Carr popped out to second baseman and Purdy was put out on a fielder's choice which let J. Thornton reach first base. D. Dautel smashed a single which scored Wiseman. In Defiance's half of the inning, a double, a single, a walk, and three errors brought two Defiance runs in to make the score at the end of the first inning of play, 2-1, Defiance. In the second inning the Jackets failed to cross the plate while Defiance added another tally. The third inning saw one run added to the Jackets' score only to have Defiance send three runs home in their half of the inning. The rest of the game was scoreless until the top half of the seventh inning when the Jackets trying to rally coupled together 3 hits, an error, and a fielder's choice to score twice.
