## Cedarville College

Cedarville College is a Baptist college of arts and sciences of 2,600 students. The school is located on a 300-acre campus at the north edge of the village of Cedarville, Ohio, a quiet town with a population of approximately 3,000. The village and its surrounding area have long maintained a reputation for providing a wholesome environment for learning.

Though located in a rural community, Cedarville is conveniently situated in the center of a triangle formed by Columbus, Dayton, and Cincinnati, which allows easy access to three of the fastest-growing metropolitan areas in the nation.

Founded in 1887 by the Reformed Presbyterian Church, the college was established by individuals who had a vital interest in the spiritual welfare of young people. In 1953, the operation of the college was transferred to the trustees of Baptist Bible Institute of Cleveland with the goal of enlarging the Institute's ministry. The name, Cedarville College, was retained and the school continues to perpetuate the original purpose of its founders. The school motto, "...for the Word of God and testimony of Jesus Christ," reflects this commitment.

Since its founding, Cedarville has coupled a balanced liberal arts program with a fundamentalist, theological position in regard to doctrine and patterns of conduct. All classes are taught by dedicated Christian professors who integrate the knowledge of their respective fields with Biblical perspectives.

In keeping with the liberal arts concept, the curriculum centers on a basic program of general studies, including biblical education, communications, humanities, physical education, science and mathematics, and social science. Students choose a major field of concentrated study related to their abilities, interests, and career goals. The college offers over 90 programs of study leading to a baccalaureate degree.

The College recognizes that students must live and work in a society where computers and computer networks are an essential part of everyday life. To equip students to function effectively in this environment, Cedarville has launched CedarNet, the award-winning campus-wide computer information network. CedarNet, which allows access to Internet, WWW and OhioLINK, links computers in every dorm room and office on campus.

Cedarville views individual ministry involvement to be a vital and necessary part of each student's education and personal growth. The Christian Ministries Division provides training and assistance to the hundreds of students who volunteer for any of the more



than 100 different ministries each quarter.

Cedarville attracts students from 47 states and nearly 65 percent of the student body comes from out of state which includes more than 30 international students.

Residence hall living is considered an integral part of the educational process with approximately 80 percent of the student body residing on campus in college housing.

## Dr. Paul Dixon, President

Dr. Paul Dixon is a graduate of Tennessee Temple University and Temple Baptist Theological Seminary. In 1986 he received his doctorate in higher education from the University of Cincinnati. He is the recipient of two honorary degrees: the Doctor of Divinity from his alma mater and Doctor of Laws from Liberty University.

After 14 years in an evangelistic ministry, Dr. Dixon became the president of Cedarville College in 1978. Under his administration, the College's enrollment has grown over 90 percent, with 2,600 students in fall 1998.



For more than 20 years, Dr. Dixon has been a popular speaker for professional sports chapel programs including the Cincinnati Reds and Bengals and many of the National League baseball and NFL teams.

Mrs. Dixon, the former Pat Landers of Chattanooga, Tennessee, serves as the Assistant to the President for Institutional Enhancement. She is Professor Emerita in the Department of Language and Literature Department where she taught for 25 years before retiring in 1996.


The Dixons have one son, Scott, who is an assistant professor of Bible at the College. He and his wife, Sara, have five children and reside in Springfield.

## Dr. Don Callan, Dean School of Health and Human Performance

Dr. Don Callan begins his 39th year at Cedarville College where he has served in various capacities in athletics. His most recent promotion was being named the first Dean of the School of Health and Human Performance. He is responsible for the Department of Exercise and Sport Science, Athletic Department, and Athletic Training.

At one time, Callan jointly held the positions of athletic director, head men's basketball coach, and department chair. He was the school's athletic director from 1961 through 1997 in which Cedarville went from offering just a couple sports to 14 varyity program.



Callan is a member of the Halls of Fame at the NAIA, NCCAA, Cedarville College, and Taylor University, his alma mater. He received the prestigious Lifetime Achievement Award presented by the Agonis Club of Dayton, Ohio in 1996 for his longtime commitment and contribution to athletics in the state

Callan is founder of the Missions Involvement Service at Cedarville College. He has been especially committed to worldwide sports evangelism for four decades.

