The Trumpet Duet, Ladies' trio, and Kinsmen Quartet introduced the theme of the conference by an ensemble rendition of "The Whole Wide World." The audience was quiet and expectant, as though anticipating great things.

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CHOIR RETURNS TO CAMPUS

Concerning Cedarville College, Charles says, "Cedarville College has made tremendous changes since I first came in contact with it back in 1953. In 1955, when I came to Cedarville College, many changes were already evident. And the changes continued. My prayer is that our thoughts may not be completely on the changes and growth of the school; I pray that its spiritual atmosphere and spiritual life may not deteriorate."

Bob Humphreys, a Bible major and a student pastor at New Richland Baptist Church, feels that Cedarville College has helped him in the Word of God. His life verse in Joshua 4:24: "That all the people of the earth might know the hand of the Lord, that it is mighty; that ye might fear the Lord your God forever." He says, "We need young people dedicated to Christ in teaching, business, and other fields, but we need them as soul-winners for Jesus Christ first of all. No one is qualified to be a leader until he has won someone to Christ." Bob has been a member of the Varsity C Club four years, serving as chaplain his junior year and president his senior year; played varsity basketball three years and baseball two years; was on Student Council two years; and was a member of the choir for three years. His future plans include pastoring and possible seminary.
