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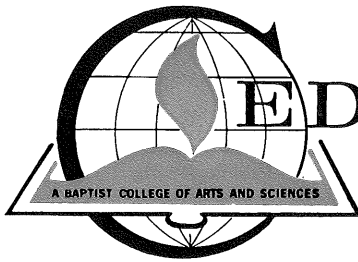

### CEDAR DAY WEEKEND

On Friday, May 9, Dr. George Lawlor was honored with the Faculty Award.



This award was presented by Dan Stevens, president of Student Council, during a special Honors Day service held in Alford Auditorium. Dr. Lawlor has taught in the Bible department for ten years. The recognition was for his outstanding contribution to students in the areas of counseling, teaching, and student activities.

The highlight of the program was the recognition of the scholastic achievements of the student body. A total of 151 students were recognized by Dr. Clifford Johnson, academic dean; Dr. James T. Jeremiah, President; the faculty; and the student body. There were 94 students with a minimum grade point average of 3.25 on the dean's list and 57 students with a minimum grade point average of 3.75 qualifying them for the dean's honor list.

Cedar Day, May 10, was sponsored by Alpha Chi, a men's service organization. The men of Alpha Chi organized a complete schedule of interesting events that were dampened by rain later in the day.

By mid-morning a softball game between the faculty and Alpha Chi men drew a group of cheering spectators. The faculty won 10-8. At noon, a special dunking machine was in operation with dean of men, Mr. Tom Loper, being dunked more than once; a frustration car was clobbered at the rate of three swings for a quarter; and water balloons were tossed at well known faces. Each of these popular activities was attracting small crowds. The noon meal was patterned after a country fair; and gave students, alumni, faculty, parents, and prospective students a wide food selection.

In the afternoon the Yellowjackets baseball team took a 1-0 win from Findlay College. The college tennis team, 13-2 for the season, had their scheduled match rained out. The tennis team swept the MOC tournament and travels to Kansas City for NAIA national competition June 9-14.

The traditional Cedar Tree ceremony was conducted in Alford Auditorium by

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## FROM THE PRESIDENT'S DESK

Dr. James T. Jeremiah, President



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J. Edgar Hoover said that the most valuable resource in America is the "moral, mental, and physical health of her young citizens." Millions of dollars are spent to conserve water, timber, and mineral resources. There seems to be a great deal of debate about the cost of higher education, while comparatively few in our nation actually become concerned about Christian education.

Are these "young citizens" worth the investment? You answer that question for yourself next time an appeal is made for our schools. The answer will be obvious by your response to the need.

The undergraduate college years are ended for more than one hundred eighty graduates of the class of 1969. The seventy-third commencement is history. Our investment—yours and mine—in these young lives is completed though our concern and interest in them will continue.

In the years to come many of the readers of our College Bulletin will become acquainted with the members of the class of 1969 and other graduates. We trust you will welcome them into your schools, business, organizations, and your churches. Put them to work. Give them responsibility. Expect something from them and let them know that you do.

Usually, vision is a characteristic of youth. It is good that this is so. Many things now enjoyed by all of us would never have become a reality if a number of individuals did not have vision. The electric light, mimeograph, phonograph, and countless other inventions never would have become realities if Thomas A. Edison, or other men like him, did not have vision coupled with ambition and determination.

Marconi, Howard Armstrong, Lee DeForest, and others had vision for communication possibilities, and now we have radio and television.

On May 20 and 21, in 1927, Lindbergh kept flying by a vision of success until he conquered 3,605 miles in 33 hours and 39 minutes. His non-stop journey across the Atlantic became one of the greatest feats of history.

The pioneers by "vision" faced perilous dangers, a hostile wilderness, crossed the Appalachian and Rocky Mountain ranges, and gradually opened the West to the thousands who should follow them.

God gave Joshua a vision of the promised land and said, "Every place that the sole of your foot shall tread upon, that have I given you . . . there shall not any man be able to stand before thee all the days of thy life: . . . I will be with thee; I will not fail thee" (Josh. 1:3-5). If our graduates are to succeed they must have vision of the possibilities ahead of them and a vision of the God Who will enable them. This is also necessary for all of us who daily face the responsibility for the future of Cedarville College. There is no end to the need for praying and planning for the future. As we bid one class farewell, we are about to welcome another new class for the fall quarter, and so it goes year after year.