Dr. Callan is a 1955 graduate of Taylor University. He received his master's degree from Ball State University in 1960, and his Ph.D. in physical education from The Ohio State University in 1968.

Dr. Callan and his wife, Nedra, reside in Cedarville and have two married children. A daughter, Jan Leach, and her husband, Mark, reside in Fairfield, Ohio with their two children. The Callan's also have a son, Jon David, who lives in Wilmington, Ohio with his wife, Karen, and their two children.



## Pete Reese, Athletic Director



Pete Reese begins his 11th year at Cedarville College and on July 1 was promoted to the office of athletic director where he will oversee 14 varsity Yellow Jacket sports. He brings over 30 years of athletic administration to the program.

Reese previously held the positions of assistant men's basketball coach and Director of Athletic Facilities at Cedarville. Among his many responsibilities, he guided the construction of


new complexes for soccer, baseball, and softball.

Reese was Cedarville's head baseball coach from 1989 to 1991. He was named the 1990 NAIA District 22 and Mid-Ohio Conference Coach of the Year after leading the Yellow Jackets to their first MOC title in 20 years and the top seed in the district tournament.

From 1965 to 1988, Reese was associated with The Master's College in California, formerly known as Los Angeles Baptist College. At one time or another he held positions as athletic director, chairman of the physical education department, professor, and coach.

Reese is a 1960 graduate of Cedarville College and has a master's degree in education from Eastern Michigan University. He established himself as one of the most dominant basketball players to ever play for the Yellow Jackets and he was inducted as a charter member of the Cedarville College Athletic Hall of Fame in 1984.

Pete and his wife, Joyce, live in Xenia and have two married children. A daughter, Kim Ray, and her husband, Ken, reside in San Jose, California. Their son Chris, a 1989 Cedarville graduate, is presently athletic director and head basketball coach at Multnomah Bible College in Oregon. He and his wife, Cheryl, have two children.



## John McGillivray, Head Coach

John McGillivray takes on a new role in 1998 as the head women's soccer coach at Cedarville College. He takes over the program after enjoying a notable 24-year career as coach of the Yellow Jacket men.

McGillivray is one of the most well-respected soccer coaches in the state of Ohio and the NAIA. The Springfield, Ohio native, who in 1993 was inducted into the NAIA Hall of Fame, put together a career mark of 215-197-27 at the

helm of the men's program. McGillivray led his teams to eight Mid-Óhio Conference titles, five NCCAA District III banners, three NAIA District 22 championships, and one NAIA Area IV crown which carried with it a trip to the NAIA Nationals in 1974 where the Yellow Jackets placed sixth. He guided his squad to five NCCAA National Tournament appearances with a pair of runner-up finishes. He was chosen NCCAA Coach of the Year in 1981.





McGillivray and his teams have been recognized for their sportsmanlike behavior before, during, and after matches. He was presented the first-ever Distinguished Merit Award in 1990 by the Ohio Collegiate Soccer Officials Association. The National Intercollegiate Soccer Officials Association honored him in 1992 with their National Merit Award.

McGillivray has served in all levels of NAIA soccer including president of the NAIA Coaches Association from 1983-85. He has also been a longtime district and conference soccer chair.

An Associate Professor of Physical Education at the College, McGillivray was recently promoted to the school's Chair of the Department of Exercise and Sport Science. He is a 1970 graduate of Cedarville College and earned his master's degree from the University of Dayton in 1976. John and his wife Bonnie reside in Cedarville and have five children and three grandchildren.

### 1998 Season Outlook

Now that the Cedarville College women's soccer program has its first varsity season in the books, the business at hand gets a little more serious. The Lady Jackets, who posted a 4-7-1 record during their inaugural campaign and qualified for two postseason tournaments, aren't expected to surprise anyone this time around. Among other things, they will be facing a more demanding schedule which includes the new American Mideast Conference.

