CEDARVILLE YELLOWJACKETS END SEASON IN TRIUMPH

"All's well that ends well" may not be completely apropos as a memorial to Cedarville's 1959-60 basketball season, but the fine finish displayed by the Yellowjackets certainly brought a great deal of satisfaction to many.

Beginning with a highly improved pattern of play against Findlay's Yellowjackets a week ago (even though losing 65-63), Coach Borser's squad showed the students and fans some really superb basketball by downing Grace College 85-63 Friday, February 26. Tuesday night our boys escaped a winless league campaign as they toppled Jefferson 80-78. Pete Reese ended a hot seat contest with a one-handed jump shot from the circle just as the buzzer sounded. Reese's 37-point performance led both teams in scoring and the talented center concluded a highly successful college career.

The only other senior playing his last game was old reliable John Entler, who came through with his usual steady performance playing the full 30 minutes (as did Reese) and hitting for 9 points. Cedarville closed the year with a 7-won, 16-lost record.

STUDENT GOVERNMENT LEADS DISCUSSION

The Student Government, in charge of the chapel service Monday

ing, February 29, reminded students of its purpose and of their duties, and clarified some vague campus rules. Larry Smith led the discussion, and Dr. Williams helped him answer student questions. Of the 34 students graduating, about 22 entered four years ago in a class of 55 students. Some students have dropped out or behind; others have joined the class as transfers from other colleges or other classes. President of both Student Council and Foreign World Missions this year, Merlin Ager, has spent a profitable four years at Cedarville. His work here has been a good illustration of his life verse, I Cor. 15: 58: "Therefore, . . . be ye steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord." He has given valuable help and leadership to the Student Council, Varsity C, Alpha Chi, Foreign World Missions, Basketball and Baseball teams, and the Choir. A history major with plans for the ministry, Merlin says that during his study at Cedarville College he has "Become a Baptist by conviction" and has had his "spiritual sense of values more aligned to the Word and Will of God." He plans to do graduate work in education at the University of Wisconsin, then after study at Grand Rapids Theological Seminary, full-time Christian service.

A Bible major with plans for the ministry, Paul Anderson has participated in the Tract Club and Foreign World Missions. After he graduates, he plans to work and to preach as the opportunity arises. Paul and Miss Nancy Newman plan an August wedding. Paul has chosen as his life verse Philippians 3:12, 13: "Brethren, I count not myself to have apprehended; but this one thing I do, forgetting those things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus."

ZINN SINGS HIS SERMONS

FORMER STUDENT IS ORDAINED

The Reverend Jerrold Root, formerly of Beaver Dams, New Jersey, and graduate of Cedarville College in the class of 1959, was ordained into the Baptist ministry January 29 during evening services in the Baptist Church at Monterey, N. J. During the afternoon a council of 16 ministers and 13 delegates heard the candidate's expression of conversion, call to ministry, and views on Christian doctrine. After deliberation, the council recommended to the church that the candidate be

ordained. During the evening service, Mrs. John Reno of Cedarville, and Miss Mary Short rendered musical solos. The Reverend John Reno of Cedarville gave the ordination sermon.

The Reverend Root and the former Miss Mary Short were married following his ordination and are now residing in their new home at Corinth, Vermont, where he pastors the Congregational Church.
