## MANY IMPROVEMENTS PLANNED FOR C. C.

The business manager's office has released a list of campus improvements which can only be realized as funds are made available. Heading this list is a new dormitory which will house between one hundred and two hundred students. Another major change will be the relocation of the cafeteria. Two possibilities for this are the Student Center or the basement of the proposed dormitory. Other items on this list are:

1. Grading of parking lots.
2. Installation of insulation and storm windows for Faith Hall.
3. New tractor for snow removal and lawn mowing purposes.
4. Redecoration of the Administration Building and sandblasting of the exterior.
5. Conversion of the banquet hall into two large lecture rooms.
6. New heating system in the Science Building and auditorium.
7. Redecoration of the auditorium.
8. Increase in outside lighting.
9. Paving of road next to Milner Hall.
10. Water line in trailer court.

These look good and present to our supporting constituency challenging objectives which will make Cedarville an

even better place to live. Before construction can start on a new library the school needs at least \$300,000. Let us all pray that the needed funds will come in for these improvements and the library.

## ROUTE 42 CHANGE PROPOSED FOR FUTURE

Following the completion of the construction of Highway 71 from Columbus to Cincinnati, the Ohio Department of Highways proposes to re-route Highway 42, which presently runs from Xenia through Cedarville, making a turn at Main Street and Chillicothe. The reason for this change is to bypass the business district of Cedarville, which is a principal area of congestion.

The proposed highway will probably begin at the Xenia city limits and go to the Clarke County line. It will be a limited access, four-lane highway with a median strip.

How will this change affect Cedarville College? The proposed highway will touch college property at the southwest corner of the farm, crossing Highway 72 midway between Bethel Hall and the North Cemetery. The State wants

## EDITORIAL

### WHY FOLLOW RULES?

We are exhorted in Romans to take heed lest we cause a brother to stumble. Paul stated that he would not eat meat if it offended his brother. Such is a non-moral issue. A student here may find several rules in the College Handbook which he feels unnecessary for him. To what extent is he to follow them?

First, we should be aware that these rules can change. We can submit our opinion to Student Council representatives or by written pleas to the student government via the suggestion box on the Student Center bulletin board.

However, we should realize that the rules established on campus were not initiated haphazardly. Many individuals have worked developing a system for governing the College. To disobey these rules openly is to instill a spirit of anarchy in our lives.

Secondly, it is mere courtesy to others to obey the regulations of our society. Poor headlights is a minor offense that would cause us great anger if we were to receive a lecture from a patrolman concerning them. But, if we would receive a telephone call from our pastor informing us that our parents were in a terrible accident due to faulty headlights of an oncoming car we would be "out for blood." There is a reason, so let's obey laws!

Thirdly, the rules were here before we came. Knowing them beforehand gave us ample time to change our choice of colleges. We have all signed our

names to a document stating that we would abide by these regulations. By breaking one we thereby break our word.

Fourthly, it is a sign of weakness not to conduct ourselves according to these rules. It was once stated that the good and poor soldiers could be picked out early in basic training. Where a poor soldier's attitude is, "They can't make me do anything I don't want to do"; a potential hero would say, "I'll show them, anything they can 'dish out,' I can take." We are exhorted to be soldiers of Christ. Let's be good soldiers. When a reasonable authority demands—let's obey.

### SCHIZOPHRENIA: U. S. STYLE

One of the greatest mistakes in the foreign policy of the Kennedy administration was the decision to sell wheat to Russia. In the name of "peace" and under the guise of "co-existence" America has not only helped the enemy out of a disastrous farm crisis but it has also lost power to enforce an economic blockade on Cuba. We plead with our allies and many other countries not to trade with Cuba but they reply, "you sell wheat to Russia, why can't we sell goods to Cuba if it is for our own profit?"

What makes us so upset about this Cuban government? Are we finally seeing Communism in close perspective? Are we finally realizing the very ideology that has terrorized European nations for many years? While Russia is playing Halloween in their "peaceful co-existence" costume, their worldwide plan is being carried out by their henchmen in places such as China, Cuba, Zanzibar, and the Congo. If America

to acquire a 250-foot right of way, approximately 10-12 acres.

Some college officials feel this change will provide advertisement for the College, by having a state highway going by our proposed buildings.

Other advantages will be avoiding the bad turn between Cedarville and Central State, and alleviating the constant flow of trucks coming through Cedarville.

Although this change has been proposed, it has no status on the current construction program of the Highway Department and will not until at least 1968.
