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## Library faculty member resigns to assume director position



**Brent Etzel**, *Director of Library Public Services*, resigned effective October 22, to assume a new role as the library director at Arkansas Tech University in Russellville, Arkansas. Brent came to Cedarville in 2008 to serve as the Instructional Services Librarian and under his leadership, the research instruction program expanded significantly, serving more academic departments and scheduling more instructional sessions. Brent was also active in University MIS missions trips, participating in or leading two teams to the Evangelical Theological Seminary Library in Osijek, Croatia during the summers of 2012 and 2013. In 2011, he was appointed the Director of Library Public Services, after the departure of Tonya Fawcett, who had served in that position for 12 years before moving on to become the Library Director at Grace College and Seminary in Winona Lake, Indiana.

## New Director of Library Public Services appointed

With the departure of Brent Etzel from the Library staff in October, a search began to replace him as Director of Library Public Services. **Josh Michael**, *Information Services Librarian/Health Sciences Liaison*, was an applicant for the position. After a successful interview with the present Library staff, Josh was appointed as the new Director of the Public Services department. Though his tenure at the Centennial Library has been short, Josh, a 1999 graduate of Cedarville, brings previous administrative experience to this position, having served for 6 years as the Library Director at Baptist Bible College in Clarks Summit, Pennsylvania. Josh has a background in information literacy instruction, training tutorial development, and resource collection development. He has also taught history courses at the college level. As the leader of the Public Services department, Josh supervises the staff of the Research Center, Circulation Services, Interlibrary Services, and the MediaPLEX.



## Library faculty participate at state library conference

Three Library faculty members participated in the 2014 Academic Library Association of Ohio annual conference on November 15 in Sandusky, Ohio. **Julie Deardorff**, *Director of Collection Services*, was an invited participant in the panel discussion, "Working with Faculty to Build Collections." She was also selected to present a poster session about the Centennial Library's program which encourages students from all majors to consider career options in libraries. The poster presentation was entitled "Library Careers: Promoting Librarianship to Undergraduates." **Joshua Michael**, *Director of Public Services*, was part of a team poster presentation, "Innovative Leadership: Fostering Interlibrary Engagement," that summarized the value of the Library Leadership

Ohio conference that he participated in during this past summer. This collaborative effort included librarians from INFOhio and Shawnee State University. As co-chair of the Curriculum Materials Center Interest Group, **Sharon Kerestes**, *Curriculum Materials Center Librarian*, hosted an informational table about the interest group and introduced the group's sponsored speaker session.

## Graduate library scholarship available to seniors

The Centennial Library is again seeking applicants for the its scholarship award in Library Science. This Award, presented annually at Honors Day, was established by the Centennial Library faculty to encourage and actively support the next generation of library and information specialists, and especially to encourage those who seek careers in library service and also those who will fill the future library faculty ranks of Christian colleges and universities. The cash award is available to senior applicants, and is made directly to the institution in which the recipient is enrolled for graduate study in library and information science. The first award was presented in 2000, and a total of thirteen scholarships have been awarded since then. The Award information and application can be accessed on the [library website](#). 


### Recognizing Faculty Scholarship

**Patrick Oliver**, *Associate Professor of Criminal Justice*

*Recruitment, Selection & Retention of Law Enforcement Officers.*

Flushing, New York: Looseleaf Law Publications, 2014. 266 pages.

Patrick Oliver brings his many years of experience in law enforcement as a police officer, a chief of police in several communities, in executive leadership training, and in criminal justice education to this book on recruiting and employing quality law enforcement officers. The author states that “this book is designed to be both a how-to manual and idea guide for law enforcement administrators and other government officials involved in the process of recruitment, selection, or retention of law enforcement officers. It contains a collection of standards in the law enforcement profession, legal mandates, best practices, and recommendations based on criminal justice research.” The focus of this book is to assist decision makers in attracting, evaluating, hiring, and retaining the kinds of officers that make agencies great and communities strong.

### Carrying the Torch to Their World

**David Branon** (Class of 1973)

*Stand Firm: 48 Life-guides from Philippians.*

Grand Rapids, Michigan: Discovery House, 2014. 216 pages.

This exegetical study through the book of Philippians features 48 life lessons written in a down-to-earth style using a commentary-and-devotional combination. Each life lesson addresses “What you need to know,” followed by “How do these verses help me stand firm,” and concluded with “What has to change.” The author states about the Apostle Paul, “We need to hear from a guy who was beaten, jailed, shipwrecked, threatened, and mistreated due to his allegiance to Jesus as he tells us how to stand firm and experience peace.” Dave Branon is an editor for Discovery House Publishers and RBC Ministries and is a popular contributor to the devotional series, *Our Daily Bread*. He has written over two thousand devotional articles and sixteen books.
