come to Cedarville for a career move," says Jeff, now 53 and the associate director of career services at Cedarville. "You come for other reasons."

Jeff returned to Cedarville and then stepped down after five seasons for five reasons: his sons.

"The guys were at that age where they were starting to play," Jeff says.

## Playing

Criss Reep has learned a few things about basketball over the years. She knows not to save your best outfit during a tournament.

"You wear it the first night," she says, "and hope you get to be there for the rest of the tournament."

She also learned not to save her voice. She has a unique scream, Aaron says.

"I guess they know if I'm there, which is mission accomplished," Criss says. "What's the use of being there if they don't know it?"

The Reeps have played too many games to count over the years. This year has been a special challenge with three brothers in college.

For example: On Feb. 14, Jeff and Criss watched Kevin play a noon game in the Wayne Embry Youth Basketball League. They left from that game to watch Nathan play a game at Thomas More College in northern Kentucky. Then the family reversed direction and made it to Cedarville in time for Ryan's Senior Night.

Jeff and Criss missed Jason's game, but on most nights the high school games take precedence. The Reep parents reason that if they attended all of Ryan's, Nathan's and Aaron's high school games, so they should be there for Jason's.

On and off the court, all the boys have their differences and similarities.

Ryan is the scorer and the leader. He led Clark County as a senior with 25.2 points per game and accepted a limited role with a deep Cedarville team.

"There's nobody on our team more responsible for our success than him," Cedarville coach Pat Estepp says. "He's always talking. He's always coaching. He's always encouraging the guys. He sat on the bench and knew exactly what's going on in the game. He just continued to lead and never took a day off."

At 6-foot-3, Nathan is the biggest of the brothers, and he benefitted as a senior at Emmanuel by having Aaron as his point guard.

# Basketball Path

## Former Lady Jacket Softball Coach Headed to Arkansas



"It was such a unique dynamic," Nathan says. "He was looking out for me on the court. He was taking care of me. It's a credit to him that I scored as much as I did."

Aaron is the passer and the most outgoing of the brothers, Jeff says. He modeled his career after John Stockton, even taking his number 12, and finished sixth in Ohio history in career assists (663).

Aaron eats, breathes and talks basketball as much as possible.

"When Ryan started playing, we would always come home from his games and I'd talk for two hours with dad — everything about the game, about this and that, about who we had coming up," Aaron says. "Now I'm in college, 800 miles away, and I'll be in the locker room and the only thing going through my mind is I've got to get on the phone with dad and talk about everything."

Moore says Jason, the point guard for the Lions this past season, was a combination of Aaron and Ryan. Kevin says he doesn't want to grow too tall because he'd like to play point guard in high school, too.

As to the question of who the best Reep brother is, there's no right answer.

"I've been asked that I don't know how many times," Moore says. "They've all fulfilled the role we've asked of them."

Looking ahead, Moore says, "Hopefully, Kevin's the best player."

## Schooling

Basketball is a big part of the Reep's lives, and Criss jokes that, "Kevin will take us from his last game to the nursing home."

But there's more to the Reeps than hoops.

The boys have run a lawn-mowing business in their Springfield neighborhood for years.

The family is active in church, evidenced in part by the three oldest Reeps attending Christian universities.

And all the brothers have been home schooled by Criss. The three who graduated attended enough classes part-time at Emmanuel to qualify for extra-curricular activities. Jason does the same now.

Basketball gave them an identity at the school and made it easier to fit in.

"We are just really grateful for Emmanuel for the way they embraced home schooling and the way they included the boys and let them have a place there," Criss says. "I feel like they've had a real positive impact there at school."

The Reep's methods have paid off.

For example: After leaving Cedarville, Ryan is teaching engineering at the U.S. Navy's nuclear power school in Charleston, S.C. Aaron also wants to join the military after college as a Marine officer.

You can sum up the brothers by what Nathan had to say when asked what he learned about basketball from his dad.

"The biggest thing he taught us about the game that I've carried with myself is it's not about yourself," Nathan says. "Having neat accomplishments are all fine and great, but when it comes down to it, it's about the team, the relationships you build there, the impact you're having."

University of Arkansas softball head coach Mike Larabee has announced the hiring of assistant coach Sue Carpenter. Prior to coming to Arkansas, Carpenter was an assistant coach under Larabee the previous three seasons at Wright State where she worked with the infielders and coordinated camps, recruiting and scouting.

"I am thrilled with this opportunity to be coaching at Arkansas," Carpenter said. "Having worked with Mike the past three years, I consider it quite an honor and quite a compliment that he would consider me to bring along with him. Arkansas is an incredible place, not just the university but the entire community is great. My family had a chance to come visit and they really enjoyed it, too. I'm incredibly excited to get started."

During her three years at Wright State, the Raiders made two NCAA Tournament appearances and won back-to-back Horizon League Tournament titles in 2007 and 2008. Carpenter's work with the infielders was put on display when Bridget Henry earned the All-Tournament Defensive Award at first base during the Raiders' 2008 run to the conference tournament title. She also helped guide Jherica Williams to the program's first Horizon League Player of the Year award, also in 2008. Wright State went on to win 34 games, the second-most in program history, and record a .974 fielding percentage against conference opponents in 2009.

"Sue has really been my right hand the last three years," Larabee said. "With previous experience as a head coach, her mind is always working to stay a couple of steps ahead. She did a great job with the infielders at Wright State and she'll continue those duties here. She is incredibly personable which makes her an outstanding recruiter. In addition to her coaching abilities, Sue will be a great role model for our student-athletes."

Carpenter served as the head coach at Cedarville University for seven seasons (2000-06) prior to joining the Wright State staff. She led the Lady Jacket softball team to four appearances in the National Christian College Athletic Association (NCCAA) Tournament and three appearances in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) Region IX Tournament. In 2000, Cedarville captured the NCCAA Midwest Region championship.

Carpenter was a three-year letter winner (1984-86) during her collegiate playing career at Cedarville University. She was a member of the program's inaugural fast-pitch team in 1985 and was an All-Western Buckeye Collegiate Conference and All-NAIA District 22 shortstop during the 1986 season. Carpenter still holds single-game school records for runs scored (4), runs batted in (6), stolen bases (4), and walks (4). She is Cedarville's season (38) and career (57) record holder for walks.

She began her coaching career as an assistant at Cedarville (1987-89) and later spent five years on the coaching staff at Colville High School in Washington.

Sue and her husband, Kevin, who is a 1989 Cedarville graduate and has been Director of Technical Services in Computer Services at the school, have two sons, Nick, 15, and Josh, 12.

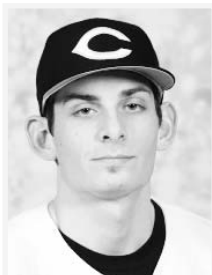

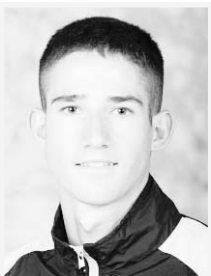

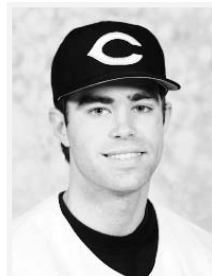