Our students deserve the best we can provide for them. God has given us an excellent faculty which is spiritually and academically prepared to teach and counsel the young people who have selected Cedarville as their college. A new library, new dorm facilities, and the athletic fields presently under construction are examples of the goals accepted by the College family.

Within a few weeks announcements will be made relative to a program for new science facilities. We sincerely hope our friends will be prepared to accept the challenge and join with us in the "vision" which will eventuate in a new and well-equipped science building. As in the past, so now, it can be done as we pray and work together.

The excavations on our new lake and athletic fields are more than half finished and should be completed in another month. The trustees authorized the construction of six tennis courts and a track. The contracts have been let for both of these projects and they will be started when excavations are completed.

The fenced in and lighted tennis courts will be an appropriate facility for our championship tennis team. Our rapidly expanding track program will make good use of the new all-weather track.

During the summer, lighting will also be installed around the new lake. Underground wiring will be used throughout in order to preserve the natural beauty of the new lake and mall. Much of the area will be seeded during September so they will be ready for use by the fall of 1970.

The faculty are now enjoying the use of their new air-conditioned offices on the third floor of the Administration Building. The colorful new furniture and carpets provide an attractive atmosphere for study and counseling.

Visitors to the college are now greeted in the colorful and attractively furnished reception area on the first floor, and if they should visit the offices of the Business Manager or Academic Dean they will be treated to additional wonders brought about by the transformation of remodeling.

## STUDENT FACTS

Paul Entner ('69) chairman of the student missionary project, presented Dr. James T. Jeremiah a check for \$1500 during the week of the Spring Missionary Conference. The money will be used to purchase surgical equipment and supplies for Dr. and Mrs. James Entner, alumni of the college, who are now serving their first term on the island of Palawan, Philippines. The goal was \$1461, which represented a dollar for each day of the Entner's four year term. The campaign slogan was "A dollar a day, keeps Doc away." Various ideas were used to attain the goal. Special slide presentations, selling shares, "a penny can drive", and individual student gifts enabled the drive to become a success.

Bruce McDonald ('69), Paul Entner ('69), and Dave Gregory ('69) were selected for inclusion in the 1969 edition of **Outstanding College Athletes of America**, whose purpose is to recognize and honor the all-around abilities of young athletes who have distinguished themselves in sports competition. The annual biographical compilation features the accomplishments of approximately 5,000 young athletes who have proven themselves outstanding in sports, campus activities, and curriculum. McDonald's recognition was for basketball, Entner's was for tennis, and Gregory's for soccer.

## PASTORS' CONFERENCE SEPTEMBER 8 - 11

The Second Annual Pastors' Conference will be held September 8 - 11. Dr. John G. Balyo, pastor of the Cedar Hill Baptist Church, Cleveland, Ohio, will be the featured speaker. Dr. Balyo's messages will be on the theme "The Pastor and His Preaching." These homiletical messages will be followed by discussion periods when pastors can ask questions and share ideas.

Work shops are also being planned that will cover informative topics relating to the pastor's work. Dr. Robert Sumner, evangelist, will conduct a workshop on "Evangelism in Preaching." Dr. Jack Riggs and Mr. James Grier, professors in the Bible department, will have a workshop in "Apologetics." Rev. ## GRADUATION 1969

The 16th annual commencement under the present Baptist administration was held June 7, 1969. The featured speaker was Dr. Warren W. Wiersbe, pastor of the Calvary Baptist Church of Covington, Kentucky. The **Class of 1969**, was the largest ever graduated. Over 180 graduates received their Bachelors degrees.

## SUMMER SCHOOL

The sixth summer school session begins on June 17 and continues through July 25, 1969. Nine quarter hours is considered a normal load and thirteen hours is the maximum. Approximately 27 courses are being offered and independent studies are available in eight major areas.

