The one rule which I keep before me at all times and which applies to both is found in the Bible in Hebrews 12:1-2:

"Wherefore seeing we also are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every

weight and the sin that doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us, looking unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith; who for the joy that was set before Him, endured the cross, despising the shame, and is set down on the right hand of the throne of God."

In running I put aside all weights, exercise, and control my eating; then I look to my clothing, be sure I have the lightest shoes, my trunks and shirt just right. So it is in life. We lay aside the sins that are in our lives and hear and don the full armor of our Lord. We have to run the race with patience; that is harder than some may think. In a two mile race we shouldn't go out into too much of a lead and run as fast as we can, or run it as though it were only a one-mile race. And so it is in our spiritual lives. We must not get impatient and take on spiritual tasks which we cannot accomplish. Wait on the Lord; He will teach you these needful things. The 1960 Senior Class may not emerge as the over-all intramural champions at the end of the school year, but it can already claim a record that may stand for years. Last Thursday the "elders" edged the Sophomores 39-35 for the basketball championship, making the fourth consecutive year that this class has so done, having previously copped the title while playing as freshmen, sophomores, and last year as juniors.

The win last week was by no means an easy one. After blowing a nine-point bulge early in the game, the Seniors were tied shortly after the start of the second half, 22-22. From then on it was a real nip-and-tuck affair. Aging Don Sewell had his best night of the year in leading both teams with 16 points. Marv Troyer topped the Sophs with 12, and Dick Minier backed him up with 11.

Minier emerged as the season scoring champ with 109 points in 8 games. His two closest rivals, Bob Humphreys and Bob Redman, were held to 5 and 3 points respectively in the final game. Redman, however, led the league in average with 14.1 per game.
