DRAMATICS, PHOTOGRAPHY CLUBS IN MAKING

Within the network of campus life here at Cedarville we have numerous organizations that help the growth of our college experience. These groups are the various clubs that have become a part of the Cedarville tradition. The college student wishing to find a more rounded and enjoyable stay on the college campus takes advantage of the clubs, helping not only himself, but his fellow students as well. It is but a natural step toward maturity.

One such organization is the dramatics club. The purpose of this group is to provide the interested student the opportunity of expressing his or her talent along with others with like interests. It also will give these individuals the deserved recognition.

At present there are no members, but a number of students have already earned points towards the accumulation necessary for membership eligibility. Main parts are awarded 7 points; secondary parts 4 points, and minor points 2 points. The possibility for promotion points may be collected by making 15% of the total sales at any one play. Production points are earned which involves such things as stage properties, make-up, and costumes.

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NEW JAIL WORK OPEN FOR STUDENTS

Beginning this Sunday, December 14, several girls from the college will have the opportunity of holding services in the women's division of the Clark County Jail, located in Springfield.

For the past few years fellows from our school have been bringing the Word of God to an average of 100 men each week, but this is the first time a women's work has been set up on a permanent schedule. The women's ward occupies a position on the second floor of the jail, away from the men's ward.

Services will be held each Sunday morning beginning at nine, and lasting approximately one hour. The service itself will be not more than thirty minutes in length, giving the students a chance for personal work among the prisoners.

The jail group, led by Leon Rolland, feels that, though this is a needy work, the opportunities for service are as great as the need.

NEW RULES PASSED

Several new rules have been passed in the past weeks by the faculty members. Some of them are as follows:

1. No person should be given an excuse from class unless confined to his room or bed by the school nurse.

2. Notice of camping will be posted on board for lesser offences, and announced in chapel for more severe offences.

3. Students in each dormitory are expected to report any furnishings which they may break. If something is broken and the responsible person or persons fail to report their responsibility then furnishings will be repaired, notice will be posted of the expense, and if the guilty student still fails to report then all the students in the dorm will be assessed through the business office.
