The campaign swung into action when the group met Tuesday night, March 10, at 7:30 P.M. in the Lion's Club meeting rooms, above the Thrifty Market. At that time they met with the captain of their group, received instruction about what the Red Cross does, were assigned to their streets for solicitation, were given pointers on soliciting through the use of a film, and received their Kit and Credentials.
