MIDWESTERN STATE UNIVERSITY

Midwestern State University, located in Wichita Falls, Texas, is a state supported co-educational institution composed of 9 divisions of instruction and the Graduate School.

In 1922 the Wichita Falls Junior College made its appearance as the first municipal junior college in Texas. In 1936, in honor of a gift by the late Mr. and Mrs. John G. Hardin of Burkburnett, Texas, the Wichita Falls Junior College was renamed Hardin Junior College and moved to the present campus in 1937.

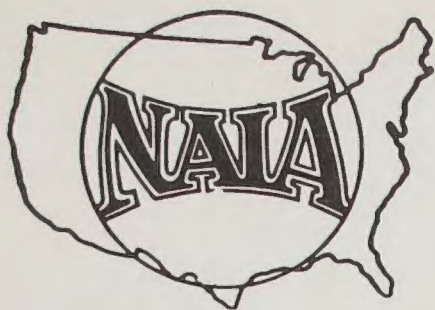
In 1946 the senior division was established and the name changed to Hardin College. In January, 1950 the name changed to Midwestern University and later to Midwestern State University when it became a part of the Texas Colleges and Universities in 1961.

The 9 academic divisions are Human Studies, Education, Humanities, Mathematical Sciences, Sciences, Fine Arts, Business, Health Sciences, Political Science and Public Administration.

Associate of Applied Science degrees are awarded in Chemical Technology, Computer Programming, Electronics Technology, and Engineering Technology. The Associate of Science degrees are awarded in Dental Hygiene, Medical Laboratory Technology, Nursing, and Radiological Technology.

The following baccalaureate degrees are offered: Bachelor of Applied Arts and Sciences, Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Business Administration, Bachelor of Fine Arts, Bachelor of Music, Bachelor of Music Education, Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice, Bachelor of Science in Education, Bachelor of Science in Dental Hygiene, Bachelor of Science in Medical Technology, and the Bachelor of Science in Radiological Technology.

Master's Degrees are offered in the following areas: Master of Arts, Master of Business Administration, Master of Education, Master of Music, Master of Music Education, Master of Science, Master of Science in Physical Education, and Master of Science in Computer Science.



National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics

The National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) is a completely autonomous association, currently administering programs of intercollegiate athletics in 515 fully accredited four-year colleges and universities. The fundamental tenet of the NAIA is that intercollegiate athletics is an integral part of the total educational program of the institution. This belief is strongly reflected in the governing documents, activities and organizational structure of the Association.

PURPOSE AND HISTORY

Established in 1940 as the National Association of Intercollegiate Basketball, the NAIA (the name change coming in 1952) emanated from a "National Small College Basketball Tournament" inaugurated in 1937 in Kansas City Missouri. The conversion of the NAIB to the NAIA in 1952 included the expansion of the program to include national championships in golf, outdoor track and field and tennis. Football, cross country, baseball and swimming were added to the ledger in 1956 and wrestling (1958), soccer (1959), bowling (1962 - 1978), gymnastics (1964), indoor track and field (1966), ice hockey (1968), volleyball (1969 - 1979), and Division II football (1970), are the most recent additions. The initial purpose of the NAIA — to provide national championship opportunities to colleges and universities competing below the so-called "major" level — has indeed been well served.

NAIA organizes and administers all areas of intercollegiate athletics at the national level, including rules and standards, and district and national sports competition.

The NAIA clearly outlines its own responsibilities and those of its members: a sound athletics program, administered and controlled by those responsible for the administration of the college. This means direct supervision in the matter of caliber of competition, financing of the athletics program, and taking steps to assure that financial assistance is made available only through the institution and under the same general policies as aid to all students. In short, the basic premise is that the athletics program must be a basic component of the overall general educational process within the institution, and not an entity apart.

The NAIA encourages a broad program of athletic pursuits in its member institutions, and making the program available to the greatest possible number of students. The national organization aims at uniformity and equity in policies and practices through its district and national tournaments and meetings.

Eligibility rules in the NAIA govern all play in all sports recognized by the Association, not just postseason tournaments, and must be adhered to by all members, including members holding dual affiliation with other associations.

HOW ADMINISTERED

The principal governance body of the NAIA is the Executive Committee, composed of 11 persons elected by the membership, and the Executive Director (ex-officio). This committee is responsible for establishing policies and determining the overall direction of the Association.

The NAIA is organized into 32 geographic districts spread over the 50 states and including two Canadian members. Each district is governed by a District Executive Committee, the chief officer of which is the District Chair. Representation on the District Executive Committee includes one committeeperson for each three active member schools, or major fraction thereof, in the district. The District Chair is elected for a three-year term by a vote of the active membership within the District.

The District is the basic unit of the NAIA. The District Executive Committee establishes a program of District championship events in the various sports. Individual and team District champions are certified to compete in Bi-District Area and / or National championships by virtue of winning the District event or by meeting qualifying standards established within the particular sport.