Mr. C. B. Hurst, registrar, had approximately 150 students register for this summer program. About ten percent of the number were admitted to the newly formed Educational Development Program, a non-credit course of instruction. This special assistance is to provide a background of experience to increase the student's opportunities for academic success. Each student in this program has the opportunity to enroll in five to seven credit hours of regular class work for credit.

## STANDOUT ATHLETE

Bruce McDonald of the Class of '69 is considered a standout athlete, not only by officials of the Mid-Ohio Conference, but also Cedarville College. McDonald's basketball number was permanently retired at the college. He is on record as hitting over 50 per cent of his shots, and scoring a total of almost 2,000 points in his four years of play.

Good athletes are sometimes unnoticed by the area press, but the old reliable sports grapevine always gets the word to the ones who count. McDonald's baseball career is even more impressive. He has never hit less than .400 in baseball at Cedarville and has been viewed by scouts from all the major-league teams. Two years ago he completed a 30-game season with a perfect 1,000 fielding average at second base.

One area veteran observer of hardball play - an umpire for 23 years, says McDonald is one of the best prospects this Ohio area has developed in his career. McDonald expects to be picked in the major league draft in June. He has indicated he might like to go with Cleveland or Detroit.

Last summer Bruce led a group of outstanding basketball players from colleges across the country on a five-nation "Ventures for Victory" tour through the Fiji Islands, New Zealand, and Australia.

## ALUMNI OF NOTE

Jack D. Willetts ('57), assistant superintendent of Brunswick, Ohio schools for the past four years, has been named superintendent. The new position will begin August 1 which will start a two-year contract. After graduating from Cedarville College in 1957, he received a master's from Western Reserve University. ## RECORD REGISTRATION FOR FALL QUARTER

Mr. C. B. Hurst, registrar, advised after the conclusion of pre-registration in May that the receipt of applications is substantially ahead of last year. However, there is still opportunity for interested students to apply. Mr. Hurst anticipates a fall quarter enrollment of approximately 900, the largest in the history of Cedarville College.

There have been curriculum improvements outlined in the catalogue that will be of interest to students. Two courses have been added in Christian Education and a major in Psychology. A Pre-pharmacy course has been included in the science division. This program is administered in cooperation with Ohio State University College of Pharmacy.

## TENNIS CHAMPS REPEAT

If the Mid-Ohio Conference demands a real test of the Cedarville College tennis team or bars the Yellow Jackets from future MOC tournaments, don't be surprised.

Last year, Cedarville pulled a first ever for the MOC when it won all divisions of the conference tennis tournament, and on May 20, 1969 Coach Murray Murdoch did it again as his boys won all six finals singles matches and the three doubles events.

Cedarville, which had the team title sewed up before the final matches in the rain-delayed tourney finishing with a perfect 45 points, while Defiance was second with 12, Bluffton and Malone had six each, Findlay three, and Wilmington zero. Five points were given for winning the division title and three for second place.

The NAIA nationals will be at Rockhill Country Club in Kansas City, June 9-14 for the Jackets

And all of this was done with only one practice court at the college. Coach Murdoch hopes to have six new courts by next year. Not only is that bad news for the other MOC tennis, but Coach Murdoch loses only two of his players this year, Paul Entner, the No. 1 man, and Ron Baker. The No. 1 spot will be harder to fill, since this man must face the best the opponents have to offer.

Two singles and one doubles combinations are unbeaten. Dave Durham has a 16-0 mark, Ron Baker, 17-0 and the doubles team of Warren Pettit and Dave Beck are 16-0. Entner is 15-1, Dan Ruffin 15-2 and Pettitt and Beck each 16-1 in singles. Entner and Ruffin are 12-2 in doubles and Durham and Baker lost only one doubles match, that was to Transylvania, which beat the Jackets 5-4 for its only loss this season. The only other team to score on Cedarville was Hillsdale, Mich., one of the strongest NAIA teams in that state. Cedarville has had 12 shut-outs this season.

Cedarville went through the entire MOC tournament losing only one set. The all-conference MOC team consisted entirely of players representing Cedarville.
