PSYCHIATRIST SPEAKS

Last Friday, our school family witnessed a program in which the Junior Class founded a ceremony that will be an annual highlight on the C.C. campus in the years to come.

A group of Junior Class members secured a large rock from the gravel pit and placed it on the front lawn Thursday evening. After the opening exercises of song and prayer, Ed Mawhorter read a dissertation about the objective of the chapel hour. Following this reading, Al Griffin spoke of the meaning and the usefulness of the rock.

The **dubious** assembly moved from Milner Chapel to the rock at the front of the Science Building. Cliff Miller formally announced the declaration of purpose.

The ceremony was climaxed when each member of the Junior Class identified himself with his class by pouring his class color over the rock.

Ex-Roman Catholic psychiatrist, Dr. F. Milke, addressed Cedarville College last Monday.

Dr. Milke was saved two years ago through the testimony of Pres. James Jeremiah and Rev. Harvey Christian.

"Christ is the best psychiatrist and the only solution for our problems," Dr. Milke said.

In a direct answer of summation to the question, Mr. Turnbull said, "They should go to war if the cause is just."