Women's Division — Effective August, 1980, the NAIA instituted a championship event program for women through its newly-established Women's Division. Nine championships for women were offered during 1980-81 and 1981-82. The NAIA decision to offer competitive opportunities and championship events for women followed two years of consideration by the membership and proposals developed by a committee on women's athletics. The general membership passed the proposal by mail vote in May, 1980.

MEMBERSHIP ELIGIBILITY

Any four-year, degree-granting college or university in the United States and Canada, fully-accredited by the member accrediting agencies or commissions of the Council on Postsecondary Accreditation, may become an active member. Institutions may become members of the NAIA at any time but schools sending in membership dues after the deadline of October 15 will not be considered as active members and will not be eligible to participate in District, Area and National events until the next eligibility reporting deadline following payment of dues. Those reporting deadlines are: October 15, February 1 and April 15.

OBLIGATION OF MEMBERSHIP

Member institutions must conduct their intercollegiate athletic programs to the standards of the regulatory Association in which they hold memberships, and the NAIA. They must pay the annual membership dues and be in support of the policies of the Association. Where institutional rules and standards are stricter than those of the regulatory group or the NAIA, those rules and standards of the institution are recognized and supported by the NAIA.

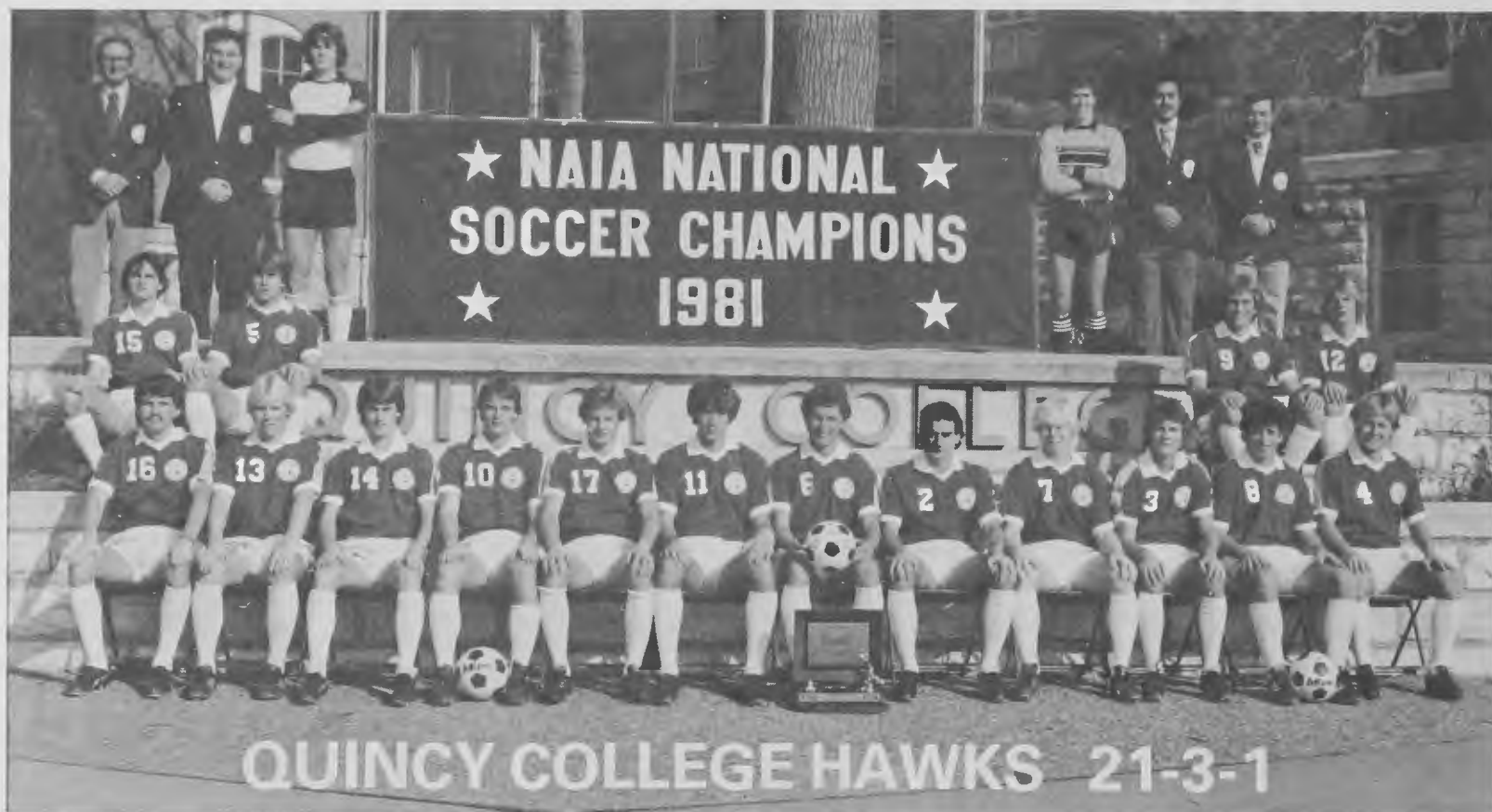

Sophomore striker Tor Duner scored two goals and midfielder Frank Bufe added a goal and two assists, to lead the Quincy College Hawks to a 4-1 victory over Alderson-Broaddus College in the championship final of the 23rd annual NAIA National Soccer Tournament, November 28, 1982 at Sangamon State University in Springfield, Illinois.