However, Cedarville has good reason to be optimistic. The kickers return a solid nucleus of talent, including a pair of All-Americans, and they have a veteran coach in John McGillivray, who moved over to the women's program following a 24-year stint with the Yellow Jacket men.

"We want to continue to build upon the solid foundation that was set last year under (head coach) Dave Dillon," said McGillivray, who posted 215 victories with the men and has already secured himself a spot in the NAIA Hall of Fame. "Our schedule is much tougher, but we have some good players that should make us competitive. The first goal is to have a winning record, and, if we can make the playoffs, we'll take it from there."

The list of key returnees starts with senior co-captains Lisa Thomson and Carrie Orme. Thomson effectively anchored the Lady Jacket defense from her sweeper position last fall and was voted to the NCCAA All-America Second Team. The Monroeville, PA native was named an NAIA and NCCAA All-America Scholar-Athlete and was appropriately tabbed the team's MVP.

Orme joined Thomson as two of only five players to start all 12 matches. The midfielder from nearby Dayton, OH will provide valuable experience in the middle again for the Lady Jackets.

McGillivray welcomes back the team's leading scorer in sophomore Kristen DeVinney, who recorded 10 goals and an assist for 21 points. The Perry, NY product was named to the NCCAA All-America Second Team as a forward, but she may be moved to an attacking midfield position this year.

Allison Hume, a sophomore forward from Dayton, OH, used her quickness to supply five goals and three assists for 13 points as a rookie. She will again be asked to provide a strong attack up front.

Cedarville's defense is even more solidified with the return of junior goalkeeper Katie Mummau, who hails from Mechanicsburg, PA. She started all ten matches in which she played with a 2.21 goals against

average. Mummau, who is the team's tallest player at 5-11, was voted to the AII-NSCAA/NAIA Great Lakes Region First Team.

"I expect us to be strong defensively," stated McGillivray in summary. "It's good to have returning players in all of the key positions, but our newcomers will

be counted on to help as well."

The Lady Jackets begin play in the American Mideast Conference. formerly known as the Mid-Ohio Conference. Other women's programs in the AMC include Geneva PA, Malone OH, Notre Dame OH, Saint Vincent PA, Tiffin OH, and Walsh OH.

The non-conference schedule will be just as demanding. It includes NCCAA champion Indiana Wesleyan as well as the likes of Denison, Georgetown, and Wittenberg just to name a few.

## 1997 Review - The Inaugural Season

#### Head Coach: Dave Dillon Overall Record: 4-7-1

The new varsity sport on campus in 1997 was women's soccer and the Lady Jackets had a lot of positive things to talk about following a 4-7-1 season under head coach Dave Dillon. Cedarville qualified for two postseason tournaments and even hosted one game, had two players earn All-America honors, and had three members garner All-America Scholar-Athlete recog-

The historic first match in school history resulted in a 4-1 setback at Bluffton. Freshman Allison Hume netted the program's first goal.

It didn't take long for the women to record their first win as they blew past host Huntington, 9-0. Rookie forward Kristen DeVinney scored four goals in the match and Rachel Soderstrom was credited with Cedarville's first-ever

Following three shutout losses, two by 1-0 scores, the Jackets played their home opener against Bluffton. This time they turned the tables on the Beavers, 2-1, with DeVinney getting both goals.

The biggest win of the season came in a 2-1 upset of Walsh, who entered the match ranked No. 6 in the NAIA Great Lakes Region. Stephanie Aittama scored the gamewinner with only 12 minutes left.

After ending the regular season with a 2-0 win at Notre Dame College, the Jackets dropped a four-overtime marathon at home to Tiffin, 3-2, in a Mid-Ohio Conference playoff match that was decided on penalty kicks. Cedarville's initial season finally ended in the NCCAA playoffs to eventual national champion Indiana Wesleyan.

Serving higher education in this manner is a responsibility the NAIA does not take lightly. It is a relationship built on confidence and trust — a relationship strengthened year after year.
