A leather bound volume of the Augsburg Confession of Faith shows the early style of books. It is still in good condition despite the fact that it was published in 1591. The library also has the Hexaglot of the Torah. It is written in Hebrew, Greek, Latin, German, Chaldean and Slavian. It was published in 1599. Another classic is the Writings of Martin Luther published in 1573.

## FROM THE FACULTY

Mr. Webber, what do you consider to be the most serious need in our congregational singing?

"The basic problem is the singing of hymns without understanding and meaning. In Psalm 9:1,2 we learn an outward manifestation of a heart full of praise is a song to God. When we sing in chapel or in a church service, we often seem afraid to register our emotions. If we love the Lord and our hearts are full of praise, should we not show forth that praise and love when we sing?

Too often, rather than singing to God and exhorting our fellow man to the virtues of following Christ our Savior, we are either mentally asleep or are thinking about something else while we sing.

Try this test. The next time you finish singing a hymn, see if you could tell someone the meaning of the hymn just sung. God wants us to worship Him in spirit and in truth. Do we worship God when we sing?