The victory marked the fifth consecutive NAIA soccer crown for the Hawks, their eighth over the last nine years and 11th title overall. The 1981 tournament featured an expanded 12-team, World Cup format for the first time. Keene State College NH came away with the third place consolation trophy, defeating Alabama-Huntsville, 3-0.

Keene State goalkeeper Kyle Dietrich was named the tournament's most valuable player, Dennis Hutchinson of Alderson-Broaddus was voted the outstanding forward award and Quincy College's Mark Roome earned honors as the outstanding back.

WHAT IS THE BRINE FORMULA FOR BETTER SOCCER ?



The Brine formula for

better soccer is $R_d = \frac{\rho VD}{\mu}$

TECHNICAL DATA

It will be clear from the following technical explanation that the BRINE WIND CHANNELING will not only eliminate the "jumping" or "knuckling" of the soccer ball, but the ball will travel further and more accurately.

The air flow over a soccer ball and thus the lift and drag of the ball are dependent on whether the local boundary layer is laminar or turbulent, i.e. whether the flow is so-called subcritical, transcritical or supercritical.

The drag coefficient

$$C_{d0} = \frac{\text{Drag}}{\frac{\pi}{8} D^2 V^2}$$

of a smooth ball in low turbulence

flow as a function of Reynolds number, $R_d = \frac{\rho VD}{\mu}$

where D is the ball diameter,

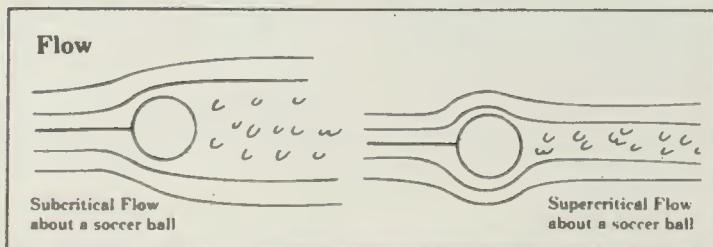
ρ is the air density,

V is the speed of the ball with respect to the air, and

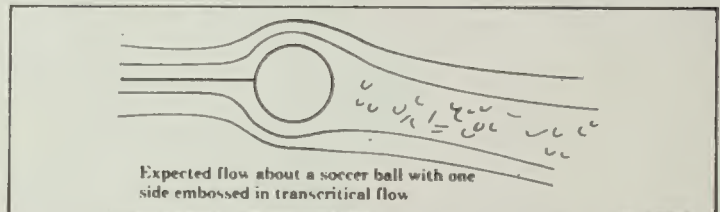
μ is the viscosity of air.

Below a Reynolds number of about 2×10^5 (subcritical flow) the drag coefficient gradually reduces to an asymptotic value of about 0.47. From about $R_d = 2 \times 10^5$ to 6×10^5 (transcritical flow) the drag coefficient drops to about 0.15. Above $R_d = 10^6$ the drag remains roughly constant, although it does begin to rise again at about $R_d = 10^7$. For a soccer ball the critical Reynolds number is exceeded at about 30 mph.

It is important to note that both flow visualization and measurement of the surface pressures over a soccer ball has shown that the reason for the reduction in drag coefficient is that at the higher Reynolds numbers the air flow "adheres" to the surface of the sphere over a greater portion of the surface.



If one (lower) side of the ball is embossed and the other smooth then the flow is as shown below:



Such a flow shows that there will be "lift" force on the soccer ball in a direction away from the smooth side, i.e., the ball tends to curve. Further, if it were spinning slowly the soccer ball would appear to jump, i.e., have lift for a short while and then stop. This same effect is the objective of the knuckle ball pitchers use in baseball.

As already pointed out, both turbulence in the approaching air and the WIND CHANNELING on the surface of the BRINE soccer ball can reduce the critical Reynolds number. The air through which a typical soccer ball is kicked has little small scale turbulence and thus it is the WIND CHANNELING on the BRINE soccer ball that results in the decrease in critical Reynolds number.

Roughness, or embossing, on the order of $K/D = 10^{-3}$ (where K is the embossing height and D the diameter of the ball) provides a significant reduction of the critical Reynolds number. The $K/D = 10^{-3}$ embossing is less than the WIND CHANNELING on a BRINE soccer ball.
