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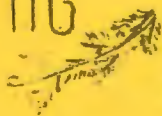

Jacobus Arminius and his followers tell us that Adam's fall alienated the affections, darkened the intellect, corrupted the body, polluted the heart, but the will escaped and is now "free." Hence, man is only partially depraved and is not dead but only sick.

The will is the faculty of choice, the immediate cause of all action. But as the hand (immediate cause) serves the nerves and muscles of the arm and the brain (primary cause), so the will is the servant of the heart. The Word of God teaches that the heart is the dominating center of the human being (Mark 7:21). Unfallen Adam's will was free to do good and evil but his sons are only free to evil since their hearts are "deceitful above all things and desperately wicked" and "are by nature the children of wrath and disobedience." Hence, the will is not free but is regulated by the sinful nature of man.
